that yo Lasp will not be displeased at my acquainting you with ye distress of so great a genius, in order to give you an opportunity of introducing him into ye world. The giving Bread to this poor man in any part of Wales will be doing a very eminent service to ye Welsh in general, his writings will do honour to his country, and sure I am were there many such as him among ye Welsh clergy that their labour wd greatly stop ye progress of the mad Methodists who have in a manner bewitched the major part of ye inhabitants, wen is generally attributed to ye Indolence and, it's greatly to be feared, ignorance of too many of ye parochial ministers. I am informed that Mr Tho. Owen, Rector of Aberffraw, is in a very declining way and cannot hold out long: in whose gift the living is, I know not. years fatiguing labour in collating & correcting two Impressions of the Welsh Bible hath merited me any esteem with yo Lap, & their Lasps the other Welsh Bishops, I shall think my self very abundantly rewarded if this poor man can but get any small preferment at my recommendation more particularly in his native Island, and I humbly beg yo Ldsp to have him in remembrance

FRIEND,

Yours I recd In due time with ye acct as desired, Excepting

that you dont tell me whether the Effects mentiond there, are in Ready money, Lands, Bonds, or Cattle which I would be glad to know if Could Enquire further into ye affair, & write to me pr first opportunity.

as for ye acct I promisd to send you Concerning ye wonder that was seen in ye Air, according to ye best Enquiry I could make Ill give it you with all ye Impartiality Imaginable and Let you Judge of ye Cause and Effects of ye Phenomena.

On Decr ye 5th 1733 at about 2 In ye afternoon an Indifferent dull cloudy day, Inclining to rain, ye wind blowing fresh S.S.E. one William John Lewis a Farmer of ye Parish of Holyhead being within half a mile to ye E.S.E. of Holyhead a Plowing with a servant boy in ye fields. He with his boy saw Coming from ye mountains of Snowden a vessel of about 90 ton as he guessd Rig'd after ye manner of a Catch [? Ketch] under all her sails with ye Fore Tack at ye Cathead sailing in ye air about a Quarter of a mile High from ye Ground steering directly towards him, with her penant & antient flying but of what colour he could not Discern; after he had taken some notice of ye phenomena he ran home to Call out his wife and by ye Time she came to ye Door all that she saw was the Vessel returning Stern foremost towards Carnaryonshire mountains. penant coming upon Deck and all ye sails down and Furld or at least not to be perceivd. The masts Boltsprit and yards very plain and then a cloud receiving ye vessel out of sight.

The next day after this strange story was spread abroad I went to ye mans House to Enquire into ye truth and Particulars of this Story. The man being not at Home, His wife with some unwillingness told me ye above passage that she had seen, and how her husband calld her out and that she did not care to mention it Lest people might Imagine it was an Invention of theirs. Sometimes after I met her Husband in Holyhead of whom I Enquird further, who agreed in what ye woman said in most particulars Excepting Sea Terms for she could not say how she was Rigg'd but said she was like ye old Packuet boats (which tis known were Catches).

He said further that he could count ye very Ropes of her

Riggin Though the vessel came no nearer to him than within half a mile viz. over Penrhose Bradwen; and that he saw a great number of Birds Flying about ye vessel and under her Keel and when ye vessel began to return back The birds took their Flight to ye Northward into ye Sea.

He saw no men nor any Likelyhood of any, he could see ye very keel and Stern plain as could be, & the Sails were so plain that he could see y^m swell with ye Hardness of ye Gale, & in Lowering down ye fore stay sail it hung Loose over ye Bow, & a cloud received ye vessel, stern foremost.

He further says that about 10 years agoe he saw another vessel Rig'd after ye same manner and abt ye same bigness but that it came further to ye N.W. and Quite over his head at a place called Peibio not far from his house, and was very near ye Ground, and about 20 year agoe he saw Just such another.

All these things I had from ye People's own mouths Now we are to consider into ye truth of the Relation & nature of this appearance.

All Evidences are to be Considered under one of these 3 heads:

Testimony of Honest Historians or Relators. Reason of things & Experiments. In our Case The Only Evidence of proof we have is ye Testimony of ye Relator. Therefore we must Enquire into his Character and by what I hear of all his neighbours that I have discoursed with, it is this.

He is an Illiterate man of about 54 years of age, Lives upon himself having a good stock of money, Farms & Small Tenements, lets Horses to hire & for passengers. He & his wife are a couple of very serious sedate people, far from any vanity and from being Talkative or vain glorious. He is a man of very sound Judgement in his own affairs to my knowledge and hath nothing (as I can find) of a Melancholy disposition in him: No man Can object agt his sincerity and Indeed he is noted for his Blunt Honesty & his plain dealing, nor can I learn that ever he is us'd to tell a lye willfully.

By the Character Given of this man you may Judge of yetruth of the Relation.

What is remarkd upon ye whole is

That God shews his power when he thinks proper, & most Comonly to shepherds & Ignorant people, to the Confusion of Great wise men & That ye first appearance was about ye Preston Rebellion [1715] whether any thing Extraordinary happend after ye second appearance you may better remember than I. What Extraordinary alteration in ye world may happen soon after this Phenomenon God alone knows.

The Inclosed is a copy of the Commission I had from the Treasury which I desire you'll carry without loss of time to any eminent council (except ye attorney-gen1) & except also such persons that you may suspect will be employed by my adversaries, and let me have an opinion,

1. "Whether an Injunction from any Court of Law can or ought to stop me in working these mines for ye Crown," or whether an Injunction lies against the Crown. It would be a
