# Mysterious thunder echoes through time

A blast from the past has haunted Shirley. Wallace for 17 years.

The moment frozen in her life happened in Maryvale around 6 p.m. on a Sunday when Wallace was 18. Most of her family had gone to church that evening. She staved at home with her father and baby brother.

"We were just sitting around in the kitchen when there was a tremendous explo-



sion." Wallace said. "The whole house shook violently like a cardboard box. It wasn't like a sonic boom or an earthquake. I had felt earthquakes before, and this was more violent. My dad had been in

the service twice, and he said it felt like an artillery shell."

"There was no smoke or fumes or anything," Wallace said. "Even the dog was acting quite normal."

They walked around to the front and were met by another curiosity.

"When we went out in the front yard, all the people from around the block and surrounding streets were standing there looking at our house like it had blown off the face of the Earth. It was sort of like a scene from The Twilight Zone."

Wallace never did find out what caused the blast. She's considered all kinds of exotic possibilities, including the collision of parallel universes.

Then it happened again. This time, last December while Wallace was shopping with her three sons and a girlfriend at Metrocenter. She was returning a rent-astroller when a sound like a gunshot erupted from the stroller rack.

"My friend and I looked at each other like, 'What was that?' Others in the mall stopped and stared at us. One man started running."

Wallace later called Metrocenter to find out what had happened. She may have found out more from Stephen King.

"They didn't know of anything out of the ordinary."

# Government lied to public about UFO reports, CIA says

Many sightings really secret U.S. spy planes By William J. Broad

In the darkest days of the Cold War, the military lied to the American public about the true rature of many unidentified flying objects in an effort to hide its growing fleets of spy planes, a CIA study says.

The deceptions were made in the 1950s and '60s amid a wave of UFO sightings that alarmed the public and parts of official Washington.

The ClA study says the Air Force knew that most reports by citizens and aviation experts were based on fleeting glimpses of U-2 and SR-71 spy planes, which fly externely high.

Those planes were developed in the 1950s and '60s to photograph enemy targets. From secret bases, mainly in California and Nevada, the aircraft repeatedly flew across the country and eventually overseas to bases in countries that included Britain, West Germany and Taiwan.

While commercial airliners in the 1950s flew at altitudes of up to 30,000 feet, the U-2 soared to more than 60,000 feet and the SR-71 to more than 80,000 feet, or 15 miles, nearly the edge of space.

The planes carried powerful carretas to spy on foreign military installations and sensitive electronic gear to capture radio and radar transmissions. The spy craft were developed by the intelligence agency and often flown by the Air Force.

Rather than acknowledging the existence of the top-secret flights or saying nothing about the UFOs publicly, the Air Force decided to put out false cover stories, the CIA study says. For instance, unusual observations that were spy flights were attributed to atmospheric phenomena like ice crystals and temperature inversions.

"Over half of all UFO reports from the late 1950s through the 1960s were accounted for by manned reconnaissance flights" over the United States, the CIA study says. "This led the Air Force to make misleading and deceptive statements to the public in order to allay public fears and to protect an extraordinarily sensitive national secu-

rity project."

The study, "CIA's Role in the Study of UFOs, 1947-90," was written by Gerald Haines and appears in Studies of Intelligence, a secret CIA journal. Five years ago, the agency began releasing unclassified versions of the journal yearty. The 1997 edition, with the study on unidentified objects, is at http://www.odci. gov/csi/studies/ 97unclas/ on the World Wide Web.

Haines is a historian at the National Recomaissance Office, the intelligence agency that builds and runs the nation's spy satellites.

The admission of federal deception on the issue appears to be a first, experts said in interviews.

"It's very significant." said Richard Hall, chairman of the Fund for UFO Research, a group in Washington. "Certainly they've lied about not having any interest in the subject. But I don't know of any other deception like this."

John Pike, head of space policy at the Federation of American Scientists, also based in Washington, said the admission raised questions about other federal cover-ups involving UFOs.

"The flying-saucer community is definitely onto something," in charging that the military is hiding something, Pike said.

There are two schools of thought on the nature of such a cover-up. One, from Pike and other acrospace experts, holds that many sightings over the decades involved secret federal projects fearning advanced aircraft and reconnaissance missions. The new admission strengthens that view.

The other school holds that the government has come into possession of extraterrestrial craft and beings and is hiding them from the public, partly to avoid causing panic. That view was celebrated last month on the 50th anniversary of an incident in Roswell,



N.M.. in which conspiracy theorists say a saucer crashed to Earth and was seized by the government.

The deceptions about the spy flights were issued in some of the tensest days of the Cold War. The Soviet Union exploded its first hydrogen bornb in 1955, the year that the U-2 flew for the first time.

In 1960, a U-2 was shot down over the Soviet Union, leading to the cancellation of an East-West peace conference. In 1962, a U-2 spotled a buildup of Soviet nuclear arms in Cuba, precipitating the diplomatic crisis regarded by some experts as the closest the superpowers came to nuclear war.

To make the spy planes harder to see and less likely to prompt UFO reports, they were evenually painted black. The CIA study said U-2s initially had silver bodies "and reflected the rays from the sun, especially at sumise and sunset."

The report added that "they often appeared as fiery objects to observers below."

But the SR-71, which first flew in 1964, was apparently painted black from the start. Its nickname was the Blackbird.

# Extraterrestrial search group organizing chapter here

If there was a group of professionals dedicated to the serious investigation of extraterrestrial life, and making contact with it, would you be interested in joining?

According to one local woman, the Center for the Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence, otherwise known as CSETI, is that group.

The group goes beyond just documenting reports from people who claim to have seen unidentified flying objects or been abducted by aliens. CSETI operates what is called CE-5, or close encounters of the fifth kind human-initiated contact with extraterrestrial beings.

The group should not be confused with SETI, the Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence, the organization popularized by astronomer Carl Sagan and privately funded since it was cut from the government purse in 1993.

CSETI is described as an international nonprofit scientific research and education organization dedicated to the understanding of extraterrestrial intelligence, said Trudy Schuett, local organizer of the group.

CSETI will host a training session next month in Yuma to build

a local team of researchers. Interested Yumans should contact Schuett by Wednesday at 7266200.

"The focus of CSETI is, if possible, to create a relationship with extraterrestrials," Schuett said.

Schuett, founder of the Desert Light Metaphysical Society in 1995, said the universe is too big for there not to be extraterrestrial life.

She became interested in UFOs about four years ago, as a hobby she and her husband could share. But with all the hype and information out on the subject, and her own unexplained sighting, Schuett wants to find out for herself what is really going on, she said.

Schuett said CSETI is a wellrespected national organization with about 500 members worldwide.

The organization was founded in 1991 in Asheville, N.C., by Dr. Steven M. Greer, an emergencyroom physician. Greer wanted to change the focus of UFO research from investigating past sightings to researching sightings themselves.

To do this, he used information gathered from years of sighting reports to develop ways to attract extraterrestrials, and he trains teams of observers to take notes. The methods include using strobe lights, lasers and tones that match those recorded from ET craft. CSETI also trains its members in directed thought and remoteviewing techniques.

CSETI reports it has been successful in making contact with extraterrestrials. Since 1991, sightings by CSETI research teams have been reported in the United States, Mexico, Belgium, England, Scotland and Finland.

Schuett said people are beginning to realize you don't have to be a nut case to have a sighting or believe extraterrestrial civilizations really exist, she said. A statewide poll taken last month revealed that one in 10 Arizonans say they have seen objects in the sky they believe are alien spacecraft. Half of those people say they've seen spaceships more than once, and in Pima County, 7 percent said they know somebody who has been abducted by aliens, according to the poll.

CSETI's Project Starlight is an effort to get officials in government, military and intelligence to come forward and disclose information they have on ETs.

Schuett said she had her own sighting a few years ago. She was with her son when they saw a triangular object moving slowly up in the sky above Somerton Avenue at County 8th Street. She initially thought it was a stealth bomber, but later learned it was not. The sighting was never explained, she said.

"I have no idea what's going to happen, but I'm hoping for actual physical things that we can document."

She said skepticism doesn't bother her, "it just goes with the territory."

Schuett, a writer, said potential members of the Yuma group include a real estate agent, an astronomer and a retired person.

To host the training at least 10 people must sign up. The cost is \$85, which covers a one-year membership in CSETI and the training.

Schuett said the cost isn't high when you consider some new-age organizations charge \$200 to \$300 for an afternoon. The daylong training will be followed by a night session in the desert.
