It was not an ordinary burning star or light as it seemed to be under control — it moved rapidly and then would stop and then move again, said Charles Morris of Salisbury. Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Morris was referring to the "ball of fire" that has been spotted recently in the Moncton area which even Department of Transport officials claim has been spotted.

Sunday at approximately 11:30 p.m. Mr. Morris was travelling from Salisbury to Coverdale where he is employed when he spotted a bright light across the Petitcodiac River over Moncton.
"I first picked the fire-colored

object up in my rear view mirror," he said, "and then again as I was opposite the Turtle Creek Church as it appeared directly opposite me across the river."

Mr. Morris said, "sometimes it appeared very large and then appeared very small and didn't last for any more than 30 se-conds."

It appeared to be approxi-mately 10 to 12 feet in diameter, he added.

In recent years there have been several reports of Un-identified Flying Objects at the identified Flying Objects at the control tower at Moncton Airport but they were shot down by officials as being aircraft landing and taking-off.

Also, Sunday night at approximately 11:30 p.m. another man spotted the mysterious object over the city.

He was sitting in his suburban Toronto home when a news report came over the radio that a Chapeau Que, man had told of sighting a "flying machine," on his 10-acre farm near here.

pursuit for the truth when one pursuit for the truth when one night he says he spotted a bright light in the sky "which jiggled and jogged," in a manner too fast for an aircraft or satellite.

"That one particular incident got me more involved and it's been a sericus thing with me ever since," Mr. McKay said today on his way to Chapeau to talk to Leo Paul Chaput.

Mr. Chaput told reporters this week about various incidents near his farm on the Wabash Line which lead him to believe in "flying machines."

Three large rings of matted grass just across the road from his home is his evidence that "a machine landed one night when he saw a blinding light that lit up the sky.'

The circles about 27 feet across are perfectly shaped and look like an object was resting on the grass tramping it down.

Jun - 7,1969 Flying Objects in Sky Here

Several flaming objects flashed across the late afternoon sky yesterday, startling hundreds of residents of St. Louis and St. Louis County.

The objects were described as white with a green or blue tinge and were reported to be flying faster than 2000 miles an hour. Witnesses included the pilots of two small planes, one of whom gave chase briefly.

Reports said that the objects crossed from east to west about 5:50 p.m. Residents from O'Fallon, Ill., to Chesterfield in west St. Louis County saw the objects.

They were seen as far east as Peoria, Ill., and by an airline pilot near Denver. All of the sighting were made about the same time, indicating that the objects were at a very high altitude.

J. Allen Hynek, an astronomy professor at Northwestern University, said that the objects could have been parts of a man-made satellite that burned as it re-entered the earth's atmosphere.

However, an official at the Space Defense Center in Colora-do Springs, Colo., told the Post-Dispatch last night that the center, which tracks man-made satellites, had no record of a satellite scheduled to re-enter the atmosphere.

The spokesman said that it was highly unlikely that the objects were from a satellite because rarely is one placed in an east-to-west orbit.

Most authorities speculated that a large meteor entered the upper atmosphere and broke up as it hurtled earthward.

The two pilots told officers at Scott Air Force Base that they were flying at about 2000 feet when they saw the objects. Both said they thought the objects were about 2000 feet above their planes.

One witness, Maj. John R. One witness, Maj. John R. Richmond of the 1856 Facility Checking Squadron at Scott Air Force Base, flying at 3300 feet in a T-33 jet, told the Post-Dispatch that he first thought the "burning chrome-green" object was one of the brightly colored jets operated by Braniff International Airlines. Richmond said the object appeared as more the object appeared as more than 30 feet long and was leav-ing a 200-foot trail of small ing a 200-foot trail of small whitish fragments as it moved westward in a flat trajectory at about 4000-feet altitude.

'Cosmic Phenomena' Given Unexplained Lights

CAPE CANAVERAL plained green and white lights, termed "cosmic phenomena" by the U.S. Coast Guard, were reported over the Atlantic Ocean from Port Canaveral to West Palm Beach

Wednesday night.

Coast Guard utility boats had sped to the rescue from Fort Pierce and Port Canaveral at the first report of a "distress flare" received from sheriff's deputies at Indialantic and a civilian at Sebastian. The flare was estimated to be about eight miles at sea.

THURSDAY MORNING Coast Guard spokesmen reported the rescue search was discontinued and the flare and others like it were ascribed to "cosmic phenomena." Some lights were seen inland, reportedly near Jacksonville, spokesmen said.

The lights were "green or white," depending from which angle you saw them," and resembled somewhat a meteorite the Coast Guard reported.

According to Coast Guard spokesmen, who disclaimed the idea of unidentified flying objects, the cause of the flashes would be in the weatherman's province, not theirs.

PATRICK AIR Force Base weathermen stated they had no knowledge of lights and doubted if weather conditions could cause them.

Dr. David D. Woodbridge, professor of physics and space technology at Florida Institute of Technology, said one possible explanation of the lights would be "an electric glow from charges in the air."

Woodbridge could think of "no meteorological cause," considering Wednesday night's weather which was clear.

As it approached the town, the girls attempted to follow it but were outdistanced after only a short distance.

The object appeared to be flying low, was ball-shaped and was traveling south.

Dropping more would-you believe's than Ripley, Ivan T. Sanderson was introduced yesterday as a consultant to a brand new Man and His World pavilion.

It's called the Strange, Strange World Presentation and is housed in the former Man and the Oceans theme building.



Wabash Line farmer recalls strange sights

PEMBROKE (Special) — "Flying saucers" are real to Leo Paul Chaput, a resident of the Wabash Line, six miles from here on the Quebec side of the Interprovincial Bridge.

A father of eight children who owns a 10-acre farm on a back access road to Chapeau, the nearest community, Mr. Chaput claims to have had a visit from "one of those machines", at frequent intervals for some time.

The most recent was a month ago when the 54-year-old pulp mill worker at the nearby Consolidated-Bathurst plant says his visitors left markings in his fields.

Three large circles of what appears to be singed or matted grass are Mr. Chaput's evidence. Lately, the circles have become the focal point of interest for people from miles around who heard about the markings from neighbors in the area.

The circles, each 27 feet in diameter have perimeters of about a foot in width and look as if an object that had legs inside landed on the grass.

Saw lights

Mr. Chaput says he was sitting in the kitchen of his home one evening a month ago when he looked out the window and saw "a big white light in the field."

"It was just like in daytime all of a sudden," says the wiry part time farmer.

He points to rock which he believes the "machine," scraped before it was able to land.

Inside one of the circles is a tiny balsam tree and a pine both of whose needles have turned orange with the appearance of having been singed by something hot.

The plants are being analyzed by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests for possible origin of the burns.

Mr. Chaput says he witnessed another incident on his farm which leads him to believe "there is something out there."

"I was walking by the field one night and thought I saw a car coming across but thought to myself a car can't drive there."





CEDAR RAPIDS, IA. — Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) officials in the Midwest received a rash of reports of sightings of unidentified flying objects Thursday evening.

Officials at the Cedar Rapids airport said three persons in the airport coffee shop reported seeing a blue, circular object with no wings or indication of a propulsion system streaking east to west above the airport runway at an altitude of less than 1,000 feet.



GREG LUCIT' is convinced he saw a flying saucer.

Greg, 13, of 210 N. Schubert st., Palatine, a senior at Polatine High school, told Chicago Today:

"It was prefectly round on the bottom, and it bulged out, in a sort of convex shape, with a concave area in the center. From the side, it looked like a squished-down football.

"It was duil gray, and seemed to have two bright lights, like headlights, that swiveled. It also had blinking red, white, and blue lights.

"IT MADE a humming noise, like the submarine Seaview on that television program, 'Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea."

"It was flying real low, right over us. I think if I had stood up. I could have hit it with a rock. It wasn't more than 144 feet up, if seemed.

"I'm convinced it was a real flying saucer-a spaceship

from another planet, either with intelligent beings at the controls, or under computer control.

"After all, if we can go to the moon, flying saucers from another planet can come here, can't they?"

DR. J. ALLEN Hynek, director of Northwestern university's astronomy department, said Greg's report fits two other reports made to him.

Greg said he saw the unidentified flying object [UFO] last Monday night in company with his friend, Alan Prouty. 18, of Lake Zurich Heights, Alan's parents, and Ray Holmes, 18, and his firl friend, Diane.

The sighting was from the Prouty home at 949 Kenilworth av., in the suburb, and took place about 11:30 p. m., Greg said.

"That was the fourth time Alan and I saw the UFO that night. We first saw it about 10:25 p. m., while driving north on route 53 a little past the Reseda subdivision in Palatine;

and again at about 10:40 p. m., while traveling on Fairview road about two blocks from Al's house; and again at 10:50 p. m., at Al's house, while I was telephone the Nike base in Arlington Heights to report it.

"IT WENT AWAY, but came back at around 11:30, when we got our best and closest look at it."

Greg says the soldier at the Nike base switched him to the air force, and the air force listened to his tale.

"But I don't think they believed me."

Dr. Hynck said, "You have to conclude from talking to these people that they are either badly mistaken, or that they really did see an unusual object in the sky."

The air force, in its Project Blue Book, investigated 11,702 sightings between 1947 [when the first "flying saucer" was reported by business man Kenneth Arnold, zipping thru the sky near Mount Rainier, Wash.] and 1967.
