Catawba Police Spot UFO—'A Weird Thing'

NEWTON (UPI) — Police officers and deputies in Catawba County said they Catawba County said they spotted an unidentified flying object which gave off a greenish-blue light and flew at great speed early yesterday.

"It was faster than a plane, said Sgt. M. L. Moore of the Newton police, who saw the object about 12:30 a.m. "It went across at a heck of a speed. It was a weird thing, I

tell you." Witnesses

said the object and gave off a was round and gave off a bright, reflecting greenish-blue light that "blipped like an electrocardiogram."

"It came to a sudden stop over the business district and began moving in a slow up-and-down motion just like it was suspended in air," Moore said. "In a few minutes it moved on in a southwest

direction." Moore said he and officer T. W. Huffman, with him in the patrol car when the object was first spotted, drove to a ball park and observed the strange light for nearly

half-hour. The officers said it could not possibly have been a balloon because of its erratic and high speed flight. They also ruled out helicopters

because the object was silent. Newton's police chief, J. D. Kirkman, did not see the object but said it apparently was the same thing seen earlier by another officer. "One of our officers, Paul

Burgess, has seen it before — and he's been here two years," said Kirkman. "It's the same thing all right. They compared notes and it's the same thing."

Strange sight seen in skies Over city "It's the craziest thing I ever saw. It doesn't act

like an airplane or anything I have ever seen." That is how Lonnie DeCamp, 2000 Skyline Drive, describes a strange light that his family, neighbors, and even a friend in Cashmere, have seen in the sky the last two nights.

DeCamp and his family as well as a deputy sheriff will be out looking tonight.

He describes the sight as a "glowing blue cone with lights coming out of the top in a fan shape." When it appears to get bigger and brighter, it will

start to move slowly, he said.

It was first spotted by Mrs. DeCamp and a daughter while they were driving up Miller Wednesday evening, he said. When they got home, they looked at it through binoculars and saw it move toward Black Rock and then over to No. 2 Canyon Road. After awhile it just shot away, DeCamp said.

Last night, they watched it in the same area for about 20 minutes. A friend in Cashmere, Martha Robinson, called them to say she had seen it. A deputy sheriff arrived about five minutes after it left, DeCamp said, but his neighbors can confirm that it was there.



Shelton, who lives near Diaz, said his son, Donnie, first saw the object while traveling home about 8:15 p.m. on Hwy. 17.

"My son said he happened to glance out the left window and saw a glowing disc about the size , of a basketball," said Shelton. I "It appeared to follow the car, changing colors from green to white to reddish-orange.

Shelton said the light emitted, by the sphere was of an indirect nature, "Sort of like an indirectlighting fixture in a home," he said.

The younger Shelton, who is a senior at Newport High School, said the object paralled his travel in an open field for several miles at about 200 yards 'away and a similar distance in the air.

At one time the youth stopped the vehicle and the light also hesitated momentarily and stopped. "It was like it was following me," he later told his father.

Once at home, the youth ex-plained the sighting to his father. "It was hard for him to use conventional terms to explain to me what he had seen," said Shelton.

Five minutes later, the younger Shelton ran into the. house and asked that the family come outside to see the sphere.



NEWPORT-Don Shelton, counselor for the Newport School District, told police Sunday night that he and his family saw a "wired glowing sphere" on the horizon at 8:30 p.m. near his home, and watched it for 30 minutes before it disappeared.

Shelton, who lives near Diaz, about two miles from here, about 8:15 p.m. on state Highway 17. "My son said he happened to

glance out the left window and saw a glowing disk about the size of a basketball," Shelton said. "It appared to follow the car, changing colors from green to white to redish orange."

Shelton said the light emitted by the sphere was of an indirect nature "sort of like an indirect lighting fixture in a home."

The younger Shelton, who is a senior at Newport High School, said the object paralleled his travel for several miles. It appeared to be about 200 yards away at an altitude of about 600 feet, he said.

At one time, the youth stopped his vehicle and the light also seemed to hesitate momentar-ly, then it also stopped, he said. "I felt like it was following me," he told his father.

So far the thing sounds like an airplane, but the descriptions continue. The craft can hover indefinitely in the air then take off in an instant in any direction.

"I don't believe it myself. I Jon't believe in UFO's." says Officer Cowan. "But I can't identify what I saw. All I know is that I never saw anything like it before."

Officer Solntzeff says, "It couldn't have been a helicopter. It didn't look like one and it didn't sound like one. It was absolutely silent."

There were no unidentified objects darting through Phoe-nixville skies last night — at least no one reported anything of the kind.

However, spottings have been reported for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights. The most frequent reports cluster around the hour after 9:30 p.m. But Schuylkill Police have rec-ords of fownship residents who ords of township residents who have seen the same type of object at 6:30 in the morning on at least two different days in the past week.



The spokesman for the Environmental Sciences and Services Administriation office at the airport said Venus will be a bright evening star through June 17.




Who Can Explain Strange Sight?

At first I thought it was a satellite as its brightness was similar to one. But suddenly its speed picked up and its direction in the north sky changed by an angle of close to 90 degrees. Planes and satellites don't move like this.

It appeared to be heading It appeared to be heading straight for the car so I slammed on the brakes. It seemed to be vaguely triangu-lar shaped with rapidly rotating and pulsating lights of different colors. It was complete-ly silent as I rolled down the window to see if I could hear anything.



Quick camera action catches: s unidentified flying object

By EDWARD STARK

Bill Bostic, a sixth grader at Drake Elementary School in Strongsville, never dreamed that his new camera would record the fleeting visit of an unidentified flying object.

But a few weeks ago Bill and some friends were interrupted at play by just that.

EARLIER IN the day, Bill Bostic had taken his new camera out for a trial run and then put it away when he joined other youths playing on Illuminating Company property across from the Coventry Towers on Pearl Road where Bill lives.

When the object suddenly appeared Paul Yunker, also a student at Drake School, and other youths shouted for Bill to go and get his camera.

Bill had more than ample time to get it and return because the saucer-shaped object reportedly hovered back and forth in the sky for almost 30 minutes.

"I saw it moving back and forth, and so did Bill," Paul Yunker explained: "It was there for at least a half an hour and then suddenly moved up and away and disappeared."


AT LEAST moral support was lent to the sighting by Mrs. Bostic, Bill's mother, she stated emphatically, "At first my husband and I couldn't believe it. But then we saw the pictures. In addition to being very surprised I think that they show that it is exactly what it seems to be."

Robert D. Bridges, a teacher at Drake Elementary school was also impressed by the photos but went one step farther. "The kids brought the pictures to school and at first I thought it was a joke," he said. "But I questioned the youths separately and their stories all corresponded."

In a more temperate vein Bridges added, "However I don't think there is enough proof overall to justify the existence of flying saucers. There have been all kinds of sightings throughout the years, but no actual proof to my knowledge."

AND THAT basically is the crux of the problem. The debate over the existence of inter-planetary space vehicles observing the earth is a subject which usually draws distinct battle lines. Experts on both sides argue long and hard, and the question remains unresolved.

A NASA official refused to enter an opinion but did point out, "The Air Force had a program called Project Blue Book which was conducted at Wright Patterson Air Base and was

closed one and a half years ago. They did the study. We are not responsible for any official pronouncements in this area."


The Dean of American Ufology (the study of unidentified flying objects), Earl Neff, was not hesitant to issue an opinion. Neff cautioned, "There is a myth that there are not many sightings anymore. But this is untrue. It is the same old story that we think as earthlings we must do it first. Actually sightings date back to 3500 B.C."

NEFF WENT on to qualify his position saying that his real goal in the field of ufology is to expose false sightings. He feels he has a responsibility to do so because of his firm belief in the reality of other life forms which have chosen to visit our planet - visitors who technologically are as superior to us as we are now in comparison to the inventors of the wheel.

As a wologist, Neff voiced no intent to investigate the validity of the Bostic sighting, but valid or not it would probably be very hard to convince two small boys in Strongsville that what they saw was less than real.

For, in the past three months, there have been getting on for 150 reports of mysterious bright objects in the sky over United Kingdom. the

Officials in Government and aviation circles are frankly baffled.

It all started back in August when five policemen in Staffordshire watched a colossal egg-shaped UFO hovering silently in the night sky at an altitude of about 1,000 feet.

Using their patrol car's camera, they took several pictures of it — and then the Chief Constable clamped a sucurity ban on the release of the pictures.

Hundreds of anxious callers from places as far apart as Northern Ireland, Yorkshire and Surrey jammed police and Royal Air Force switchboards with reports of the sighting. It was large enough to be

with reports of the sighting. It was large enough to be mistaken for the moon in one area and several photographs were taken. "It was disc-shaped and fairly luminous," said an amateur astonomer in York. The "Great Flying Saucer Riddle" as one paper called it caused a definite rattle among the tea cups in Whitehall. The Ministry of Defence — officially responsible for making sure Britain's skies stay free from UFO's—thought it might have been a 'rare phenomenon' called a noctilucent cloud.

nave been a rare phenomenon called a noctilucent cloud. That same rare cloud had already been mentioned by the Ministry several times earlier in the year. It occurs when the dying rays of the sun are seen reflecting off a cloud reflecting off a cloud. The Glasgow weather centre

said the UFO was a fluorescent chemical cloud ejected from a meteorological research rocket.

And the Royal Observatory at Herstmonceaux, Sussex, thought they were both wrong. "It's either a fireball, meteorite or a re-entry satellite," said a spokesman.

"Nonsense," said eye-witness Dr. David Carrick, a former RAF fighter pilot. Dr. Carrick was driving along a lonely road the west coast of Wales on the west coast of when he saw the UFO.

when he saw the UFO. "At 21.20, I saw a very bright light, 40 degrees to the horizontal. It moved rapidly to the left," he said. "The light then became hazy and developed a round shape. "Then it became an elliptical shape — in other words, it was typical of those pictures of fly-ing saucers."

Reports of sightings began to pour in from all over the country in October and Novem-ber. Residents of Newcastle ber. Residents of Newcastle told of a silver-coloured object "as big as about five or six Juumbo jets and looking like two saucers joined together." Two London policemen on night patrol in a car saw a long cigar-shaped object which gave off a blinding white light.

gave off a blinding white light. And two Hull police officers "booked" a long, slim-shaped "booked" a long, slim-shaped object with a green flaming tail 100 feet long which whizzed over the city. Then a television film crew

shot about a minute of colour film of an orange coloured craft several miles up in the sky above Oxfordshire. "It was gleaming, noiseless and moved off quickly after hovering for some time," they said.

national television news that night. No explanation was forth-coming this time from the baffled boffins of Whitehall. It certainly wasn't United States Air Force planes, said the commander of a U.S. base near the sighting point

NEW ZEALAND Scientists claim UFOs are real-life things.

By William Dick in New York

THE existence of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) can no longer be doubted. And the most likely explanation for them is that they are vehicles controlled by intelligent beings from outer space, according to a group of responsible scientists and educators who discussed the subject in a two-day conference at the University of Arizona.

Lecturers at the confer-ence, professors from lead-ing universities in the U.S. and Canada, called on the scientific community as a whole to make an all-out research effort to clarify the nature of UFOs.

"UFOs are now a respect-able subject for scientific study," said Dr J. Allen Hy-nek, director of the Dear-born Observatory and Lin-heimer Astronomical Re-search Centre, Evanston, Illinois.

Dr Hynek was for 20 years scientific consultant to the U.S. Air Force UFO-investigation project.

Beings in space

Dr Robert F. Creegan, described by "Who's Who In America" as an educator and professor of philosophy at the State University of New York, Albany, said: "I am convinced there is in-telligent life in outer space. UFOs are not just illusions. Some reports show them to be controlled objects. "To me the most accept-

"To me, the most accept-able and realistic theory is that UFOs are controlled by intelligent being from outer space.

Two highly skilled scien-tists — Dr Wilbert Smith, chief of "Project Magnet," the UFO study of Canada's Department of Transport, and Dr James McDonald, atmospheric physicist at the University of Arizona—both came to the conclusion: UFOs are controlled by beings from outer space.

Serious thought

Dr R. Leo Sprinkle, as-Dr R. Leo Sprinkle, as-sociate professor of psycho-logy and director of the divi-sion of counselling and test-ing at the University of Wy-oming, Laramie, said: "From my examination of UFO case histories, I find it vectore and the bilioux we are reasonable to believe we are being studied by intelligent beings who want to know about us -- but who don't want us to know they're doing it." reasonable to believe we are

"I do not feel that there is any reason for alarm. They give no evidence of hos-tility," Dr Sprinkle said. Dr Emerson W. Shideler,

retired chairman of the De-partment of Philosophy at the Iowa State University of the Iowa State University of Science and Technology, said he believed the evidence was quite clear that UFOs existed. "The most prob-able explanation is that they are controlled by intelli-gence from another planet," he said.

"There is a very real pos-sibility that they are com-pletely unlike our accepted ideas of normal life.

Who are we?

"I do not believe they are any threat to us. But their impact on our notions of culture and religion would be tremendous if their

visits could be proved," said Dr Shideler. Dr Frank B. Salisbury, head of the Department of Plant Science at Lich State Plant Science at Utah State

Plant Science at University, said: "We just don't know whether UFOs are con-trolled by space beings of intelligence — but it is a strong possibility and a intelligence — but it is a strong possibility and a theory we must seriously theory we must seriously consider. Then what kind of beings could they be? One possibility. is that they could be virtual 'immortals.'

could be virtual 'immortals.' Certainly there are plant cells which have never died. "These beings could be similar. It would help ex-plain their survival for cen-turies or more if they were coming from other stars in our own Milky Way or even from other galaxies."

Mr Cooke said the convention programme would provide for lectures and discussions on subjects such as general sightings, report-ing methods, scientific re-search and findings, and ancient material on visitation of craft from space. — (P.A.)

WITH violent tempests, greenhouse-smashing hailstorms, W luminous arches in the sky, vivid flashes of lightning and meteors the Hertfordshire sky was apparently so full of apocalyptic phenomena in the nineteenth century that neither its observers nor those who read their reports can have had much spare time for regretting the entertainment opportunities open to later generations.

Now readers of "Hertfordshire Countryside" can share in these ex-periences through R. J. Pigram's article "Odd things seen in the sky" in the February edition of the maga-zine. " Hertfordshire zinc

zinc. The incidents, gleaned from old newspapers and other sources, range from the terrifying to the ridiculous. On September 15, 1875, for instance, sci-fi was anticipated when a "bluish-white" object was seen in the sky. The extra-terrestrial visitor moved slowly from east to west, leaving no trail, the spotter prosaically observes, adding that it was "unusually large in size."

Could it have been a flying saucer ? "Could it have been a flying saucer ? "A brilliant meteor," he decides. On October 24, 1882, a storm raged over Hitchin and Letchworth leaving an extensive trail of damage. The poplar tree at the bowling green of the Sun Hotel toppled over and crashed on to the wall of Miss Gerard's 'garden and the brewery was deprived of its roof. A few years carlier an April "shower" released so much rain over the streets of Hitchin that the walls of the sewers collapsed and many cellars were flooded.

Airships

Local people were still spotting odd things in the sky in the twentieth century: Zeppelins for instance. Fascinating and informative as ever, the readers' forum contains letters tell-ing of an airship named "Bourne-mouth" at R.A.F. Cardington and a Zeppelin that crashed at Cuffley, to the delight of souvenir hunters and the profit of the Army guards, who sold them the handles off their billicans in-stead! stead !

- smoke. An RAF wife and her two daughters were the "saucer viewers" in an earlier sight-ing during the first week of December.
- December. The girls drew their mother's attention to a bright disc in the sky above Uxbridge in the late evening. "I observed the light for about a minute and in that time it changed colour, without alt-ering in size, from red, to a pinky orange then to a bluish white."

bluish white. "Then we sighted black swirling clouds of smoke in it, and it vanished completely," they said.

Like the first sighting referred to, which was in broad day-light, the sighting was des-cribed as "very unusual and very memorable."

One woman described a sil-very blue object with a round long, reddish tail which disap-peared into a cloud bank. The fact that the object was seen clearly against the sky on a cloudless day lead some ob-servers to the conclusion that some solid material had reach-ed the land surface. Air force calculations placed the object over the Mayor and Alderman Islands off the Bay coast. Most of the people who spott-ed the object in Te Puke were in the Cameron Road and Dun-lop Road areas near the Dairy factory, although it would ap-pear that people in many parts of New Zealand reported sight-ing the object. Several Te Puke residents phoned on Thursday and re-ported seeing a meteor-like ob-ject hurtle across the sky at about noon. NEW ZEALAND

While shooting on a station north of Geraldton on Saturday right, five Geraldton youths were frightened and puzzled by the appearance of a brilliant orange light shape in the sky to the north-west of them, a station of the light later separating and coming. towards them.

The youths — brothers Risto (17), Kari (15) and Markku Laine (12) of Shenton Street and John (17) and David Seppala (15) of Flores Road -- said they could give no definite explana-tion for the light they saw. The sighting was made at about 11.10 pm on Risto.

The sighting was made at about 11.10 pm on Mary Springs Station, some 80 miles north of Geraldton.

Geraldton. Risto said that he first saw the light when were travelling they were travelling down a track on the property. He mentioned it to John who was in the front of the utility Risto was driving.

The three younger lads were on the back at the time and Risto said he stopped the car and attracted their attention to the light.

CAR LIGHTS

"At first we thought it "At first we thought it was the moon or car lights from the highway, three quarters of a mile away. But we dismissed this as the light was concentrated and bright orange. Car lights would have been pointing the other way as it was north-west of us and we

it was so dark." said Risto. "What really' scared us was when the long end of the 'thing' separ-ated from the main part of the light and came towards us." said John. "The larger part stayed where it was."

where it was." They all agreed the light coming towards them was part of the main light and the crop stubble under it was very clearly lit up as if by a spot light, allowgh the area around the light was pitch black.

PRETTY SCARED

"By this time we were "By this time we were pictly scared and were moving again. The light came to about 250 yards from us but then we lost sight of it as we drove down a gully," said Risto.

He added that before they went into the gully they could still see the

main part of the light some distance away. Kari said that by the time they went through time they went through the gully and up the next hill, the smaller moving light had vanished but the larger one was still visible. From the crest of the hill the track led round a bend and cress parallel

hill the track led round a brnd and goes parallel with the highway. This is where Risto stopped the car a second time. "We all watched the remaining light. It seemed to get much brighter and higher, but was moving away." he staid.

UNEASY

They had watched it for some 15 minutes from the time they first saw it and had seen cnough to be more than uncasy and started mov-ing again. Kari drew a sketch map of the area.

Asked about the sepa-ration of the smaller light, the five agreed it took about three minutes and was not instantaneous.

The youths had left Geraldton that morning and spent the day at a mine on the station. It was not until about 8 pm that they decided to go shooting

pm that they decided to go shooting. Risto said that he in-tended taking a camera when they left but had forgotten it at the last moment and regretted missing the chance to photograph the mystery light.





ARE they genuine or a hoax?





WASHINGTON - On Nov. 2, 1971, 16-year-old Ronnie Johnson was tending sheep on his parents' farm near Delphos, Kan. It was about 7 p.m. Early darkness. When, according to the boy, a brilliant light swooped over a tree line in the distance. The lad says he heard a rumbling noise, made out a circular object, then closed his eyes to the light and ran to his home for help.

Guess what? Flying saucer. No kidding

It may be too early or too presumptuous to tell, but the accumulating evidence seems to indicate that Unidentified Flying Objects are on their way back into the news. After some years of aerial phenomena drought, interested observers say sightings are on the increase in many areas of the world. Ceylon had a rash of them recently. Great Britain gawkers are getting eyefuls too. Australian interests have been perked to the point where scientists there recently held a "serious" convention. And here in America the saucers are flying like the clay pigeons they re-semble — "We're getting so many reports," says Norma Short, editor of the UFO publication Skylook, "that I can't get them all in my paper.

The trend, if that's what it is, will be reassuring to millions of saucer believers and sympathizers. Many are holding their collective breaths right now, for instance, to get more evidence on the Ronnie Johnson spot. Johnson says his saucer left a burnt ring in the ground. Soil analysis is in process. Skylook believes it may "be the biggest last point: "... he was physical evidence of UFO reports" in several years. ...

But while the return of the air things pleases some, it has the opposite effect on many others. UFOlogy critics thought they had ended decades of saucer talk in 1969. That was the year the moon landing determinedthere were no green people up there, the year the Air Force gave up 20 years of recording and investigating aerial mysteries, the year a competent University of Colorado research unit said in several hundred pages of put-down that flying saucers were for ding-a-lings.

Indeed, 1969 all but buried saucer interest. UFO clubs folded by the scores. Long time enthusiasts turned to other pursuits such as astrology. And the year following, 1970, passed with hardly a report of strange Martian visitors.


The hard times may be ending for die-hard saucer fans. Stuart Nixon, executive director of the National Investigating Committee on Aerial Phenomena (NICAP), says: "Right we have about 100 now pending (open) sighting cases. That's three times what we had in 1970. And some of the cases are very interesting. I just investigated one sighting in Maryland. A little town called Cavetown. Many of the residents there saw strange lights in the sky. They called the state police, and at least one trooper saw the lights, too. The trooper was very helpful. And he was hardly the kind of fellow who would be making up flying saucer stores."

... Nixon emphasizes the

hardly the kind who would be making up flying saucer stories!" Nixon says he is dealing increasingly with reliable rather than emotional people. He says he thinks a lot of the oldtime crackpots have faded away. 'Oh, we still have the nuts around. There's the mystic barber from Brooklyn, who wears a propeller on his head and says he's from another planet. There's that guy in California who offers, for a fee, to get medical-legal advice from his space friends. But these people are exceptional today. I find that more and more we are hearing from the solid citizen."

As it happens, Nixon adds, the solid citizens are the real belief of serious UFOlogists. There may be men from Mars, then again there may not be, but Nixon says the solid citizens are definitely real: "I'm 29 years old. I've never seen a saucer. But I sincerely believe we can't just turn our backs on the people who say they have. NICAP has gathered well over 10,000 UFO sightings in the last 15 years. We've pretty we!' disproved about 80-90 percent of them. But there are hundreds which we can't explain. And I think we should explain them. I just don't think it's very scientific to simply ignore the unexplainable.

Others agree with NI-CAP's Nixon. Northwestern University's Dr. J. Allen Hynek (chairman of the school's astronomy department) has set up a UFO information gathering bureau, pledging anonymity to anyone who wishes to confide.
