# Unidentified Flying Objects

While most of Americus slept, there were some strange goings on aloft in the wee hours between 12:30 a.m. and 5 a.m. today as some "unidentified flying objects" apparently paid the city and area a visit during that period.

The objects probably had at least three local law enforcement officials rubbing their eyes in disbelief. Trooper A. L. Cahill of the local unit of the State Patrol and Sgt. Jerry Crawley and Officer John Harris of the Americus Police Department along with policemen in a number of other

Southwest Georgia towns began spotting the mysterious objects in the sky about one o'clock this morning.

Trooper Cahill spotted his UFO while on patrol duty on the south side of Americus on S. Lee Street Road. He reported that the object appeared to be flying from Dawson toward Albany in

a Southeasterly direction. "It was a real bright white light traveling in the sky," the trooper reported. The UFO was round and "rather large" and would "move for a while and then stop," Cahill stated.

No explanation has yet been determined as to the cause or substance of the objects which

were also sighted by police departments in Macon, Cordele, Waycross, Leesburg, Doerun, Dawson, Pelham, Dougherty County, Whigham, Leary and Camilla.

A Leesburg police officer who gave a description of the UFO while he was watching it said the object is round, with

orange, red, green, and blue lights. It is not moving now." Robert Welch, a dispatcher with the Camilla police, described an object that hung over Camilla for three and a half hours, during which time he said it was observed by at least seven people.

"It looks like a white light

with blinking green and red lights," he said. "It has moved slowly back to Newton. At first, it moved in a zigzag pattern and then moved slowly to the west."

Other reports gave characteristics of the phenomenon as round, shining or glowing aerial objects which moved with no sound or odor.

Witnesses described color changes in the lights on the objects from red, orange, green, blue to white. The objects were said to hover at times, sometimes move rapidly and sometimes move slowly.

## Authorities Plan No UFO Probe

ATLANTA — Despite an unprecedented flurry of Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) reports by Georgia residents, military and civilian authorities indicated yesterday they plan no investigation of the sightings.

Police officers, newsmen, citizens and one military policeman turned in reports of the UFOs four straight nights during the weekend.

"These are the first reports of any UFOs I've seen in a number of years. The Air Force used to have a program to check up on this type of thing but they dropped it," said one Air Force spokesman. "I seriously doubt there will be any investigation," he added.

In Nashville, Tenn., a mother who reported seeing Unidentified Flying Objects "speeding across the sky" said yesterday she was disappointed that police who also witnessed the UFO show wouldn't admit it.

Nashville police officers who responded to a call by Mrs. Nancy Harrington's daughter said the flickering object they saw was probably a star.

## 'SOMETHING DID HAPPEN'

# Meeting With Space 'Things'?

PASCAGOULA, Miss. (UPI) — Two shipyard workers say they were taken aboard a glowing blue spacecraft by buzzing creatures with silvery, wrinkled skin. Sheriff Fred Diamond is sure "something did happen to them."

"These are reliable people," Diamond said yesterday. "They had no reason to say this if it had not been true. I know something did happen to them."

"I was scared and I'm still scared and shook up over it," said one of the men, Charles Hickson, 42. "I've never experienced anything like that and I hope I don't ever again."

WHATEVER happened took place around 7 p.m. Thursday night while Hickson and Calvin Parker, 19, were fishing off an old pier on the west bank of the Pascagoula River near here. They said they saw a strange object approaching in the sky emitting a bluish haze, and then were taken inside the craft by the three creatures.

Both men were questioned at length by the Jackson County sheriff's office but were reluctant to talk to newsmen. However, they consented to a brief, filmed interview with a Biloxi television station.

"All of a sudden we heard something like

a buzzing sound," said Hickson, "and I saw what looked like a bright, flashing blue light. It looked bluish to me. All of a sudden it seemed to stop."

He said it appeared to be "hovering" a few feet over the ground and "one end just opened . . . and I saw three things coming out. They seemed to be floating across the water a couple of feet high."

"BEFORE I knew it they were on me and two of them had me by each arm and immediately I was lifted from the ground. I was quite scared. It's hard to recall exactly what did happen."

He said he was carried to the vehicle "where he was examined by 'some kind of instrument . . . it reminded me of a big eye' which 'covered my entire body.'"

He said he was not harmed and "didn't have any sensation whatsoever. I was just helpless."

Parker, who also works at a local shipyard, said he was taken to the craft too, but passed out shortly after the creatures appeared.

BOTH MEN told authorities they took "a stiff drink" after they were released, but said they had not been drinking before.

Chief Deputy Barney Mathis said they definitely were not intoxicated.

Diamond said the men described the "space craft" as fish-shaped, about 10 feet square with an eight-foot ceiling. The occupants were said to have pale, silvery-grey skin with no hair, long pointed ears and noses, with an opening for a mouth, big eyes, and hands "like crab claws."

They were "real wrinkled and the only sound they made was a 'buzzing-humming sound.'"

Neither man suffered any apparent injuries but they were taken to a military hospital at nearby Keesler Air Force Base yesterday to be checked for possible radiation exposure. Keesler officials said an examination by Air Force physicians found no evidence of radiation.

IN DAYTON, Ohio, meanwhile, a television newsmen said yesterday he had caught an unidentified flying object on movie film as it was speeding away from a neighbor's house shortly before dawn.

"It was white and there apparently were no other colors," said John Gedder of WKCF-TV.

At least 20 UFO sightings have been reported in this area of southwestern Ohio since Wednesday night.

## UFOs Take Partners Seattle P.I. Oct. 1, 1973 CR: Sam Williams For Tennessee Waltz

HORNBEAK, Tenn. — (UPI) — Sheriff Nathan Cunningham's office in Obion County is beginning to take on the aura of a traffic control center for UF's reported zipping across northwest Tennessee skies at 100 miles an hour.

Cunningham said yesterday he personally saw three UFOs (unidentified flying objects) Saturday night, including one which raced over his house glowing and humming.

He said at least 20 callers reported similar sightings.

The reported sightings were the latest in a rash of such incidents throughout the Southeast. Cunningham said he had been aware of earlier reports but had not paid much attention to them.

"I figured it was something military and they just didn't want to tell anybody about it," he said.

"I saw something, and I don't know what it was. But it was sure identified to me. It had a big bright white light in the center and it had red, green, and blue-looking lights around it."

"You couldn't tell how far away it was or how big it was. From a distance it looked like the big glow was 10 or 12 feet square."

Cunningham said he saw two UFOs hover over a Hornbeak riding ring then disappear early Saturday evening.

When he arrived home later, Cunningham said his phone was ringing constantly. As he looked outside, a third UFO passed by.

"It was low enough that I could hear this one," he said. "It made a humming sound that didn't sound like a plane or a helicopter."

"Just a wild guess, I'd say it was moving 100 miles an hour or better. It just zoomed right on over. It stopped over the north for four or five minutes then came back over south and finally disappeared."

George and Vickie Rogers were returning by car from Reelfoot Lake in the northwest corner of the state when they saw a piercing light.

"We had been sitting at the lake and my wife kept seeing red and blue lights go around the lake," Rogers said. "I told her it was an airplane and we forgot about it."

"But we were coming home and I just glanced over to my left in a field and there was a six or seven foot bright red light. It was so bright I couldn't see. It lit up an acre and a half of land."

"Then the light went out and we couldn't see nothing. There were seven or eight cars on the road and they almost hit each other. I was pretty scared."

## 'UFO' Puzzle Has Solution

What appeared to be an "unidentified flying object" last week to some area citizens turned out to be not quite so puzzling, once Mount Airy police had a crack at it.

Tuesday and Wednesday nights some citizens reported what they identified as "UFOs" in the skies over Mount Airy. One 44-year-old woman reported a red lighted UFO, according to George Fawcett, which "smelled like something on fire" and made "strange buzzing and whizzing noises". They contended it fell to the ground somewhere near Mayberry Mall.

Others reported a "huge round, white light" above North Park Shopping Center on Renfro Street.

Officers of the Mount Airy police department later found a parachute and what looked like a burned flare near the Merritt Street housing development.

Fawcett, who has been chasing UFOs for years, agreed with police that the parachute flare would account for some of the reports of sights in the night skies over Mount Airy.

## UFO Site Mystifies Scientists

GRIFFIN, Ga. — (AP) — University of Georgia soil scientists have found unexplained high concentrations of copper and chromium in soil taken from the landing site of an alleged unidentified flying object.

Test results announced Friday by Dr. Oscar Anderson and Dr. Larry Shuman of the university experiment station in Griffin indicate that copper concentrations were 2,000 times more and chromium 200 times more than in soil in the

area. The scientists said the results appear to support an eyewitness report that a small bright, hot metallic object seemed to land and slightly imbed itself in the soil.

Anderson said the object was probably a small meteorite or part of a disintegrating satellite, but he and Shuman could not account for the absence of a crater or depressing in the earth around the alleged impact area.

# 'Golden Egg' Cracks Earth from UFO Sky

GRiffin, Ga. — (UPI) — The plague of UFOs that has unsettled Georgia for weeks took a sudden twist yesterday when a witness reported a golden egg fell from the sky in a cloud of smoke, searing the earth where it struck.

"I tell you, I believe it to be a piece of brimstone from heaven come down here to show people how He can burn the earth with it," announced Ressa Clanton, who said he saw the object fall.

Clanton said he was in Orchard Hill, about five miles south of here, late yesterday afternoon when he looked up and saw a golden object about the size of a hen egg spinning to the earth.

It apparently destroyed itself upon impact, leaving a hole a foot long and 4 to 5 inches deep. Researchers from an agricultural experiment station nearby took earth samples but said he saw no aircraft in the area.

For nearly two weeks reports of UFOs have been rampant in central and southern Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, and Florida. Most of the reports tell of strange, hovering objects with brightly colored lights.

## Challenges government reports

# UC prof: UFOs are real and from other planets

Government reports say unidentified flying objects (UFO) are "natural phenomena." "Ridiculous," challenges Prof. James Harder of the University of California at Berkeley department of civil engineering. "UFOs are real — and from other planets," he claims.

Prof. Harder also is director of research for the Aerial Phenomena Research Organization, and testified in 1968 before the Committee on Science and Astronautics of the U.S. House of Representatives.

He said his belief coincides with that of the Air Force in

1947. It was then the Air Technical Intelligence Center in Dayton, Ohio, which had been investigating UFOs for 23 years, pronounced them "real" and "interplanetary."

GOVERNMENT officials later rebuked the report and, since that time, it has become "unfashionable" to imagine creatures from outer space, according to Harder.

Again in 1970 a government investigation, the Condon Committee, denied the existence of spacecraft controlled by beings from other planets.

Harder holds that the government has taken the easy way out of explaining the

more than 700 UFO sightings investigated by the Condon Report.

About one third of the sightings were listed in the report as "unexplainable," according to Harder.

HARDER SAYS space visitors are unfriendly but not downright hostile.

"They do not seem too interested in communicating with earthlings," said Harder, "but occasionally take humans into their space-caps."

He is investigating such an incident alleged to have happened recently in the San Francisco area.

He reported that at least one teenager claimed, under deep hypnosis, that he was abducted by spacemen after a struggle and taken into the UFO where two tubes were inserted into each side of his chin and blood samples taken.

UNDER HYPNOSIS, the youth remembered the scene with "complete terror," according to Harder.

The boy described the spacemen as about five feet tall with big heads, big eyes and five stubby fingers on each of their two hands.

Harder claimed the boy's description under hypnosis

was either a delusion or real, but not a hoax.

The boy later developed sores over his body, hair on his head fell out and two bruises appeared on his chin.

HE WAS ACCOMPANIED by three other youths at the time, and Harder is making an extensive investigation of two of the other boys under hypnosis to see if the stories tally.

Harder says their experience is not unique by any means as it's been happening for centuries. Further, he believes that only about five per cent of all UFO sightings are reported to authorities.

## Scientists Try To Explain Georgia UFO's

Atlanta (UPI) — An expert satellite tracker suggested today that those unidentified flying objects reported over Southern skies for the past six nights may be manmade satellites and assorted space "junk" dropping out of earth orbit.

Dr. Ralph Buice, an astronomer at the Fernbank Science Center in nearby DeKalb County, said there were two satellites circling the earth which were expected to decay and drop out of orbit last week.

The slashing lights reported from Florida to Tennessee since last week may have been the satellites breaking up as they reenter the earth's atmosphere, Buice said. He said the decay of a satellite orbit may produce unusual aerial phenomena for several days.

He said the North American Air Defense Command (NORAD) has charted almost 7,000 satellites and space debris in orbit over the past six years and about 3,000 are still flying.

"Only 1,000 of those are satellites and the other 2,000 are discarded rocket stages, shroud panels and other assorted bits of debris associated with the launch," Buice said.

Once a satellite starts to break up and reenter the earth's atmosphere, there can be flashing lights, puffs of smoke and other unusual sights, he said.

"Conceivably, a satellite that burns up could deposit a cloud of ionized gas in the upper atmosphere, perhaps 70 miles above the earth, that would glow and take several hours to dissipate," Buice said.

Robert Hayward, another Fernbank astronomer, suggested the lights might be the planets Venus, Jupiter and Mars, and meteorologist James Buckley said cirrus clouds at high altitudes might produce a light-scattering effect.

Whatever they are, there were more of the UFO's reported Tuesday night in the Sandersville area in east-central Georgia. One object was described as changing color from red to green to blue and then to gold.

A second seen at the same time was larger and multi-colored but eventually turned white and dwindled in size.

## Skylab Sees Strange Light

HOUSTON, Aug. 27. — (UPI) — The Skylab 2 astronauts, doing an "exceptional" job on scientific research, Monday photographed a strange light in Earth's upper atmosphere and waited for backup space spider Anita to start spinning a web in weightlessness.

Alan L. Bean, Owen K. Garriott and Jack R. Loussma started the second half of their 59-day flight with solar observations, biomedical experiments and tests of a one-man flying machine.

"Hey, what are those strange lights in the sky?" my companion asked as we drove north on I-75 near Marietta Wednesday night.

He pointed. But before I could ask "where?" I spotted a small, eerie light almost due north, directly in front of us, hovering, gently bobbing in the black, 10:30 p.m. sky.

And from all reports Thursday morning, we apparently weren't alone in catching a glimpse of UFOs, Wednesday night.

Not as fixed as a star and beaming more steadily than a planet, the light seemed to mother two smaller lights underneath and to the lower left of

where it hovered, moving only slightly now and then.

"Is that a UFO?" we both asked simultaneously. Discussion began of recent UFO publicity and past personal experiences at spotting or attempting to spot the unidentified flying objects, but we talked with four eyes hypnotized by and glued to the light that did "seem" to move ever so slowly, followed by the two smaller, pinpoint twinkling lights.

Suddenly, to the left of the horizon, a helicopter swiftly approached the lights, but they immediately dimmed themselves to darkness. The lights never reappeared. We discussed this, convinced "they" were still up there, speculating what visitors from another

planet would be like, if there were such beings.

When I arrived at the Marietta apartment complex where I live, several people stood back pointing and looking up at the northern sky. I tried to call another reporter, anyone, to find out if others had spotted the UFO.

Everyone was out evidently and the 11 o'clock news had no word. For some time, I considered calling the police, the Naval Air Station, someone, to report what we had seen. Instead I went to bed and dreamed of yellow-green men with four arms and suction cups on their piqued faces.

But, many others, about 25 callers,

did call the Marietta Police to report strange goings-on in the sky Wednesday night.

And although a Dobbins Air Force Base spokesman reported no calls there, imagine how many others saw something and felt calling someone would admit a touch of craziness or hint at drunkenness.

"We haven't had any calls and we don't do anything but comfort the people when they do call. That program was ended many years ago," the Dobbins official said.

But, what could they do? Send a helicopter or planes to check out lights in the sky? Could the armed services check out the UFOs since their program for such was phased out "many years ago?"

Speculation Thursday morning from those who saw, those who thought they saw, and those who didn't see ranged from government projects the government doesn't want the people to know about; satellites falling back to earth; a new planet; foreign government projects they don't want to talk about; and about as many other ideas as there are descriptions of the UFOs, themselves.

## Macon Police Keep Seeing Those UFOs

Those UFOs are starting to make believers out of a sizeable number of Macon policemen.

"I'll go against any man who says these things are a planet or scrap metal falling from space," said patrolman Dennis Brown. He viewed four of the objects through a 10 power rifle scope early this morning.

Brown said he saw a ship, and that at least 10 other officers came to the intersection of Waterville Road and Rains Avenue to look through the scope—one was definitely convinced from his former cynicism.

BROWN SAID the officer had been kidding those who reported sighting the unidentified flying objects. "When he looked through the scope, he said 'Well, I'll be damned!'"

Brown explained.

The object looks like "something they shoot up from Cape Canaveral (Cape Kennedy)," according to Brown. He not only saw the same type blinking lights reported by others, but added that the lights were definitely attached to or coming from a ship being piloted by someone or something.

This was his second sighting. The first came early yesterday morning. He took the scope from a rifle yesterday and used it this morning when he and his partner made the second sighting about 4 a.m.

They continued observing until daylight. There was no moon, and at times, Brown said, clouds hid the objects from their view. "It was real dark," he added.

"I BELIEVE the yellow or white lights are from the propulsion system. There is

"I REMEMBERED a rifle I had and went to get it. I thought I would take a shot at the thing," Toole said. However, it went up "like an elevator" before he could squeeze off a round.

What he saw then and what he saw early this morning "was not caused by the atmosphere."

Several officers admit being kidded about their sightings. They are cautious about speculating on what the UFOs are, but more than one pointed this out: "The odds are that there is life on another planet. It is not beyond reason that these things are manned."

After all, they say, 20 years ago most people would have called anyone crazy who predicted earthmen would soon walk on the moon.

Toole also refused to speculate, but indicated he believes both his sightings might be space craft.

## UFOs Over NE Arkansas, Callers Say

JONESBORO — Several persons reported unidentified flying objects in the Northwest Arkansas skies Wednesday night.

Jonesboro police said they had had reports of orange and brown colored balls in the sky. "One person called in to report an oblong object with blue lights on one end and red lights on the other. That turned out to be an airplane," one officer reported.

State police at Jonesboro said that they had received one direct report of a "big white ball" in the sky northwest of Jonesboro.

State Police also reported that officers at Truman received a report of an object which appeared to be changing colors from white to red to green. Other reports of balls of fire were received from Rector, Corning and Sterling Springs, State Police said.

One skeptical officer explained that a Jonesboro newspaper had run a front page article Wednesday about reports of UFOs over Harrisburg Tuesday night — about 25 miles to the south — and "now everybody in the county is out looking for them."

## UFO Sightings Told By Metroland Men

When Douglas Griffiths of 307 Rosa Road, Schenectady, went to get a camera to photograph the unidentified flying objects (UFOs) he watched from his front porch, they were no longer in sight.

But he isn't the only one in Metroland to report having seen unidentified flying objects over the past weekend. Another story from Colonie matches Griffiths' very well.

At about 9:30 Sunday night Griffiths was listening to his VHF monitors, which he does as a hobby in his home, when he started hearing a lot of static. He looked outside to the east and saw three quivering bright lights "playing tag" with one another.

"I'D SAY THEY were about three miles away," Griffiths said. The static on his monitors disappeared as soon as the UFOs went away.

David Quellette of North Bethlehem was in the parking lot of K-Mart in Colonie

Saturday night at 9:30 p.m. when one of his children called his attention to three "very, very bright" lights he described as moving the same way Griffiths had seen. Quellette and his three children stood and watched the objects for about a half hour.

"They covered the whole horizon in about 30 seconds," Quellette said, making "rapid swirling patterns" and sometimes standing still. "I've never seen anything like it in my life," he added.

Quellette said he estimated the UFOs at about 60 to 70 miles high, quite a bit higher than lights Griffiths saw the following night. Both men said they rubbed their eyes a little at first but became convinced they weren't "seeing things" when the UFOs remained in sight for several minutes.

"We live here, why can't somebody live up there?" Griffiths asked. "We ought to get together and exchange our knowledge," he added.

## 2 Memphis Deputies Report UFO Lights

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — An unidentified flying object blinked its spotlights twice Sunday night, then disappeared into the darkness with a whirring noise, according to Shelby County Sheriff's Deputy P. L. Pilalas.

Pilalas said he and his partner, J.O. Davis, were driving on U.S. 70 just east of Memphis when they saw the craft hovering overhead. Two bright spotlights were shining beams straight forward from the craft's altitude of 500 to 1,000 feet, he said, and two red lights were glowing at the extremities of the craft.

"We couldn't see the craft itself, but only its lights," he said.

"I flashed my spotlight on the vehicle which appeared to be traveling with us at about 15 m.p.h.," Pilalas said. "I was hanging out the window at this point. I contacted the dispatcher to see if we had any metro helicopters up in the area. His answer was negative; all units were grounded."

Federal Aviation Administration officials at Memphis International Airport said they could detect no crafts in the area on their radar screens and had no record of any flights that were supposed to be in the area.

# What's blue, red and spins?

Of all the students returning today to West Chester's Stetson Junior High School, eighth grader Glennnda Egolf may write the most unusual "What I Did During Summer Vacation" theme.

Because Glennnda Egolf did an unusual thing: she watched what she firmly believes was a flying saucer fly slowly over her house.

It all began when Glennnda looked out of the living room window of her home on Edgewood road, West Chester, Wednesday afternoon and saw what she at first thought was a "funny shaped airplane."

But when she went outside to get a better view, she decided no airplane, even a funny one, looked like this. Here's her description of what she saw:

### Didn't Make A Sound

"It was round with a point on top of it — something like a top. It was blue, green and red with white lights all the way around

the middle. It was rotating pretty fast, and at the same time moving across the sky, very slow. It didn't make a sound."

For five minutes Glennnda watched the strange object move silently across the sky until it disappeared over the eastern horizon.

Afterwards, Glennnda wasn't sure how she felt. "I know I wasn't scared," she said, adding she would have been had the "saucer" landed. "I didn't know what to think. It was just sort of funny. I felt funny."

But she is sure of one thing: she was not seeing things. "I know I saw it," she said.

Glennnda was alone at the time, and she said none of her neighbors were outside. "I don't think anyone else in my neighborhood saw it. I didn't think to get anyone," she said.

In fact, Glennnda said the only person she told that day about her experience was her mother, Peggie, a perforator operator at the

Local News. She described her mother's reaction as one of surprise — but belief.

"My mother said, 'Oh, really?' and looked up in the sky herself. She believed me," said Glennnda.

Neither West Chester police nor state police at Downingtown received any reports of UFO sightings Wednesday. One witty West Chester policeman remarked he "wouldn't even have a classification for filing UFO complaints," while Downingtown Trooper Dennis Mulligan suggested a "suspicious vehicle" complaint might fit the description.

### Explainable Object

The last area sighting Mulligan recalled was reported about two years ago, and he said, it, along with most other sightings in the past, was later identified "as a perfectly explainable object," such as a weather balloon.

A spokesman at Willow Grove Air Force Base, to which UFO reports are referred by Phila-

delphia International Airport, also said no sightings were reported Wednesday and suggested what Glennnda may have seen was "space debris — you know, crap floating down from satellites and Skylab."

But when Glennnda's description of the object was relayed to him, the spokesman said, "That does sound like a UFO, all right."

Although Glennnda said she had never seen a flying saucer before, she said she had seen a picture of one that had "almost the same shape" as the object she sighted Wednesday. But she is certain that picture did not activate her imagination. "I know what I saw," she said.

In fact, the 12-year-old said she did not believe in flying saucers — until Wednesday. "I guess that sort of made up my mind for me," she said.

Glennnda planned to tell her school friends her story today. "But I really don't think they'll believe me," she said.

## Farmer Says He Shot UFO

GRIFFIN, Ga. — (UPI) — Roy Lawhorn, who lives in the nearby Brooks community, said yesterday he fired several shots at a gold, lighted flying object "as big as your head" as it drifted towards his house and vanished into the ground.

# UFOs or Space Junk?

GRiffin, Ga. (UPI) — On Sept. 10, Ressa Clanton said he saw a golden, egg-shaped object descend to earth, burn a hole in the ground and disappear in a cloud of steam—the high point thus far in a two week-long outbreak of Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) reports.

Although the most unusual and spectacular of the nightly sightings, Clanton's report seemed to have stirred more official interest than most, apparently because it left some sort of evidence.

"Something definitely elevated the temperature of the soil," said Dr. O. E. Anderson, a soil chemist for the Georgia Experiment Station. He said the ground around the little hole which Clanton said the UFO made was about 200 degrees nearly two and a half hours after the object fell.

## No Outlines

By and large, the reports have been of multi-colored, erratically-moving lights in the sky in middle and south Georgia. Photographs of the objects have shown the fuzzy lights, but revealed no outlines.

The Air Force has shown absolutely no interest in the reports, even though two military policemen claimed they were run off the road by a low-flying UFO. Air Force bases in the area reported no unusual activity on their radar screens.

Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter claims he saw a UFO before he became governor.

Carter said he and a group of friends were coming out of a dinner meeting one night several years ago, when they saw a big, shining light in the shape of a flying saucer hovering overhead.

"I don't laugh at people any more when they say they've seen UFOs," he

said, "because I've seen one myself."

There have been a rash of UFO reports across the South in recent weeks. The most recent two came from Chattanooga, Tenn., where two Hamilton County policemen and a security officer for a motel said they watched a UFO early Thursday.

Officers Craig Glaze and Ed Anderson and the security guard said they sat at the intersection of Interstate 24 and Highway 41 in the Tiftonia area "watching the thing" through field glasses.

The plague of UFOs got into high gear late in August. On Aug. 31, police in four south and central Georgia cities reported blinking, multi-colored lights, moving silently. Susan Shingler, a reporter for the Albany Herald, said she stood on a country road with police watching three UFOs when "two came flying across the sky. There were six in all and some were larger than others."

## Nightly Reports

This sort of activity continued nightly until Sept. 8, when reports became more agitated.

Spec. 4 Bart J. Burns and Spec. 4 Randy Shade, military policemen at Hunter Army Air Base near Savannah, said they were on a routine patrol around the perimeter of the base when an UFO dived toward their car, forcing them into the ditch. They said the UFO hovered nearby as they pried the car out of the ditch, and then followed them as they sped away to headquarters.

They said they saw quickflashing lights, traveling at a "high rate of speed from east to west, about 2,000 feet above ground level" at their first

sighting. Then, they said, the object "came in at tree-top level and made a dive," forcing them off the road.

The same night, a Savannah policeman sent to investigate UFO reports said he saw a "large circular craft something like a flying saucer" with small blue flashing lights and a "large spotlight which changed color from red to green."

Dr. Ralph Buice, astronomer and satellite tracking expert at the Fernbank Science Center in Atlanta, said some of the flashing light sightings might be space junk, mostly parts of satellites, burning up as they re-entered earth's atmosphere.

He said there are at least 3,000 pieces of debris in orbit and two were expected to drop out of orbit during the time of many of the sightings. He said the destruction of such objects can produce spectacular aerial phenomena for days.

The chemist who examined the hole left by Ressa Clanton's golden egg said nothing unusual was found in the soil, but he said Clanton seemed quite sincere.

"I had the feeling he was telling us what he thought he had seen. I talked with the gentleman again today, and he sticks to the same story. It is a credible story. I don't think he dreamed something up and went out and set a fire."

Clanton, on the other hand, didn't classify his egg as a UFO.

"I believe it to be a piece of brimstone," he announced.

What's more, he said, "my electricity has gone off, gas given out, tires gone flat and the fish quit biting Friday." He went on, "I have been subpoenaed to appear before a congressional committee to swear that UFOs don't exist... and is psychiatrists from the U.S. Air Force have convinced me that we're experiencing mass hysteria because of the low intelligence of the natives, compounded by the heavy use of corn huck (corn liquor)." Under close questioning, Sutton admitted to have exaggerated things slightly, but averred that he was, indeed, contacted by a West Coast television newsmen. He also said in his letter that he was intrigued by the Fernbank Science Center's report that the UFO sightings were merely dying satellites. "If this be true," he declared, "the 9th District is a burying ground for dead satellites, 632 of which have been inferred to date."

# UFOs May Be Junk From Space: Expert

# Credibility Low Blamed on UFO

State Sen. Franklin Sutton, D-Norman Park, says his credibility "has been brought to a new low" because of statements he made about flying saucers in his senatorial district.

"If I see the Loch Ness Monster chasing a 100-ton blue whale in Reed Bingham Lake, or if I observe Lester Maddox defeating Bobby Rowan in a runoff, I intend to ignore it," Sutton said in a letter to a newsmen.

"And if confronted with it," he said, "I intend to deny it on the basis that if you hadn't seen it, you wouldn't believe it, and I didn't see it."

In other weekend sightings, two military policemen at Hunter Army Airfield near Savannah reported something dived at their car as they were on routine patrol and then pursued them as they raced back to headquarters.

Bart J. Burns and Randy Shade said the object, traveling at a high rate of speed with "quick flashing lights," was initially spotted at about 2,000 feet but then it dived at them. They said it hovered near the car and pursued them as they raced back to the base.

A Georgia highway patrolman in Manchester said he saw a UFO hovering at tree-top level Saturday night.

"It went over the unit patrol car, and was going so fast there was no way he could even get close enough to identify it," said a patrol spokesman.

Meredith said he's done a lot of reading on the subject of UFOs and has always wanted to see one. "I guess it was just my turn," he said.

Dr. E. J. McCranie, faculty member of the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta, said in a telephone interview that people "get activated, alerted and see something — a stimulus — and misinterpret it. They are looking for something and are apt to be overly apt to see it."

## MPs Claim UFO Forced Car Off Road

The police report said the men saw "quick flashing lights, traveling at a high rate of speed from east to west, about 2,000 feet above ground level."

The military policemen said they continued their patrol and about 10 minutes later the object "came in at tree-top level and made a dive," forcing the car into the ditch.

Late Friday night, about a dozen residents in south Savannah reported seeing an unidentified object, described as "bright yellow" in color.

## Numerous UFOs Sighted in Georgia

ATLANTA (UPI) — Despite an unprecedented flurry of unidentified flying object reports by Georgia residents, military and civilian authorities indicated Monday they plan no investigation of the sightings.

Police officers, newsmen, surprised citizens and one military policeman turned in reports of the UFOs four straight nights during the weekend.

The sightings were made in several central and south Georgia towns, with most of the descriptions being similar — blinking, varied colored lights, usually hovering in one position but occasionally showing great bursts of speed.

Chester A. Tatum, publisher of the Sowega Free Press in Camilla, said he photographed one of the UFOs Saturday night. He said it had a "ribbed type design with some sort of center down the middle." Tatum also said the craft had an illuminous trail behind it.

But military spokesmen at Georgia's two main Air Force installations, Dobbins Air Force Base

in Marietta and Warner-Robins Air Base, said there would be no investigation of the sighting reports.

"Most of the calls we've received have been from the press," said Lt. Col. Richard Davies, an information officer at Warner-Robins. "There have been two reports from police and one from a military policeman here, but none from any private citizens."

"These are the first reports of any UFOs I've seen in a number of years. The Air Force used to have a program to check up on this type of thing but they dropped it. I seriously doubt there will be any investigation."

Georgia Civil Defense Public Information Director Col. Douglas Embry said all the UFO reports have been logged "but we don't do anything with them or publicize them. They seem to have gotten enough publicity already."

Embry said if there were no "logical explanation" for the sightings, and if there was a "danger to life and property," then the civil defense office would ask the governor to take any necessary steps to investigate the sightings.

# Military Mum on UFOs

News of the multiple sightings of unidentified flying objects over Southwest Georgia has reached the Pentagon, but it isn't commenting.

"The Department of Defense does not have a statement to make," said Maj. James A. Durham, speaking Saturday for the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs.

Questions of whether the military was interested and what its involvement might be in solving the puzzle have cropped up constantly since the sightings of UFOs were first reported to the Dawson police department shortly before midnight Thursday.

More UFO sightings were reported Friday night and Saturday morning in Southwest Georgia. Military base officials said they could not pick up the objects on radar. They said no planes had been sent to investigate the flood of sightings.

At the Pentagon, Major Durham refused to answer questions concerning the military's involvement other than to say the Department of Defense knew of the sightings, was concerned about them and wanted citizens to continue to report sightings to local law enforcement officials.

"Can't Answer"

After telling The Herald Saturday afternoon the Department of Defense has no statement, Major Durham was asked why the refusal. He answered: "I can't answer that question." Major Durham was then asked if the Department of Defense, the Air Force, Army, Navy, Marines or any other military service under Pentagon control was investigating, and he replied: "I'm not going to be able to answer that for you."

The next question asked Major Durham was, "What is the Department of Defense policy on unidentified flying objects?"

He replied: "I'll have to skip that question, too, but I will say that we are

concerned about all this, and civilians should continue to report any UFO sightings to their local civilian law enforcement agencies. Beyond that, I can't tell you anything."

In Albany, Assistant

Police Chief J. J. Lairsey commented Saturday, "The Albany Police Department has received no direction from the U.S. Department of Defense or any other government agencies about what to do about these sightings of unidentified flying objects."

Asked how long the

Pentagon had been aware of the UFO sightings, Major Durham replied: "We have been aware of this for three days, but I can't tell you anything else."

At that point, Major Durham said, "Maybe I should point out that the Air Force was involved in studies of these phenomena but these studies were terminated about 1969, I think."

Asked to elaborate on those studies, Major Durham said, "I'll try to call you back on that," but he said he did not know when that would be.

Multiple sightings of the brightly shining UFOs were reported again Friday night and early Saturday over portions of Georgia, the state patrol said. Sightings were reported in the Albany, Macon and Lawrenceville areas. More than a dozen other cities and communities reported similar sightings the previous night.

A Moody Air Force Base radar technician in Valdosta reported no unusual radar reports, however, and so did the Albany Naval Air Station. A dispatcher at the Albany state patrol post said a portable radar unit failed to respond when aimed at the phenomena.

A spokesman at the Albany post reported sighting bright lights which were flickering red, green, blue and white.

Similar sightings several years ago were traced to experimental weather rockets launched by Eglin Air Force Base in Florida. However, Air Force spokesmen have offered no theories for recent sightings.

## Pentagon Dodges Inquiry on UFOs

The Pentagon was busy passing the buck Saturday, when queried about multiple sightings of unidentified flying objects for three days in Southwest Georgia.

The Herald asked the Pentagon whether the UFOs were being investigated by attempting to reach by telephone Adm. Thomas H. Moorer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

A Pentagon spokesman who identified himself as Col. Jack Powell, emergency actions officer, said: "Admiral Moorer is attending a wedding and is not available to talk to the press."

No Comment

Colonel Powell refused comment on the UFOs, and referred The Herald to "someone else here who may be able to help you," a man whom Colonel Powell identified as "Lieutenant Colonel Williams," who, according to Colonel Powell, was the public affairs officer on duty at the National Military Command Center in the Pentagon.

A voice then came on the telephone: "This is Colonel Williams speaking, may I help you?" The Herald asked Williams for a Pentagon statement about the UFOs. "I can't talk to you about that," he said, adding, "Our public affairs people who handle that will have to talk to you."

Williams suggested that The Herald telephone a "Mr. Willibee," at another telephone extension in the Pentagon. Colonel Williams refused to give his own first name. He also said he did not know how to spell the other man's name. "Maybe it's spelled W-I-L-L-I-B-E-E," Williams said.

Colonel Williams was asked again to give his own full name and he replied: "I don't see

why you need that," and at that point, Colonel Powell's voice interrupted the conversation and said, "If Lieutenant Colonel Williams doesn't want to give out his first name, that's his business. I don't know his first name myself. Why don't you follow Colonel Williams' suggestion and call 'Mr. Willibee'?"

News Branch Chief

The Herald finally reached a man in the Pentagon who identified himself as "Mr. O. G. Wiloughby." He said his position was "chief of the defense news branch in the Pentagon." Wiloughby acknowledged that he had just received calls pertaining to the UFO inquiry from Colonels Powell and Williams, then added, "It's time for me to go off duty, and I cannot talk to you."

Wiloughby was asked for an official Pentagon statement about these unidentified flying objects. Wiloughby then said, "Major Durham is in charge of that."

The Herald questioned a man in the Pentagon who identified himself as "Maj. James A. Durham in the office of the assistant secretary of defense for public affairs."

Major Durham was asked what the Pentagon is doing, if anything, about the UFO sightings in Southwest Georgia. "I'll have to get back to you on that," he said.

No Statement

Seventy-one minutes later, Major Durham telephoned The Herald and said: "We don't have a statement to make." The Herald asked Major Durham, for purposes of accuracy, to restate his statement, and he did: "The Department of Defense does not have a statement to make."

ALBANY, Ga. (UPI) — Unidentified flying objects, blinking in various colors but moving silently, were reported sighted over a wide area of south Georgia early today.

But Alabama, now! There sightings—one a fast-moving object which appeared red and white, then green and then white—were made in various places. Not by mere befuddled citizenry, either; these sightings were reported by police. Things are looking up for UFO fanciers.

## UFO Identified By Soil Chemist

GRiffin, Ga. (UPI) — The unidentified flying object that burned a hole in the ground near here Monday and vanished in a cloud of steam probably was "something in the nature of a small meteorite or a piece of space hardware," a Georgia soil chemist said Friday.

Dr. O. E. Anderson, head of the Agronomy Department at the Georgia Experiment Station, said either item would have impacted at very high temperature.

Anderson analyzed soil at the crash site after Ress Clanton of Griffin reported seeing a small, metal-like object descend to earth and burn a hole in the ground.

Clanton said he thought the UFO was "brimstone from heaven" to show people God can burn the earth. The object was destroyed on impact.

## Cops Report Huge Light

SAUGERTIES (AP) — Two town policeman on night patrol reported seeing a huge, shimmering light hovering over the New York State Thruway today.

"It lasted maybe 15 seconds, and then disappeared," Peter Karashay said.

No other reports were received of the sighting, but Karashay and Howard Ostrander said they were sure of what they saw.

## 2 S.C. Officers See Two UFOs

# Not Martian Ships, But Dying Satellites

Those flying saucers Georgians have been seeing the last few nights could have been little green men from Mars, but more likely they were earth-made satellites dying a slow but spectacular death in space.

Or they could have been planets or high-altitude weather activity.

Dr. Ralph Buice, an astronomer at Fernbank Science Center and an expert on satellite tracking, said some of the strange objects that have been reported in recent days could have been satellites breaking up as they reenter the earth's atmosphere.

Dr. Buice said two satellites were in orbits that were predicted to decay last week. One satellite was expected to drop out of its orbit and plunge into the atmosphere Aug. 28 and another was expected to do the same thing on Aug. 30.

Dr. Buice said the decay of a satellite orbit can produce unusual aerial phenomena for several days.

He pointed out that the North American Air Defense Command tracks objects that

are launched into orbit about the earth and gives each one a number. The numbers are assigned in sequence starting with NORAD 1 in 1957.

NORAD numbers have been assigned to nearly 7,000 objects, of which 3,000 are still in orbit.

"Only 1,000 of those are satellites," Dr. Buice said. "The other 2,000 are discarded rocket stages, shroud panels and other assorted bits of debris associated with the launch. There can be several pieces of junk for each satellite. Skylab, for example, has about 30 bits of debris associated with it."

When a satellite's orbit decays, Dr. Buice said, all of the debris which is in similar orbits decays at about the same time. The result is a series of aerial phenomena spread over several days.

When a satellite reenters the atmosphere, he said, there can be bright flashes of light, puffs of smoke and other spectacular sights.

"Conceivably, a satellite that breaks up could deposit a cloud of ionized gas in the upper atmosphere, perhaps 70 miles above

the surface of the Earth, that would glow and take several hours to dissipate," he said.

Dr. Buice said such an incident occurred once when a satellite launched to test a booster rocket reentered the atmosphere a few years ago.

"The top stage was loaded with sand to simulate the weight of a fully fueled vehicle," he said, "and when it reentered, all the sand burned up in the atmosphere and created quite a spectacular sight."

Dr. Buice said that reports of bright lights and puffs of smoke high above the ground could very easily be such an incident.

"If you get reports of UFOs chasing cars, landing and doing other things like that, it's obviously something else," he added.

"In all the years I have been looking, I have never seen anything suspicious," Dr. Buice said. "I would like to see something like that so I could try to determine what it is."

Another Fernbank astronomer, Robert Hayward, said reports of flashing red, green and blue lights on recently-sighted UFO's lead him to suspect that the objects people have been seeing are planets.

Currently, three bright planets, Venus, Mars and Jupiter, are visible during various hours of the evening.

"When Venus sets in the evening, you have to look at it through several miles of the atmosphere," Hayward said. "The atmosphere diffracts, or scatters, the light, causing you to see different colors. I talked to one woman who said she had seen an ob-

ject with flashing lights on it and didn't believe it could be Venus because it wasn't round. People don't realize that Venus goes through phases just like the moon and does not always appear round viewed from earth."

Fernbank meteorologist James Buckley said cirrus clouds at high altitudes can produce the same light-scattering effect described by Hayward. The clouds themselves are so thin that they are not visible at night, he said.

A bright satellite viewed through these clouds would also appear to have flashing lights of various colors attached to it, the scientists said.

A bright satellite, PAGEOS, has been passing over Georgia in recent nights, Dr. Buice said, making one pass late Thursday night, the first night UFO's were reported in Georgia last week.

Buckley said ball lightning and other electrical phenomena could also account for some of the UFO sightings.

"These phenomena are usually associated with thunderstorms," he said, "and there was a line of thunderstorms across southern Georgia Thursday night. This line was moving slowly northward and the UFO sighting reports followed the same pattern."

UFO reports tend to come in spurts, Hayward said, because "when one person reports seeing something, a lot of other people go out and look and see things too which they then report. The second person to report something might not have even seen the same thing that the first person saw."

Hayward did not say that the UFO's were absolutely not spaceships from another planet. In fact, he hopes they are.

"I need a Martian for a class on Mars I have to teach this fall," he said.

## Many Replies To UFO Report In Democrat

Many residents throughout this area replied to our story about the Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) which we published last Thursday.

Some residents called early last Thursday and others reported this week that they had seen the UFO on Aug. 21. To our surprise there were also other staff members who had seen the bright object.

Also this week we received a letter from Mrs. William Wood of Lincoln, Neb., with a clipping from the Lincoln Evening Journal. The Nebraska report called the UFO a "blazing white light."

But it wasn't a flying saucer or space ship as some people thought. North American Air Defense Command in Denver reported that "the shower of streaking light was apparently caused by a Soviet communications satellite disintegrating on re-entry into the earth's atmosphere." NORAD had been informed of the re-entry by the Soviet government before it took place.

## Mystery Light Spotted Again In El Paso Skies

Another "what-zit" was reported over the general El Paso area Wednesday night and is presenting quite a mystery. Even experienced pilots said it left a trail and appeared to be a "comet."

Two reports, one from a pilot over the Salt Flats area, 90 miles east of El Paso, and one from a truck driver near Sierra Blanca, told the FAA's El Paso Flight Service Office they saw the vehicle suddenly flare brightly and then disappear, perhaps crashing, in the vicinity of Van Horn. Both reports indicated the time at 10:15 p.m. It was first sighted west of El Paso about 9:45 p.m. A full half hour of something unusual in the air.

Reports from as far as Fabens and Horizon City described the object, appearing as a bright light to most witnesses, that traveled on a generally northwest to southeast course.

Two witnesses in Northwest El Paso, including a veteran police sergeant, saw it approaching from the west-northwest. At first it appeared to be a bright star fairly low on the horizon. But no star of that magnitude exists at this time of year in that particular direction.

A few minutes later the "star" had moved to a position due north of El Paso's West side and was continuing in an easterly direction, appearing to be not much higher than the mountains as it passed them and then turned to the southeast. These witnesses saw no trail or "tail" but both agreed it was an "extremely bright" object.

During the past weekend there were reports of a similar object flying in the Clint and Fabens areas. One witness in the Lower Valley Wednesday night said it appeared to him the object may have landed in the Clint area. But there were no reports that it did.

## Alabamians seeing more things in sky

For 20 minutes Sunday night, Notasulga city councilman W. F. Delbridge and police sergeant Mid Giles watched two unidentified flying objects hovering over the town.

"We watched them through binoculars," said Delbridge. "And what we saw definitely was not an airplane ... nor some kind of gas."

"THEY WERE solid objects, round, and were multi-colored and bright."

The two said they watched the objects for more than 20 minutes and quit "because we just got tired of it."

The sighting followed a rash of similar reports during the early morning hours of darkness Sunday by lawmen in five southeast Alabama towns.

Delbridge said the UFOs were round and appeared to be large. "I couldn't guess how far away they were ... but it was a good way."

Earlier, police in Lanett, Auburn, Carrville, and Tuskegee gave similar reports.

Sgt. Wayne Meadows of Lanett described it as "a big light just easing its way through the sky ... it would change colors."

The sightings coincided with UFO reports in southern Georgia a few hours earlier.

It was not the first mass sighting in Alabama. In February of this year, at least 125 people gathered at a junk yard in Lexington—in Lauderdale County—and saw several disc-shaped orange objects.

During the first part of the year, there were as many as 500 sightings in the area.

Henry Harvey, director of the Florence State University Observatory, says:

"The people saw something ... there were too many responsible people there to pass it off as imagination."

"But what they saw, I do not know. I'm mystified."

A Georgia astronomer suggested over the weekend that people are seeing "space debris," the remains of satellites.

"I don't agree with that," said Harvey. "Those things would travel rapidly and burn out as they re-entered the earth's atmosphere."

"The recent sighting in Alabama have been more prolonged."

An FSU student, Bill Rogers, went to Lexington 40 times during the sighting outbreak and saw objects on nine occasions, he said.

"The shapes was either round or cigar shaped," he said.

"I followed a round, orange object for several miles one evening. It stopped once, then turned on a 90-degree angle and sped off, disappearing in a few seconds."

He said one object had a row of lights that went out. "But I could see the silhouette against the sky. I followed it from Muscle Shoals to Leighton."

In February 125 people caused a veritable traffic jam in Lexington to see a UFO; they weren't disappointed:

Two showed up and caused a stir of excitement.

"It couldn't have been imagination," said Rogers, "because everyone there reacted at the same time."

In January, the Rev. Gordon Ware was returning to Lexington with several members of his church youth group.

They saw an object—described as round and encircled with lights—hovering above them.

"I WAS DRIVING," said the minister, "but I saw something. I don't know what it was. At first I thought it might be a helicopter—but it wasn't."

Mrs. Bob Springer had a more harrowing experience. On the night of Feb. 20, she said, an object—yellowish-orange and round stayed above her car for more than four miles.

"I would slow down, it would slow down; I would speed up, it would speed up. I was frantic. Then another one joined it as I came into Lexington. Several people saw it, including Pat Brown, one of the teachers."

She said two of the objects passed near to each other and set off a flurry of small green sparks between them.

"You have to see something like that to believe it," she said. "I've always been skeptical of such stories ... but not anymore. They can go faster than anything you've ever seen. They can go slow. Or they can stop."

Rogers says, "You have to be suspicious of some of the reports. But 125 people can't be wrong."

The anonymous Renton woman who reported seeing a "sparkling ball" in the sky during the night of Aug. 25 has support for her story.

Art Kohler, 629 Camas NE, Renton, reported that he and his neighbors — Ira Porter, Frank Bright, and John Barn — all witnessed the same sighting.

"It was probably a meteor that burned itself out," Kohler speculated. "It was going south to north."

Kohler said the woman's husband could rest assured that his wife had not been drinking.

## N.C. Sheriff Cannot Confirm Space Monsters

WHITEVILLE, N.C. (UPI) — Columbus County Sheriff Ben Duke says he's uncovered no evidence of any "space monsters" which have supposedly been harassing a family here all week.

Rose G. Williamson, who was arrested here on charges of shooting firearms into a public area, told Duke Thursday she, her father and sister had seen two monsters twice during the past week.

She said the 7-foot creatures had reddish-brown faces, brown hair and pointed ears, and wore ragged brown shirts, black pants and shoes which resembled brogans with silver eyelets.

Duke said "there's no tangible evidence whatsoever" that the creatures exist. The reports have spurred interest and drawn scores of searchers and spectators here recently.

"We have looked in the woods for tracks and we even had the bloodhounds out there," he said. "There was nothing found."

Duke said several persons had reported incidents of shots being fired at the "monsters." He said no one had been injured from the shots but that a camping vehicle had been hit by buckshot.

"It's dangerous whenever people shoot guns," Duke said, urging persons to stay away from the area to avoid injury.

## More UFO's Reported In Charleston Area

CHARLESTON (UPI) — For the second time in a week, there were reports of unidentified flying objects (UFO) in the Charleston area late Thursday night and early Friday.

Authorities said they received reports from about a dozen persons who claim to have seen red, white and blue lights in the Folly Beach area moving north.

One man told officials the movement of the UFO's was very erratic and much like a helicopter.

Similar sightings were reported in the Folly Beach area Wednesday.

# Saucer-Eyed UFO CHASERS FLOCK TO STATE

By CHARLES SEABROOK

Several nationally known UFO chasers are flocking to Georgia in the wake of a UFO-sighting epidemic in the state.

The latest UFO tracker to arrive is John Acuff, president of the National Investigation Committee on Aerial Phenomena (NICAP), who came by plane to Atlanta Thursday to lead an investigation into reports of UFOs hovering, zigzagging, and going through all kinds of motions in Georgia skies for the past two weeks.

Stewart Nixon, NICAP director, said Thursday from the Kensington, Md., headquarters of the non-profit organization, that a team of NICAP investigators will try to pin down the reports of UFOs in Georgia in an attempt to explain the aerial spectacles.

"However, at this point, we think there may not be an explanation for the cause of the Georgia UFOs," he said.

NICAP investigators from Georgia who will take part in the UFO investigation are Harry Lederman of Atlanta and Dr. Julius Benton, a college astronomy professor from Savannah.

Stan Friedman, a nationally-known UFO devotee and nuclear physicist from Redondo Beach, Calif., said Thursday from his California headquarters he will also spend some time in Georgia next month to check out reports of UFOs visiting the state.

"I especially want to talk to persons who have seen UFOs close up," said Friedman, who lectured on flying saucers before full-house crowds earlier this year at the University of Georgia and Georgia Tech.

Friedman, who has written and published several papers on UFOs, has delivered his illustrated lecture, "Flying Saucers Are Real," on more than 50 college campuses in more than 20 states this year.

"The same types of UFO movements reported in Georgia have also been reported at other times in other areas in the United States," he said.

Friedman debunks the theories that the recent Georgia UFOs are due to weather phenomena, decaying satellites, or planets.

"I've talked to enough policemen in Georgia in the past two weeks to convince myself that the UFOs seen are not due to astronomical observations," he said. "I also find that most astronomers know little about UFOs."

But is there anyone who does know a lot about UFOs?

Friedman suggested he could qualify as a UFO expert. He gave up his job 14 years ago to devote full time to the aerial phenomena.

"I think we have two alternatives for these unexplained UFO sightings," he said. "One is that they may be intelligently controlled from outer space, and the other is that they may be secret intelligent terrestrial systems."

Those secret terrestrial systems may be defense systems being tested in this country by other nations, he suggested. "Why build missiles to defend yourself when you can use UFOs?" Friedman asked.

Friedman admitted that most UFO reports are due to natural or man-made phenomena in the atmosphere, but it is the 20 per cent or so unexplained UFO sightings that bothers him.

"The biggest study of UFOs by the Air Force listed 20 per cent of UFO reports as unexplainable," he added.

NICAP does not see eye to eye with Friedman on some aspects of "UFO-ology."

"Friedman is convinced that some of the UFOs are controlled by intelligent beings," said NICAP's Nixon. "However, we would like to have more proof before we commit ourselves to such a belief."

"But, it is essential that anyone in this field keep an open mind, because we don't discount the possibility of extraterrestrial life," he added.

Friedman said other UFO investigators will either follow or precede his trip to Georgia. Two other national organizations devoted to UFO study are in the United States — the Mutual UFO Network in Quincy, Ill., and the Aerial Phenomena Research Organization in Tucson, Ariz.

Is there any practical reason for such a widespread study of unidentified flying objects?

"Of course," said Friedman. "If we can find out what UFOs are and duplicate their movements, we will have a beautiful transportation system that can land and travel anywhere at tremendous speeds without pollution."

## Carter Once Saw A UFO On 'Very Sober Occasion'

DUBLIN—Gov. Jimmy Carter doesn't scoff at people who report UFO sightings, because he saw one himself about three years ago. And, Carter quipped, "it was on a very sober occasion."

Carter said he saw a blue, disc-shaped object during a campaign stop in Leary, a South Georgia town in the same general area where numerous UFOs have been reported recently.

The object came into view as Carter and several members of the Leary Lions Club stood outside the hall where Carter was to speak. All the members of the group observed the object for about five to ten minutes, Carter said. He

immediately went to a tape recorder and dictated a description of what he remembers as "a very remarkable sight."

"It was about 30 degrees above the horizon and looked about as large as the moon. It got smaller and changed to a reddish color and then got larger again," Carter recalled.

Carter speculated that his UFO "was probably an electronic occurrence of some sort," rather than a visitation from outer space. At any rate, the governor said, "it was obviously there and obviously unidentified."

Carter recounted the experience during a stop here on his statewide listening tour.

## UFOs Fly, Trigger No Flap For Apathetic Gazers Here

The report of green and orange glowing unidentified flying objects in this area last night apparently will remain only that — a small notation on official log books.

Although numerous witnesses reported seeing the aerial objects between 10 o'clock and midnight last night, no probe will be made of the sightings — probably a consequence of skeptical scientists and military personnel and a lack of funds for research.

Although the U.S. Coast Guard station on Tybee Island received calls on the sightings, a spokesman said today, there were no search craft sent out to look into the reports, which said the object crashed into the sea off Tybee island.

The Tybee Coast Guard station made a call on the sightings to the local Coast Guard air station, which, in turn, reported the incident to the U.S. Air Force in Charleston, S.C.

### Usual Fate

There, the report went the way others since the Air Force

abandoned its Project Blue Book — a UFO study project — several years ago.

According to Capt. David Duggan, information officer for the Air Force base in Charleston, a description of reports was made and entered on log books, but no investigation was made, and none is scheduled.

Officials apparently have not tried to dismiss the reports with logical explanations. Duggan said the Air Force, to his knowledge, has no theories.

on last night's sightings, although he did say the glowing objects could have been debris from space.

He said the Air Force in the past has explained some UFO reports by correlating them to missile firings in the U.S.

Fisher said he and his wife then caught sight of a third UFO which came into sight at the level of the second and went very close to it, also seeming to rendezvous.

No sound was heard from the objects, he said, and shortly thereafter, the three objects

moved off together at what appeared to be the same level.

A report to police that night led to a search of the area by a plane. No evidence of the objects was found.

Last night, local aviation controllers and radar operators did not record any unidentified flying objects, according to a spokesman for RAPCON (radar approach control) here.

## No Highway in the Sky, Patrol Says of Objects

While some residents of North Florida, Georgia and Alabama are keeping a skyward watch for unidentified flying objects, Florida police officials say they're keeping their focus earthbound.

"What would the highway patrol do with objects up in the sky?" asked Maj. A. E. Reddick, chief of operations for the Florida Highway Patrol.

Reddick said over the weekend that his agency had no records of UFO sightings although citizens in North Florida and Alabama and citizens and some police officers in Georgia have made such reports in recent weeks.

"We might occasionally have people call the station and mention it, but usually the newspapers get it first," Reddick said. "We get our infor-

## Evidence Left Behind After Report of UFO Stirs Official Interest

GRiffin, Ga. (UPI) — On September 10, Ross Clanton said he saw a golden, egg-shaped object descend to earth, burn a hole in the ground and disappear in a cloud of steam — the high point thus far in a two-week-long outbreak of unidentified flying object reports.

Although the most unusual and spectacular of the nightly sightings, Clanton's report seemed to have stirred more official interest than most, apparently because it left some sort of evidence.

"Something definitely elevated the temperature of the soil," said Dr. O. E. Anderson, a soil chemist for the Georgia Experiment Station. He said the ground around the little hole which Clanton said the UFO made was about 200 degrees nearly two and a half hours after the object fell.

By and large, the reports have been of multicolored, erratically moving lights in the sky in middle and South Georgia. Photographs of the objects have shown the fuzzy lights, but revealed no outlines.

### Air Force Not Interested

The Air Force has shown absolutely no interest in the reports, even though two military policemen reported they were run off the road by a low-flying UFO. Air Force bases in the area reported no unusual activity on their radar screens.

Georgia Governor Jimmy Carter said he saw a UFO before he became governor.

Carter said he and a group of friends were coming out of a dinner meeting one night several years ago, when they saw a big, shining light in the shape of a flying saucer hovering overhead.

"I don't laugh at people anymore when they say they've seen UFOs," he said, "because I've seen one myself."

There have been a rash of UFO reports across the South in recent weeks. The most recent two came from Chattanooga, Tenn., where two Hamilton County policemen and a motel security officer said they watched a UFO early Thursday.

Officers Craig Glaze and Ed Anderson and the security guard

said they sat at the intersection of Interstate 24 and Highway 41 in the Tiftonia area "watching the thing" through field glasses.

The plague of UFOs got into high gear late in August. On August 31, police in four South and Central Georgia cities reported blinking, multicolored lights, moving silently. Susan Shingler, a reporter for the Albany Herald, said she stood on a country road with police watching three UFOs when "two came flying across the sky. There were six in all and some were larger than others."

This sort of activity continued nightly until September 8, when reports became more agitated.

Sp. 4 Barry J. Burns and Sp. 4 Randy Shade, military policemen at Hunter Army Air Base near Savannah, said they were on a routine patrol around the perimeter of the base when a UFO dived toward their car, forcing them into the ditch. They said the UFO hovered nearby as they pried the car out of the ditch, and then followed them as they sped away to headquarters.

They said they saw quick-flashing lights, traveling at a "high rate of speed from east to west, about 2,000 feet above ground level" at their first sighting. Then, they said, the object "came in at tree-top level and made a dive," forcing them off the road.

The same night, a Savannah policeman sent to investigate UFO reports said he saw a "large circular craft something like a flying saucer" with small blue flashing lights and a "large spotlight which changed color from red to green."

LONG SAID HE AND his wife saw the object. "She was near frantic. I was afraid and did not investigate while the thing was down."

Tom Westmoreland, a ranger for the Tupelo office of the Natchez Trace Parkway, said he and other rangers saw an unidentified object in the sky north of Tupelo.

The object was over the area for about 15 minutes, he said, flashing red, yellow and green lights. He said it appeared to be the size of a two-bedroom house.

"It is probably some highly secret experimental aircraft," Westmoreland speculated. "Probably associated with the space program."

MARLIN GOODE of radio station WELQ in Tupelo said Thursday that he has "been reporting these sightings for the last few days and I was skeptical."

## Red light in sky is puzzling

A mysterious red object in the sky had Gaston County people puzzled for the second night in a row Friday.

Even Federal Aviation Authority officials in Charlotte said they didn't know what the light was.

The red light, moving very slowly and very low, was visible from about 9:15 until 10 p.m. moving up and to the left, then disappearing as it went in a southwesterly direction.

Police departments all over the county were deluged with calls, as was The Gazette's switchboard. Callers were wanting to know what the light was.

Although police Thursday night said the light they saw may have been a balloon of some kind, neither the FAA nor the U.S. Weather Service offered any explanation.

"I don't have any idea what it was," said Lawrence Surkey, a radar operator with the Federal Aviation Authority in Charlotte.

Surkey said that the radar screen showed no object in the sky in that direction and it was not visible from the tower at Douglas Airport.

Surkey checked with the U.S. Weather Bureau for a possible weather balloon in the area but the results were negative.

Surkey theorized that the red light may have been a planet that was magnified by the hazy conditions in the atmosphere.

"I have seen these stars turn all kinds of colors when seen through the clouds," he said.

He also suggested that it may have been a high flying airplane not visible on the radar screen or even the Skylab.

"I'm sure there's an explanation for it, but I don't know what it is," he said.

Carlton Barber of 102 E. Sixth St. reported seeing an object in the sky Thursday night. Barber said the object had three red lights with a white light in the middle.

### Mysterious Lights Seen On West Side

Weldon Fox and his family told Kalamazoo police early Sunday morning they saw three unidentified flying objects (UFOs) hovering above Kalamazoo's West Side.

Two officers sent to Fox's home, at 503 Hilbert, said they saw the objects.

Fox, 50, a self-employed heating contractor, said his family witnessed the unusual objects again Sunday and Monday nights.

Fox said the objects had red and green flashing lights, but said they hovered and did not move like airplanes.

The objects moved, he said, when beams of light were flashed at them.

About a dozen persons saw the objects, Fox said.

Lt. Michael Moshier said the officers saw the objects but did not photograph them. Moshier said an officer told Fox to call police again if the objects landed.

Fox and his family looked at the objects through a pair of opera glasses and through a camera's telephoto lens. Photographs were taken, but have not been developed, Fox said.

## It went whirling along with a bluish-white glow

Ever see a UFO close up? If you have, you know your inner feeling; if you haven't, you're in for a treat.

A Millville couple and their neighbor are the latest area residents to have sighted a UFO in area skies.

Mr. and Mrs. George Helms, who lease the Paul Vandine farm, one mile south of Millville, were treated to the extraordinary sight around 9:20 Thursday night.

Helms told the Press-Enterprise that he and his wife were outside feeding their dog when he glanced into the south sky and saw a saucer-type object flying straight across the sky. Both Helms and his wife stated that the object was traveling at a high rate of speed and emitted a whirling sound.

"There was a haze around it, but we could still see the

shape. It had a bright bluish-white color to it," Helms said.

The couple viewed the object for about five minutes and notified their neighbor, Ronald Stackhouse, who also saw it. By the time Stackhouse reached the area where the couple was, the object had moved into the eastern horizon and had changed into a bright red glow.

Helms said that the object flew at a low altitude, approximately 1,500 feet, and appeared very large.

A check with the 648th Radar Squadron at the Benton Air Force Base was made to see if the object had been picked up on radar, but a spokesman at the facility stated he had no reports indicating this.

## UFO's Are Sighted Over Leon County

Two Leon County residents say they saw bright, unidentified lights moving across the sky north of Tallahassee last night shortly before 9 p.m.

Both of the sightings occurred at roughly the same time and the number of lights reported was identical, but the two skygazers differed vastly in their description of what they saw.

"It was a bright, flashing, round-looking object," said Mrs. Linda Goodwin, of 3317 Robinhood Road.

Mrs. Goodwin assumed she and her husband saw the same object making three east-to-west trips across the sky, each time moving at an extremely high speed.

"The third time it came by, it turned very sharply to the north and then it was gone, zoom," she said.

Clay Culp, 275 John Knox Road, said he believes the three objects he viewed were satellites.

Culp, whose residence is about a mile directly to the south of Mrs. Goodwin's, said he saw a white, steady light, "like a small star," moving across the sky in an east to west direction at a constant velocity.

The first two objects crossed the horizon within seconds of each other, at 8:40 p.m., Culp said. The third traveled the same path at 8:42 p.m.

There are "several likely explanations" for the sightings, according to Dr. Robert Davis, nuclear physicist at Florida State University.

The lights could have been American or Russian satellites or space debris coming back to earth. "Or unusual atmospheric conditions, which could reflect, on a temporary basis, lights from the ground," said Davis.

## 'UFO' Seen, Theorized As Jupiter

An unidentified flying object sighted in East Pennsboro Twp., Lower Allen Twp. and Mount Holly Springs—all in Cumberland County—last night may have been the planet Jupiter in an "unusual position."

The county Fire and Police Network dispatch center received "about 15" calls between 9:20 and midnight from persons in the three municipalities reporting a hovering, oval object with blinking red and green lights.

One of the dispatchers on duty said an astronomer from Dickinson College in Carlisle theorized the "UFO" was only Jupiter in such a position that it appeared brighter and more reddish than usual.

The astronomer, according to the dispatcher, made no mention of green lights or of the blinking of the lights some callers said they saw.

## Why Not UFO's?

Several area residents reported seeing what they thought could have been a UFO on Sunday evening. Two of the men said that the object was round and appeared to glow. They also said the object was traveling towards the north at a comparatively high rate of speed.

According to reports from the United States Air Force, the object viewed in this part of the country was "space trash."

No matter how many people see and report objects that either are or resemble UFO's, government officials always have an explanation for their appearance. Considering the credibility of government officials now a days, it makes one wonder.

## UFO Reports Continue

Several Atlanta area residents were slightly spooked Sunday by what they said were unidentified flying objects that zoomed and zigzagged across the Atlantic sky-line.

Descriptions of the UFOs ranged from "three flashing orange lights" to "something as large as a big airplane" to "a bunch of lights popping on and off."

Although scientific evidence of flying saucers has not been presented, a rash of reported UFO sightings in the state recently seems to have prompted Georgians to gaze at the sky.

The first reported UFO came at 4:40 a.m. Sunday from Mrs. Virginia Smith of Morrow. Mrs. Smith said her car started acting strangely and that she spotted the UFO when she went to the door to put the "ignition" cut out. "I saw something shiny sticking up from the top like a pipe," Mrs. Smith said. "It stayed at the tree tops for about 15 minutes and then moved quickly and silently to the northwest."

The orange-colored object was about the size of a large airliner, she said, and it had "pipes" protruding from the bottom and from both sides.

Two northwest Atlanta residents claimed they spotted three glowing objects over their homes at about 7:30 p.m. Sunday. James R. Wyatt II, national director of the Civilian Saucer Information Bureau, said he sighted three glowing objects moving in an erratic, zigzag pattern.

At about the same time, Wyatt said, all the lights on his side of the street went out. "They continued flying zigzag and then moved off in a northerly direction," Wyatt said.

Mrs. Alma Ethridge, who lives almost due south of Wyatt, said she saw the three objects at about the same time.

The UFOs must have returned for a repeat performance three hours later because Mary Alice Hodges saw "what looked like a plane cracking up" at about 10:30 p.m.

She said she was driving along Buford Highway and

saw flashing lights that appeared to be over the oil tanks in Doraville. "It was like magnesium, real bright, and there was one red light," she said. She has been in a UFO club before and said she was looking for UFOs Sunday.

"I thought there was some smoke as it moved away, but it may have been a cloud," she said.

UFOs were also spotted in Carrollton and Palmerton. Alton Hutchinson of Carrollton was fixing his television antenna at about 9:10 p.m. Sunday and told his wife the UFO "looked like a falling star going sideways." Hutchinson said the object was white and silent. He said he figures the object was put up there "by the government."

Georgia State Trooper R.E. Traylor reported he was in his patrol car in Palmerton at about 10 p.m. Saturday when "a large glowing object came into my line of sight travelling due south at a high rate of speed."

"It was floating like a balloon, only much faster, at an altitude of about 250 to 300 feet," Traylor said.

What bothered him was that two minutes earlier he had gotten a radio message that a UFO had been spotted over Manchester, which is about 14 miles from Palmerton.

A spokesman for the state patrol reported that a trooper in Manchester spotted a UFO Saturday night "that went over his patrol car so fast there was no way he could identify it."

But authorities found a commonly used automobile flare in Manchester Saturday and said people mistook it for a UFO.

However, two military policemen said something dived at their car near Hunter Army Base south of Savannah and forced them off the road.

Officers Bert Burns and Randy Shade said they saw "quick flashing lights" about 2,000 feet above the ground that moved at a high rate of speed. They said it hovered near their car and pursued them as they raced towards headquarters.

## They Looked Like 'Neons Gone Mad'

"Suzanne, you won't believe this, but we have three unidentified flying objects spotted over Dougherty County," State Patrolman William Revel said over the telephone at 1 a.m. today.

"I have a Dougherty County police unit out on the Dawson Road at the Lee County line watching them now. If you want a story, go on out."

I went on out, and I watched as three and then five UFOs played games in the sky, flashing like neon signs gone mad, before disappearing to the north at about 3 a.m. It was some story.

When I arrived at the scene, four Dougherty County police officers were watching three of the objects.

They appeared to be round, and rapidly changed colors — from a bright red, to blue, to yellow, to green, to a vivid orange. The largest of the three, which was the most active, would at times seem to "turn sideways" and suddenly acquire a "spur" on the left side.

The two smaller objects seemed to be stationary on either side of the large one. The largest would move a short distance, then "sway" back into its original position.

We watched the three objects for about 30 minutes before their activity began to increase. The object to the right of the biggest one suddenly moved straight up, stopped, and resumed changing colors.

A few minutes later, two more objects, which appeared to come from nowhere, shot across the sky under the three we had sighted.

By this time the group of spectators included Lee County law enforcement officials, an Albany City Commissioner, and several other local citizens.

Reports began to come in over the police car radio of objects being spotted in all parts of Southwest Georgia. Sightings had been made in Turner, Mitchell, Terrell, Lee and Colquitt counties. The reports continued to flow in.

Some of the spectators asserted the objects were stars. But their color change was too rapid, their movement too constant. Others were almost positive that life from another planet was surveying the earth, just as the earth had surveyed the moon.

I stood and watched the objects, and listened to reported sightings over the police radio until 3 a.m. It was puzzling; it made me wonder what they were, where they came from, what was their destination, and if they would return to Southwest Georgia, tonight maybe.

## Georgia officials shunning probe of UFO sightings

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Police officers, reporters, surprised citizens and one military policeman turned in reports of the UFOs four straight nights during the weekend.

The sightings were made in several central and south Georgia towns, with most of the descriptions — being similar — blinking, varied colored lights, usually hovering in one position but occasionally showing great bursts of speed.

Chester A. Tatum, publisher of the Sowega Free Press in Camilla, said he photographed one of the UFOs Saturday night. He said it had a "ribbed type design with some sort of center down the middle." Tatum also said the craft had an illuminous trail behind it.

But military spokesmen at Georgia's two main Air Force installations, Dobbins Air Force Base in Marietta and Warner-Robins Air Base, said there would be no investigation of the sighting reports.

"Most of the calls we've received have been from the press," said Lt. Col. Richard Davies, an information officer at Warner-Robins. "There have been two reports from police and one from a military policeman here, but none from any private citizens."

"These are the first reports of any UFOs I've seen in a number of years. The Air Force used to have a program to check up on this type of thing but they dropped it. I seriously doubt there will be any investigation."

eastern and western horizons.

"I was in the vicinity of Westover High School when I got my first call about these strange objects in the sky," said Patrolman Dennis T. Truman, of the Albany Police Department's uniformed division. "I was checking schools to see that the doors were locked, when I received the first call about these objects in the sky. They were various colors — blue, green, white and red, with flashing lights. I thought they were weather balloons, although that is pure speculation."

Another Albany policeman, Corporal Ronald Abbott of the traffic division, said he observed the UFOs "on both the east and west horizons of Albany."

## Moved at Slow Speed

"They seemed to be moving at a slow speed," said Corporal Abbott. "They pretty much held the same course. These sky objects were still visible at daylight."

Leesburg police officer Albert Smith described one of the objects he was watching at 3:15 a.m. "The object is round, with orange, red, green and blue lights," he said. At that time, he observed, "The object is not moving now," and added that the UFO was too far away for closer observation.

Robert Welch, a dispatcher with the Camilla police, described the object that hung over Camilla for three and a half hours, during which time he said it was observed by at least seven people.

"It looks like a white light with blinking green and red lights," he said. "It has moved slowly back to Newton. At first, it moved in a zig-zag pattern and then moved slowly to the west."

## Various Colors

Other similar reports gave the characteristics of the phenomenon as round, shining or glowing aerial objects which moved with no sound or odor. Witnesses described color changes in the lights on the objects from red, orange, green, blue to sometimes white.

Some witnesses reported they saw the objects hovering, then moving rapidly, and also moving slowly. And some witnesses reported the objects could be observed for longer than half an hour.

All of the witnesses said they were neither drunk nor under the influence of drugs.

In Decatur County, Eli Washington said he saw what looked like a "light in the sky," and added "I don't believe it was men from Mars," but, he added, "I don't know what it was."

## Pelham Sighting

Lt. Melvin Perkins of the Pelham Police Department said he saw one of the lights visible for about an hour after he reported to work at 7 a.m.

"I could tell it wasn't a star," said Perkins, "but it didn't shine like a star." He wondered if it might be the "Northern Lights showing up in this part of the country."

"If it's not that, possibly it could be some secret military experiment by the Air Force," Perkins theorized.

The State Patrol headquarters in both Thomasville and Donaldsonville reported no calls about UFOs.

After the first sightings of the UFOs in Terrell County, the Albany Naval Air Station was alerted by the Georgia State Patrol, and an NAS spokesman was quoted as saying the Navy "is concerned about this and will look into it."

The U.S. Air Force also was alerted, and spokesmen for Eglin Air Force Base, Fort Walton Beach, Fla., and Warner Robins Air Force Base, near Macon, said they would send investigators to Southwest Georgia.

At Dawson, Police Captain Rocky Wiggins and Patrolmen Larry Fincher and Gary Ellington observed the sightings after four U.S. government workers stopped a Dawson police patrol car and reported seeing "something quite weird in the sky."

## First Report in Dawson

"This thing started off in Dawson," said Patrolman Ellington, "when these government workers, who were driving into Dawson from Bronwood on U.S. Highway 118, reported they had seen two objects in the sky."

Ellington said Dawson police then observed a UFO northeast of Dawson and another UFO southwest of Dawson.

"Upon looking at these objects, they appeared to be real bright, and the lights were changing colors, going from white to a reddish orange color to a sort of greenish-yellow color," said Ellington.

"We called in another police patrol car and Captain Wiggins and Patrolman Fincher and I discussed the possibility of whether these strange UFOs could be weather balloons or reflections of an unknown object in the sky, and at that point," he said, "the objects just faded out, and we called the State Patrol in Albany, asking that the Albany Naval Air Station be contacted."

Dougherty County police sent a patrol car to the Terrell - Dougherty county line where the Dougherty police also reported observing the objects.

By that time, said Ellington, the Albany Police Department had reports that the object was spotted in Lee County.

"Our first sightings occurred in Terrell County shortly before midnight, and somewhere about 1:30 a.m. and 2:45 a.m., two more objects were picked up and spotted to the northeast part of Terrell County near the Lee County line."

## Police Contacts

Ellington said Dawson police kept in contact with police units "all over Southwest Georgia who reported seeing the objects."

B. C. Crowell, mayor of Doerun, said he spotted a light in the sky early this morning after the night policeman called him. Crowell said he and some employees at Crowell Auto Parts spotted an object directly over Doerun about 5:45 a.m. and

another object in the southeastern sky.

He said the overhead object appeared to be a "big light."

"We saw something — we don't know what," he said, adding that it looked like an "oversized morning star."

He said the object, in the southeastern sky, moved at a slow speed in a southwesterly direction. He said the object had blinking lights. Other Doerun observers said they saw different colors including a "sort of orange" and "light blue."

Crowell said he had never seen anything like the UFO. He said he watched it until daybreak "when it became hard to distinguish the light."

Police department spokesmen in Leary, Waycross and Camilla were reluctant to talk about the UFOs. However, the police departments in Leary and Camilla reported their night policemen saw objects, but the phenomena in Leary and Camilla could not be reached for comment.

# Two More UFOs Sighted Over South Georgia

SANDERSVILLE, Ga. (UPI) — Two more unidentified flying objects appeared over South Georgia Tuesday night to keep the week-long mystery going.

Witnesses first reported a very small object in the southwest, its color changing from red to green to blue and then to gold, moving within a small area.

Later, a second object, larger and multi-colored, appeared in the northwest. It eventually turned white and dwindled in size. Both objects are visible at the same time, witnesses reported.

At about the same time that the Chattanooga officers were watching the object on N. Moore Road, Red Bank Police- men Jack Blankenship and Lynn Carr and two firemen were standing front of the Dayton Boulevard station watching a U.F.O.

A Harding Mall area family reported seeing several bright star-like objects and a glowing red triangle move across Nashville skies Saturday night.

However, police and officials said they believed the objects were either bright stars or planets.

CINDI HARRINGTON, 16, of 245 Willow Lane, said she and her two brothers and two visiting friends first saw the objects when her mother, Mrs. Nancy Harrington, pointed them out at about 11:15.

She said the first object she saw looked "like a real close star" which was at first white but an instant later changed to red, green and yellow.

"It's the first time we've seen anything like this. We judged its movements by the telephone wires and it moved three inches in two hours," she said.

THE TEENAGER said the

only aid the group had in seeing the object was a pair of binoculars.

"About 12:30 a.m. we saw the second one. It was the shape of a triangle glowing red and had three white lights on it. It moved across the sky in about 10 seconds," Miss Harrington said.

She said she watched the sky until 3 a.m. and later saw several more objects moving slowly across the sky.

AFTER SEEING the red triangle Miss Harrington said she decided to call the police.

Officer Robert Hullett, who answered the call with Officer Gregory W. Moss, said he saw the first white object, but thought it was a star flickering.

really out of our jurisdiction," Hullett said.

DR. ARNOLD M. Heiser, associate professor of astronomy at Vanderbilt University, said the objects could have been planets or fairly bright stars.

"They could appear to change colors because of the atmosphere if they are low to the horizon," he said.

Heiser added that clouds could have also caused the objects to flicker.

IN REGARD to the triangular object, Heiser said it could have been a helicopter or plane, but "I really have no idea."

A spokesman at the Metro Flight Service Station said he had received no calls or information about the objects, but ventured the possibility that the triangle could have been the U.S. astronauts, but "I'm just guessing, I really have no idea."

## Interest in UFOs Picks Up After Sightings in Alabama

With red, green and white lights blinking on and off, a large, round object hovered above a cemetery in Carrville early Friday morning.

"It didn't make a sound and was high up in the air," said Police Chief Ray Sides. "But we know it wasn't an airplane. And after a while, it began moving across town real slow, then suddenly it just streaked away into the sky and disappeared."

What happened in Carrville is something that is many other communities both in and out of Alabama, according to reports. Unidentified flying objects are being reported by dozens of witnesses, many of them law enforcement officials and other reputable residents.

But none of them have any explanation as to what it is they have seen and all of them say "we want to find out."

Sides said the Carrville incident was reported by police officer Billy Clayton, who said the object was stationary but would suddenly move and then stop, always over the cemetery.

At 4 a.m. Saturday, six different police departments in Auburn, Tuskegee, Tallahassee and other areas saw a large, round object with green, blinking lights that was moving too fast to be an airplane.

"Although it was moving very fast, it was joined by another object with a red light," says Auburn police dispatcher Keith Broach. "Another officer said he saw it stop, then shoot across the sky."

Other police departments in his area reported seeing a similar sight and "most of the other policemen thought it resembled an airplane in a way but yet it was going too fast for that."

Notasulga Police Chief Mid Giles said that the object he saw Saturday morning was covered with blue, green, white and red lights and swayed as it moved back and forth.

"It was as big as a good-sized automobile. It wasn't making any noise at all. It wasn't moving very fast but then it just took off."

Like other witnesses, he said it seemed to "sit" in one spot before it jetted away.

"We still look for 'em. We sort of keep an eye open to see some more," he said.

"Saturday and Sunday a couple of people called me up at home," said Bill Thornton, civil defense coordinator for Lee County. "But none had anything we could confirm."

The National Weather Service in Montgomery ruled out any possibility that the UFOs could be weather balloons because these are generally released during the late afternoon and explode within a two-hour period.

David Martinson, an air traffic controller at Topeka Municipal Airport, said he saw the object, and, though he isn't sure, he believes it may have been a weather balloon released north of Topeka — possibly in Omaha, Neb.

"The air was pretty still all day," he said, indicating that the balloon might have risen nearly straight up and reflected sunlight, making it appear bright.

Forties Air Force Base control towers workers said they didn't see any strange objects in the sky around sundown.

Controllers at Richards-Gebaur Air Force Base near Kansas City said they didn't see anything unusual, either.

Harold Parmenter, a water department employee in Marysville, said he watched the object for about 30 minutes before sundown Tuesday. He said it was due north of Marysville, and appeared to rain altitude while he watched it.

National Weather Service forecasters in Topeka saw the object, but said they don't know what it was.

The objects usually rise about 300 to 400 feet in the air when taking off, then go straight up at a high rate of speed.

"In fact, four just passed over here, heading west," Jim said. "They came by here about 9:10 p.m., he added, "so they should be over Savannah just about now."

# Hunter Report Changed

Hunter Army Airfield officials Monday denied that an unidentified flying object forced a military vehicle off the road early Saturday.

At the request of the Provost Marshal, Lt. Col. Robert Reid, the portion of the report indicating that the vehicle left the road was deleted.

Two military policemen on routine patrol Saturday saw the UFO at approximately 2:20 a.m. In a report filed after the incident, they described it as "traveling at a high rate of speed from east to west about 2,000 feet above ground level."

The object dove toward the sedan and passed above the blue warning light on top of the vehicle. The initial report filed Saturday said the vehicle left the road when the object passed over the car's roof.

A statement from the office of military police Saturday indicated that the vehicle also entered a ditch, but Lt. Robert Hulen, duty officer, said Sunday that report was incorrect.

## Left the Road

Spec. 4 Bart J. Burns, one of the MP's in the vehicle, stressed early Sunday morning that the vehicle did not enter a ditch, but did leave the road. Burns said he and his partner, Spec. 4 Randy Shade, ducked in their seats when the UFO approached and the car left the road at that time.

Hulen disagreed Sunday with the report that the MP vehicle left the road and said both of the MP's told him Sunday afternoon that the car had remained on the road during the incident.

Following Hulen's statement Sunday, the public information officer for Hunter-Fort Stewart said Monday that the "vehicle left the road" phrase was omitted from the official report at the request of Reid. "There apparently has been some error made in the initial report," Anderson added.

GRIFFIN, Ga. (AP)—A soil scientist is investigating the Monday daytime sighting of a bright gold object which a Spalding County farmer claims floated to earth then took off again after burning a circle in a field.

Dr. O. E. Anderson of the University of Georgia's Agricultural Experiment Station in this middle Georgia city said he examined the burned circle — about the size of a basketball — two and one-half hours after the farmer called a radio station to report the incident.

Rast Clayton of Orchard Hill, a rural community east of here, said he saw the bright gold object descend to the ground about 25 yards from his home. The scorched ring was about the size of a basketball, Anderson said.

Clayton said it was spinning like a top and a cloud of smoke went up when it touched the ground. He said it rose again and disappeared.

Anderson said he has begun an analysis of the soil in an effort to identify any particles foreign to the area.

"If it was a magnesium flare, we would expect to find a high amount of magnesium compared to the soil around the burned area," he said.

Anderson admitted that a person could get a similar burned effect by pouring gasoline in a circle and lighting it. He added, however, that he didn't think gasoline was used because there was no trace of it. He said he did not want to speculate on what caused the burn.

Anderson said his study will not necessarily unmask a hoax, if such is the case, since if a volatile substance were used to start the fire it could have completely evaporated by the time he arrived.

"The soil was unusually hot for just grass to be burning," he said. "It was hot down to a depth of at least a half an inch and as much as an inch the soil was very, very hot," he said grass roots and wood chips in the soil were also burned. He said there was no hole or depression in the soil in the burned area.

Anderson admitted that his temperature observations were made by holding his hand over the burned area and by touching a knife blade which had been used to probe the soil.

The radio station which received the call concerning the sighting about 4 p.m. later reported other citizens had begun calling in UFO reports by nightfall.

The object re-appeared about 9:35 p.m., she said, when it was seen climbing up through some trees, then hovered for a few minutes and disappeared again.

Miss Penny Black of East 56th Street near Waters Avenue said neighbors across the street called her out to see a red object the size of a football resting stationary in the sky above her house.

The neighbors spotted it when they heard a noise in their front yard "like something brushing across the trees."

Eddie Chapman of Williamsburg subdivision reported seeing something "about the size of a very large star" moving slowly from east to west not far from Memorial Stadium about 9:20 p.m.

He said the object had an orange glow and that three distinct orange spotlights were visible just before it disappeared.

Ronald Sumner of the Kingsland subdivision reported seeing a similar object over Lake Mayer and Robert Epstein said he saw what he first thought was a red flare about 9 p.m. near DeRenne and Waters avenues.

Then, Epstein said, it zig-zagged and "blinked a couple of times."

A red, oval-shaped object "pretty high up" was seen near Greenview about 8:59 p.m. Earl Herman and John Sussman said they observed the object for about five minutes before it disappeared into the clouds.

# UFO Sightings Rampant; Officers Report Lights

Authorities Sunday checked out more reported sightings of unidentified flying objects in the Southeast, but quickly dispelled a fear that something from another world had fallen in a Georgia field.

The Georgia State Patrol said a glowing green cylinder found near Manchester Saturday night, shortly after several persons said they saw UFO's buzzing the area, turned out to be only a commonly used automobile trouble flare.

But reports continued to pour in, from police and civilians. Two military policemen said something dived at their car near Hunter Army Air Base south of Savannah and forced them off the road. A state patrol trooper based in Manchester said a UFO whisked past his car, going so fast there was "no way" he could get a close look.

A cameraman for WAGA-TV in Atlanta recorded 90 seconds of film of a UFO near Manchester early Sunday. It showed a hovering, glowing light, changing colors rapidly.

Police in five East Central Alabama cities reported sightings early Sunday.

Officer Keith Broach of Auburn, Ala., said he saw

something the size of an airplane, which appeared red and white, changed to green and then to white before flying away.

A policeman at Lanett, Ala., said he saw an object about the size of a car, coming to within 150 feet of the ground.

There also were sightings reported by police in Carrville, Notasulga and Tuskegee, Ala.

Military Policeman Bert Burns and Randy Shade said in Savannah that an airborne object dived toward their car as they were making a routine patrol near Hunter Air Base.

## '3 Officers Sight Flying Saucer'

A flying saucer radiating a bright red color was in the Chattanooga area early this morning.

At least that's what two county policemen and a security guard believe they watched for some 30 minutes as it slowly descended into the Mount Etna area.

Officers Craig Glaze and Ed Anderson and a security guard with Trans-American Security Force sat at the intersection of I-24 and Highway 41 in Tiftonia watching "the thing" for at least a half-hour through field glasses.

Although efforts to contact Officer Anderson and the security guard were fruitless this morning, Officer Glaze said "they agree with me that it was something weird."

Officer Glaze's father, Gene Glaze, said he sat atop Signal Mountain and also watched the object after receiving a call from his son, but speculated and "hoped" that the object was merely a research balloon instead of a space ship.

### NOT ON RADAR

Officials at Lovell Field's control tower said they were contacted about 2:30 a.m. this morning by several people who had watched the object, but said they had been unable to spot anything in the Tiftonia area on their radar screen.

Deputy Glaze said he and Officer Anderson were dispatched to the Holiday Inn in Tiftonia after the security guard called headquarters and reported seeing an unidentified flying object in the area while on routine patrol of the motel.

The two officers traveled down I-24 near Whiteside and spotted the object, then speeded back to the Highway 41 exit and the motel to watch the UFO through field glasses.

During the past two weeks, especially in the south-east

area, there have been numerous reports of UFO sightings and unexplainable occurrences linked to UFOs.

These sightings are the first mass reports to be made since the abundance of reports filed during the late 1950s and early 1960s.

Officer Glaze said the object appeared very clear and distinct through the field glasses and gave off a burnt orange or fiery red glow.

He said that it looked like a disk with two prongs or points emerging from the rear, but was unable to estimate its size.

### DESCENDS SLOWLY

The officer said the UFO, when it was first spotted, appeared to be several thousand feet above the tree line on the top of Mount Etna and slowly descended behind the mountain during the 30 minutes he watched.

At intervals, sometimes lasting five minutes, the object would "disappear," Officer Glaze said. He speculated that either the UFO was going behind clouds during these periods or had a back side that was not illuminated.

He discounted theories that the object was the moon, "it was too small," or a star, "it was too big," and knew positively that it was not a plane.

"The thing didn't move with any rhyme or reason and would disappear only to reappear several minutes later in a different spot. I can't say for sure what it was, but I've never seen anything like it before."

Gene Glaze said that from his viewpoint on Signal Mountain the object did not appear to be descending down Mount Etna, but was traveling "very erratically, wandering back and forth across the mountain."

### BUTT OF JOKES

The two county officers were the butt of many jokes when they arrived at the sheriff's office this morning, but Officer Glaze said he is sticking to his story.

Lt. Bill Newell radioed the two officers while they were en route to the jail and asked

them if they had the flying saucer. He was taken back a bit when they jokingly replied they had the object in their truck, but told them to be sure and get the space ship fingerprinted and examined before they left for the day.

## Auburn asked to track Carrville flying saucer

CARRVILLE

Carrville authorities have asked chemists from Auburn to study an area where residents say an unidentified flying object may have landed several days ago.

Townpeople told police Wednesday that they had found an area of grass that has been mysteriously burned.

It follows more reports of aerial sightings by police here, as well as in Tallassee Wednesday night.

CARRVILLE POLICE officer Gary Clayton said he and several other people saw a large disc-shaped object.

"It's the fourth time I've seen something in the past few weeks," he said.

He and his wife, Pam, reported seeing an object several nights ago that hovered about 350 yards from the ground near this Elmore County town.

"It gives you sort of an eerie feeling," he said. "It upset my wife very much."

He described it as being about the size of car, with a red light on one side, a green one on the other and a white one in the middle.

"It made a slight ringing noise," he said. "Like bells jingling. I really feel sort of foolish telling anyone about it. But we know what we saw and heard."

"Then the thing just took off without any noticeable sound and disappeared. And so did me and my wife. We lit out down the road for home."

## 'UFOs Seen In Alabama

Numerous unidentified flying objects (UFOs) were reported sighted through the central Alabama during the weekend.

Police in Auburn, Lanett, Carrville, Notasulga and Tuskegee reported they saw UFOs streaking through the nighttime sky Sunday.

Keith Broach of Auburn said he saw a red and blue object the size of an airplane which later changed to green and then to white before disappearing.

## UFO sightings are disputed: do moonmen need lights?

While Unidentified Flying Objects over the Deep South were getting all the attention last weekend, residents of Holland, Mich., also reported that something was up there.

Holland police say they received numerous reports of bright lights flashing high overhead last weekend.

An investigation determined that the Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) was an airplane with a revolving sign promoting the "Uncola" in the green container — 7-Up.

Many of the weekend sightings, in Georgia and Alabama came from policemen — civilian and military.

But Dr. Richard Williamon, who holds a doctor of philosophy degree in astronomy from the University of Florida, told The Detroit News that all sightings for which sufficient data is available can be explained as natural phenomena.

Dr. Williamon is on the staff of the Fernback Science Center, Decatur, Ga., which, he said, has been acting as an "unofficial central

receiving point" for reported UFO sightings in central and north Georgia.

"We have been getting quite a few of these reports," Williamon said yesterday. "Most of the reports can be explained as natural phenomena because we have an adequate description of the objects and can identify them."

The reports received at Fernback that remain unidentified, he said, are so classified "simply because the people who observed these objects didn't observe them closely enough to give a complete description of what they had seen."

Many of the reported UFOs, the scientist said, have been identified as reflections of spotlights off clouds, or the planets Jupiter, Venus and Mars, or the star Sirius — which he said is "rising in the east and very bright at the (4 a.m.) time of many of the sightings."

The majority of recent UFO sightings around the world have been in the category of flashing or moving multi-colored lights in a night sky.

Dr. Williamon scoffs at the contention that the lights may be on space ships from outer space.

He reasons, "If these are intelligent beings and have the technology to come all the way down to earth from wherever they've come from — then why in the world would they even need lights?"

Meanwhile, at Hunter Army Airfield in Savannah, Ga., yesterday, two military policemen were undergoing "de-briefing" after reporting that a UFO made an apparent "dive" at their cruiser early Saturday.

A public information officer at nearby Fort Stewart, Ga., said the MP's — specialists fourth class Bart J. Burns and Randy Shade — would be unavailable for press interviews until after the de-briefing process is completed.

The men told superior officers that they sighted "brilliantly flashing lights — blue, white and amber in color" — while on a routine patrol of the former B52 base, which is in the process of being phased out as a military facility.

The UFO dove at their vehicle from tree-top height, the MP's said, and later "came to a complete hover in front of them for about 15 minutes" before following them as they returned to their headquarters to report the incident.

The Fort Stewart PIO officer described the scene of the sighting as a "high air-traffic area" with numerous helicopter training flights "both day and night."

The Air Traffic Control Center at Hampton, Ga., reported no unusual activity on its radar screens during the times of the reported UFO sightings.

"We cover the area in question," a control room operator at the center said yesterday, "but a (radar) sighting can depend on the size and altitude of the object."

He said he could not comment further on the radar's capability because such information "is classified."

## Dobbins Gets Reports Of Cobb UFO Sightings

Telephone calls reporting unidentified flying objects over the Cobb County area were made to information officials at Dobbins Air Force Base Friday night following a rash of similar sightings ranging from South Georgia to as far north as Lawrenceville.

can grow to enormous proportions.

"Years ago, when we took in all calls, we had to make official reports on every one of them," he said. "Naturally, many were made by pranksters or drunks."

Osborne also noted that, since Dobbins is a reserve base, it is manned basically by civilians who are not as expert on the governmental regulations as are regular personnel.

Dobbins' base operations head said he had received "a few" calls concerning the UFO's Saturday morning but referred the informers to the news media.

At 10:30 a.m. Saturday, he said, he got a call from an unidentified youth who stated he saw something unusual hovering over the football field during

Friday night's Wheeler High School football game.

Ray Smith, of radio station WSNT, said several persons had called the station to report the UFOs. He said many of the residents admitted they saw the moving lights Thursday night but hesitated to report them "because they thought people would think they're crazy."

Dr. O. E. Anderson, a specialist in soil analysis at the Georgia Experiment Station here, was called in to make a soil examination where the UFO was reported to have hit the ground.

Anderson said it would take three days to complete an analysis. But he said the description of high pitched, pulsating sound and the golden glow was "unlike anything in my experience."

The UFO made no depression in the ground, but it left markings which covered an area one foot long by six or eight inches wide. Underneath the top layer of soil, Anderson uncovered a wide area of charred earth and organic matter.

Brooks is about 20 miles southeast of Orchard Hill, where a man reported seeing a "golden egg" drop to the earth last week. Lawhorn said he knew nothing about other UFO reports which have been made in Georgia, Florida and Alabama in recent weeks.

## Two Deputies Report UFO

Several persons including two deputy sheriffs reported Monday they saw strange flashing lights in the skies over Tennessee over the weekend. A South American newspaper reported a saucer-like object showed up in a photo snapped casually by two vacationing students in Montevideo, Uruguay.

"If I was a drinker, I could understand it," said Deputy Sheriff P. M. Pilalas of Shelby County, Tenn.

PILALAS SAID he and his partner, J. O. Davis, were driving on U.S. Highway 700 just east of Memphis late Sunday when they saw a cluster of red and white lights hovering overhead in misty skies at an altitude of 500 to 1,000 feet.

Two bright spotlights were shining from the forward part of the craft and two red lights were flowing at the extremities of the craft, they said.

"We couldn't see the craft itself, only its lights," said Pilalas.

"I FLASHED my spotlight on the vehicle, which appeared to be traveling with us at about 15 miles an hour. I was hanging out the window at this point.

"We let our blue light (on the police car) shine twice and then stopped," Pilalas said. "The vehicle then flashed its white beams twice and then both the white lights and red

lights went out. Then it was gone."

Tommy Robbins, an Illinois Central-Gulf Railroad employee, said he spotted a bright, hovering object with red and white lights from his carport in Jackson, Tenn.

"IT WAS very bright and seemed to give off a light like a strong fluorescent light. It moved to the west very slowly," he said, "then it disappeared."

The South American students, both Brazilians, said a saucerlike object showed

up hovering in the air in one of the photographs they snapped in July of the Uruguayan Legislative Palace in Montevideo, according to the newspaper La Manana.

The newspaper said the picture had been forwarded to Montevideo by the Pelotas, Brazil "Society for Investigation and Research of Flying Saucers."

THE LETTER from the society said professional photographers had found no trace of fraud in the photograph.

## More 'strange lights' in A sky seen in Dexter

There are continuing reports in this area of "strange sights" in the sky at night, and more reports of UFOs.

Strange lights were seen in the sky north and east of Dexter last night, and persons who saw them say they have been watching them for two or three weeks.

"They (the lights) are not there every night, but we have seen them often," one observer said.

The lights in the sky to the northeast were described as being a "small cluster of lights" which sometimes remain in the heavens for "two or three hours," then fade away or leave.

The light was continuous and not a twinkling, sparkling type of light, they said.

There have also been numerous reports of sightings in this area the early-morning hours, just before daybreak. Several persons have said

they have watched these lights for several weeks.

"We see them every morning—or almost every morning" one early-riser said.

The early-morning lights are generally in the western sky over Dexter, they said. They described them as vari-colored.

And numerous persons in Bernie area say they continue to see some "strange lights" at night, although not on as regular a basis as they did several months ago. At that time the lights at Bernie and at Piedmont attracted national attention—and were the subject of much study and speculation.

"There's something up there, alright," one person said. "Whether it is just a strange light, or a craft, or some other type of object, I certainly don't know. But it is different."

## Another UFO Is Reported

Another unidentified flying object (UFO) has been reported in the Surry County skies.

George Fawcett of Mount Airy, veteran of 27 years of chasing UFOs around the country, said he received a report from Mr. and Mrs. Snow of route 2, Dobson, of a sighting Monday morning. The couple were on their way to work, he reported, and said that just before 8 a.m. as they were driving about seven miles from Pilot Mountain they spotted a glowing circular object in the skies. They watched it for 20 to 30 seconds at tree top level.

Fawcett said the couple reported the mystery object was "blinking" with its colors rotating in a circular movement, and that it appeared about 300 feet away from the side of the road they were traveling on. The color was described as "bright and pretty, deep, rich red, orange and yellow colors". It disappeared as rapidly as it appeared.

The scientists said the results appear to lend support to an eyewitness account that a small, hot metallic object seemed to land and slightly imbed itself in the soil.

Although Shuman and Anderson speculate the object may have been a small meteorite or piece of space junk, they cannot account for the lack of a crater or depression in the earth around the alleged impact area.

No elements used in flares and no hydrocarbons (fumes) were found in the soil tested, the scientists reported.

These facts, said Shuman, indicate that ignition of natural organic materials in the soil tested was not caused by petroleum products or flares.

# UFO Sightings Reported Across N. C.

Much fuss was made over UFOs in the '60s, then the talk subsided for a few years and wasn't revived until hundreds of sightings were reported this summer in and around Georgia.

George Fawcett, of 607 N. Main Street, Mount Airy, a longtime UFO investigator, says people sometimes ask him, "Where have they been?" He says he tells him they've been just about everywhere — and not to be misled by lack of publicity.

The theater of action has shifted, though, Fawcett says. There have been fewer UFO reports this year in North Carolina than there were last year. But 1973 still have been a good year for UFO sightings.

From George Fawcett's extensive sightings in Northwest North Carolina within the past few months:

—In Winston-Salem, a lawyer and his wife reported that they were driving on Country Club Road around 7 p.m. Jan. 16 when a UFO with a dome top and four lights fell in front of the car. They said they experienced a feeling of weightlessness and were lifted up in the front seat of their car. Fawcett said the weightlessness is frequently reported by people who get close to UFOs.

—In Mount Airy, two different families who live some distance apart called Fawcett within five minutes of each other to report a round revolving object over northern Mount Airy. There were 11 witnesses in all. All reported that the UFO lit up houses and surroundings with a bluish-red light. It stayed within sight for about three minutes. That was Feb. 23.

—In Dobson on Aug. 14, a farmer called the Surry County Sheriff's Department around 10:30 p.m. to report a circular UFO that appeared to land in a cow pasture. The man said it hurt his eyes to look at it. A woman who lived some distance away described seeing a similar object at the same time. No trace of such an object was ever found in the pasture.

—Two students reported a UFO with red and white lights over Germantown April 6. They said it circled at treetop level, then flew straight up. Two students reported seeing two red, revolving UFOs, at an altitude of about 100 feet, at Millers Creek on Feb. 21.

And, in other parts of North Carolina: —Fawcett said the State Bureau of Investigation analyzed a greenish fluid from the site of a reported UFO landing Jan. 7 at Ellenboro near Forest City. He quoted the report as saying the fluid was "not a controlled substance, not identifiable with any other substance, and did not separate into elements." In this

case, a boy who was home from school said the UFO landed in his backyard and he went within 25 feet of it to take a Polaroid picture. Marks were found on the ground.

—A Marine reported that a UFO was tracked on radar at the Cherry Point military base. Jets reportedly were sent to chase the UFO, which led them in direction of Atlanta but outran them.

Fawcett predicts that UFO sightings will increase in 1974. One of the reasons he gives is that people will be more sky-conscious because of a comet that is soon to become visible.

Fawcett is currently quoting a Latin motto, which sounds rather ominous with reports of UFOs and their occupants tangling with people and airplanes: "Untrunque paratus," which means: "Be ready for anything."

# Experts Say Local UFOs Are Planets

By BILL GARBETT

Scientists said today the Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) sighted moving across the sky by many Montgomarians this week were probably planets.

Astronomers in Atlanta and Montgomery said the mysterious objects were three planets visible to the naked eye.

Dr. Ralph Buice of the Fernbank Science Center in Atlanta said what residents saw were probably the planets of Jupiter, Mars and Venus, particularly visible to the naked eye this time of year.

For the past several weeks, residents of western Georgia and eastern Alabama, including Montgomery, have reported seeing multi-colored objects moving across the sky.

Some residents described the objects to police and newspapers green, as having red, and white lights blinking on and off, and darting around the sky.

Buice said Jupiter (this time of year is a bright planet and can be seen with the naked eye at about 10 p.m. moving in a southwesterly direction. He said when it is low on the horizon the atmospheric affect makes it appear to be changing colors.

Before 2 a.m. Mars appears as a bright red and may account for many of the sightings, Buice said. The planet also moves in a southwesterly direction, rises in the East and sets in the West, (See UFOs, Page 2)

and is not visible after 2 a.m.

Buice said all three planets will be highly visible for the next two months.

Dr. Donald A. Boudreau, a physics professor at Huntingdon College, agreed with Buice adding that the haze over a city can produce various optical distortions.

Buice said there were about 1,000 satellites in orbit. Of these, about 100 are visible to the naked eye.

He said the satellite Pegasus was now visible over the Southeast and might account for many of the UFO reports.

Buice said airplanes can also be confusing especially if they have their landing lights on and are coming towards you.

"I have done a lot of observation and tracking of satellites and I have never seen anything unusual," Buice said.

But the apparent motion has seemed real to many observers in the Montgomery area.

For instance, a caller today reported the object he watched last night appeared to land. He thought it large as a highway truck.

# Flying A excites UFO watchers at Charlevoix

CHARLEVOIX — A growing band of skywatchers looks nightly for an unidentified flying object some say resembles the brand on a steer in the sky.

Robert Young, who says he first sighted it last October, said that through binoculars the UFO looks like an A lying on its side surrounded by a diamond shape.

To most observers it is merely a luminous light, perhaps a star, when seen with the naked eye. It reportedly

moves about in the heavens for some 30 minutes before settling in the west about 10 p.m.

Young said attempts to photograph the object have been futile. He was rejected when he asked the Air Force tracking station between Charlevoix and Petoskey for help in identifying it.

SOME 40 PERSONS journeyed to Young's home, about six miles north of Gaylord, after he first reported seeing the light. Some brought binoculars.

Now more of them have reported seeing the object high over Charlevoix. These include UFO fanatics, the curious, and skeptics, such as Gordon Freedman, Charlevoix industrialist and a pilot.

Freedman said that the haze and heat waves that collect before the human eye gazing through miles of atmosphere can create strange illusions.

Jet pilots, he said, used to chase such sights, and some of them crashed. Some believe they were chasing the planet Venus.

But Freedman cannot explain why the UFO sometimes is directly overhead, at a point too low for atmospheric distortions.

RESIDENTS were used to looking skyward before this newest topic of conversation and speculation.

B52's fly overhead about a dozen times daily on simulated bombing runs for the Air Force.

The area of sightings appears to extend from Valdosta north to Macon, and preliminary reports indicated that there might have been one or more sightings southeast of Albany in the Waycross area. Georgia Highway Patrol officers in Perry said they had received a report that a UFO had been observed for more than 30 minutes. The object was described

Cordele and in the vicinity of Warner Robins Air Force Base. Officers at Warner Robins said no planes were sent up to investigate because "we didn't have any planes to send." An information officer at the base noted that the Air Force no longer investigates UFOs on an official basis and has discontinued its "Blue Book," a compendium of UFO sightings.

## UFOs may be Skylab fragments

The unidentified flying objects reportedly seen Wednesday night by Richard Hildreth and his son, Carbondale, may be fragments from Skylab II.

Reeve Norton of Marion says he has seen several objects similar to the one described by Hildreth and as a result he wrote the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) to find out if there is an explanation. X

NASA replied with a schedule of Skylab sightings for a two-week period. Norton said NASA reported that there are five pieces of debris ahead of Skylab II and four pieces trailing it.

The report from NASA that the S-2 tracking stage is 23 minutes ahead of Skylab, a fragment precedes it by 13 minutes, a shroud precedes it by six minutes, another shroud precedes it by five minutes and another fragment precedes it by 2 1/2 minutes.

Following the Skylab, NASA, is a cover, 15 seconds behind the space ship; a shroud five minutes behind; another shroud six minutes behind and a fragment 11 minutes behind.

Norton said he and some of his fellow workers saw five of the objects the night Skylab was launched.

"When we saw the first one we thought we were seeing Skylab but when the other four appeared, we began to wonder," Norton said.

Norton is employed by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency in Carbondale.

## Nurses Report Sighting UFO

Five nurses at the Warner Hospital returning from a meeting in Hershey Monday evening reported spotting a bright unidentified flying object in the Dillsburg area around 10:30 p.m.

One of the nurses, who asked to remain anonymous, said they stopped their car to observe the object for five minutes before it disappeared in the sky. At first, she said, they thought the bright light, similar to a big star might be Sky Lab, but then the bright lights were turned off leaving only a few small colored lights illuminating the craft. Minutes later it sped away "like a streak" across the horizon.
