Was it just coincidence or did a number of Yazooans' imaginations work overtime, perhaps stimulated by what some say is "mass hysteria" over recent reports of UFO sightings? One thing is certain: the reports of the strange happenings Tuesday night fascinated thousands of Yazooans and many could talk of little else Wednesday.

No one here reported seeing any wrinkled redskinned beings as two fishermen Pascagoula recently did. (Supposedly they were taken aboard a blue-lit spacecraft, examined but let go unharmed.)

Nevertheless there were some sightings of moving and hovering lights and which. changed colors, a "whirring", "humming" or "whooshing" noise which varied in intensity and apparently came, went and came again.

Probably the most interesting happening of all was a massive power failure at Mississippi Chemical Corporation's huge nitrogen fertilizer plant. At 11:17 p.m. Tuesday MCC's entire production complex was shut down.

Why or how no one can say except to report that a big ceramic insulator at the plant's number two electric substation shattered.

Actually, the device is a lightning arrestor and is designed to ground any bolt of lightning without damaging the equipment. Although it's rare, it's not unheard of that these insulators shatter and cause electrical outage.

Just after the power failure MCC plant workers had to contend with a gas vent fire in its large ammonia plant supposedly set off by an accumulating static electricity.

A guard at MCC, who asked not to be identified, was interviewed Wednesday morning on WJNS and told of the incident.

Just after the fire he reported seeing two bright white lights streaking rapidly in opposite. directions from behind the ammonia plant, he told announcer Wally Adams.

However, it was reported that static electricity, which was the probable cause of the fire could produce "shooting fire balls" under certain conditions.

This newspaper Wednesday talked to several persons who had heard noises late Tuesday night. One who did not mind being identified was John Harris, manager of radio station WAZF.

Mr. Harris and his wife first saw a peculiar bluish light out the window of their home on '18th street at about 10:30 p.m. At first they thought it was an airplane, then realized it was not. They went outside and saw the blue light hovering about 75 feet above ground of the cotton field just west of their home.

Mr. Harris said he watched the "big blue light...it was larger than a light on an airplane ... I could see no shape. Even with bineculars he could not see an outline, it was just too far...'

A few minutes later MCC experienced a power shut down. Herbert Carver of the Mr. Harris said he was unaware Mississippi Power and Light of any trouble at MCC until he public relations department called WAZF Wednesday morning and talked to his staff.

The night operator of the city police department, Fearon Jenne, noted in his log that a person called and told of seeing a strange light while driving between Canton and Benton about 1 a.m.

Another call came from a resident of the Yazoo Motel to report to the police of hearing a loud continuous noise that gradually faded away.

Chief of Police Odis Wilkinson said what hundreds of Yazooans saw early Wednesday afternoon was "definitely a weather balloon." It was confirmed by the US Weather Bureau in Jackson who were contacted by the Yazoo Civil Defense department, said the Chief.

Scores of Yazooans telephoned this newspaper, both radio stations, the sheriff and police departments as well as Civil Defense headquarters about seeing the white diskshaped object in the southern sky-the balloon.

WEST POINT - A Clay County man says he had a brief encounter with a UFO Monday night on the Cedar Bluff Road near Henryville.

The young man, who has requested that his name be withheld to protect his privacy, told the TIMES LEADER the "craft" he saw on the road was cliptical in shape and had blue and orange lights.

"They weren't blinding lights. They weren't very bright," he said. He reports the vehicle was "as big as a car or bigger" and "looked like it was made of metal."

The man, a respected Clay County businessman who is believed to be a credible source, was a bit reluctant to relate his experience to the press, but conceded when assured anonymity

The reported sighting occurred when the man was driving home on theCedar Bluff Road. He first saw lights in the road ahead, but only when he got closer did he realize the vehicle was something he'd "never seen before'

He says the eliptical craft was standing on "legs" about four to six feet in height. Although he noticed no windows in the craft, he estimates the blue and orange lights numbered six to eight.

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In order to avoid the unidentified vehicle, he swerved into the ditch, then proceeded back onto the road home.

Asked if he was frightened, the observer answered, "No, not really. But it didn't do me any good." He further said that he saw no form of life in or around the craft.

Although there were no passengers in his truck to later verify his story, he did report that another pick-up truck driver was ahead of him on the rural road and also had to "take the ditch" to avoid the craft.

However, the second observer is reportedly unwilling to admit publicly that he saw anything unusual.

On Tuesday, the day after the sighting, a number of persons in the western part of the county heard of their neighbor's unusual experience and drove to the spot where the vehicle was to have been "parked". The party who first notified the TIMES

LEADER of the Monday night sighting said she noticed that grass in the ditches on both sides of the road was "burned and smelled like oil

The observer himself verified the grass was burned and added he saw marks in the ditches "that looked like two round pads had been in the dirt."

When asked if photographs could be made of any remaining "evidence", the observer said, "A lot of people have been down there today, and everything has been walked over

The Clay County man's story sounded quite believable, particulary due to his reluctance to have any publicity about his experience.

delivered his "Flying Saucers Are Real" lecture to an overflow audience in Lee Hall Auditorium on the MSU campus.

With hundreds of persons sitting in the . aisles and on the stage and standing in the projection room, Friedman unleashed a wealth of scientific data, backed up by slides of UFO's and drawings of "humanoid" creatures as described by persons who reported encounters with them.

Friedman, the only space scientist in the nation who is devoting his full time to the study of UFO's, said, "We're being visited. Some of these UFO's are somebody's spacecraft."

The speaker classifies UFO's into three categories: (1) sightings by reliable ob-servers which can later by identified (identifiable flying objects); (2) sightings in which there is insufficient data to determine. whether or not the object can be explained; and (3) reports by competent observers who see objects on or above the ground which. remain unidentifiable after sufficient data

has undergone rigorous scientific study. "Most of the true UFO's sighted have been described as round, metallic, disc-shaped objects. You know--the typical flying saucer," Friedman told his audience.

The speaker pointed out that crafts which, look like flying saucers could be manufactured by a number of American<sup>6</sup> companies.

However, "The way they move, the way; they behave, make them unique," Fried-man said. The unidentified vehicles move hundreds of miles per hour without ac-celeration or deceleration. Instant starts and stops and movement in any direction are characteristic of true UFO's.

Actually, Friedman prefers to call the unidentified objects EEM's or Earth Excursion Modules, because he believes they vehicles are used by creatures from planets in other solar systems to study the Earth.

Following his full, scientific explanation of UFO's and creatures piloting the craft,? Friedman gave various reasons for public ridicule of persons who report sightings and reasons for the observers' reluctance to report sightings to authorities.

The renowned authority says "ignorance of facts" is the prime reason for the public's skepticism of UFO's. The "laughter curtain", said the speaker,

culs down communication between ob-servers and those who have never seen a UFO. The fear of ridicule leads many to, decide not to report their observations.

Another factor involved in the public's reluctance to believe in the existence of UFO's is ego. Friedman says people on Earth are unwilling to believe more in-telligent life might exist within the universe.

Friedman concludes there has been an unreasonable failure on the part of the government and private scientists to use our

technological knowledge to study UFO's. Several times throughout his presen-tation, the speaker referred to the recent-sightings in Mississippi, particularly the incident involving two Pascagoula men who say they were taken into a draft by three creatures)

Friedman said their story appears to be credible and that he believes their experience could result in new data on EEM's.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: A week ago Charles E. Hickson, 45, and Calvin R. Parker Jr., 19, local shipyard workers. told authorities three space creatures took them aboard a saucer-like spacecraft. As told to the Mississippi Press We were fishing last Thursday night behind the old Shaupeter Shipyard building on the Pascagoula River. I turned to get some more bait when I heard a zipping sound.

I turned around and saw a spacecraft

with bright, flashing, blue-looking lights. but it was plenty bright. It just hovered without touching the ground.

# **UFOs Diminish** As 'Angel Hair Slips Earthward

No Explanation **Of** Substance Given By Officials

"It's quite a mystery to me," said a state pollution control official today as his workers tried to analyze a strange transparent material that fell in filaments over Mississippi Thursday afternoon.

Jerry Stubberfield, air divi-sion chief for the Air and Water Pollution Control Commission. said he expected an analysis of southe the thread-like substance late night. this afternoon or early Saturday morning.

What UFO buffs describe as the first tangible evidence of unusual air activity over the state puzzled authorities just as they were beginning to knock down some of the bizarre tales. The silky material floated from the sky over Jackson and Central Mississippi and in North Louisiana.

"I've got no explanation for it at all," said a National Weather Service spokesman today. A Federal Aviation Adminis-

tration spokesman discounted today the possibility the clear material was chaff dropped by planes to chart wind currents or jam radar.

The spokesman said military planes often use a tin foil-like planes often use a tin foll-like material for such purposes, "but it would take a helluva lot of planes to drop stuff" over the areas reported receiving the fallout.

Dr. Joseph Bruening, a UnU. versity of Mississippi sociologist and UFO scholar, said such clear threads are often seen af-

ter extensive UFO sightings. "The material usually dis-appears, just fades within 30 to 45 minutes after it lands," said Dr. Bruening. The sociologist speculates "angel hair" could be propulsion exhaust from spacecraft.

And Forest City. Clerk Bobbie Rester said all of the material was gone from utility lines and cars where it had fallen from about 1:30 until 2:30 p.m.




green, hazy cloud was seen moving up and away into the sky, headed north. Police added that about this

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L.A. GETS INTO ACT, TOO **UFO Sightings Reported** al Griffith Park, Valley

With UFO sightings streaming forth from around the country, it fig-ured that Los Angeles would eventually get into the act.

It did early Friday, when two policemen and a security guard claimed they saw a mysterious bluish-green object fall from the night sky over Southwest Los Angeles.

Also, two other police-men sighted such an object from the Valley, they reported "it was in the shape of a ball traveling at. a high rate of speed speaking of the southwest L.A. sighting: and we watched the object approximately five seconds b e fore it disappeared," said officer Lawrence Whitman, who reported to superiors that he and his partner, William Driver, saw something in the sky at 3:25 a.m. while on rou-tine patrol near. Western and Manchester Aves.

Incident Described

During a coffee break later, the two 77th St. Division officers met John Crocker, a night security guard, who claimed he saw something, too.

"I was sitting near Man-chester and Western Aves. in a Kinney shoe store and I saw an unidentified flying object falling down," Crocker recounted.

"It looked like it hit the ground between Gramercy' Place and Van Ness Ave. and looked bluish-white to me," he continued. Crocker said he thought

it fell about three or four blocks away.

"I didn't think too much about it and I drove down to the Boys Market at 1730 S. Manchester Avc. and saw the police and I asked them if they saw what I saw and they said yes," he said.

"We went to look and see if we could find the object and I immediately drove through the alley-way behind 1933 W. Manchester and I had one of the funniest feelings come over me in quite some time," Crocker said.

First Hot, Then Cold It seems bizarre, but There is what Crocker says happened next:

I got cold and shook like it was 28-degree weather and immediately after I came out of the alleyway everything was back to normal again.

"I made another turn and came back through the alley again but this

time I had a hot feeling like it was 90-degree weather in the hot summer," Crocker said.

Meanwhile, the two policemen from North Hollywood Division were driving on the Ventura Freeway near Pass Avenue at about the same time when they said they spoked an object which turned from blue to green to white traveling at a high rate of speed over the Van Nuys area.

The officers, who said they didn't want to be identified because they feared being ribbed by other officers, said the ob-ject was definitely not a shooting star. And if this wasn't

enough. at 4:45 a.m., a Los Angeles newsman claimed he saw a fiery glow illuminate the night sky behind the Griffith Park Observatory on Mt. Hollywood.

Resembled Blaze

Bill Morgan, news edi-tor of Radio News West, said he was standing at a bus stop at Lucile Ave. and Sunset Blvd., when he spotted what he thought was a brush fire benind Mt. Hollywood.

'It was reddish-orange and looked as if there was a fire behind the observat-Morgan said. "It tory. lasted about 15 seconds and when I came into work I asked if there was a fire in the Hollywood area, but I was told there wasn't.'

"If it hadn't been for the rash of reported UFO sightings recently, 1 woouldn't have thought much about it," Morgan added.

But one interesting sidelight did surface around the reported UFO sighting in Southwest Los Angeles. "Hoax" Recalled

It seems that officer Whitman is the same officer who concocted the "great watermelon hoax" last year, which caused c o nsiderable embarrass-ment for the LAPD.

In that "incident." some officers at the 77% St. Division reported that a man was injured when his girl friend dropped a 51-pound watermelon on his head. That story, as it later turned out, was definitely out of this world.

Distorted glasses attention-getter

A pair of eyeglasses became the center of attention today in the story of a Greenville truck driver who claims he saw an unidentified flying object and then was hit in the face with a ball of fire which temporarily blinded him.

The eyeglasses were damaged when Eddie Webb, 45, of Greenville, a driver for Sam Tanksley Trucking Inc., of Cape Girardeau, encountered the UFO while he was driving a tractor-trailer rig on Interstate 55 just south of the Jackson exit at Wedekind Park about 6:15 or 6:30 Wednesday morning.

Dr. Harley D. Rutledge, head of the physics department at SEMO State University, said that a cursory examination of the eyeglasses shows that the plastic frames have apparently been damaged by heat.

He said he examined the eyeglasses briefly Thursday under a microscope and the plastic frame appeared to have been heated internally. "I was quite surprised. It doesn't look like a hoax at this point," he said.

Mr. Webb was temporarily blinded, but later his vision began returning and he could see with blurred vision for about three, feet. He was treated by a Cape Girardeau ophthamologist who found no damage to his eyes and was scheduled to see a specialist in St. Louis today.

"One thing which seems to substantiate Mr. Webb's story is that whatever struck his glasses did not come from directly ahead, but from slightly to the left," Dr. Rutledge said. "This is what you would expect from a person looking to the rear from a truck window "

The glasses which were melted and slightly twisted bear pit marks which Dr. Rutledge said resemble craters caused by bubbles coming from the inside of the plastic to the surface and then bursting.

He said two major tests will be made on the glasses' frames-a test for -residues performed by the Law Enforcement Assistance Council Crime Lab at the university and a nuclear flourescence test for ralioactivity which he will conduct.

Dr. Rutledge said he would also study the pattern of damage to the frames in detail under a microscope and test an undamaged portion of the frame to see if he can reconstruct the damage pattern.

He said the tests should be completed within three to five days.

Dr. Rutledge pointed out that there have been reports of events similar to that experienced by Mr. Webb where a ball of light has struck a person in the forehead. He also said that the turnip or top - shaped object is one of the most irequently reported shapes for UFOs along with disc and cigar shapes.

One of the most vivid ac-counts of a UFO sighting in Wayne County to date was provided today by Wayne Jailer Lloyd Smith who said "a blinding, spinning object" descended to within 50 feet of his ear.

Smith said the incident occurred about three miles east of Grantham as he was driving to work last Saturday night, but he has told very few people about

Meanwhile, dispatchers at the Wayne County Courthouse and Goldsboro Police Department were deluged with calls on UFOs last night.

Smith said when he first spotted the object, it appeared to be a flare dropped from an aircraft. He was driving toward Goldsboro on Old Grantham Road.

He said he observed that the closer to the ground the object got the larger it got and changed colors. He said it was reddish at one point, then turned to a red and silverish glow, and became blue and silver as it got to several hundred feet from the ground.

He said it was shaped like the crown of a mushroom but it was revolving so fast he could not distinguish any other features. He said the glow of lights, however, appeared to be emanating from the bottom of the object.

Smith said the object traveled across a field and nearly in-tercepted his car on Old Grantham Road as he rounded a sharp curve.

"I thought it was going to force me off the road at first," "But then it he recalls. descended to the side of the road and hovered about 50-75 feet from the ground. It blinded me and I had to stop my car.

"I got out of the car and drew my pistol and pointed it over the top of the car. I don't really know why I did that, except that it was a reflex action, I guess. I wasn't scared at any time during the incident."

Smith said the object hovered above the ground no more than 50-60 feet from his car at that point but he was blinded by it could not make out and anything clearly. He estimated that it was



Cole Barnhill and his wife, Letha, thought their house was on fire when they awakened by the ... bowling of their dogs at 6:10 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 6. "The light was so bright with a real red glow you could have read a book in the bedroom," said Cole who explained that it was still dark outside.

After jumping out of bed and discovering that their house was not on fire, they looked out the window, thinking that a neighbor's house was on fire. To their surprise, they saw a round, red object "like a full moon but much brighter," said Cole, hanging in the sky.

Cole explained that the object was just below the treetops and not more than 65 or 70 yards from their window. "And it wasn't the moon either." explained his wife,"because we could see the moon over in a different direction."

Both said they watched it for some 15 or 20 seconds and "then it just disappeared - blinked out - just like turning off a light," said Cole. He explained that even though it glowed brightly they were able to look at it. The degree of brightness was emphasized by the fact that,

after the object disappeared, "everything looked awfully dark even though we have nine vapor lights outside our house," said Cole. Although none of the Barnhill's neighbors saw anything, Heyward Byrd, who lives in the Byrdtown Community, was driving to his job. at Sonoco around 6:15 a.m. that morning and saw something "like a light or fire"over a hill, near Antioch School. Thinking it might be a fire, he hurried to the top of the hill in his car and then saw a round, bright object-"like the moon,but

much brighter" in the sky. Byrd said that the object was off to the right of the red light on top of the Carolina Power & Light Company plant at Lake Robinson. He said, "I don't think the object was moving because it stayed just

to the right of the red light.

At that time, Byrd was some 7 or 8 miles away from where the Barnhills live, on Griggs Circle in North Hartsville off the Patrick Road.

Hensleys spotted the object again and followed it to near Gordonsville where it reversed its field and started back toward Madison. Then, at one point, the light descended toward the car to within several hundred feet and "made a tremendous roaring noise.".

Then it was gone.

This was the third sighting of the week for Kenneth Hensley who first saw it Sunday night when he and his wife he and his wife and another couple - John and Jewell Thomas - were driving back to Culpeper from Fluvanna County and noticed a "huge, silvery-bluish glow in the sky just above treetop level."

"The object was moving almost parallel to the road we were on," said Mrs. Hensley, "so we followed it. It was glowing so brightly we couldn't tell what shape the object was. After a couple of miles the object seemed to hover and, since it : looked like it was a mile or so from us, we tried to get closer. But there was no road we could find to cut much of the distance down.

"When the last light was gone, the big glowing object ; disappeared into the trees as if it had landed. We had been watching it now for about two hours. It did not reappear before we left."

The Hensleys could not believe what they had seen and were back on the scene Monday night with three other friends. Again, they report, they saw the object in approximately the same place although they did not see the smaller lights.

Thus, at least nine persons have witnessed a strange glowing object in the sky within four nights and within 15 miles of the same spot.





In Gibsonville, Swepsonville 81 Reported In Aren

Gibsonville Police Officer Steve Montgomery stationed his mobile radar unit on Highway 100 late Wednesday

night about one-half mile south of the city limits.

He was expecting to clock some of the speeders who frequently careen down that stretch of highway.

But instead the radar picked up what Montgomery believes was an unidenlified flying object.

Montgomery told the Daily Times-News Friday that sometime between 11:30 p.m. and midnight Wednesday, he noticed the dial on his patrol car's radar unit acting "kind of funny."

"The needle was jumping and the machine went haywire," Montgomery recalls.

Montgomery said he got out of the car to check the radar unit. It was then that

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he noticed a "right large light in the sky."

The object appeared to be a pulsing red light, he said. The police officer watched the light a few minutes, while it hovered over the road. Then it disappeared.

If Montgomery had any doubts about what he saw Wednesday night, they were dispelled about 4 a.m. Friday morning. He saw the object again while on patrol in the same area.

Montgomery wasn't alone in spotting the UFO. There are reports from some Gibsonville residents on Hornestead Street who say they saw the object Thursday night. Montgomery and the Homestead Street residents are keeping a look out for the UFO every night now.

"I don't really know what it was, but I'm a firm believer in UFO's," Montgomery said.

The police officer, a member of the Gibsonville force for about two and a half months, can take comfort in the fact that his sighting is part of a rash of calls local law enforcement personnel have been receiving about UFO's.

Alamance County Sheriff John H. Stockard says his department has been flooded in the last few days with reported sightings of UFO's, especially on the second and third shifts.

Stockard didn't express any opinion on the sightings, but said "everyone's description is different." Yet a woman 'In Stockard's own office-a dis-

patcher-claims to have seen a "huge thing, round-shaped with red lights around it" in Swepsonville Thursday night between 11:10 and 11:30 p.m. That's approximately the same time that Montgomery spotted his pulsing red light.

The woman, who asked that her name not be used, said she was driving through Swepsonville on the way home when she saw the object hovering over her car.

The craft departed suddenly and the woman dispatcher drove home to tell her family. She and her daughter returned to where the object was sighted, but it was gone.

"I don't know what to think about it. Everyone thinks I'm crazy," she said later with an air of resignation. "My husband thought I was crazy." TIMES-NEWS

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As a dispatcher, the woman said she had taken calls from people-some calm, others extremely excited-who had also seen UFO's.

The calls have come in from such diverse locations in the county as Saxapahaw, Graham, Haw River and near Holly Hill Mall.

So far, local law enforcement officials are not getting too excited about the findings, despite reports from other areas in Piedmont and the South where police officers report seeing UFO's. As recently as Wednesday, Sheriff James Taylor of Mt. Airy and 60 other Surry County residents reported seeing a total of six UFO's in the Ararat River area.

But most local officials here are generally reacting to UFO citings with skepticism.

Some strongly infer that the citings are just a mild form of mass hysteria, perhaps induced by the publicity UFO's are receiving in the national media.

Guilford County Sheriff Paul Gibson, who says his department hasn't received any of the UFO reports, summed up the skepticism: ::Once that stuff starts, it spreads, doesn't it?"

# Detector Test Fails To Shake UFO Story

Pascagoula, Miss. (1111) -A be detector test indicated Tuesday that a shipyard worker was felling the truth about being taken aboard an unidentified flying object (UFO) by three crab-clawed creatures from outer space.

Charles Hickson, 43, was given the test by Scott Glasrow, a polygraph specialist from New Orleans, lie repeated the harrowing tale he and a co-worker told authorities carlier this month.

"IT IS my opinion that he told the truth when he stated that he believes he saw a spaceship, that he was taken into the spaceship, and that he saw three creatures." Glasgov said.

Hickson and Calvin Parker, 18, have maintained under inquestioning that they tense were fishing from an old pier in the Pascagoula River Oct. 11 when a "fish-shaped" vchicle cinitting a bluish haze approached from the night sky.

They said three crabclawed creatures with wrinkly skin and pointed cars emerged from the craft and took them inside, where they were examined by an instrument that look ed like a glant eve.

PINE, La. (UPI) - Sheriff's deputies chased five orange-reddish flying objects 12 miles through the Louisiana Piney woods late last night and early today.

Deputy Michael Moore said the unidentified objects almost attacked a police car.

"One of our deputies was scared pretty bad," Moore said. "He turned on his red lights, and they came down at his patrol car. He turned them off and they just vanished like in a cloud."
