How UFO Change Oakland, California Sunday Tribune CR: Don White

PASCAGOULA, Miss. (AP) — The weird experience that Charles Hickson and Calvin Parker Jr. underwent five months ago as they stood casting for croakers in the Pascagoula River has changed their lives considerably.

They said a spaceship hovered nearby and three pale, wrinkled creatures seized them, took them inside for an examination, then let them go.

Incredible, of course, but mystified investigators placed the report in a special category because they found no logical way to debunk it.

Authorities said whatever happened undoubtedly

was a soul-searing experience for Hickson, a 45-yearold shipyard foreman and his young visitor, the son of a family friend.

It took place last Oct. 11 near the beginning of a great flap over Unidentified Flying Objects — (UFO) - along the Gulf Coast.

"I've done everything I can to prove I'm telling

the truth," Hickson said.

He is a slightly stooped man of middle height with a monkish fringe of hair, a slow and serene Mississippi drawl. He has four children and lately has been working two jobs, which occupy him from 8

a.m. until 9:30 p.m.

"As long as I'm working, I don't have any problems, but when I don't have anything to do, I sit and think," he said.

"I don't reckon I'll ever get over trying to figure out where they came from - and why they picked me."

Hickson's report, briefly stated, was:

He and Parker, 19, were fishing at old Schaupeter shipyard. The site has since been scraped clean for new construction. At the time, it bore the ruin of

Though it seemed to be an isolated spot, it was not. Pascagoula is directly across the 100-yard-wide river, Ingalls Shipyard's huge cranes loom a mile to the south; busy U.S. 190 is 150 yards to the north.

A soft darkness had fallen as the men cast their lures. An oblong luminous blue blob circled, descended, hovered nearby, just above the junk.

Hickson said he and Parker were too stunned to

run and, in any case, there was no place to flee.

An opening — not a door, simply an indescribable opening - appeared in the side and three pale creatures came out, paralyzed him, floated him into the craft, rotated him before an instrument resembling a big eye, then put him back on the pier.

Parker, reported almost in shock when officers questioned him three hours after the alleged encounter, said he blacked out as the creatures approached

and remembers no more of it.
"They weren't lying," said Howard Ellzy, chief investigator for the Jackson County sheriff's depart-ment. "Whatever it was, it was real to them."

Ellzy's evaluation was later backed up by a polygraph test given both men.

Joe Colingo, attorney for the shipyard, said Parker was first treated at a hospital for the stress of a "complete physical and emotional breakdown."

For Hickson, things have been a bit better than he expected when he decided that, "though I'll be the laughing stock of the country," he had to tell the story so government officials would know of it.

UFOs No Longer A Joking Matter

The world of science, particularly astronomy, is full of unsolved mysteries and enigmas, yet none are shrouded with as much controversy as unidentified flying objects.

The present status of UFOs may be summarized thus: Do you believe they are real or mental figments of over 1,000 observers' imaginations. Therein lies the crux of the dilemma.

UFOs and associated phenomena have been observed by a small fraction of the world's population and since scientists comprise a minute fraction of it, the chance that a scientist will observe a UFO event directly is small.

Consequently the NIH (not invented here) factor is paramount, i.e., unless an individual witness makes his or her own discovery, anyone else's is automatically rejected. Each of us has to rediscover and relearn all the knowledge in existence, all that which preceded us.

Being no exception, I had relegated UFOs to the world of the fanciful. At best I was neutral on the subject and never took it seriously—until recently. My research for this article of a recent UFO sighting in Los Angeles led me to interview a number of witnesses.

The principal witnesses were two police officers and others who telephoned the police. I happened to interview one witness who had not reported his findings to anyone before and who observed it from several miles' distance.

His description of the UFO trajectory was similar to that of the police officers'. I was intrigued. I next read a well-written book by J. Allen Hynek, "The UFO Experience." I

recommend it, as it is by a renowed astronomer and contains a wealth of carefully selected and organized information on the subject.

According to Hynek, the data so far gathered requires more study and analysis. However, encugh information is given to allow the reader to a make up his own mind even now. The L.A. sighting is similar to hundreds of others. Most UFOs seem to exhibit purposeful, intelligently directed motion. They are not meteors, aircraft, helicopters, balloons or stellar objects. If indeed the unexplained strange UFOs originate outside the earth (we cannot completely discount that they are secret devices from the United States, Russia or China, but that is highly unlikely), they exhibit a far greater advanced technology than what we presently know.

This fact alone would make their study imperative. As an example, when we exploded the first atom bomb in 1945, no other nation had the technical details, yet we gave the biggest and most important secret away by merely showing that it could be done.

SIMILARLY, EVEN though we do not understand the propulsion and power sources of these enigmatic UFOs, it behooves us to study them if at all possible, since they imply a far more efficient, superior, silent, nonpolluting, faster transport vehicle than anything we can muster.

It undoubtedly uses scientific principles and technologies of which we are completely unaware. Would not our energy crisis make such study, even though a long shot, possibly rewarding?

It is, however, this apparent technical

superiority as well as the strangeness of the UFOs that is so frightening to so many.

Consequently, it is far more comfortable to reject these sightings altogether than to admit ignorance and expose our basic insecurity. This attitude is perfectly normal and to be expected from the bulk of 20th century "status quo man." It is after all only 12 generations since Galileo, who received similar reactions when he unsuccessfully attempted to persuade his contemporaries to look through his telescope (man's first) and examine Venus and the moons of Jupiter in support of his theory.

The typical 16th century reaction to Galileo's request was: "You must be in league with the devil, we don't even want to look." Is that not too different from the snickering and contemptuous attitude of some of the present scientific community when confronted with the UFO phenomena?

Of course, given enough time and overwhelming evidence, these negative attitudes will gradually change until finally UFOs are regarded as legitimate objects of study.

The present negative view has unfortunately carried over somewhat into the general public,

with the result that not enough people have the courage to report their findings. This situation must be changed.

Historically the meteorites went through the same stages. First no one believed that stones fall from heaven. Now there is no problem, even though according to Hynek not a single astronomer has ever witnessed the fall of a meteroite. The analogy is perfect since the scientific community will ultimately have to take the public into its confidence, since it must rely initially on the general public for these rare sightings and data collections.

The public should be encouraged to make instant reports and use toll-free national phone numbers to a central agency, so as to alert the appropriate scientific investigators for immediate followup and study. Time seems to be of the essence.

It took about 70 years for scientists to become

convinced that there is organic material in certain meteorites—a very significant discovery, long controversial.

If I may be allowed the role of intermediafy in this dilemma, I would point out to the public that scientists are faced with so many tough problems today, which challenge their intellects to the limits, that any additional and seemingly impossible dilemma just "tilts" and overtaxes them.

Let me mention just a few of the present unresolved controversies: pulsars, quasars, black holes, sun spot cycles, absences of expectant neutrinos from the sun, interstellar dust and polarization, x-ray sources, interstellar chemistry, origin of the solar system, continental drift and, prior to 1969, origin of moon craters.

TO THE astronomers I would say: Since there are more than 100 astronomers who consider black holes real even though no one has ever seen one, why not be a little generous to the more than 1,000 who have seen a UFO and who think they are real. Whereas the black holes are strange theoretical constructs, which astronomers thing possible, UFOs are strange objects which have been seen by many. Why not allow the subject to be studied seriously?

The groups that perhaps have done the most harm in frightening away the much needed scientific support are the "fringe" types, as well as science fiction in books, television and movies.

Science fiction tends to blur the real and the imaginary and brings on the twilight zone. It has made some of the public believe anything, and others overskeptical.


Reputations get tarnished very easily by stepping only ever so slightly over the bounds of accepted and conventional science. UFOs have been depicted by some "scientists" as no-nos, hence the "kiss of death fear syndrome."

Studies of the origins of life outside the solar system are now openly discussed by scientists but with obvious tongue in cheek at all times to ensure a lack of ridicule.

However the time may be now for a thorough reevaluation of the mass of existing UFO data as Hynek has suggested.

I wish to add a note of urgency: Suppose, as may be likely, that we are being studied

the UFO experience.

"In my association with
UFO phenomena I have been somewhat like the prover-bial 'innocent bystander' who got shot. Actually I have encountered everything from utter scepticism and scorn to deep respect.

"Today there is a ground-swell of interest. In fact, more people believe in UFOs than President!" in

UFO EXPERIENCE Stating that the UFO thesis has not been disproved, Dr. Hynek threw out many questions to his enthusiastic audience. A show of hands revealed that approximately one - third had actually had what is termed the UFO experience. Either they or friends had sighted a UFO.

Commenting upon the credibility of the hundreds of people that he has interviewed during the years, Dr. Hynek disclosed, 'I found the accounts absolutely fascinating. The individuals I listened to were very sincere, highly creditable. I asked these persons why they were telling me, and each stated that it had been a very real experience.

"Yes, I have heard un-believable tales related by the most reputable of people individuals whose testimony would be completely ac-ceptable and admissable in a court of law under other circumstances."

Speaking of what he terms close encounters by scientists and others, Dr. Hynek number of comments:

"The UFO will be etched in my memory for all time."
"I've never seen anything in the sky quite like it."

In his book, "The UFO Experience, A Scientific Inquiry," Dr. Hynek quotes Sherlock Holmes, "It is a capital mistake to theorize before you have evidence. It biases the judgment."
However, Dr. Hynek is quick to state that Holmes

surely exaggerated, for "one never has all the evidence." "After more than 20 years'

association with the problem, I still have few answers and no viable hypotheses. And I have no desire to act the prophet.

"One of the most exasperating and even repugnant features of the subject of UFOs is its apparent irrationality. Do you realize that not one of the 50 most famous astronomers predicted the space age 50 years ago?

"Even Ben Franklin, when he was asked why the sun shone, could not envision the sun as a nuclear reactor; so let's suppose that there are domains of nature of which we are unaware just as Franklin was unaware so many years ago."

Photo By Thrush Shows Spots Of Light, 'Tube' Extending Toward River

UFO Sightings Reported Additional Info on last months cover story. By Two Manatee Residents

BRADENTON - Two Manatee County residents have said they spotted unidentified flying objects (UFOs) Thursday night, and one took a photograph of a UFO hovering over the Braden River.

Both sightings occurred between 8:50 and 9:15 pm.

Patrick Thrush, 16, who lives in East Bradenton, said he was on 27th Street E at the intersection with Manatee Avenue when he looked to his right and saw something coming down in the direction of the water. He thoughts at first it might be an airplane making an emergency landing on the river.

THRUSH PULLED his car off the road onto an embankment, and as he started to turn his car around, he said. the high beams from his car showed a silvery reflecting object hovering about 20 feet over the water. A tube extended from the object into the

"I just sat there a second." said Thrush, then he pulled his camera from the car, ran behind the car and snapped a photograph, using a strobe flash and the car headlights for lighting. The camera was a Canon FT-QL with a 55 mm.

As soon as the flash went off, Thrush said, the tube. which had been at an angle, straightened up and began retracting into the hovering object. He took a second shot.

When the tube disappeared. the object headed toward the embankment where Thrush was standing. He said he heard "several loud clanks" and a splash, suggesting something dropped into the water.

"THAT'S about the time I started running in the opposite direction," he said, "You don't stand around waiting for it to do something to you be-

ly as it came toward him, he said, estimating it was about seven feet above the hood of his car at its lowest point. Thrush heard something hit the car hood, the the object changed direction and moved rapidly to the west, in a curved path.

When the object first began to move, he said, it was a pale bluish-green. As it picked up speed it-changed to a reddish-orange hue, and rapidly faded out of sight.

Thrush said he attempted to take a time exposure of the object as it left but those photographs did not develop. The first two did, however. They show two saucer-shaped blurs of light and a tube with one or two segments extending down-

When he got back to the car, Thrush said the headlights picked out three rocks.

about one-half inch in diameter. He gave two to Bradenton Police Patrolman Chris Schmidt. The rocks were analyzed as iron pyrite, a substance native to South America. A check by officers of the Bradenton Fire Department showed the rocks were not radioactive.

POLICE theorized the rocks may have been dumped into the river decades ago, as iron pyrite might have been ballast used by ships. Thrush fore you figure out what it noted, however, each rock was warm and dry, "The The object descended slight- edges were rounded and it had a lava-like appearance to it." he said.

> Thrush estimated the UFO was 25 to 35 feet in diameter. and about 11 feet thick. He judged the object to be hovering about 35 feet from the

At roughly the same time. George Montgomery, of 609 Casa Bella Drive, Palma Sola, was looking west out his upstairs window and saw what he thought was a satellite. "It looked like a star. then I saw a movement," said Montgomery.

He glanced farther south and saw what he assumed to be an airplane, with red and green flashing lights. When he looked back at the satellite. he noticed they were both moving in the same direction - northwesterly.

"THEN I noticed another dot, of lesser magnitude, up

above the first dot, also moving in the same direction as the first one," he said, "I got to staring at it and then I saw another dot underneath. All of a sudden the one above and the one below converged with the big dot." Montgomery said the large dot continued traveling for about five seconds, then suddenly vanished. He glanced back to where the airplane had been, and it too

Montgomery said he went outside to see if clouds might have obscured the objects. "It was as clear as it could be." he said. "Stars were out evervwhere."

At the same time Thursday night, Thrush said a friend who is a ham radio operator lost all communication on one band - roughly 21 megacycles. He told Thrush he was able to reach people on other channels, and communication on the one band returned about 9:20 p.m.

Thrush, who is selfemployed in an electronics research and development firm, has put together a theory that ties his own experience to that of his ham friend.

SCIENTISTS at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. he said, did an experiment in which mercury reacted to heat by moving away from a flame. Thrush said if two pools of mercury were placed with an extreme heat source between them, the pools

would rotate in opposite directions, creating a powerful magnetic field.

With enough heat - and it would take a mind-boggling amount - enough energy could be generated to propel a spacecraft. It would require a shield to block off other magnetic pulls, and the craft would move in the opposite direction to whichever side of the craft the shield was on.

A cooling device would be needed, Thrush said, and iron pyrite would be an excellent choice because it has "a wonderful heat - dissipation quality."

For an energy source; Thrush suggests the craft used radio waves - the waves his ham operator friend lost for 10 minutes or so Thursday night.

In short, Thrush's theory suggests that the craft converts light waves (or radio waves into heat, which starts the mercury pools rotating and creates an electromagnetic field. The craft then moves by magnetic push and pull. changing direction as it changes the location of a shielding device which blocks out other magnetic forces.

Did A Creature From Here?

After sighting an Unidentifield Flying Object and being felled by a ray apparently from an occupant of the craft, a strange "devil's head" was found growing in his ward. his yard, a Jacksonville man has reported to the UFO Re-

Norman R. Chastain, 62, of 2507 Kershaw Drive W. said he delayed reporting the strange incident after it occurred for fear he would be ridiculed as "some kind of a nut."

Chastain's photograph with the "devil's head" appeared in the Journal nearly two years ago after he brought the plant to the newspaper and reported finding it in his yard.

At that time, however, he did not mention the earlier incident. He said he is telling the story now because of the investigation being made by the research institute.

Chastain is an electrician with the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad Co. He was out in the St. Johns River fishing late at night Jan. 26, 1972, near the eastern tip of Blount Island.

At 3 a.m., he was sitting at anchor in a slack tide about 50 feet from shore

when he noticed "several orwhen he noticed "several orange and blue lights from over St. Johns Bluff Monument," he said.

At first he thought it was a mosquito control or police beliconter

Chastain said his boat lights were on and a Cole-man lantern was burning. He said the object made no

He said the object was about 150 feet in the air diapout 150 feet in the air di-rectly over his boat. He snapped off the lights on his boats and turned out the lantern and the object moved slowly back to the bluff.

His boat had run aground by this time and he went ashore, he said.

Chastain said he went looking for a lever to pry his boat free, found a piece of 2-by-6 wood and was carrying it back when he stopped to rest, 75 feet from his

the muck and, in the edges of the bushes, I saw the darndest-looking human-like creature one could ever imagine," he said.

He said he dropped the

timber and immediately was hit by a "brilliant white light." It made him dizzy and he lay down on the

His arms and legs became numb and tingled, but he stayed on the ground, praying, until daybreak, he said. He then crawled farther in-land and stayed until about noon, when his strength returned.

He swam out to his boat, which had drifted about 50 feet from shore. He noticed

feet from shore. He noticed an "overpowering stench" in his clothes and hair that was not present until he met the "devil-looking creature."

He said he washed and threw away his old clothes before going home. Still his wife commented that he didn't look right and asked if he were all right. Chastain he were all right. Chastain said he told her he got sea-

He also noticed the same overpowering smell he experienced three days before, he said.



Rnoxville and Marion County law officers spent more than an hour and a half late Friday night and early Saturday morning searching for an object reported to have landed near the Marion County Fair Grounds.

The search began about 11 p.m. Friday with public reports of a bright, blue-green fiery object crossing the sky. Some of the reports indicated it seemed to land near the fair grounds/

by foot. The search. snowmobile and car - in windy, near zero temperatures - failed to turn up anything.

The search was terminated after midnight when the Knoxville Police Department received radio dispatches of similar sightings as far south as Missouri.

Checks by police radio after the first public reports disclosed a lightning - like flash had been reported in a band from northern Iowa,

over the Knoxville area, south into Missouri

The reported sightings recorded Belmond and Cedar Rapids. These initial reports placed the location in north central Iowa. Subsequent sightings were reported from near Mingo, over Monroe, near Russell and Albia, and finally in Missouri.

There was no definite conclusion about what was actually seen, but the general consensus was the object must have been a meteor or shooting star, burning up as it plunged through the earth's atmosphere.

Astronomers say this type of phenomena is commonly sighted during the fall and winter months.

However, some of those who reported seeing Friday night's display report it to have been bigger and brighter than anything previously seen. The flash was likened to heat lightning or gigantic fire works displays.

Police Search For Area policemen sight 3 <u>UFO</u>'s

WARRENTON - "I see it but I don't believe it!" said the voice on the police radio.

The voice belonged to officer Joseph Scalici of the Manassas Park police department and what he didn't believe was a light in the southwestern sky that Scalici believes is an unidentified flying

But Scalici was not the only one watching strange objects in the sky early Friday morning. Fauquier deputy sheriff John Payne and, Virginia state trooper William M. Neal were eyeing a light in the western sky near the Warren-Fauquier County line along Rt. 55.
"I noticed the light about 4:30," said Payne. "I was riding along

near Marshall when I noticed this light moving in the western sky. I followed it to the top of the mountain here until it stopped. I've been watching it for almost two hours now."

Trooper Neal was also on the spot and while Payne was talking Neal was glassing the object through binoculars.
"See the colors," Neal broke in, handing the glasses to Payne.

Payne and Neal concurred that the object was indeed giving off colored light at either end of what appeared to be a glowing circular form. To the left the light was green and to the right it was red. The lights appeared to be blinking.

Meanwhile, back in Manassas Park, Scalici noticed a light in the southwestern sky moving eastward. According to Scalici this object had also initially been sighted in Fauquier County and had moved across into Prince William.

"I saw one light - and then another. They stopped very high in the sky and then one began to drop. It came down rather quickly and seemed to hover just above treetop level. The other light remained aloft in the same position.

"The lower light hovered for about 15 minutes, then moved back higher into the sky. Both disappeared momentarily."

Officer Scalici estimated that the lights were as far as 15 miles away and noticed no color.

The Friday morning reports were the first since a rash of sightings occurred during October all over the East and South.

Astronomer pursues UFOs

By JAMES KUTINA

If J. Allen Hynek were to choose a legacy it would probably be that Unidentified Flying Objects (UFO) would no longer be a "dirty term" or unexplained.

Hynek, head of the astronomy department at Northwestern University, Evanston, said he knew he was going to be an astronomer since he was 7 years old, but he never thought he would become involved in the UFO phenomenon to the point that he is considered the top authority in the field.

Even in his lectures on astronomy, it is easy to detect the underlying concern he has for telling the UFO story.

To the question of whether other life forms and UFOs exist. Hynek explained to students at an Elgin Community College workshop Wednesday, "with the vastness of the universe and the billions

of stars like our sun, it is nonsense to think that we are unique and that our sun would be the only one with planets."

'It's the reports by the crackpots that cut into the credibility of the valid sightings," he explained.

Hynek first became involved with UFOs in 1948 when approached by the Air

"They needed an astronomer and I happened to be handy," he explained.

"I thought it was just a fad." said Hynek, "but they persisted and are still being reported."

He explained that the UFO phenomenon is mind bending in the fact that reports of such things even exist.

"Why do we have reports of things looking like saucers?" quizzed Hynek.

Leaning back in a chair, he exclaimed. "Frankly, I am at the point where I don't know if I give a damn, but I would like an answer before I die."

Even as a child, Hynek had the inclination to quiz the meaning of space. He said he first became involved in Astronomy at 7, when he came down with scarlet fever.

"In those days you were quarantined" he said adding, "my mother, who was a

teacher, had to stay with me during the sickness."

He explained how his mother went through several books with him and finally came to an astronomy book. From that point he said he knew astronomy would be his life's work.

"When I was eight or nine I got a \$35. Sears and Roebuck telescope," he said. adding, "of course it would cost more than \$100 today."

Even going into a limited field like astronomy, Hynek said he really never worried about getting a job.

When asked what he would like to be if not an astronomer. Hynek said it would be something dealing with people.

"I like the loneliness of observing through a telescope, but I was always one to feel that knowledge should be given out," he explained.

Recalling two men in Mississippi who recently claimed to have been abducted by aliens, Hynek said it was a real experience to them.

"I talked to them. They were checked. Whether it was a spiritual experience I don't know, but those two men had no reason to make a false report," said Hy-

For his closing years, he said he hopes

to devote full time to his Center for UFO Studies headquartered in Northfield.

· He explained that the center is really scattered all over the country and draws on various scientists. He has even set up a special "hotline" for law enforcement agencies to call in unexplained sightings.

According to Hynek, the purposes of the center are: to provide a place to get accurate information on UFOs, to provide a place to report UFOs without being ridiculed and to provide a forum to study the subject.

Although the center relies on contributions. Hynek said he hopes to establish some sort of foundation eventually.

Until he retires Hynek plans to keep on lecturing and chasing the elusive UFOs.

With his perspective on time and space he will probably never become frustrated. because he says Earth's only a speck in the overall cosmological scheme.

As for time, he explains that the light we see from some stars left those stars when dinosaurs walked the Earth.

Although he would like to claim that his / group is the only one studying UFOs. Hynek maintains that although the U.S. government has publicly abandoned studying UFOs, it is still doing it privately, adding another question to the long list about what's really out in space.

Minister Calls UFOs 'Work

"Are UFOs real?" the flyer innocuously asks, baiting the reader's attention.

To find out, all you need do is go to the Indianapolis Baptist Temple tomorrow and listen to the preaching of the Rev. Bill Riddick, pastor of Ocean Springs Baptist Church, Ocean Springs, Miss.

The former Air Force master sergeant says he interviewed Charles Hickson and Calvin Parker, the two shipworkers from nearby Pascagoula who say they were kidextra-terrestrial naped by beings last fall.

That Hickson and Parker were indeed taken aboard an "egg-shaped spacecraft" pilot-ed by three "pale white creatures with slits for eyes and hands that resembled crab claws" appears now to have been accepted by authorities in the field of UFO phenome-

"People started asking me if UFOs are real, then about the Bible . . . what does it say about flying saucers?

The 41-year-old minister ex plained, however, that the Bible does explain the rash of unidentified flying object sightings last year, if you can "interpret" the language.

This is the Rev. Mr. Riddick's interpretation: He believes UFOs to be the work of Satan. That way when the second coming happens and the believers are taken "un," as the saying goes, those left behind (i.e. the nonbelievers) will think it was the work of a "higher being" other than God.

"I don't see these incidents as visits from other parts of the universe but rather as 'fallen angels' as part of Satan's master plan of deceit,"

the Baptist minister stressed. In case you don't follow the direction of his sermon, long-playing record of it titled "Visitors from Outer Space— What Saith the Lord?" probably will be on sale after the service.

For those who might accuse the Rev. Mr. Riddick of capitalizing on a topical event, he quickly points out that all the proceeds go to the Ocean Springs Boys Home. He does admit, however, that "love of-ferings" have been good to his message.

But there still remains this curious twist to his story that 'Hickson's children attend our Sunday School"

" He told Wendell we did the right thing in calling," she said.

"We thought surely someone else would have seen it, like from OSU or even our neighbors.

It's not the theme of a science fiction movie, even if it sounds like it, but the carefully thought out conclusions of scientists in Australia, America and many other countries experiencing UFO

According to Willy Ley, a leading US expert on space exploration, the commonly accepted idea of space travellers being little green men, with three legs and long antennae, is a lot of rubbish.

"Basing our theories on scientific fact we can be certain that our visitors from scientific certain that our visitors from space will not have webbed feet or TV antennae growing out of their foreheads, but might well bear a strong resemblance to ourselves," he said.

Many responsible scientists go along with that theory and they have good grounds, because it has been proved that there's nothing accidental good grounds, that there's nothing accidental about the shape and construction of living bodies. Rules of biological construction worked out by 17th Century scientist, Christian Huygens, are universally accepted today, and by applying them to space travellers, scientists have been able to work out a fairly been able to work out a fairly accurate picture of creatures that may be piloting flying saucers across our skies, or even living among us undetected.

The scientists accept only tw had accept only two basic assumptions — spacemen's bodies are made protoplasm like our own, and they are intelligent. If they can build and pilot spaceships, the latter is hardly an assumption, but once accepting those two suppositions, the experts have managed to piece together a portrait of the men from Planet X using known scientific facts.

Water breathers could develop intelligence, but it's unlikely scientists think (some scientists think impossible) for them to smelt metals underwater, which means their technology could not have reached that of Earth's stone age men, let alone have reached the alone have reached the spaceship stage.
Researchers believe they

must also eat meat, because plant food is not concentrated enough and strict plant eaters would spend too much time eating to build up a eating to build u sophisticated civilisation.

After assembling all the data, scientists finally came up with this picture of a man from space who could be from space who could be living among us. He would be about 1.5 and 1.8m tall, weigh no less than 22kg, which, according to scientific theory, means his brain would weigh at least .9kg. He would also have some kind of skull to have some kind protect his brain.

So what are the chances of meeting a space traveller even if he is hard to recognise? Pretty good if the evidence collected by author Michael Harvey is anything to go by. He has written two books about UFOs and sifted through thousands of reports of sightings.

"These reports cannot be disregarded as nonsense," said Dr C. H. Mackenzie, Chairman of the Atomic Energy Control Board. "There is scientific evidence that strange objects visit our planet. It's lamentable that governments tend to draw a veil of secrecy over them."

Take the case of four Sydney youths happily setting up camp on a beach a few kilometres south of the city on a summer evening in 1968. It

The boys were frightened, but relaxed a bit when the object stopped, switched off lights and hovered about 365m away and 60m high. Silhouetted on the dark background of the sky there was still a darker shape, triangular with a base of about triangular with a base of about 15m and a small dome at the apex. Along the sides of the object was a dim reddish light reflecting from the surface and coming out of a row of small lights situated along the

No windows, antennae or other appendages were visible. Two of the boys decided to go closer and see what the object was, but what the changed their minds. Instead, one of them, having a powerful torch in his hand, decided to shine it at the object. As soon as the torch was switched on, the object responded by switching the big lights on. Frightened, the youth switched off his torch and the object reacted by switching off its light. Three times they signalled to the craft, and twice it responded. The third time the brilliant light of the object did not switch off, but after hovering for about 25 seconds, it began moving slowly away in a northwesterly direction following the line of the ridge of the distant hills, until it suddenly disappeared.

Another spectacular sighting was made at Moe in 1963. The weather was poor. with rain and low-lying clouds

After a few seconds the strange craft, on an even keel, moved off at the same angle in a westerly direction at "about twice the speed of a jet plane." With a sound vaguely resembling the "swishing of a humming top." The object was about 7.6m

in diameter and 3m high. The underside was curved like a saucer, was pale blue in colour and seemed to glow. colour and seemed to glow. This lower third of the craft revolved anti-clockwise and had "scoop-like" protruberances about 457mm apart around the outside edge, turning very slowly while it was hovering." The main part and hattleshin-crev was battleship-grey and appeared to be metallic. The topmost section was described as being a transparent dome of a glass-like material like material, from which protruded a 1.8m mast, or aerial. This was the thickness of a broom handle, and looked like bright chrome.

They are just a few of the sightings examined by Harvey. It's significant they did not include hysterical claims to have seen little green men, or were even green men, or were even made by people interested in UFOs. The observers were UFOs. The observers were surprised, but who wouldn't be, but there seems no logical reason to doubt they saw what they saw.

If that's so we are left with the big question. Why did the space vehicles land? Surely they wouldn't have bothered unless it was to send out scouts to sample life on earth, particularly here in Australia. And how many other landings have taken place undetected? place undetected?

According to Harvey, ere could have been there hundreds.

The incidence of Truro sightings is increasing

"You'd better think twice before telling me my mind is in outer space just 'cause I've got enough guts to admit that I've seen an unidentified flying object."

Hardly the most elegant words ever spoken but no one could deny the... sincerity with which the warning was uttered. The Truro resident who spoke then is not alone in expressing those sentiments. Many local people like him are convinced that the recent U.F.O. sightings in the area are no hoax.

The most recent sightings to date were made by a group of youths while skating behind the North River Elementary School. Between 10 and 15 youths claim to have seen a U.F.O. hovering close to the school early on the evening of Jan. 2.

While walking toward a friend's place nearby, 11-year-old Brenda Leahy said she saw the "thing" as it came toward the ground on "a bit of a

She described the object as being "oval-shaped and sort of bluish in color. I know it wasn't a comet or a falling star because I've seen both and it wasn't like either."

DIDN'T BELIEVE HER

Miss Leahy said that when she first told her teachers about it; they didn't believe her story. However, after other youths confirmed the sighting, they weren't too sure what to believe, she explained.

"When I first saw the thing, I was scared out of my wits," she exclaimed. "I can still picture it in my mind very vividly and have had dreams about it."

Another 11-year-old who claims to have sighted the flying object that night is Karen Lorraine of Lower

"Like Brenda says, it came down on a slant and then began to rise fairly sharply-sort of a half-motion," she stated, waving her hand to show the pattern of its path.

At first, the Grade 6 girl believed that her eyes were playing tricks on her, for as she observed, "it's something I've never seen before in my whole life."

In retrospect, she believes that the object she sighted that night is probably a spaceship. "However," she added, "it's a frightening thought—something you don't like to admit to yourself."

Lawrence Best, principal of the elementary school, said that he is less than convinced about the authenticity of the objects. Mr. Best explained that he had heard other children talking about the object but "my mind just doesn't allow me to believe in things like this."

Another school principal, Arthur Lindsay of the Chiganois Elementary School, said that while none of his school children have spoken about U.F.O.'s, "there are just too many reports about them to igore com-

A number of the children at the North River school claim that at the same time the object was sighted, lights in the community went off for about five seconds. An engineer at C.K.C.L. radio admitted that the radio transmitter went off the air for a few seconds last week and that he was still unable to say what caused the dead air time.

Officials at the Nova Scotia Power Corporation in Truro declined comment on the question of the brief power shortage.

An R.C.M.P. official in Truro said that the majority of people reporting U.F.O.'s were "serious mature, adults who were quite aware of what was going on."

Regardless of the personal reelings of police officers involved in investigations, reports of all U.F.O. sightings are sent to Ottawa. This has been the policy of the R.C.M.P. since sightings were first made of the unidentified objects, the police spokesman noted.

Another person who has reported sighting a U.F.O. is Mrs. Lucy Mc-Sween. Mrs. McSween and her husband Gary were up by the ski slope on Wood Street one evening last month when they saw "an orangy, phosphorescent object somewhere over Bible Hill. It was like a big star," said Mrs. McSween.

The McSweens' watched the object for over a half-hour before "it split into two, one part went higher and higher and then just disappeared.

Mrs. McSween said that after their report of the incident was published in The News, a number of people phoned to say they had also seen the object only much closer. "Apparently, it was quite a large object to those closer to it," she explained.

Mrs. McSween said that she was upset that many people, including the local media, had treated the sighting as "a big joke." She said that more people would probably be willing to come forward if they were not held up for public ridicule.

Another person who wasn't afraid to come forward on the matter was Catherine Lantz. Twelve-year-old Miss Lantz claims that she first sighted an "orangy-colored object" about a month ago.

"At first I thought it was a comet," she said, but after watching it awhile, it rose up in the air, split up into two pieces and then disappeared. I've never seen a comet do something like that," she argued.

NO BALLOONS

Contacted by The News yesterday, the weather bureau said that contrary to what many people think, there are no weather balloons in the local area.

"As far as I know, the closest weather balloon is on Sable Island,' claimed the weather official.

Another recent U.F.O. sighting was made by 13-year-old Louise Knight.

Her description of the object, which she sighted over the Bank of Montreal in Truro, was identical to that given by Miss Lantz.

"I had always believed in them (U.F.O.'s) so it just confirmed by belief," she observed.

However, Miss Knight is not concerned about those who don't take her sighting seriously. If I hadn't seen it myself, I would probably have the same doubts, she noted.

"At least most of my friends are open-minded about the whole thing.

OTTAWA -There have been reports . lately of UFO's buzzing people driving along roads in the Ottawa Valley.

So what else is new?

Ever since a flying saucer gave me the once-over when I was driving to Montreal on the afternoon of April 22, 1966, I have refused to be surprised by reports of saucers in the valley.

A chap named Brian Lee was driving along a back road just about dusk recently when, on rounding a bend, he saw a large round airborne object with three red lights and one blue light on its underside.

it saw my lights," Mr. Lee "When said, "it started to blink one of its red lights, and it moved right over the road." And there it hovered, he said, about 30 feet in circumference and 50 feet up, while Lee jammed down on the accelerator "and just kept moving." He didn't even look back.

My own saucer experience went like

this. I was heading down the Valley towards Montreal, driving to Dorval to catch a plane for New York, when I spotted this patrol saucer hovering several hundred feet up and about a quarter of a mile away across some fields.

· I slowed up, the better to watch him as I drove past, but he simply held his station, gleaming silvery in the sunlight. I am sure it was not a helicopter. His attitude was akin to that of a highway patrol car parked in ambush for speeders.

I didn't stop. I had a plane to catch. But I should also confess that I had no inclination to stop and thereby encourage the attention of whatever was in that elliptical vehicle.

With saucers my policy - formed on the spot - is live and let live.

Obviously there's somebody out there keeping an eye on things down here. I'm not sure whether that's good or bad .-However, it hasn't hurt, at least not yet.

Brotherhood members chased by unidenti

CHASED along a dark highway by a 10-foot ball of glaring light, travelling at speeds up to 100 miles an hour, was the harrowing experience for two Brotherhood members last month. Rick Bouchard and Ron Hamelin, members of Ottawa Local 110, employed by the Canadian National at the Ottawa Station ticket office, Bouchard's wife and three children and Hamelin's lady friend, all saw the strange illuminated object, which has inflicted a fear in the hearts of the Bouchard family that it is now afraid to travel to a new home along the highway where the night-lights appeared.

Rick Bouchard explains that he was with his wife and children, looking at a home recently rented about 15 miles from Ottawa, where they moved a few days later. They were driving home when the flashing light appeared in their car mirrors. At first they thought it was a careless driver tail-gating them with the high lights on. Donna Bouchard looked back and urged her husband to start praying and step on the gas.

Rick reported that he drove up to 100 miles an hour but the thing kept following him, at times getting within 15 feet of his vehicle. "We went so fast that the radiator cap blew off," he said. Eventually on nearing the city, the light vanished over a clump of trees.

On reaching their Ottawa home, Rick said the children were so afraid they wanted to sleep in the same bed with the house lights on. Rick and his wife were also shaking and telephoned to Ron Hamelin, his friend, to visit him. Ron said considering the condition of the Bouchard family he had to believe them but to satisfy himself, he also drove over the same highway and had the same experience of being trailed by the strange light.

MYSTERIOUS OBJECT IN SKY IDENTIFIED

That thing persons in the Williamstown - Summerstown area reported seeing Jan. 9 was a meteor, the president of the Cornwall Space Observers, says.

Robert Montpetit, in a letter sent to the Centre for Short - Lived Phenomena of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass., says that is the answer to mysterious sightings in that area last week.

Reports stated a bright, red, almost crimson light, flashed across the sky for about four minutes. Then it disappeared.

Persons who saw the phenomenon were looking for comet Kohoutek at the time.

"Through careful investigation of our field workers we have come to the conclusion that the findings of the short - lived phenomena of Jan. 9... was (a) meteor ... very similar to the fireball," Mr. Montpetit says in his letter.

He says meteors are observed to explode in the air and break up into two or more fragments with each having the appearance of an exploding rocket.

"When a meteor enters the earth's atmosphere, it generates light, either from the glowing body itself caued by friction, or from the luminescence of the flowing gases surrounding the body," he says. "Technically, this light itself is the meteor."

Mr. Montpetit says meteorites vary in size from a few ounces or less to masses of 60 tons or more. The falling on earth are called micrometoerites.

'Meteor falls are completely unpredictable," he says. "The brightest meteors, called fireballs, are quite spectacular and even frightening. Indeed, unprepared observers are often so shocked that the reports of fireballs are often confused."

Both Bouchard and Hamelin reported their sighting to the area police, municipal and provincial. The police admitted they had received similar reports. The Ottawa Brotherhood members are not alone in sighting unidentified flying objects. Similar reports have been received from different parts of Canada and the U.S.A. All are about the same. All describe the unusual lights as oval shaped, travelling in a staggering pattern and disappearing without a trace of any landing.

The National Research Council at Ottawa has more than 900 sightings on file since records were kept in 1965. Allen G. McNamara, chief of upper atmospheric studies in Ottawa, reports that all sightings are checked as close as possible. "If the lights appear like a meteor, the scientists are interested," McNamara explains "but if it remains unexplained it merely remains on file."

There may be some comfort to the worried Bouchard family in that no harm to any person or any damages from the UFO's have ever been reported.

The Ottawa expert believes that many of the UFO observers are seeing perfectly natural phenomena, such as a plane switching on its landing lights 50 miles away from an airport. He explained that the U.S. government spent millions of dollars a few years ago trying to explain the many sightings but without any positive results.

The fact that many reliable people, like Brother Bouchard and Hamelin, have sighted the unidentified objects is no proof that the lights were launched by people from outer space, McNamara explains. He also admits there are hundreds of artificial satellites that periodically burn up as they fall back to earth, which may account for some of the sightings.

While the mystery of the lights continues with reports of more sightings every day, the Bouchard family is constantly reminded of their frightful experience. Perhaps the fear will vanish in time, Brother Bouchard has been advised, but with the shock still haunting them, the family will only travel over the highway in daylight, except in emergencies.

Friends at the Ottawa station are trying to help the Bouchards as much as possible and none of them consider the situation as a laughing matter.

In the Himalayas the natives call him Yeti and the white man calls him the Abominable Snowman. In the Pacific Northwest of B.C., Washington and Oregon states he's called the Sasquatch and in the rest of the U.S., Big Foot.


Now, in Manitoba, he's called the Easterville Monster or, in Cree, the Weetekow, and Saulteaux, the Wen-

This is the mythical — or is he? — huge, hair-covered creature said to roam the wilds. And in our province reports of sightings, as well as huge, human-shaped footprints 21 inches long and indicating a stride of five feet have wildlife experts befuddled.

These articles provide the first reports of large, hum n-like tracks documented in Manitoba — the mosteasterly sightings in Canada. They were found by conservation officer Bob Uchtmann of The Pas, when he was hunting Sept. 29 and about 20 miles east of that northwestern centre.

Word that the three tracks had been found on a weathered ant hill came to light only recently, while The Free Press was making a check to determine if any unusual sightings had taken place following the recent and unusual shooting in Manitoba of a cougar.

Other reports quickly followed.

Stomping out forest fires by foot wouldn't be impossible if some kindly and co-operative Weetekow could be found, says conservation officer Bob Uchtmann of The Pas.

Folk-tales and legends about a Weetekow Cree for devils, ghosts or troublesome spirits have been heard more frequently since Mr. Uchtmann came across the 21-inch-long, seven-inchacross, human-like footprints while hunting about 20 miles east of The Pas, north of Landry Lake.

Now, he admits, people wonder about his mental state and stories about the Weetekow do seem "pretty far-fetched." Still, in 14 years as a conservation officer he has never seen anything like those three large prints on a scattered and rain-softened ant hill.

According to legend, the mysterious creatures are huge, dark and hairy, with gigantic feet that leave massive footprints behind.

"Other than that, there's no explanation" for the prints, says Mr. Uchtmann.

Out hunting Sept. 29, he left his truck at an earthen dam down a crooked road, setting off to look for moose on a limestone ridge. With no luck, he was returning along the ridge and was walking through a semi-open clearing with a sparse growth of spruce and pine trees.

"Then I saw something that just didn't seem right!" There in the soft earth of a flattened ant hill were three strange footprints.

"I took a good look and they didn't strike me as anything made by any ordinary type of animal ... Some funny thoughts began to cross through

"It just wasn't possible for an animal to make them - but they were right there." Bemused, he returned to the truck.

Then Mr. Uchtmann found that some things are better not mentioned. His story brought guffaws from many, who found the story incredu-lous. "But they don't say, 'You're crazy', or anything straight to my face. It's sort of an unknown feeling."

After the weekend he discussed the tracks with fellow employees of the department of mines, resources and environmental management and that Monday returned to the tracks with regional biologist Dick Robertson and wildlife technician Barry Jahn.

A light rain had fallen that morning and a hunter had later walked through the anthill, stepping through two of the tracks despite a red ribbon left by Mr. Uchtmann to mark the prints. Rain had also washed down the sides of the impressions, making it impractical to take plaster

Almost circular and some six feet in diameter, the worn anthill was surrounded by an area with a ground cover of light moss and vegetation atop a clay-gravel base, making it impossible to detect any tracks other than the three in the anthill.

A first print, most likely from the right foot, showed the heel placed some 18 inches into the soft patch of ground. The flat-footed impression showed what appeared to be four joined toes. A second print, likely from the left foot, led the men to believe it had resulted after a stride of more than 58 inches. A third track also would have a required five-foot stride.

The prints were depressed 11/2 inches while Mr. Uchtmann, who weighs 160 lbs., left a halfinch impression.

Mr. Uchtmann now regrets not having returned earlier to the prints. "The only reason I didn't go back until Monday was because the more I thought about it, the crazier it seemed."

A search of the area failed to provide other tracks, fur tufts, feces or other clues.

Chances of a practical joke are ruled out. "To me," says Mr. Uchtmann, "it would seem that someone would leave footprints on the road where they had stopped.

"If it was me playing a practical joke on someone, I certainly wouldn't leave prints way back in the bush" where it's unlikely they would

Conservation officer Jed Reader, a lifelong resident of The Pas, said the tracks correspond to those described in Indian folk tales. The Wee-teko left immense tracks and "as far as I know . . . if he caught you, he would eat you," said Mr. Reader "That's why the Indians were so scared of him."

People would drown, perish after falling through the ice or even die in the bush. And if no solution could be found ... Wee-te-ko could always be blamed.

There are three people who will swear the Easterville Monster exists. Coincidentally, each is a teacher, and all the sightings took place on provincial road 327 to Easterville from Highway 6.

Former teacher June Emerson, since returned to Brandon University, saw the creature twice. On one of those occasions she was accompanied by Easterville school principal Don Jones, now teaching at Fort St. John. The other teacher was Allan Skrumeda.

These are their stories:

Two Incidents Have Her Convinced

After two incidents more than a year apart — June Johnson is thoroughly convinced that at least one Weetokow exists.

The last time she saw the "seven-foot or more" creacreature, it stood on the side of the road as she and two pas-sengers, school principal Don Jones and the late Tom Mink of Easterville, Man., were returning to Easterville from Grand Rapids in November,

A year earlier, she passed it as it was "hurdling" some low willows or bushes.

M is s Johnson, now 36, taught school at Easterville for five years before return-ing to Brandon University. Many of the Interlake com

munity's residents believed in the monster, she says.

"People would tease and warn me about getting stranded on the road where the 'moose man' would catch

me ... but they definitely believe it exists." Many were reluctant to discuss it.

"It's just something don't normally talk about, because people might think you're crazy, and they would treat it like a big fish story.

"I'm prepared to say I saw something. I know I did" she

adds emphatically.

Most recently she saw what she took to be someone with car trouble but she couldn't see a car ahead, and assumed the vehicle had gone into a ditch.

"I thought it was a man at first, because it was upright. The first thing that hit me was that it appeared to be stooping forward and had such long arms

"I had kept looking at it, but didn't say anything to Don Jones, but when we got past it he asked if I had seen it, and I said I had. arms were long - and whatever it was, was stooped over.
"I was stunned; it's a

strange feeling, like seeing something you've never seen before. You don't really know what you're looking

Driving past, she saw its "flashing green eyes" as it stood off the road to her left. There was sort of a flashing bright green color ... and there was sort of a reflection and I was staring at it."

She backed up and turned the car to see if her lights would spotlight it, but it had disappeared.

The previous summer, within several miles of the same spot, was her first meeting.

"If I'm not mistaken I had rounded this curve and hit a straight stretch one night when Wilson Easter and his wife, Nora, of Easterville, were in the car with me.

A figure she first took to be that of a man ran from the road.

"He was running and it appeared to be an upright thing and it was just as if it was hurdling the willows or small bushes. It was like you see the hurdlers doing it on television sports shows."

They were long strides, "not short ones for sure," she said, describing the dark, upright figure.

Miss Johnson always paid extra attention when highway driving for fear of moose, deer or other animals on the roadway.

In each incident, the creature "definitely had two logs and not four," she said. "They looked very upright, but stooped with long arms. and they certainly weren't bears because I certainly know what a bear looks know like."

Miss Johnson wasn't fright-ened either time, but "after passing them I would wonder just what I had been looking at."

Frankenstein Monsters Are Beyond Belief -But What About When You Meet One?

Frankenstein monsters are just beyond belief — but what does a person say after seeing one, asks Gary Holo-

The young electrical design draftsman for the Atomic Energy Commission plant at Pinawa, Man., was driving Jo'anna Moore from her Werner Lake, Ont., home to Winnipeg, where she was a student. They had just crossed the border into Mani-

"I had just turned this corner about 15 miles from Werner Lake when this "thing" ran across in front of my car.

"It was running, hunched over; it was a semi-grayish, brownish white in color. It was like a tawny color... you know, like the way some chicks streak their hair," he explained.

Miss Moore said it was un-forgettable. 'It gave me such a weird feeling — one that I've never felt before. I felt chilled all over."

They saw the creature "for only a minute, only onds," said Miss Moore. only sec-

"It was sort of like an ape," and certainly wasn't a bear, she said. "I've seen plenty of bears; we've got a lot of them in the country.

"It must have been close seven feet tall," recalls Miss Moore, now a secretary for the Canadian Consolidated Faraday Mine at Werner Lake. "Its arms were long and it was very dark and dark though not a dark dark dark seles." dark, dark color."

Mr. Holowchuck said he was driving about 30 miles an hour that clear, cold Sunday night in December, 1972, along the little-travelled road.

"A Weetekow, or Sasquatch, is ridiculous, but every alternative explanation is impossible," says Dr. Gover Krantz, an anthropologist at Washington State Unifersity and a leading figure in the aca-demic community concerned with deter-mining reasons for sightings of large, two-footed, hair-covered creatures.
"The animals do exist, I'm sure," he

"I'm sure it's the same animal" as reported in the Easterville area.

Dr. Krantz has not been successful in tracing reports of such creatures being shot or killed in road accidents.

"I'm sure someone has shot killed the animal before — it could have been almost anywhere — and if someone has, I would like to find the skeleton," he said.

"People wouldn't talk about it (shooting the creature) for fear of being in trouble," he believes.

The unsuccessful attempts to capture or find a skeleton of the creature has' cast doubts on its existence, despite hundreds of sighting reports.

Carcasses of dead animals are torn into pieces before being dragged further into the bush and consumed by other animals, he said.

This, along with falling leaves and bone-consuming porcupines, would rare bones difficult to find, he said. would fake

Any animal or bones can be difficult to find in heavy brush or in little trad velled areas.

"And a rare animal is even more dif-ficult to find."

His Eyes Looked 'Most Peculiar'

"I said, 'June put on your brakes! Stop! What is that?" recalls former Easterville school principal Don Jones. It was late one night in November, 1970.

Mr. Jones had noticed what appeared to be a man on the left side of the road about 600 yards ahead. He appeared to be ready to hitchhike, though Mr. Jones, who wondered if perhaps someone's car had gone off the road.

Some 200 yards closer, he thought the figure was about to cross the road in front of the car.

"I had this strange feeling there was some animal, perhaps a dog, with the figure."
Then it suddenly struck Mr.
Jones that this was no man

at all.

As the car approached "the creature then stepped to the side. It didn't run — it just stood there. I said, 'June, put on your brakes! Stop! What is that?'''

She stopped and backed up, but the creature had disup, but the creature had disappeared into the bush. Mr. Jones recalls they had passed a seven-or-eight-foot-tall creature that "wasn't in the form of man," covered with dark hair and with an extremely short neck and long heaving arms. long, hanging arms.

Mr. Jones still remembers "the most peculiar look" in its eyes. "They didn't have a distinct coloring, but the eyes were deep-set, . . a neanderthal man's. I didn't see any color, but June said she noticed its green eyes."
Mr. Jones recalls "a flash of
r e d n e s s ' but doesn't remember any iris coloring.

"I felt there wasn't much of a nose; it wasn't pro-nounced and the impression I received was that the creature was that the creature was ape-like, but more humanoid. What I could see of its face was hairy, and I don't recall a mouth. The ears didn't stand out as the face appeared heavily cover-ed in hair."

The arms were long, like those of apes, hanging to the knees and almost clutching the legs, as if the creature was nervous.

At first it appeared erect, but "up closer, I felt the head seemed a little forward and not as straight as I had thought when I first saw it." Its coloring "was one of general darkness because of the hair," and its skin coloring was dark.

"I got the impression this creature wasn't of any great age, (more) like a young boy in good physical condition, and very strong," Mr. Jones said. "There was no doubt in my mind that it was a strong, virile creature, and in our standards would have been aged 25 to 35 ... wasn't in the form of a gorilla. I know what they look like — and this wasn't that type of being, not that type at all."

Mr. Jones, now 43, said he understands that a few years earlier there had been reports of sightings of a cre ture, called the Easterville Monster. Most reports were

He estimated the creature as nine feet or more in height and very broad across the chest and shoulders. It appeared erect, but it "crunched forward" when looking into the car lights.

Most striking feature was the creature's eyes. "They were really sunk in, and beady, staring with a great intensity as they gleamed" in the lights. "You got the feeling that something was

looking through you."

The car was within 50 feet of the creature "and skid-ding all over the road. When of the was going sideways it lèaped across the road, through a ditch and it was gone into the heavy bush."

Mr. Pfiel said he was "half asleep and dozing off" and didn't see anything when the brakes were slammed on. "It was real shaky. He claimed he had just seen the Easter-ville monster."
