Reports Still Logged

Here are some typical UFO sighting reports received last year by the State Office of Emergency

A 13-year-old boy saw an object the size of a 727. It was dark blue and had lights going around. It was at about 5.000 feet and moving northwest when he saw it for a half a minute on Dec. 10.

On Dec. 7 at 11:45 a.m., a 56-year-old woman reports that her husband saw a five-foot domed shaped object moving at treetop level south for a half a mile, then west

On Dec. 5, someone on Vashon Island saw an object moving at 2.000 to 3.000 feet. It had headlights

A jockey used binoculars to track an object he said was bigger than a helicopter. Someone in Puvallup saw an object that looked like a star. It rose about 10 degrees above the horizon for 11/2 minutes. then disappeared.

A 16-year-old student saw a round object of unknown size with red lights on top and white lights on bottom. It moved south, then east, then away.

According to the state office, there was no pattern in any of last year's sightings, but several years ago a series of reports from a single time period yielded a plotting of the sightings up from Oregon. through the western part of the state as far as Vashon Island, then out over the coast.

The UFO business has fallen off a great deal in recent years-the last serious outbreak was about three years ago when there were numerous sightings, some associated with a beeping noise.

"Incredible UFO reports by credible persons from all walks of life continue on the upswing on a global basis in 1974. Fawcett "Two new Air Force projects, code-named Old New Moon and Bluepaper and JANAP 146-E (Joint Army-Navy-Air

Force Publication) cover continued efforts to shed some light on the growing global enigma by the military. Scientists at the Center for UFO Studies in Northfield, Illinois now have a toll-free number distributed to all local police departments for the purpose of relaying such en-counters to the scientific community for study and evaluation," Fawcett reported.

An object that fell from an oval blue UFO on the roof of Mr. Floyd Bowman's home in Ararat, North Carolina last October 25 was turned over to Fawcett by Captain Bob Hiatt of the Surry County Sheriff's Department. Fawcett in turn mailed it to the Aerial Phenomena Research

Organization (APRO) in Tucson Arizona for analysis. One of APRO's consultants Dr. Robert L. Gilbertson of the Department of Plant Pathology, University of Arizona analyzed the object and found it was the reproduction organ of a plant parasite FOMES ROBINEAE, which decays the heartwood of the Black Locust. It takes a pressure from 10 to 40 pounds to break it loose from a tree trunk. No evidence of unusual handling was found and no evidence of radiation was discovered. It could have been dropped from a sample gathering operation or have been knocked off a nearby tree when the UFO maneuvered overhead making a "loud whistling sound."

Currently, a photograph taken by Tommy Thompson, an em-ployee of R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company in Winston-Salem, is under investigation by the National Investigations Committee On Aerial Phenomena (NICAP) in Kensington, (NICAP) in Kensington, Maryland. Thompson took the photo of a circular disc-shaped UFO last October 15 at 5:30 p. m. at Lewisville, N. C. with his 174 Instamatic Camera. It had a flat bottom and was about 30 feet long. The UFO photographed appeared to be following a singleengine plane at an altitude of 1,000 feet. It was preceded by two white clusters of light.

Last year brought a total of over 87 landings from 23 states and 10 countries. Forty one of the landings involved UFO occupants either aboard or outside: of the UFO on the ground.

The most recent reports in the Mount Airy area occurred on May 10 when a "huge round reddish UFO", reported by several frightened residents was discovered to be a parachute flare sent up by pranksters. Policeman Donnie York identified the flare from a nearby hillside.

On Thursday night, May 15 other residents in Mount Airy described a brilliant red, green and white UFO that changed colors. Upon investigation, Fawcett was able to determine that the UFO could be identified as the "scintillation of stars" due to atmospheric illusions.

UFO Sighting Really Far Out

Here's a UFO story with a logical ending—the "object" wasn't flying after all, not in

any earth sense.
Audley Higbie of 3999 E. Chadwick Rd. in Olive Township near DeWitt was the first to report it to State Police at the Lansing post about 10:15 p.m. Tuesday.

IT IIAD been sationary in the western sky for at least half an hour, was hovering, but didn't seem any closer or farther away, Higbie said. And it was alternately flashing green, white and red.

Trooper Dan Cook went to the Higbie home and took a look himself. "Yep," Cook

ruled, 'that's a UFO, all right, a real, live UFO"

Cook and his partner then went to the FAA control tower at Capital City Airport and reported the object to control-lers there who are accustomed to UFO sightings. It was a perfectly clear night and there was absolutely nothing on the airport's radar screen.

THEN THE controllers and the troopers looked at the object with glasses and the conpect with glasses and the controllers explained they were viewing a pulse star. It was then 18 degrees south of due west and apparently flashing red, green and white.

"Pulse stars," Cook wrote in his report, "are much like our current but pulse with apparent

sun, but pulse with energy at

an even signal rate. Because of gases surrounding the star. the spectrum of light much like a rainbow is emitted as the energy pulses. The refracted light seems to flash."

And that, Cook indicated, is the difference between an unidentified flying object and "Tinkle, twinkle, little star."

Two mystery lights were observed in the sky over San Jose at about 10 p.m. Saturday night and disappeared

Though a Federal Aviation Administration tower controller at San Jose Airport confirmed sighting of at least one of the red-to-orange-colored lights, there was no explanation offered which could be verified.

Phone calls were received at the Mercury city desk from some 35 to 50 excited callers, who all reported seeing the lights.

Most of the callers said that the lights hovered for five to eight minutes over the

San Jose Almaden Valley area and then descended in the direct tion of Mount Umunhum.

Robert Long, FAA controller in the San Jose Airport Tower, said he and a trainee observed one of the lights at about 10 p.m., and continued watching it until it disappeared, some time between 10:05 and 10:08 p.m.

Long said he spoke with an official at the FAA's Oakland radar station, which sweeps the San Jose area, and was informed that the objects did not appear on the radar.

The possibility that the objects were weather balloons from Moffett Field Naval Air Station was discarded after an operations officer there reported that no balloons had been luanched recently.

UFOs that dematerialize before observers'

By J. Allen Hynek

NEW YORK - The possibility that there are civilizations galore scattered throughout our galaxy of 150 billion suns has excited the imaginations of millions.

Have we been visited by representatives of those civilizations in the past? Are we being visited now? Can we communicate with them? Or are they trying in their own way to communicate with us? And if so, what methods, unknown to us, might they be trying - perhaps with as little success as if we tried to communicate with Stone Age men by radio?

Perhaps the entire Unidentified Flying Objects phenomenon, so perplexing to us, is in itself a form of communication we haven't caught onto yet. Maybe it is time we tried.

The many thousands of UFO reports from over the world baffle us. We have no explanation for them. Many have been made by very credible people, persons of considerable training whose testimony in other circumstances would be unquestioned.

Over the past 20 years, I have found that my best reports on UFO phenomena come from air-traffic controllers. pilots, radar technicians, police officers and other persons in responsible positions. It is illogical that while we disregard their testimony on this subject, impugning their very integrity - even their sanity - we often continue to place our welfare and our lives in their

Explanations of the truly puzzling UFO cases by conventional, ordinary means - that they were misperceptions of planets, aircraft, meteors, balloons, etc. - fail miserably to account for the closely studied, truly puzzling "close encounter" cases: the true unidentified flying objects.

Anyone who is really familiar with the cumulative UFO evidence of today. who has actually rolled up his sleeves and dug into the facts, can no longer accept the pontifical rejections of those who know little about the subject.

We have a UFO phenomenon. What does that mean? Many people jump to the conclusion that UFOs represent actual nuts-and-bolts hardware from some other civilization.

Yet there is much evidence against this. UFO "craft" appear in some cases to violate well-established physical laws. They take off at prodigious speeds but without producing sonic booms. They make exceedingly sharp turns, involving accelerations no living matter could stand. They can change shape and form while being observed,

and some have been reported to dematerialize before the observer's eyes. Vancouver Nuts-and-bolts hardware, as we know it, cannot do this.

Are these then perhaps some sort of Sun holograph — that is, three-dimensional noiograph — that is, three-dimensional — images, implanted in our consciousness by other intelligences? If so, why?

For the moment, let us give free rein to our imaginations. The very best UFO reports, corroborated by several witnesses and often by radar observations and photographs, indicate some sort of intelligence, or at least intelligent behavior. But is that intelligence directing the phenomenon here on earth or from afar? Are UFOs perhaps robot devices either with built-in intelligence or directed by distant intelligence?

If we continue to let our imaginations



Residents sight UFO's

SHERIDAN - A total of 14 unidentified flying objects have been sighted in Sheridan County since March 12.

Dr. Kenneth Ohm, professor of astronomy at Sheridan College said he is serving as a type of clearing house for the sighting reports.

The sightings have been made by "very reliable people, but they have a reluctance to reveal their identities, therefore those who have seen UFO's are invited to call me and describe what they have seen, Ohm said.

He said that he then compares the time, location, and description of the sightings so they can tell the people if anyone else has seen what they saw.

It appears that about six of these sightings can be attributed to the star Sirius, which is very bright in the western sky about 8:30 or 9 p.m., Ohm said.

Ohm added there was a lot of turbulence surrounding the star, with the refraction accesing a great variation in color.

Ohm knows of no natural phenomenon which could account for the other sightings.

Ohm said the sightings range from a "nebulosity," to a round white very intense light with an orange center.

All of the sightings have been seen by more than one person, and Ohm said two or three sightings have been made by separate parties at the same time.

The sightings have been in the early morning and late dusk and at night, and have been reported north, south, and east of Sheridan.

Ohm said he had not seen any of the UFO's himself, but that he was trying to get as many descriptions as possible in an attempt to establish the source or cause of the sightings.

He said that this series of sightings is unusual in that there were a number of sightings of the same object and that even prior to publication each sighting was experienced by more than one individual.

ride free - and why stop here? - let us assume that such intelligences may have followed quite a different evolutionary path from ours. In the past half-century or so, we have learned to communicate by radio and television. Today we'd find it rather difficult to return to smoke signals. Perhaps radio is to them as smoke signals would be to us: a slow and inefficient way of communicating.

Yet National Aeronautics and Space Administration scientists and others insist that since radio signals are the natural way to communicate, listening to them is the best way to detect the presence of other civilizations in space. But is it? For one thing, it is a very slow method: years must elapse before a two-way communication could be established.

' In some instances it would be a case of the long-since-dead talking to the not-yet-born. Radio as a way of communicating could have been discarded by other civilizations when man was still in the Stone Age.

We have made great technical strides, but there are stars - presumably solar systems - that are millions, not just hundreds of years older than we are.

Just how would civilizations millions of years more advanced communicate? In Ben Franklin's day, it was impossible to communicate by radio. So perhaps there are other methods of communication still known only to the distant future.

How about projected and materialized thought waves, for instance? Could civilizations in distant space beam down a message - or a UFO - in a manner much like those portrayed in Star Trek? We shall certainly learn of things in the distant future that are impossible to even conceive of today.

Suppose, then, that the whole UFO phenomenon is an advanced communication about which we know nothing. Perhaps are places UFOs are seen, the

UFOs have vet to be studied in a truly scientific fashion, the U.S. Air Force's \$500,000 Condon Report notwithstanding. Indeed, the Condon Report, which concluded that no alien craft had been sighted, demonstrated that the problem truly existed - more than a quarter of the cases it examined were left unexplained.

What is needed is a sustained effort to understand what is going on - to separate the sense from the nonsense and to study the interesting patterns presented in UFO reports the world

NASA is spending millions to find out whether there are bacteria on Mars. Might it not be wise to spend at least one per cent of that money to examine the UFO phenomenon in an imaginative and challenging way? We might find a message in the UFO phenomenon perhaps the UFO is the message!

'Space Ball' Made On Earth-Navy

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) they say. - The United States Navy says a mystery sphere found by the Antoine Betz family is only a stainless-steel ball made somewhere on earth. But the object's discoverers won't give up the notion that it's from

outer space.

"Maybe we've just become over-attached to it, but the ball is odd and even the navy called it a Mexican jumping bean," Mrs. Betz said Sunday. "Who could say what's on another planet? Even speculations have been proven wrong. The navy says what it isn't. They say it isn't an explosive. So we still want to know what it is."

Mrs. Betz said an expert from Omega Minus One, a re-search firm based in Baton Rouge, La., examined the sphere for about six hours Saturday. "He found radio waves coming from it and a magnetic field around it."

The family said the 22-pound object appeared one day re-cently outside their home on Fort George Island. The sphere moves strangely and, when rolled away, comes back, tion.'


Navy spokesman Chris Ber-ninger said the sphere is hollow with a one-half-inch shell of high-grade but common stainless steel. It is eight inches in diameter with seams and only one small tri-angular mark on the outside.

Inside the sphere, tiny beads of residue from the manufacturing process roll around and make noise, he said.

Berninger said the first X - ray attempts failed be-cause the machine wasn't enough strong to penetrate steel, but two subsequent tests showed the contents of the globe.

"I don't know who manufactured it, but I say it came from earth," he said. "We do know it is not an explosive and presents no hazard."

Berninger conceded that the sphere did move at the Betz house. "I believe it's because of the construction of the house. It's old and has uneven stone floors. Do you recall the news stories last week about a seamless stainless steel ball that was found in Florida, and that has the experts puzzled as to what it is or where it came from?

Well Sutherlin too has a

steel ball of murky origin. This one belongs to Ernie Hicks who found it at extreme low tide in Bellingham Bay in 1938. Hicks reckoned the ball had been in the water for about 30 years, but had no rust on it, and no plant or animal life lived within 10 feet of it, he said. Hicks took the ball home for his kids to play with, but after it had been left in the yard through the winter and no rust had formed on the spere he began to get serious about it.

The seamless ball is about nine and a half inches in diameter and weighs about 33 pounds. The ball has been bored and a

plug inserted in each side. Inside the ball, which can hold nine pints, is about a gallon of liquid. The liquid is described as diamond blue in color, but when shaken it turns black, and takes about 20 minutes to return to the blue color. The liquid has been tested and tests as pure water. Hicks is certain the ball was never made in the U.S. as there is no name or serial number on the sphere.He said he talked to two foundry men in the 1950's who told him it would cost about \$ 300 to produce a sphere like his, and each would have to be made from a new mold.

Hicks had never discovered what this ball is for, where it was made, or why, although he has had several tests conducted. So this simple ball remains one of Sutherlin's major mysteries. Only The Shadow Knows.....

"All of us agreed that the ball provided us with no evidence to think it was extraterrestial," Dr. Hynek said.

Its origin, he said, probably would not be known until scientists could cut into the ball.

Hynek said the ball obeys the laws of gravity, has no odor, gives off a high pitched sound when shaken and has an outer shell of stainless steel.

"It had no mystical properties that we could attribute to it.

by spaceships in early times.

Recently, Pascagoula had another report of an unidentified something—this time an underwater object "about the size of a No. 3 washtub" that emitted an amber light. The object was reported by Rayme Ryan, who was fishing with his son in Mississippi Sound when they spotted the underwater glow. Two coast guardsmen confirmed Ryan's account, but the investigation was dropped after their commander rejected the story.

The RAAF, the Queensland U.F.O. Bureau and the Department of Physics at the Queensland University have received reports of unidentified flying objects and mysterious flying lights from people in the Brisbane-Ipswich area and country regions.

Most sightings have been made at night or early morning.
U.F.O. investigator for A m berley Air Base, Squadron Leader R. Bertram, said he had received numerous reports of these "lights" over the last few weeks.

Some Brisbane residents and at least eight people from Dayboro and Upper Lacey's Creek, near Dayboro, have seen the bright lights.

A Dayboro woman who saw a "glowing yellowy light hovering over the mountaintop" on Thursday, April 18, at about 7.15 p.m., called several of her neighbours to witness the sighting.

A Queensland University lecturer in physics, Dr. J. Ross, said he had

had several phone calls from worried people who thought they had seen U.F.Os.

Dr. Ross and Squad-ron Leader Bertram said the bright lights being sighted probably were the planets Venus and Jupiter, which rose close together at this time of vear.

They appeared in the eastern sky in the early morning or sometimes late at night.

Both planets appeared bigger and brighter at this time and could also appear to move or change shape.

But these physical characteristics were merely an atmospheric illusion, Squadron Leader Bertram said.

Both planets, when they were rising, could appear to be moving on the ground, Dr. Ross said.

While these widely reported sightings of bright lights had been accounted for, two recent, separate reports to the UFO Bureau had defied logical or simple explanation, Mr. Phillips said.

Both reports had been investigated thoroughly by the bureau, Mr. Phillips said.
One report came from a 20-year-old nurse at the Ips wich General Hospital.

'Alien Airtields' Work Of Mann

Even if alien astronauts did visit earth in ancient times, as he contends, his "evidence" for this is flimsy.

A Mayan carved figure in an astronaut-like attitude, enigma-tic sculpture on Easter Island these are hardly compelling images from outer space. Uncaplained, gigantic patterns laid out on the ground in remote places are intriguing presided because their are more eisely because they are man-made, not because they can be accounted for as landing direc-tions for space visitors.

As astronomer Gerald Haw-kins (decoder of Stonehenge) observes, proponents of this latter theory have to "explain the large amount of man-made contery), more than 200,000 Hems originally scattered over the area" Dr. Hawkins investigated in Peru. These objects — believed to be contemporary with the markings—strongly with the markings — strongly suggest that the "alien air-fields" are the work of man.

You could see almost any theory of humanity's development reflected in Mr. Von Daniken's tenuous logic, happily attributing some of humani-by's greatest achievements to ditsiders.

Admittedly, there's enough to be learned about our past to urge open-mindedness. Ecientists, looking with fresh eyes at what had been dubbed merely religious or magical symbolism, are finding in it other meanings.

Thus, for example, sciencewriter Alexander Marshack has found detailed astronomi-cal records of the phases of moon in Ice Age and paintings. And two paintings and a rock carving by North American Indians show what probably is the supernova explosion that produced the Crab Nebula in 1054.

It puts an impossible strain on reason, though, to see Mr. Von Daniken's recumbent Mayan as an astronaut. Phases of the moon or supernovae are basic astronomical images. But, while the Mayan does indeed curl up like an American Mercury astronaut, that atti-t u d e is already passe for human spacemen as their craft becomes less cramped.

Actually, the remarkable thing scientists are discovering about our past is not how astonishing its cultural advances have been, but how human they are. Archaeologists once thought certain key inventions were so profound they could arise only rarely. They attributed the spread of these into Europe as diffusion out of the "advanced" Midcast. But the work of such scholars as Colin Renfrew in Britain has shown they arose independently.

more scientists learn about the past, the more they see the unfoldment of the in-telligence man himself expresses. To attribute our cultural landmarks to outsiders is to deny the potential of our own species.

Those interested in the epic of humanity's development, rather than Mr. Von Daniken's sterile delusion, will find it brilliantly told by Jacob Bronowski in his essays The Ascent of Man. Based on his television series, these have just been published by Little, Brown

Mrs A. E. Bates, of Barinia, and Miss Pearl Walden said that on the night of November 25 they saw a strange light hovering in the sky over Barinia, north of Clare.

Mr Bill Scott claimed to have seen a very bright light in the sky travelling parallel to his vehicle while he was driving from Clare to Armagh.

He stopped at the home of Mr Frank Keynes on the Boconnoc Park road and both Mr Scott and Mr Keynes saw a light hovering in the sky in the direction of Snowtown. It appeared as bright as that of a locomotive.

Previously always sceptical about reports of sightings, Mr Keynes was convinced there was "something in the sky."

All was quiet in the Mid-North until June 1969 when there was a daylight sighting of a large egg-shaped object silently travelling north at an estimated 150 mph.

That June seemed the most active period ever for reports of unidentified flying objects. In two weeks strange objects were reported from many areas during both day and night.

On June 4 about 7.45 p.m. Mr Stuart Thomas, of Cooarma, about a mile east of Hilltown. and his wife Pauline saw a dull red flashing light not far away. It was moving at about 80 mph but they could hear no

Two other Hilltown residents. Mr and Mrs Jim Michael, were travelling from Hilltown toward Clare about the same time. Mr Michael saw the light and stopped the car, but could hear no noise. They said the light appeared to follow them and then hover over the ranges near the Camel's Hump.

Mr Michael, a prominent farmer and grazier, said: "There was something there. but what it could have been I would not like to say."

About 9.30 a.m. one day earlier the same week Mr Thomas was working in his wool shed when, for some unknown reason, he suddenly put down his tools and went outside. He looked into the sky and about 45 degrees above the horizon he saw an eggshaped object with no wings, tail or propellor. It was travelling north at about 150 mph and again there was no noise.

Mr Thomas said later he seemed to stiffen all over as he watched the unexplained object. It appeared to be flying at about 2,000 ft, looked about the size of a four-seater helicopter, was egg-shaped and the bottom half gave off a bright reflection from the sun while the top half was dull.

The light given off was said by Mr Thomas to be about three times as bright as normal reflected sunlight.

Again during the same week, two young farmers. Grant and Keith Woidt, were seeding on a property six miles west of Caltowie on the Stone Hut road late at night when they were hounded by a mysterious light.

Grant, who was driving the tractor, saw the light about 2.45 a.m. in an adjoining paddock. He was at first unconcerned, thinking it was another farmer getting an early start.

Then the light changed to dull red and back to white. Still Grant took little notice until the light began ascending into the sky.

As they stopped work about 3.30 a.m. Grant pointed out the light to Keith, who had been on the combine. When they stopped the tractor the light moved toward them and hovered over the vehicle.

As they drove toward home the light followed them at a distance of about 300 yards and about 2000 feet above the ground. When they stopped, the light stopped.

Grant and Keith woke Mr and Mrs John Woidt and their sister. Helen, and the group watched the light which seemed to bob up and down every so often like a cork on ripply

They then noticed a second object, orange-red in color. And as the sky brightened

with the approach of dawn the lights began moving away.

The president of the Mid-North sub-group of the Aerial Phenomena Research Group. Mr A. T. Pink, said the number of sightings of strange lights and sky objects in May and June of 1971 was astounding. Reports came in from many people over a wide area.

In May 1972 an object described by Stanley Flat resident Mrs Phyl James as "a tremendous flashing light bursting into many smaller stars" lit up the night sky like

Her son and daughter-inlaw. Mr and Mrs Peter James. said that at the same time the house shook and rattled. The light was also reported by Mr Allan Pfeiffer of Waterloo.

There were no recorded sightings in May or June 1973. But what are the chances for May and June this year?

Keep watch in the skies. Those that doubt may be convinced, while those that are convinced will be ready to confirm what they had hitherto thought was fiction.

Another UFO was sighted at about 11.30 on Sunday evening by Mr. Fred Thomson of Mitchell Street.

Mr. Thomson said that he and his daughter were sitting in the lounge room when they heard this loud "searing" noise.

On investigation, he saw two bright red and orange lights at the front of his residence.

He said that the mass of light was just above roof

level and that it covered the length of his house.

Mr. Thomson said that he thought power lines may have been short-circuitting and he rushed inside to tell his family not to touch any electrical appliances.

He then went back outside, but by this time, the

object had disappeared.

At least 11,000 people in 34 countries will be scanning the skies for UFOs — unidentified flying objects—during International Sky watch Week from next Saturday to May 4, the organisers said today:

"We are hoping for

the biggest response so far," said Mr Brinsley le Poer Trench, President of Contact International, which claims to be the world's biggest UFO investigatory group.

This will be the second Skywatch week he has organised. Last year's, at the end of June, was affected by bad weather.

Members of Contact International's national have

asked to go out with their telescopes, bino-culars and cameras in a coordinated spot-theobject drive.

Mr Trench said: "We advise them to go out in parties because that makes for better evidence.

"Then I want them to send in their results as soon as possible—by soon as possible—by cable if they can (cable address: Ufotact London SW10)—whether those results are positive or negative."

Mr Trench is convinced that despite efforts to belittle research in this field there has been a general intensification of UFO activity.

There was a rash of sightings in the latter part of last year in regions as diverse as Italy, Yugoslavia, Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic, he said.

These were in addi-

tion to the regular flow of sightings re-ported from all over the world.

"Lights in the sky are not so exciting nowa-days," he said. "But we are getting much more of the ground-level stuff—actual landing reports."

Last Monday morning,, a most excited, but seemingly sincere, young man stopped at the offices of the Klam-Ity and swore that he had seen "Bigfoot" at Gray's Falls in Burnt Ranch where he had spent the night in his Dodge van. "I was one scared turkey", said the man who was looking for work in a mill, shaking his head in disbelief in recollection of the incident. "It was bigger than my van!" he exclaimed. Reassuring the office staff that he was not insane, inebriated or hallucinating, he said the big (almost seven feet tall) creature had looked to him like a hairy old man who smelled kind of pungent. Greg Michael, 19, from Las Vegas, had arrived at the falls at 9:00 p.m. and prepared his bed for the night inside his van that was outfitted with curtains. At midnight he awoke because someone was kicking the tires of his vehicle. He pulled the drapes apart and almost collapsed "I knew for certain that THAT was no bear!!" he laughed. It took him another 15 minutes to get up enough courage to open his curtains again. He was trembling and tried to calm himself. From where Greg lay, he had to look up to see Bigfoot's face and head. "It was right there, near the front of the van!!" he said vehemently. The night was clear and good for sight since it was a full moon night. As time went on and Greg's mind raced for a solution that might get him out of the scary predicament, he started honking his horn and turned on the headlights of the van. The next thing he knew, his whole van was being rocked like a cradle, which scared him even more. "It wasn't a bear," he kept repeating, "he had hands!!!!" Bigfoot even tried the doors of the van, which unnerved the camper who had locked his car doors before he went to sleep. At about 2 a.m., the visitor left and Greg opened one window a little. "The air smelled like somebody who hasn't taken a bath for a long time," he said. Needless to say, Greg was unable to go back to sleep and was awaiting the office crew at the Klam-Ity Kourier to share his story with first thing in the morning.

And while on the subject of "Bigfoot", here is a letter we received from the eminent authority on Bigfoot research, George F. Haas of 5309 College Avenue in Oakland, Calif. 94618, who is constantly besieged with requests for more information on Bigfoot (or Tarzan), the folk heros:

"Bigfoot, the giant hairy wildman of the western forests, is rapidly becoming a folk hero to the youth of our land. Hundreds and hundreds - undoubtedly thousands - of high school and college students across the country are writing term papers and science reports on him. Almost daily they write me asking for "all the information you have on Bigfoot".

Until recently Tarzan has been the folk hero of the wildman type. In the fall of 1912 the short novel "Tarzan of the Apes" by Edgar Rice Burroughs appeared complete in the October issue of ALL STORY magazing. Although that was 62 years ago, and I was only six and a half years old, I recall as vividly as if it were yesterday my mother reading that story to my stepfather and me. It took her all day to do it; we wouldn't let her stop. That was my introduction, not only to fantasy literature - which was to become a life-long interest - but to ape-men.

While some writer friends have tended to dismiss or downgrade Burroughs, saying he was a hack writer of children's stories, I have always delighted in pointing out that during his lifetime Burroughs not only made two million dollars on his Tarzan and Mars books but he achieved something that comes to few writers - he created an immortal character- Tarzan. As long as there will be boys

there will be Tarzan.

He lives in the unspoiled wild places of the earth, in the wilderness areas, in the beautiful forests and remote mountain ranges where millions of mengo annually for "re-creation". But Bigfoot has had that all the time; he has never lost it.

But now with his ranges decreasing due to the encroachment of man, it is up to us to see to it that he is protected and declared an endangered species. Certainly the youth of our land will join me in taking an exceedingly dim view of the plans of some to shoot him or capture him for purposes of exploitation, fame or fortune. Skunk Ape Sighted in Suburbs

Could the elusive Florida skunk ape have forsaken his Everglades home for the more civilized life of suburban West Palm Beach?

Seven youngsters reported seeing what looked like a skunk ape in a wooded area on Ranch House Road near their homes.

They said they saw it first Tues-

day and then again yesterday.
"I may be a little kid but I know what I saw," said 9-year-old Laurie Holmes.

Laurie and the six other youngsters all described the animal they saw as between six and seven feet tall with dark matted hair, long arms, sharp teeth and four toes.

"It could be a man just dressed up in a suit, but I don't think it was," said Tommy Streeter, 10. "I saw him running on his hind legs with his arms curled out and when he turned around I saw a white streak on his back."

Two boys, Tommy Streeter and Mike Edwards, reported seeing the skunk ape on Tuesday from a distance of about 100 yards.

We were walking down the path and we saw something black and hairy in the bushes. He made some deep scratchy sounds from the throat and we got scared and started running," Mike Edwards said.

The two also reported seeing the skunk ape reaching out the window of an abandoned shack located next to the path in the woods they sometimes take on the way to the Meadow Park Elementary School.

'He had bare skin on his knuckles and he just reached out the window," Mike said.

Mike's mother, June Edwards, said she might have overreacted when the children came home and reported seeing the ape. "But if something's wrong in the area where our kids go back and forth to school then I don't think it hurts to check it out," she said.

She called the Sheriff's Department about the incident.

Mrs. Rita Carr, whose son Scott also reported seeing the ape, was inclined not to believe the children's stories. "These kids have heard about the skunk ape and they have very vivid imaginations. It shows you how kids will go through mass hysteria just like grownups, she said.

The Florida skunk ape, so named because many of those who claim to have seen him say he smells like a skunk and has the white stripe, has been sighted off and on throughout South Florida since 1971.

The most recent prior incident involving the skunk ape took place on Jan. 9 when a man named Richard Smith reported hitting an ape-like creature with his car on U.S. 27 west of Hollywood.

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI) - Roshi Ishikawa, 27, the head of a Japanese expedition searching for the legendary yeti, or abominable snowman, said Thursday his team had photographed footprints of a monkey-like animal at an elevation of about 15,000 feet in the Himalaya Mountains.

Ishikawa said the footprints were found in the Annapurna Range in Central Nepal. He said from Hiroshima University in made the tracks.

He did not say when the tracks were found but the 11member expedition, which includes four professional bear hunters, had been searching for

The yeti is the larger of two such snowmen believed to exist and 16,120 feet on the slope by the native Shenpas. The 21,324-foot peak in the A smaller animal is known as a purna Range on January 5.

Shy Big Foot Eludes Observation Party

THE DALLES — Big Foot has suddenly become a hot property here.

However, Big Foot himself apparently couldn't care less. He's in seclusion.

A team of 10 professional people commissioned by the National Wildlife Federation has begun searching for the fabled nairy ape of the wilds, using The Dalles as its base of operations, but no new sightings have been report-

ed.

The biologist, the archeologists, the medical doctor and others in the Big Foot search party have begun, a vigil atop a rocky elevation near The Dalles, bringing into play sophisticated sighting and nocturnal photographic instruments. They are using as their headquarters the new Big Foot-Sasquatch Ex-

his bitton and Information Center at the western edge of the city. Their working area is a barren elevation above the Columbia River, but its deep shadowed crags apparently appeal to Big Foot. In past years many people have reported seeing

him prowling around there.

It is a coincidence that the Irish-born explorer, Peter Byrne, decided to open a Big Foot museum just at the time the National Wildlife Federation search team undertook its project. Byrne considers it most fortunate that this has happened.

Byrne is a friend of Robert Morgan, head of the federation's team. They have, in fact, searched for Yeti, the Himalayan counterpart of Big Foot, together. Morgan has welcomed Byrne as a member of the team in the current investigation. Another member of the party is Byrne's attractive young wife, an avid Big Foot enthusiact

The search is being financed with money donated to the federation by an unidentified woman in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., who has long been interested in getting the goods on Big Foot once and for all. Byrne says there has been some misunderstanding about the financing. He assures those who protest to him about the expenditure of \$29,000 for such a seemingly inordinate purpose that the National Wildlife Federation is a privately endowed membership organization, not a government agency.

Byrne has set up his Big Foot museum in a 60-foot trailer atop which is mounted a yellow permant featuring a huge black footprint. The interior walls are crowded with reprints of stories, photographs, charts and drawings, all with a Big Foot theme. Display cases include plaster casts of Big Foot's tracks and the skulls of fossil men.

Byrne never has caught a glimpse of Big Foot despite diligent searching. He nevertheless is "99 per cent sure" that the elusive animal exists.

"The accounts of other people — reliable, stable people I have talked to at length — bring me to my conviction," he says. "I have discussed Big Foot with enough of those who have claimed sightings that I believe I know accurately whether someone is telling the truth about what he saw. I can't discredit many of the reports I have heard."

Byrne argues that Big Foot sightings have been reported over the span of too many years to be interesting as a hoax any longer. He has on his museum walls copies of newspaper articles about hairy apes in the Northwest dating back to the 1850s.

A large purpose of the museum, Byrne said, is to act as a clearing house for Big Foot facts. Those who have sighted the creature in past years are eagerly solicited to tell their stories to Byrne if they haven't revealed themselves thus far, but he is particularly interested in recent and current sightings.

The center is offering at \$1,000 reward to anyone "providing information that

leads directly to a find by the center's investigative team, a find that is deemed of value. . ."

Byrne says some people have been reluctant to report. Big Foot sightings for fear of being ridiculed for lying or hallucination. He says he will honor the wishes of anyone wishing to remain anonymous in relating an experience with Big Foot.

Thus far no one in Ska-mania County, across the Columbia River in Washinge ton, has groused outspokenly about all the Big Foot attention being focused in The Dailes. This Wasco County town never has been appreciably Big Foot-conscious. On the other hand, Skamania County is so full of lore about the creature that anyone who sights one and "willfully and wantonly" slays it will be subject to a fine of \$10,000 and-or imprisonment for up to five years.

TACOMA .James Johnson is pretty sick of hearing hole jokes, like is he going to write the "hole history" or when is the "hole story" ever going to be told.

Anyway, the whole truth is that James Johnson has a hole in his backyard. a hole in his backyard. But this particular hole refuses to be filled up. And Johnson has tried, as have other owners of the Tacoma home where the hole is located.

Back in the 1920s, the owners dropped a load of marble and other junk

marble and other junk down the hole. Apparently, the hole didn't like it and 'an explosion blew everything out—marble and everything. The lady living here was scared to death and moved out," Johnson said

About 10 years later, another owner filled up the hole and things seemed to calm down a little for 40

years.
Then one day Johnson's St. Bernard started to sniff around at a small hole in the yard. Until then, the Johnsons had no idea they had "The Hole"

in their backyard. They thought they had moles.
Johnson stuck a 50-foot sewer snake down the opening but couldn't find bottom.

however, a city engineer was called in and said it looked like an old well. He measured it at 31 feet and suggested they fill it up, maybe with some gravel. The first three feet are lined with bricks bricks.
The Johsons didn't real-

The Johsons didn't realize they had a hole which wouldn't stay filled, but they did realize it would cost around \$500 to fill it with gravel. Instead they picked up 164 old tires from St. Vincent DePaul's and threw them down the hole, along with an old rug, couple of boxes of junk and some dog bones. Then they covered it with a wooden plank the city gave them.

That was last year. A

decided to put on a sun deck, which would go over the hole. When he picked up the planks, he saw that the hole had sucked up the tires and was wanting

The word of Johnsons' hole started to spread and Johnson said he has had "a million and one offers" from people to clear out the tires and junk and see just where that hole goes just where that hole goes. He decided to let some

He decided to let some professional cave explorers, the Cascade Grotto of the National Speleological Society, "get to the bottom of it."

Johnson and the explorers started to clear out the tires Friday — it took eight hours to get 75 tires out — and so far the explorers haven't found much and are only guessing that it is an old community well or maybe something used for water shortage. They did find some funny "egg-shaped"

objects down there. Johnson said, but nobody knows what they are.

So far, the Johnsons have been able to take the hole and its fame in stride. A former resident came by and said his father lowered him down into the hole with a rope and bucket in 1922 and "something" pulled the bucket out of his hands. Johnson said it was such an incredible story, he didn't tell anyone about it for a long time. So far, the Johnsons for a long time.

And a Chicago reporter called the other day and asked if it was possible the hole was dug by a Sasquatch, the legendary man-sized beast that tramps around in the Northwest. Johnson told him he didn't think so.

Still, another theory has it that the hole is part of a series of tunnels once used to smuggle Chinese workers into Tacoma. The city fathers have denied

or that it is a place where Indians buried their treasure. Or that it is an abandoned oil well. Or part of an old railroad tunnel.

think?

slouched position, he said. Police found a foot-and-a-half wide path leading back into the woods. They also found a quarter-inch-thick piece of plaster board with a hole through it, as if something of great weight had stepped on it.
