## Jackson Man Spots UFO

## In Early A.M.

UFO (unidentified flying object) was spotted by a Jackson Township man early today while he drove into Lakewood.

John Sholder, 26, of Dina Place, Harfield, Jackson Township phoned Patrolman Louis Pintar at 3:55 A.M. today and reported seeing the UFO while driving south on Squankum Road about an hour earlier.

Three people in the car with Mr. Sholder also spotted the UFO. But police had no other calls on it.

Mr. Sholder told police he was driving south near the Lakewood-Howell Township border and the UFO was traveling north.

"It was at tree top level as it approached my car. It was saucer shaped with white square blinkers in the center, and they were going on and off rapidly like a neon sign. There were orange lights at the top and bottom and a green light at the bottom" Mr. Sholder told Patrolman Pintaro.

Mr. Sholder could not estimate the size of the object.

But he said he lost sight of it when he turned around to try to follow it.

Mr. Sholder was nervous, the policeman said, and related he saw the UFO for 10 minutes. He turned on his Citizens Band radio to try to call someone and it went dead, he reported.

The foursome had been to the Royal Manor, a night club in Wall Township.

## 'Flying Object' Sighted In Harbor

At least a dozen Harbor families reported they saw a "flying object" hover over the Harbor Shopping Center Tuesday, May 4, about 10 p.m.

The ship, or plane, or whatever, gave off a red color and one resident of the South Bank Road reported he saw three lights shining down from the unidentified flying object (ufo) as it hovered high in the sky.

A Coast Guardman from the Chetco River Station said, unofficially, that the object appeared to be a satellite but there was no confirmation from any official sources.

The object was apparently seen only in the Harbor area.

# From Chalus to Isfahan by UFC

all began when 19-year-old Gholam Reza Bazargani, belonging to a wealthy and respectable family of Chalus, decided to take a stroll in the nearby woods on Sizdehbedar day.

It ended two days later in Isfahan, leaving in its trail a score

of baffled policemen, puzzled psychiatrists an unidentified flying object (UFO) and a lot of mystery.

According to Bazargani's report to Isfahan police, he was whisked away by a UFO on Sizdehbedar day while strolling through the forests, and landed in far away Isfahan on Sunday

While the authorities immediately placed Bazargani under psychiatric examination to determine his sanity, other reports from villagers in Marvine and Lanjan near Isfahan poured in as if to confirm the young man's claims.

According to police officials in Isfahan, a number of people

from these villages reported seeing what they described as a "flying saucer." Similar reports were also recieved from other individuals and groups from the same region.

The time of observations in all these reports coincided with

Bazargani's claims.

In Chalus, meanwhile, the police had launched a massive search for Bazargani, but there was no trace whatsoever of the young man.

According to Bazargani, while he was walking alone deep in the forests on Friday he suddenly saw a UFO emerge from the sky, fly straight towards him and stop directly above him. He said he was unab e to move as he watched four "beings" come out of the spaceship and take him inside it.

He claims that he spent some time under the scrutiny of the "beings" before passing out. "The next thing I remember is that I woke up back on earth early in the morning, not in the lush Caspian forests, but surrounded by barren lands," he said. He somehow found his way to Isfahan later the same day.

After spending a day with the police and psychologists, he travelled back to Chalus.

Although most authorities are skeptical about the whole affair, they are still mystified by so many identical reports coming from varied people.

All the doctors, including those at the Red Lion and Sun Society hospital in Isfahan, who examined Bazargani have given a clean report as to his health, both physical and mental.

federal aviation officials, but found no report of an overdue aircraft in the area.

The sheriff had no explanation as to where the flare might have come from.

# The Old UFO Story Not Old to Expert

Dr. J. Allan Hynek, one of the world's leading researchers on UFOs, says data continue to pile up on unidentified flying objects, leading him to believe more than ever

that the mysterious objects really exist. However, he says, there is no evidence to date that UFOs are spacecraft piloted by alien beings. "UFOs may have no connection with extraterrestial life (life beyond earth) whatsoever," he said Thursday.

Hynek was in Atlanta to speak at the

Thomas A. Edison Foundation's 27th Science Institute for science teachers. The meeting will continue through Friday at Georgia

"When persons think of UFOs, they automatically relate them to extraterrestial life," said Hynek, who is a professor at Northwestern University and director of the Center for UFO studies in Evanston, Ill.

"This is incorrect thinking.
"Undoubtedly UFOs are a new phenomenon unknown to science," he said. "We are facing a phenomenon which is a new empirical observation. Remember, nuclear energy was discovered only relatively recently."

Hynek suggested to the science teachers that if the mystery of UFOs is ever solved, "it will cause changes in our scientific thinking.

"I constantly have people come up to me and ask just what are UFOs," he said. "If we knew what they were, they would not be 'unidentified."

That's why scientific research is needed to solve the mystery, he contended.

Hynek, who researched UFO reports for the U.S. Air Force for several years, says some 20 per cent of such reports cannot be explained by astronomical or man-made occurrences. "The Air Force says only about 3 per cent of the reportings can't be explained, but the Air Force has a different way of interpreting statistics," he said.

If UFOs are not related to extraterrestial life, then just what are the objects that people report seeing zig-zagging all over the

sky?
"I don't know," says Hynek. But speaking strictly from speculation, Hynek says UFOs could be the result of an atomic phe-

nomenon.
"We know that electrons circle the nucleus of an atom. In many kinds of atoms, the outer electrons are far away from the nucleus. The space between the electrons and nucleus is mostly empty," Hynek explained.

If there was something in the empty space, it could cause atoms to behave far differently from the way they are now observed to act. Hynek, emphasizing he is only speculating, said these kinds of puzzling concepts could be involved in UFO activity.

However, Hynek does not rule out the possibility that UFOs could be associated

with extraterrestial life. "It is only one part of entire UFO concept," he said.

Hynek says reliable reports of persons all over the world being kidnaped by visitors from outer space are surfacing more

Recently, he said, seven field workers in Arizona were returning from work in a pick-up truck when they saw a huge, saucer-like craft near the road. One of the workers ran under the craft, and a blue light from the object knocked him unconcious. His companions scattered.

When they returned later, both the spacecraft and their fellow worker had disappeared, they reported. For four days the person was missing, the local authorities began to suspect foul play and ran lie detector tests on the six workers who had witnessed the courrence said Hunek nessed the occurrence, said Hynek.

"They passed their lie detector tests," he said, and on the fifth day their companion was found alive and well —and very clean - in a telephone booth miles away from the point where he was kidnaped.

The victim told the authorities that he had been captured by the alien visitors, and he also passed a lie detector test.

"Stories similar to this are being re-peated around the world," said Hynek. There's got to be something to them.

Contrary to popular opinion, UFOs are spotted more often by professionally competent persons than by others. "Police make a lot of the sightings because most of them occur late at night and early in the morning when police are the only ones about," said Hynek

Also, he said, UFO landings are re-ported more in isolated areas than in highly urbanized regions, and UFO sightings are often made by two or more persons at the

same time.
"I've been asked why UFOs don't land
on the White House lawn or during half-time at the Rose Bowl game," Hynek reported.
"We don't know why."

Hynek says most persons are still reluctant to report UFO sightings because of fear of ridicule from their peers. "It's hard to convince the public that UFOs are a research problem, and not something to be scoffed at," he said.

That's why Hynek has set up a toll-free hot line to the UFO research center to take calls of UFO sightings.

## **UFO** Sighted

Patrolmen Louis Pirrello and Joseph Bongiovanni investigated a sighting of an unidentified flying object early Monday morning.

Mrs. Rose Kellerher of Fairview Pl. called the police after her 16 year old son Steven told her and her husband he had seen a UFO. The Kellerhers followed their son outside and saw a round flying object heading north with red, green, and white lights. Mr. Kellerher, who observed the UFO through telescopic glasses, determined that it was approximately 100 miles away.

## **Rockets** Over RC

A rash of telephone calls was received early today by police and firemen of red-green and white sky-rockets flying over the southern part of the city.

According to officers, one landed on a roof at 1017 Hilton St. and a second on top of Hoover School.

Although firemen reported that they could find nothing on the roof of the school, police located two empty military flare casings at the Hilton Street home.

Firemen reported that calls were received from residents who said they saw skyrockets high in the sky, apparently coming from the Bayshore area of the city.

Last weekend calls were received of UFO's over the city, and a military flare landed near a Woodside home Thursday.

Karen Ontiveras, 19, and Alfred Ontiveras , 50, of 1017 Hilton St. reported that a "possible skyrocket" went over their home shortly after midnight. Officers said other reports were received at intervals from the area.

Miss Ontiveras told police the incidents might be related to a bomb threat she had received a few days ago.

Ronald E. Harms, 27, of 1015 Hilton St. reported to Officer Harry Baker although he heard a noise around his bedroom screen he could find nothing.

Ontiveras said he found burn marks in his rear

## UFO 'yarn'

Dr. J. Allen Hynek, a Northwestern University astronomer who heads the Center on UFO Studies, may have a predisposition to believe accounts of sightings of unidentified flying objects. He is nevertheless a scientist - one who has had exceptional opportunity to evaluate such reports.

Thus it is of particular interest that he finds "no substantiation" of charges that Travis Walton's story of involvement in a UFO episode is nothing but a hoax. The young Arizona logger's account of being seized and taken aboard a mysterious craft during a five-day disappearance last November was widely publicized. Hynek's conclusions after an interview with him makes one wonder, all over again, whether it might have happened just as Walton says it did.

# Viewers questioned about UFOs

FORT PAYNE-Reports of unidentified flying objects being spotted in the Fort Payne-Rainsville area Sunday are being investigated by officials of the Field Investigation Aerial Phenomena Research Organization International UFO Registry.
Several people, including state troopers and

county lawmen, were interviewed Monday by Clifford Collier, a representative of the UFO fact-finding organization. At least half those interviewed, said Collier, were members of the DeKalb County sheriff's office.

The viewers described UFOs up to 20 feet in diameter, ranging from white to red and orange. One report quoted an unidentified caller as saying a UFO landed in his back yard. The sightings lasted from about 10 p.m. Sunday to midnight.

The objects were said to hover over the city Collins would make no statement on his findings "at this time." He said that after weighing all evidence he would make a judgment, which would be

It all started the evening of April 25 at 9:30 p.m. when someone the Chillicothe police department and said there were unidentified flying objects in the air over Chillicothe.

Fourteen more calls eventually came in on the same sighting but as of this writing, it hasn't been determined exactly what was flying (if it was something identifiable) or what was hovering in the Chillicothe area on that otherwise

peaceful Sunday evening.

A lot of rumors have been circulating as to what was actually seen by residents who ventured out to the area, tipped off to the sighting by their citizen band sighting radios. One rumor was that two of the objects had landed. Another rum or was that a being from one of objects approached unknown police officer causing the officer to draw a gun on it. And yet another rumor had the whole area blocked off by police so no one could go near where the objects had landed.

It is apparent from talking to several eyewitnesses to the alleged sighting that all three rumors are somewhat farfetched.

"Everyone said they something but they didn't know what it was," said Nell Crew, police dispatcher on duty the night of the incident. "Some calls were from concerned citizens. Other callers wanted a photographer out there because it had landed. A couple of people said they wanted to report UFOS," she continued.

After the first two calls came in simultaneously, Officer Richard Ledbetter drove out to the Princeville Blacktop

"I saw something in the sky but didn't know what it was. I first thought they were planes, but they

weren't moving," he said.

Ledbetter stayed at the scene for a few minutes and then returned to the police station. Several people stopped to look while he was there. He asked the dispatcher to call Greater Peoria Airport to see if the objects could be picked up on radar. She was told there were five planes from O'Hare Airport circling in the area.

Officer Ledbetter then drove out to the Martin-Marietta gravel pits located on Route 29, just north of the Santa Fe Railroad overpass.

"I thought one was a weather balloon because it was long and had a light in the middle. There were four other objects. None looked like a helicopter," he continued.

According to Ledbetter, the objects were the same ones he had seen earlier on Princeville Blacktop although some had moved slightly in position. The long object had

white lights on either end with a blinking white-green light in the center. The other four objects were of different colors. When Ledbetter got off work, they were still there. That was at midnight so he thought they might have been satelites.

Several other auxiliary police officers also witnessed the objects after Ledbetter summoned them to the gravel pit area. None were certain what it was they saw.

"I don't know what it was. When you looked at it through binoculars, it didn't look like a helicopter. It was hovering n one spot. The two white lights started making an infinity sign in the sky, said Officer Gary Pelini, who said he saw three objects, but five lights.

One oblong object had white lights on either end with a red and a green blinking light in the center. The two white lights started moving and made a figure eight on its side in the sky. He said it eventually lowered down a little near the horizon.

"I don't know any plane that has lights like it. I'm sure it wasn't a flying saucer, but it was there, whatever it was," he continued adding that he had spent six years in the Navy.

Officer Charlie Britton also saw the spectacle along with his wife, Vickie, and her father. He also saw something with twinkling lights of different colors in the northeast and northwest sky, but was unable to ascertain what it was.

"I don't believe it was a star. We watched a plane come near one of the objects and watched it bolt away when the plane got near it, then it slowed down and hovered again," he commented.

Officer Jack Nicklin went to the gravel pit around 9:45 p.m. He also saw five objects, one of which made an inverted figure eight in the sky and had two white lights on either end with assorted colors in the middle.

"We were out there a good half hour. I couldn't really see what it was. The ones in the north and east could have been stars, the way they were flickering, but the other one really was clear through binoculars," remarked Nicklin.

The officers all left the scene eventually to respond to a report that one of the objects forced a car off Cloverdale road.

In addition to the auxiliary officers, several eyewitnesses were contacted, all of whom said they saw something in the sky. In an attempt to determine what was actually in the sky on the of April 25, we contacted several authorities and agencies in the area.

State Trooper Joseph Roberts said he saw the floating object on Princeville Blacktop along with

eight to 10 other people around 9:30 p.m.

"The only thing I saw was one weather balloon," he said.

A check with the state police office in Peoria as well as the Peoria county sheriff's office ascertained that no reports were filed on the incident.

Rod Palmer, principal assistant for the National Weather Service located at the Greater Peoria Airport, said a weather balloon was launched at 6 p.m. the same evening.

"It should have disintegrated by 8:30 p.m.," he said. According to Palmer, the balloon was traveling in an easterly direction and had no light on it. He suggested the objects might be research balloons from a firm or government agency doing soundings for pollution testing. He said a report would be filed with the Federal Aviation Agency if this were the case.

Upon checking with the FAA office located in the tower of the Greater Peoria Airport, it was learned that no such report had been filed for pollution testing or any other reason, according to Bob Barnett, FAA supervisor. He said they get UFO reports occasionally but it was hard to track down what the object was.

"I've never seen them (UFOs) myself. Somebody reported something like it near Brimfield a couple of months ago," commented, suggesting the sighting might be attibuted to helicopters or

"Some stars appear to be closer than they are. A star will look like it has red and green lights on it and will sometimes give the illusion that it's blinking," he added.

Checking with another group which might possibly have been involved with the incident, the Air National Guard unit in Peoria, we discovered the unit was grounded

the evening in question.

Looking into another possibility, we discovered that the pilot of one of the planes identified in the air that night was flying out of Mt. Hawley Airport. We were unable to talk with the pilot, but Dana Regier, the dispatcher, said the pilot was flying at an altitude of 1,500 feet and saw three small yellow objects, all of which were hovering approximately 700 feet higher in altitude. It seems the objects were following a triangular pattern in the sky, making a perfect staight line, coming to a complete stop, then proceeding to make another line of the triangle.

# Second UFO sighting told at Elmwood

ELMWOOD — The talk in this quiet valley village of 722 persons is not of budding butternut trees nor the need of

Instead, it revolves around police officer George Wheeler's sighting of his second Unidentified Flying

Object (UFO) within a year.

Until April 1975 this veteran of more than 30 years in police work, including 10 years as a New York State highway patrolman, dismissed UFOs as figments of others' imaginations.

Now he's convinced not only that UFOs exist, but that occupants of these mysterious spacecraft "are not

harmless but, in fact, they're out to kill us."

That remark was made earlier this week as Wheeler reclined in a bed at Memorial Hospital, Menomonie. He has spent considerable time there since April 22 when he said he was struck by a bluish-white light shot from a UFO hovering above a hilltop quarry just south of this Pierce County community.

Skeptics are no fewer than they were April 7, 1975 when Wheeler and several others saw another UFO in the same spot. But Wheeler takes solace in the fact others here saw the same UFO he observed about three weeks ago.

### Police chief gives account

Police Chief Gene Helmer here probably has the most accurate account of what may have happened to officer Wheeler about 11 p.m. April 22 when he drove to the quarry flats to investigate what he thought was a fire.

Helmer talked to Wheeler early the morning of April 23 after Wheeler returned home from a checkup by Dr. Frank Springer. Wheeler had been found sitting in his squad car in a semi-conscious condition. The squad lights. and ignition were turned off, and Wheeler muttered to a passerby, David Moots, "get me to the radio, I've been hit" (by a blast of light.)

Chief Helmer said Wheeler "was one hell of a scared guy, I'll tell you. And what George was telling me afterwards was from his sub-conscious, because later he didn't even remember describing the incident to me."

According to Helmer, Wheeler was on duty when he radioed about 11 p.m. that he was heading for the quarry "where it looks like a fire has broken out." Wheeler's wife Doris heard the conversation over a police scanner in the couple's home.

When Wheeler reached the crest of CTH P and looked to the north over a flat, hilltop alfalfa field, he exclaimed over the radio, "My God, it's one of those UFOs again," and he began describing the vehicle "very calmly," according to Chief Helmer.

Then the police radio went dead. Alarmed, Mrs. Wheeler called the rest home here where Chief Helmer works part-time. The nurse on duty telephoned Paul Frederickson, nursing home administrator, who lives near the field where officer Wheeler was observing the UFO. The nurse asked Frederickson to look out his window to see if he could observe an object in the

#### Another person sees object

"I got up and looked out the window and saw this flaming orange object in the sky," Frederickson said this week. "I watched it for a full 10 seconds and went back to bed to get my wife, but when we returned it was gone."

Frederickson, described by residents here as "a most reliable person" confided "it wasn't the first time I saw one here, either."

However, he said that "because of the nature of my job, the last thing I want is this kind of publicity, you know."

A former Jackson County resident, Frederickson recalled that early last October he and his son were traveling up CTH P en route home about 10:30 p.m. when his son pointed to the southeast and asked, "is that the

way the moon comes up, dad?"

"I took one look at the speed at which it was approaching and knew it couldn't be the moon," Fredericks-

on said.
"It was round and bright bright orange, but as it came close it turned and became crescent-shaped. This meant the light was coming out of the front end. As it hovered near us, we could see the underside very clearly. It was round, nearly saucer-shaped and dark gray. We couldn't have been more than 1,000 feet from it, and we were absolutely enthralled. But we also didn't tell anyone about it for obvious reasons.

Chief Helmer recalls that after he discussed the incident with Wheeler three weeks ago, he and Pierce County Sheriff' Department officers combed the quarry site with geiger counters but could find no reaction on the device.

Later, further investigation revealed that three persons who live in homes near the field where Wheeler sighted the object said their television sets suddenly went off about 11 p.m. April 22 and returned to operation about 10

Wheeler rested for a few days at his home here, but one night his wife was awakened when her husband began mumbling about the UFO incident and complained of severe headaches.

#### Wheeler hospitalized

Dr. Springer was called again, and Wheeler was hospitalized, first at Menomonie and then at Eau Claire where tests were done. He was then returned to the Menomonie hospital where he was confined until Wednesday of this

Chief Helmer recalls he has seen Wheeler under "all kinds of conditions relating to police work, and I've never

seen him shaken like he was that night."

Helmer, who is uncommitted on the existence of UFOs, pointed out that while the city squad car had been working well, Moots could not start it when he discovered Wheeler sitting in the squad, dazed. Helmer started it easily when he arrived at the quarry site. But two days



Wheeler is at home now, still amazed over the latest incident.
"Why do I have to see one twice?" he asked.

#### Previous sighting explained

On April 7, 1975 while on night duty north of town, Wheeler dived into a roadside ditch to avoid being struck by what he first thought was a huge 747 jet on fire and preparing to crash.

The object continued on to the flats area where Wheeler drove finding it hovering above the ground. That UFO, he said, was the size of a football field and made no sound, although it was flaming orange as was the April 22 UFO he observed.

The latest one made what Wheeler described as a "whishing" noise as it left. He also said he could see inside the latest object and found a paddle-wheel-like apparatus inside. And he said he could see shadowy figures inside the latest UFO. Likewise, Wheeler said the latest sighting indicated the UFO was about 250 feet across and as large as a two-story building.

#### Album made of accounts

His descriptions of the objects match those given by others around the nation who permitted a New York record company (Columbia) to put on an album released two weeks ago personalized accounts of UFO sightings. Wheeler's account is on the record, joining those of former military personnel, a nuclear scientist, a social worker, a psychologist, a present U.S. Treasury agent, another police officer and a U.S. Congressman. Their descriptions match Wheeler's regarding physical char acteristics of the objects. The UFOs Wheeler and Frederickson saw were traveling from east to west, just as all UFOs described on the record album "UFOs: The Credibility Factor.

Because all local UFO sightings here have been near a 69,000 volt Northern States Power Co. line, and because Wheeler observed a dangling hose on the latest UFO, he speculates the craft possibly may use the area as a

recharging site.
"I don't know what I saw," Wheeler reported, "but all I know is that I don't want that experience repeated ever again."



# OBJECT LANDED

Russian space junk, a meteorite shower, or a UFO? What was the mystery object sighted by thousands of NSW people as it flashed across the night sky on May 24?

Where did it land?

Newspaper reports claimed it was a piece of Russian space hardware burning up as it re-en-tered the earth's atmosphere.

Astronomers, scientists, and space experts variously calculated that the object would land near Robertson in southern NSW, off the coast near Shellharbour or in the Antarctic.

Scientists at the University of Wollongong weighed up the possi-bilities and decided to search in the Robertson area - for a crashed meteorite.

## Copler search

Local farmer Harry Warren mounted his own search after claiming he saw an object glowing red in bushland about two kilometres from his house.

He said the object glowed for about 10 minutes then disappeared. It made no sound and he could see no smoke.

The next day he found a patch of withered grass about two kilometres from his farmhouse.

The grass wasn't burnt but withered for about two inches on the tips.

Two days later the North American Defence Command went on record as stating that the object was the Russian satellite Cosmos 820, launched in Russia about 10 days before.

• The object was first reported to have landed near Robertson, sparking off several bushfires.

According to Dr Richard Facer, from the University of Wollongong, a meteorite would be very unlikely to cause a fire on impact.

Local residents claimed later that some fires had been burning in the area for up to three days be-

Glen Moore, a lecturer in physics, calculated that the object would have landed in the sea off Shellharbour.

Investigators said one sighting was made on February 17, and others on February 21, and each night until February 26.

The times the UFO's appeared varied from 10.15 pm to 11.55 p.m., and hundreds of people saw them.

Some watched through binoculars and telescopes, and one man claimed that when he looked at one of the lights it took on the appearance of two lights — one at each end of lights a "cage like structure".

A trucker from Olavarría claims he was kidnapped by extraterrestrial beings and he now suffers disorders.

Olavarría (From our agency) - Mar del Platé - "I suddenly saw something like a giant oyster that emitted a brilliant and blinding light, it opened... and I found myself inside with my truck."

That is the phantastic story of a surprised trucker who claims having been "kidnapped in the early hours of a foggy morning by extraterrestrial beings".

The amazed driver's name is Néstor Urruti, 47, who lives at Balcarce and Ave. Circunvalación. As a consequence of his strange encounter he is now "the man of the day".

He related his incredible experience thus: "I was driving over a bridge on the Ave. Pringles in a thick fog when I saw "that"... It opened like a big oyster and was very brilliant. Following that, the truck and I found ourselves inside. From then on it was completely dark. The tremendous brilliancy had blinded me. Afterwards I could see an enormous panel of three or four meters size, in the shape of a horseshoe. And on it were instruments similar to clocks, with needles but without numbers. And on that panel were also drawings resembling flowers of strange shapes, with yellow and violet colors.

Paris (AFP) - Flying saucers exist, but it is difficult to prove it scientifically, states a recent article in the official magazine of the French Ministry of Defence, dedicated to UFOs. # The scientist who believes in a monster

By Mildred Hamilton

ROY MACKAL IS DETERMINED to build a better monster trap. His quarry is the legendary inhabitant of Scotland's Loch Ness—the monster Nessie that has easily eluded man and machine since the first recorded sighting in 565 A.D.

Convinced a colony lives in the deep, cold, murky water, the scientist has made the monsters his avocation for 10 years. "The ridicule and the skepticism sting," he said on a San Francisco visit to talk about his search, "but the scientific evidence is sound. One day within the next two years we could have our specimen.'

Not to kill, not to keep, not even to traumatize, but rather to photograph and to document the solution of what Mackal calls "one of the great scientific mysteries."

This is what he thinks the trap will net:

A 20-foot long, 2,500-pound animal with a head and neck about 6 feet long that probably descended from the giant amphibian thought to be extinct for 250 million years.

The profile comes from submarine excursions, sonar tracking, underwater cameras, recording the beast's underwater calls. An important contribution could be made today, Sunday, when three cameras and an underwater video taping will go down deep "where the action is." May through October are the prime observation months for the Loch Ness Investigation Bureau, the non-profit organization set up by a member of Parliament, David James.

Professor Mackal, a tall blond broad-shouldered scholar, grins wryly on introduction of his topic and immediately and carefully establishes his credentials. He has been at the University of Chicago 28 years, 20 of them as a professor of biochemistry. He helped pioneer studies on the structure of DNA and his notable research is widely published.

How did a highly respected scientist get mixed up

"Pure accident. I went to Scotland on vacation, took a climb to look at Loch Ness, and met some people camped on a monster watch. I discovered no scientist had ever been involved, and with typical American arrogance decided to settle the matter.

That was in 1968 and his initial findings intrigued him enough to keep going back, to join the Loch Ness Investigation Bureau, for which he is now the scientific investigator. One leave and many vacations from the university have permitted Mackal and the growing number of interested scientists to gather monster

"Finally after five years I saw one. I had been convinced intellectually but this was a gut reaction, deep down, personal." He was out in the lake with two other scientists "when the black part of an animal broke the surface, twisted to the left and the right. All three of us saw it and we believe it was part of a flipper.'

Mackal has examined and condensed 1500 years of myth and evidence in a book, "The Monsters of Loch Ness" (Swallow Press), which he calls the first and only complete study of the mystery. He hopes it will stimulate interest in funding to permit the Loch Ness Investigation Bureau build its trap and expand its

His own contributions range from the sifting of evidence to the invention of a crossbow with which. he hopes to obtain a sample of the flesh of the animal.

The gadget would be fired from a submarine to nip out a specimen for a biopsy.

Mackal also recently made a presentation before the joint Houses of Parliament asking for legislation to protect the animals in the lake but not to stop research.

"My work there is all a labor of love," he said. "We have collected many kinds of evidence. First is anecdotal from which every human activity starts. Of the 10,000 eye witness accounts, we have kept 251 to establish characteristics of the monsters.

Still photos have all been analyzed and frauds removed. Sonar studies by several groups compiled. Underwater recordings and photographs added. Professor Mackal believes:

"There is a population of animals, big ones, little ones, middle-size ones in the lake. Remember Loch Ness is 25-miles long, one mile wide, 900 feet deep in spots and fed by fresh water rivers. The salmon going through the lake could support several hundred animals." Leading candidates for the "fearsome beastie" are the amphibians, thought to be extinct; the pleseosaurs, an aquatic reptile also thought to be extinct; large eels; a seal-like creature and the sea cow. "A case can be made for each type."

Several major scientific groups are becoming interested and joining the hunt as the evidence jells, Mackal said. "The Loch Ness Investigation Bureau is delighted. Now it isn't so lonely out there. We welcome everyone with or without funds but we could use \$200,000 to build our monster trap.

# Loch Ness: The Logic Is There

DRUMNADROCHIT, Scotland - Alistair Stewart was sipping a pint of bitter at the Lewiston Arms and talking of Loch Ness. He is a sturdy, dark-haired man, a carpenter by trade. He has never seen the Loch Ness monster, but believes "you canna any more pass it as a joke."
"I'm no scientist," Mr. Stewart went on to say. "But I'm

told the north of Scotland is like an island moving slowly past the rest of Britain. Aye, and that's what it is a-happening there down in the loch, what makes it a strange place. Aye, a strange place."

Though no scientist, Mr. Stewart understood the accepted scientific explanation for the Great Glen of the Scottish highland, whose most famous feature is Loch Ness. It was here that members of the Academy of Applied Science/New York Times Loch Ness Expedition gathered last week to begin a photographic and sonar search for the legendary "beastie," as they say around here, in the hope of solving one of the earth's best-known natural mysteries.

For if there are in this world giant water creatures yet unknown, scientists can think of several natural circumstances, geologic and otherwise, that could account for them living in the deep and dark waters of Loch Ness.

Eons ago, a crack opened in the surface of the restless earth, causing a side-ways slippage of crust between the north and south of the Scottish highlands. The result is a northeast-southwest trending fault, visible as the beautiful 100-milc-long Great Glen. Through this rift valley, between steep green hills, stretches a navigable link between the North Sea and the Atlantic Ocean, a system of rivers, canals and lakes, called the Caledonian Canal, running from Moray Firth in the northeast to the Firth of Lorne in the southwest.

During the most recent ice age, a mass of ice perhaps a mile thick covered this region. When the ice melted, about 10,000 years ago, the sea rose, but so did Scotland, now that it was relieved of its great frozen burden. For a long time, Loch Ness, probably the entire Glen, was a salt-water strait. But as the land continued to rise, Loch Ness was reduced to being an estuary of Moray Firth. Finally, with the land reaching some 50 feet above sea level, as it has been for several thousand years now, the loch became effectively cut off from the sea.

There is a shallow river running a short distance from the loch to Moray Firth, at the city of Inverness. But this was not sufficient to prevent the loch from changing gradually from salt water to fresh. The runoff from the many rivers and burns, emptying into the loch, made the change

The result is the largest fresh water body by volume in the British Isles - 23 miles long, as much as a mile and a half wide, up to 975 feet deep in places but generally 700 feet deep along the fault line. It teems with trout, pike, sticklebacks, Arctic char, cels and salmon. But could there also be giant creatures inhabiting the loch?

#### Legends and Sightings

Legends abound, and hundreds of reported sightings in the last 43 years. If there is a Loch Ness monster of some sort, a common assumption is that it belongs to a family of creatures that got trapped when the loch was cut off from the sea and somehow managed to adapt to fresh water. Some 150 to 250 of their descendents could be there now, according to estimates based on what would be necessary to support a viable breeding population these many years.

Such adaptation is not impossible, according to Dr. Christopher McGowan, a zoologist of the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto and a member of the expedition. Many animals that live in estuaries, he said, can tolerate the wide fluctuations in salinity that come with the ebb and flow of the tides. How well an animal could make a permanent transition to fresh water would in many cases depend on its skin and kidneys.

The problem is that many sea creatures coming into fresh water become bloated, some more than others, through a higher absorption of water through the semi-permeable membrane of their skin. This is a breakdown in the process known as osmosis. They have evolved systems in which the water pressure inside their bodies was accustomed to the pressures of sea water outside, not fresh water.

But if there was time for evolutionary processes to operate. Dr. McGowan explained, it might be possible for creatures to adapt fairly impermeable skins to reduce the inflow and larger kidneys to flush their systems. He noted that in Lake Ontario the alewife, migrating from the sea through the St. Lawrence, have adapted to fresh water.

The lampreys now infesting the Great Lakes have successfully accomplished the same adaptation, and certain species of North American salmon, entirely landlocked in fresh water, are indistinguishable from their relatives who live in the sea, ascending rivers only to spawn.

Dr. Roy P. Mackal, a University of Chicago biochemist, points to a species of sea cows, a type of mammal sometimes associated with the monster, that has adapted to the Amazon and Orinoco Rivers in South America. This, he said, proves that sirenas (sea cows) can exist exclusively in fresh water, if necessary, and provides a parallel with Loch Ness and its phenomena." A similar parallel may exist in the fresh-water seals of Lake Baikal in Siberia.

Another theory is that the monsters could be survivors of prehistoric reptiles, such as the plesiosaur. The small head and long tapering neck of the monster, as reported by many eyewitnesses, make this an attractive speculation, even though the plesiosaur supposedly became extinct 70 million years ago. The discovery in 1938 of the coelacanth, also thought to have been extinct for millions of years. encouraged speculations about some prehistoric creatures

not being extinct after all, only very elusive.

Whatever it is that is called the Loch Ness monster, if it is a living creature, it must be able to survive the cold water a rather steady 42 degrees Fahrenheit at depth and not ever much warmer at or near the surface. Fresh water or marine molluscs — unusually large squids or sea slugs have been suggested as monster candidates - could live at such temperatures. One species of sea cows, now thought to be extinct, also could.

But scientists doubt that a fear of large monsters - if it is a parliament of owls and a pride of lions, should it not be a fear of monsters? - could exist as vegetarians. The dark peat-stained waters severely limit light penetration, restricting the supply of plankton that depends on photo-

synthesis for growth.

But there is presumably enough plankton in the food chain for fish, though no one has taken a careful census of fish life in the loch. Sonar studies have revealed some huge schools of fish, some at great depths. And as any loch fisherman knows, the salmon are abundant, the record catch being a 52-pounder. It is therefore assumed that the monsters are fish-eaters.

At least that is a basic assumption of the Academy of Applied Science/New York Times Loch Ness Expedition, led by Dr. Robert H. Rines of Boston. High-resolution cameras with bright lights are being lowered 40 feet down into Urquhart Bay, where the monsters may be congregating to feed off salmon swimming from the sea into their spawn-

# Cattle mutilations reported

Two cattle mutilations - the first in nearly a year - were reported in Weld County this week, sheriff's officers said.

The mutilations were reported at a rural Grover ranch and at a ranch near Orchard in east Weld County.

Floyd Ford of rural Orchard reported he found a mutilated cow on her side in a pasture Tuesday. The animal's eyes had been removed with smooth, clean cuts. Also removed were genitilia and the cow's anus.

Deputy Rick Dill said no tracks were found in the immediate area of the dead animal, but tracks similar to those left by a dog were found some distance away.

Dill said the remote pasture is accessible through only two points.

One of those entrances requires

traveling through a neighbor's yard and those neighbors didn't report anything unusual in recent days. The second entrance to the field is a gate which was nailed shut and hadn't been disturbed.

A similar incident was reported by Leo Harms on a ranch east of Grover.

Investigator Norm Boyd said Harms found a five-year-old cow on her side in a pasture. The cow's rectum, vagina, eye and left ear had been removed from the carcass with smooth cuts, Boyd said.

He said the skin on the cow's jaw had been removed. No tracks were found in the area.

Last summer saw a major rash of

cattle mutilations reported throughout Colorado's Front Range and other midwestern states. Weld County alone saw more than a dozen incidents reported to authorities.

In most cases, cows were found in remote areas and their genitilia and other portions of their bodies were removed with smooth, surgical strokes.

A major effort by the Colorado Bureau of Investigation and sheriffs throughout northeast Colorado wasn't successful in solving the mysterious mutilations.

Speculation about the mutilations has blamed them on a Satanic cult, travelers from outer space or predatory animals.

# Camera Spots No Monster, But Strange Wake Is Exciting

Drumradrochit, Scotland-The excitement of exploring the unknown must be tempered with the irregular hours and lack of sleep, the disappointments, the mundane details. the tedium of watching and waiting and never really knowing whether the reward will justify the effort.

Such is the case with the Academy of Applied Science Loch Ness Expedition and its quest for the strange and elusive creatures that are said to inhabit the Scottish lake.

Charles W. Wyckoff, the expedition's photographic coordinator, made a round trip to London the other day to have eight reels of 16-millimeter color film processed. This was the film exposed by the underwater elapsed-time camea, which has been

automatically snapping a picture every 15 seconds. It just might have photographed something interesting before the television camera went into operation.

Wyckoff began examining developed film the next morning, working in the kitchen of the cottage that serves as the shore station.

Jeffery Thomason, a Cambridge University zoology graduate, said that he saw "a wake, a large wake" about a mile from their boat. It could not have - marked,

been made by their boat, or any other in sight.

Dr. Christopher McGowan, of the Royal Ontario Museum, looking through binoculars, saw what appeared to be "a couple of blobs in amongst the wake," but before he could go below and get a camera thewake had vanished from sight,

## An Observer Of Loch Ness And 'Nessie'

Roy P. Mackal is a biochemist from the University of Chicago who 10 years ago made a trip to Scotland and became fascinated with the Loch Ness phenomenon and became a dedicated searcher after the "monster." Now he has written a book setting forth the evidence for concluding that unique creations. tures do exist in the cold Scottish lake. He was interviewed by Washington Star Staff Writer Vernon A. Guidry Jr.

Question: At the end of your decade of investigation, what do you think has caused the sightings and reports of a Loch Ness monster?

Mackal: My colleagues and I are convinced that the only explanation is animals. That's aside from my own experience, which really isn't scientific. I am the first to admit I was at the lake five years before I ever had an observation. I think the thing that turns a scientist on about something is that if you do a difficult problem more and more with better and better experiments and there's nothing to your hypothesis, eventually it just goes downhill. But if there really is something to your ideas, the more experiments you do, the more evidence you should get over the long run. That's what convinced me intellectually that there is something to this. We have a definite geographical this. We have a definite geographical location and we have a set of directions for experiments with sonar. That means that anybody with different kinds of gear, different designs, can go to Loch Ness, put in reasonable effort, time and money, and can make contact with these objects moving in the depths. It's reproducible. Do what we say and you get predictable results. We stand on that.

Q: Specifically, what do you think

A: By the time we had so much evidence that clearly could only be explained by a group of animals, we asked what kinds could they be. From the evidence, we had collected some 32 characteristics. The exercise was to look at the entire animal kingdom, living and extinct, to see which ones fit. It would be nice if we came up with just one. We did come up with a front-runner, but it's still a horse race.

#### Q: They are?

A: No. 1 is an amphibian, related to newts and salamanders, but very large, 20 feet, 2,500 pounds for the biggest. There's an example in the big salamanders that live in cold mountain lakes and streams in Japan. They get to be five or six feet. That's still not up to our 20 feet, but the same kind of thing is happening.

#### Q: What kind of thing?

A: These amphibians, their ancestors, were thought to be extinct 250 million years ago. We think they survived in these cold mountain lakes because the temperature is inhospitable to reptiles.

Q: And the reptiles therefore were not around to offer competition?

A: That's right. They were more efficient on land, so they did the amphibians in. Amphibiains returned to the water secondarily; some reptiles followed in warmer regions, but not in the northern temperate zone. This is in the northern hemisphere. It did-

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n't happen in the southern hemisphere becuase the ecological niches were already filled by carniverous fishes. That accounts for our distribution only be-tween 50 and 60 degrees north latitude.

Q: The other candidates?

A: Another is a giant, fat eel, but that's pretty hard to reconcile with the longer, thin neck of the animal, of which we have a pretty good picture. Giant eels are less likely contenders.

Q: In your book, you largely rule out the reptile in favor of the amphibian or eel. But some sentiment persists for reptiles?

A: There is the popular idea that these should be Plesiosaurus. These were aquatic reptiles with long heads and necks. Reasonably, one can infer that this is an adapation for eating fish. There isn't anything else down there. You know that's the food supply. The problem with reptiles is they don't like the cold temperatures. We've got 10 or 11 degrees above freezing all year round in Loch Ness. But we can't really be too certain about it. There are a few reptiles that seem to have made it in temperatures close to that, at least, for instance the leatherback turtle.

Q: You point out that statistically it doesn't do much good to stare at the surface hoping to see one, and that underwater observation and photography are hampered by peat particles clouding the dark water. Are there other reasons the loch has held on so tightly to its secret?

A: It's a normal situa-tion. People just haven't thought about the situation. Loch Ness is a deep cold lake. The legend about such lakes is that they never give up their dead. What it means is that if a lake is warm enough, bacteria produce decomposition gas which fills the carcass like a balloon, or parts of it, and it comes to the surface. In a cold lake, the gas is produced very slowly, it dif-fuses off. And animals like eels start to eat the carcass as soon as it stops moving. Another thing about Loch Ness: it's got steep sides. There are very minor cur-rents. The carcass if anything tends to be moved to the lowest points of the lake where the ooze is 70 feet

O: More and more scientists are taking your evi-dence and the Loch Ness animals seriously. Yet you say the stigma of the crack-pot still attaches. Why?

Q: You've also said that some scientists in trying to explain away your data have come up with explana-

A: Mainly we can at-tribute this to the idea that's its been made into a joke, and some people have gone out onto a limb proclaiming it is nonsense. They feel threatened if it turns out not to be non-

Q: Is what you're proposing outlandish?

A: What we're suggesting is not contrary to any known laws of zoology or physiology. It's in fact rather mundane if looked at objectively. The size of the animals, for example. They're smaller than the biggest fresh-water animals, which are the giant sturgeon in the Black Sea. Those get to be 30 feet long, some of the females, and they weigh 2,800 pounds. We're talking about our animals being 20 feet long and weighing 2,500 pounds, with many smaller animals.

Q: Is the climate changing?

A: In the old days, I was the only scientist who was a practicing professional who would get up in public and admit that he believed that the evidence indicated animals in the lake. Now we have half a dozen in our corner, and maybe more whom we haven't heard from. People that are well known. George R. Zug, curator of the division of reptiles and amphibians at the Smithsonian Institution; Chris McGowan of the Royal Ontario Museum. We were in London last December to present our case be-fore both houses of Parliament and other scientists. The reason we were in front of a governmental body was that the animals, while I don't think they are endangered, ought to be conserved. We don't want to stop research, but we want appropriate legislation to protect them, and this is what is being drafted. Since that time there has been a paper published in 'Nature.' That doesn't make it so, but it's the first time a really first-rate scientific journal has accepted something on that subject.

Q: Have you had any second thoughts along the way?

A: Not any more. In the old days, when I wasn't sure myself, and we didn't have enough evidence in my opinion to make such statements, then I had my second thoughts, that I should never have gotten into this. But I am delighted that the evidence has gelled and we have made our case. We A: Once ridicule has been can go on to the next step.

Q: If you do go on, is there a chance that we'll learn more, or less than we want to; that the reality won't live up to our fantasies about Loch Ness?

A: We think these are tions more tortured than animals that the fossil those seeking to put animal record says were extinct in the loch. Why? 250 million years ago. But 250 million years ago. But from the zoological viewpoint, these must be animals that arose from the line of ancestors which led to land animals which be-came warm-blooded. I think we're going to have a tremendous boost in our understanding of how this warm bloodedness arose when we get these animals because they are right on the pathway. I think we are going to find that these are somewhere in between.
They generate heat inside
the body by muscle action,
by metabolism. They retain this heat to maintain their body temperature above their environment but without the sophisticated mechanisms of temperature control that we find in higher mammals and birds.

Q: All this depends on capturing a live specimen. What is being done to get

A: It's a simple matter of pulling ourselves up by our bootstraps. Because of the ridicule, it's very hard to get funded. We do have a research plan all worked out including hardware and it's ready to go. It's waiting for funding. We expect to work two years at Loch Ness, six months of each year actually in the field. I'd like to emphasize that our trapping approach in no way involves killing an animal, even putting a hook into it or hurting them in any way. It means isolating one of them, say temporarily, for a few hours, so we can bring them to the sur-face, clearly photograph them, scrape a little skin, measure them, and so on. That's it. Then let him go.

Q: How much money would it take?

A: For everything, \$200,-000. One of the reasons for the book is to make our case so we can go to people with what we think is a sound basis. I'm convinced that with the vast interest, soon-er or later we're going to

Q: How many are in the lake?

A: We've tracked as many as five to eight to-gether. That's at the low end. Now the only way we can approach the upper end is to look at the food supply, and this has been a matter of controversy. A lot of armchair critics have categorically said there can't be large animals because there's not enough food. It's a lean lake. This neglects the migratory salmon. We can set the upper limit at can set the upper limit at say 400 to 500, which doesn't mean there are that many.
