

Amite County folks report similar UFOs

What were those mysterious lights in the skies over southwest Mississippi this past week? Several sightings of unidentified flying objects have been reported from Amite County, beginning Wednesday and continuing through Friday night. Ione Walsh of Liberty, who is tax assessor-collector for the county, said she and her family were driving along the Lower Centreville Road Wednesday night about 7 when they saw a large, lighted object "as wide as my house. It was all lit up like a moving Christmas tree." She said it appeared to move low, very slowly, made a whining sound, and seemed to be flanked by other, smaller objects resembling helicopters. Five persons were with her at the time, and all saw it, she said. She said her son George Riley, who lives south of Liber-

ty, apparently saw the same object or objects Thursday night, and reported them to the air force base at Alexan-dria, La. Officials there reportedly said they knew nothing about it, but said they wanted to know if it were seen again.

Meanwhile, in the Bewelcome community five miles east of Gloster, Lynn and Rita Taylor reported seeing an object like the one the Walshes saw.

Taylor described the object as "tremendously big," and guessed that it flew some 400 feet above the ground. Formerly in the Air Force, Taylor said it did not look or sound like conventional aircraft. He and his wife saw the object "off and on" Wednesday night from 8 until 9:40, and again at 6:30 p.m. Thursday. He said he has talked with friends, neighbors and relatives who saw the object as recently as Friday night. "Tve always been the type that, if somebody said they

saw something like that, I'd say, 'Aw, go on,'' Taylor said. "But that night when I stood out there with my hair standing up on the back of my neck I had a different attitude

He confirmed Mrs. Walsh's account that the large craft seemed to have smaller ones around it. He said it at first approached with great speed, then went very slowly.

Taylor and Mrs. Walsh suggested the sightings may be of objects similar to those sighted in south Amite County

a few years ago. None of those who reported seeing the objects this past

None of those who reported seeing the objects this past week expressed any great fear. "I'd like to see it again," said Mrs. Walsh. Said Taylor, "I'll say this: I thoroughly enjoyed it." He said he and his wife Rita have watched for the UFO again nightly. "Rita's about got a sore throat from wat-ching for it every night," he quipped.

Officers encounter strange lights in S.D. sky

Gary Myers has read a little science fiction in his day, but it didn't pre-pare him for his night shift in the desolate hills of Bennett County, S.D., on Tuesday.

When Myers, a Martin City police officer, and Bennett County sheriff's deputy Tom Jensen came on duty Tuesday, Sheriff Ed Rolfe asked them to drive into the hills to check out several reports from ranchers of strange lights in the southwestern

There had been five reported sight-

ings in the past few weeks, Myers said Thursday, and the sheriff was curious

A short time later Myers was stand-ing on a dark hill, clutching his shot-gun, while Jensen was nervously calling into headquarters on his ra-dio. About 150 yards away, a large array of red and white lights floated silently in the air, Myers said.

The two officers were involved in what UFO researchers call a close encounter of the first kind — mean-ing they were within 200 yards of an unexplained "phenomenon."

J. Allen Hyneck, founder of the Cen-

ter for UFO Studies at Northwestern University, saidhe has already inter-viewed the officers and the ranchers and is impressed with the sighting.

"If it gets any more exciting, I'll have to come out there," Hyneck said.

"If either one of us had been out there alone," Myers said of the en-counter, "we wouldn't have told any-body about it because we'd get branded as crazy

"We didn't take this seriously at all,¹¹ he said as he and Jensen prepared to head into the hills again, this time armed with a tape recorder, binogu-

lars and a camera. "We thought it (the UFO reports) was a hoax, a joke."

Just after 10 p.m. Tuesday, at the time ranchers said the UFO usually appears, "we got out on top of a hill," Myers said.

It was a clear, starry night and he could see the lights of one town 20 miles to the north and another about 30 miles to the south. The officers scanned the horizon for about 10 minutes and didn't see anything but stars and distant town lights, Myers

"We got back in the patrol car, drove about 2 or 3 miles down a dirt road and stopped on another hill," he said. 'We looked back and there were two

we tooked back and there were two lights, a bright white one on the right and a dimmer red one on the left, about 100 to 200 feet in the air right over the position we'd been parked in before," Myers said.

"It was spooky. We stood there dis-cussing it. They started moving toward us at a slow rate of speed about 100 yards to the south of the road. After it got halfway to us, he (Jensen) got on the radio and started describing it to the dispatcher."

When the lights were within a half-mile, he said, "the big light shut off." Myers said he grabbed his shotgun and watched as the remaining light moved directly parallel of his squad car, about 150 yards to the south.

"It had three or four white lights on "It had three of four white lights on its side, four red lights on the back and we could still see the lights on the front," he said. At that point, he said, "it struck me that we weren't hearing any sound. None at all."

After hovering silently for about two After novering stiendy for about two minutes, he said, "it appeared to accelerate fairly rapidly to the southeast. When it did that we heard a low jet engine type of sound for five or 10 seconds, then it cut off. It was very quiet."

Myers said neither he nor Jensen could make out any structure or shape behind the lights during the 10-minute "encounter.

"We radioed to a state trooper and told him to go to Hwy. 18 (to the southeast) to try to see it, but he didn't see it," Myers said.

The two officers drove quickly to Clayton Merchen's ranch, "and without even discussing the pattern of lights we'd seen, they described the same thing."

The Merchens are one of the fam-ilies that has reported seeing the lights several times in the past few weeks. Myer said he patched through a call to Ellsworth Air Force Base in Rapid City and asked them if they hed evelopment in the one of the set of they had any aircraft in the area

Air controllers at the base said they had no aircraft in the area and even turned up their radar to scan the area of the sighting. Myers said, but reported no sightings

Jensen was less inclined to talk about the encounter, but said he was heading back to the spot Thursday night "because I want to know what that was. It was spooky."

At least eight persons saw a well-lighted unidentified flying object, described as resembling the machine in the movie "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," hovering in the sky east of Alcalde tuesday night, slowly moving in a large arc, then tading from view. "It was a classic. It was just like Close Encounters," Mel Medina, owner of Mel's Country Store in Alcalde, said Tuesday night, just after viewing the machine. Medina said his watch read 7:10 p.m. when he first saw the UFO. He had just returned home from work, and he and his wife, Diane Griego, were sit-ting on their patio when they noticed it. His wife called his father, Joe Medina, who lives nearby, and the trio watched the UFO for a bout 20 minutes. Frank Montez in nearby Los Luceros reported serief time between 7 and 8 Tuesday evening. "Whatever it was, I know one thing. It was no plane. It was no helicopter," Montez said of the object. He said he called his wife tolook, too, after he spotted the object, but all she saw was what looked like "a very bright light" fading into the distance. Both sightings were to the east of Alcalde. Medina said he watched the UFO through a pair of binoculars and wouldn't relinquish the binoculars to his wife or his father, though in retrospect, he existed to the naked eye, he said. "I was so thrilled that I saw what I always knew was up there!" Medina said. "It was too bad more

people weren't there to share the experience."
What he watched, he said, appeared to be a "mother ship" which served as home base for "a little red light" which at first was on top of the UFO and then would fly away and return. The UFO made "a rumbling sound, not real loud, like the surf in the ocean," he said.
"At first, I thought it was a plane," he said, explaining that he was puzzled at first by two extremely bright lights, "like headlights." It was dusk when he first sighted the machine, he said, and through the binoculars, it was a metallic silver color, "like aluminum."
At first, he said, the machine hovered in one place and turned, giving him a view of different sides of it. Seven bright lights surrounded it, he said. He reported it to the State Police, and in that report, he said it was "football shaped." "It was about the size of two 747s," Medina estimated.
After hovering, he said, it moved toward him and his family, made a "gigantic Uturn," and took off toward the Truchas Peaks, where it gradually faded from view. The red light, detached from the main object, followed it and also eventually disappeared.

main object, followed it and also eventually disap-peared. "The U turn was very, very slow," he said, and all three sighters had "good visual contact" from 7:10 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. "It was amazing!" When he first saw the "two huge lights," Medina thought, "Why is it so big? Why is it so low," and then it turned sideways and he saw the other lights. State police had reports of the UFO sighting from three other observers in addition to the Medinas and the Montezes, bring the total number of viewers to eight.


"Ellington described every kind of aircraft they have to me, but none of the descriptions fit

Lonely Encounter

It's a lonely stretch of interstate between Pittsfield and Newport no rest areas, no houses, no lights from nearby farms. Last Monday, (March 26), at 7:15 p.m. it was even lonelier. I could see no taillights up ahead, no on-coming lights either in my rear view mirror or in the op-posite lanes. Maybe it was this spooky aspect of the drive which caused to stop thinking about a writing assignment and look, REALLY LOOK, at two very bright lights, suspended motionless over the trees just up ahead on my right.

My first thought was, of course, that these were stars, but a quick glance in the other direction at the night sky showed the folly of that conclusion. The stars were small and white and high and twinkly as stars should be. These two lights were low, large and yellowish. As I drove toward them, they did not recede as the moon or stars seem to do in relation to a moving vehicle. While very bright and big, they did not five off a ray or beam of light — the tops of the trees and the woods around them were still dark. They did not waver or fluctuate and were not moving — either in relation to me or in relation to each other. I have seen approach and flight lights on private planes and helicopters, and these were neither. By now I was alarmed. My options were nil. I could not turn around and go home because of the divided highway. I certainly did not want to stop and "wait it out." I recalled an episode some years ago in Madison when a lighted object somehow stopped car motors and temporarily stranded the occupants. My immediate goal, then, was to get off that road as fast as possible

During this thought sequence, several minutes had passed. Up ahead I could see the sign indicating the Newport exit was two miles. I decided to drive as fast as I could, hoping that if the motor quit, momentum would get me that two miles! I was also hoping for a State Police car with flashing blue lights, but none appeared. By this time, I was at a critical point, as I had to pass in front of the lights which were still there, hanging or hovering mostill there, hanging or novering mo-tionless, over the trees. I drove past, and looked out the passenger side window for what was my last view of them — for they suddenly went out. They didn't turn and fly away into the night sky; they did not set-tle down into a field. They simply WENT OUT. At first I was reliaved WENT OUT. At first I was relieved. Later it occurred to me that they might still have been there - just no longer visible.

As I crossed the bridge over the highway and drove into Newport, I glanced back again to that stretch of road. There was nothing there. I went on to the meeting, and heard very little. My mind was occupied with the return drive to Pittsfield The interstate seemed quicker, and for some reason, safer, than the back road. I waited on the approach ramp until I could see some tractor trailers, and I positioned myself in between them. Once home, panic settled in. I felt strange telling my family about this experience, and I got some of the to-be-expected remarks about little green men and strange noises. The next morning, my curiosity got the best of me, and I called Robin Duplisea at the Department of Public Safety in Pittsfield. Although she had receiv ed no reports of anything unusual

the night before, she suggested that I call the Newport police. The dispatcher there told me about the reported sightings over the weekend along the coast. At first I felt better — other rational, normal people had seen something unusual - although seen sometring unusual — although what they saw was vastly different from what I had seen. Then it fur-ther unnerved me to realize that there are "things" out there to be

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seen — things that are not easily explained. I was given a number to call — Brunswick Naval Air Station. I had several detailed conversations with personnel there - but no explanations, no conjecture. This experience, for all it frighten-

April ed me, has been positive. I SAW something that night — something unusual and interesting and present-ly unexplained. I believe that there 5 are things and events and conditions that science does not yet understand and can not explain at this point. I suspect that our government knows more than it is saying. I am looking forward now to the publication later this spring of a new book based on court-obtained government documents. I hope there will be B Greenwood answers in the near future. Seeing those eerie lights under unnatural conditions has made me appreciate the safety I normally enjoy and take for granted. I will be tolerant in the future of people who report strange "things." I will read with less skepticism reports of UFO sightings. And I WILL NOT drive on I-95 from Pittsfield to Newport after dark and alone for a long time!

The sighting of a strange lighted craft in the Fessenden area, reported in last week's Free Press, has been corroborated by another Fessenden man who was in the country north of town at the same time in the same evening, and "saw the same thing.

The man, who wishes to be anonymous, was driving north on the black top at about 8:00 p.m. on Jan. 4. When he had reached the top of the hill on the north side of the James River he noticed what appeared to be headlights on the road a couple miles ahead. As he drew closer, he observed that the lights were not moving, and he assumed that a car was stopped on the bridge crossing the New Rockford Canal. When he was less than a quarter mile south of the canal, "it took off to the east" according to the observer. It appeared to follow the canal at an altitude of perhaps 100 feet. "In fact, I doubt that it was that high," he said. It remained at that altitude until it appeared to rise to go over an abandoned farmstead about a mile to the east. It turned toward the south there and he lost sight of it. It was approximately at that point, and from that direction, that the two men reported on last week first saw the object. They followed it to the southeast to Emrick, then east to Highway 52, then north where they last saw it near Fessenden.

There are two differences in the reports. The first report included a flashing red light when the object was

viewed from the side or the rear, whereas no red light was noted by the second observer. The first observers reported being unable to hear any sound from the object, perhaps due to the wind. When the most recently reported sighting was made, the observer got out of his car and could hear a rushing sound which he characterized as "Shhhhhhhhh." "But it wan't like a tot." he deded

"But it wasn't like a jet." he added. One of the observers in the first report had seen such an object two years ago and at that time had also heard what he described as a buzzing or humming sound. Like the first observers, the second

is most certain of what it wasn't. "It wasn't an airplane or a helicopter. he insisted. He couldn't speculate on what it was

"It was the most beautiful thing I've ever seen in my life. If I was going to die, this would have been the perfect time," Bernice Glor said

said. Glor, 72, saw an unidentified fly-ing object about 5 a.m. today, hovering near her apartment at 2406 Springdale Rd. She said she was bashful to tell anyone about it, fearing "they'd think I was off my rocker." But the light that twinkled and suddenly wooshed away was so beautiful she had to call the Freeman to see if anyone else saw it.

"I've never thought about UFOs before," she said. "But I definitely saw this."

She saw it when she got up at about 5 a.m. and looked out her apartment's windows. "I saw this light," she said. "It was twinkling, and it was the most beautiful light I've ever seen. It was too big to be a star. It was as big as a small living room, and it was about 30 feet off the ground and about three-quarters of a block away.

"It fascinated me. If it had been on the ground I would have walked to it. All of a sudden it sounded like a motor started and these red and blue lights came on. It just sort of glided west and then sort of north."

Glor said she had seen something like it about two weeks ago. But this was the first time she saw it take off. The round object was silent until a motor gave off a kind of "shoosh," she said. "It was like someone tak-ing a lid off something that was

she said. If was like someone tak-ing a lid off something that was under pressure." She said it couldn't have been a plane or helicopter. "It was all light," she said. She and her husband Edmund have lived in the apartment for about a year. Nothing like this has ever happened to her. "It sure makes you feel funny to report something like this," she said. "But I told my husband, 'Maybe heaven is sending some-thing down here to warn us." Walter Andrus, the international director of the Mutual UFO Net-work in Austin, Texas, said the sighting was similar to many reports received by the network from all over the world. He doubted it was an aircraft because they don't have blue lights.

By SHIRLEY HALLETT "Whatever you do, don't let anyone convince you that you're go-

ing crazy." "Don't let anyone tell you that you're nuts. I think there is no doubt you saw what you claim; the pattern in so stereotype." "Don't begin to doubt that you saw what you did."

These were typical comments that we received after my article "Lonely Encounter" was printed recently in The Valley Times. I was in Boston that week at a writer's conference. When I returned home there had been several phone calls from local people who had seen "things" during the past few years; "things" which were not easily ex-plainable; "things" which had been very scary. Some followed up their sighting, as I had done, by checking with the police and getting involved with the formal end of it. Most, however, were so terrified that they told only their spouse or a close friend. Some had told no one until they told me. All wish that they had not had the experience. In addition to these calls, I heard from several people who asked questions, and not a few who wished that they might a few who wished that they might have a similar experience – among them a State trooper from Skowhegan, a chemist friend from Pennsylvania, and our own famous local science-fiction writer, William Forstchen!

My experience was tame com-pared to some of the stories I have heard. One college student, traveling on a back road, found his way

blocked by a lighted spherical object. This was several years ago, yet he is still very reluctant to talk about it Another well-respected resident told of a lighted vaporous tube "birthing" an object which then followed them down an isolated section of I-95 late one night, not long ago. Two professional women were forced to dodge a glowing disc for several miles - it would appear in front of them, **disappear** momen-tarily, then reappear in back of - all the time casting an unthem natural and scary light around their car. Several people reported seeing strange lights hovering over the trees near Ell Hill, one over a lake on several occasions, one in a field. A news reporter for a Bangor TV station told about a bright disc overhead — it hovered over his car for some period of time, during which the radio and lights were knocked out.

While these calls pleased me because they were all supportive and informative, they were, never-theless, scary. What ARE these lights — these apparitions — these happenings? I am now reading widely – everything from personal accounts of sightings to highly technical books and government assessments of the situation. I have written to several of the authors, although there has not been time yet for replies. I have talked with a "retired" fighter pilot who told of in-cidents that made my straight hair curl! I have talked with a research chemist who doubted the conclu

sions put forth by a UMO astronomy sions put forth by a UMO astronomy professor, and I spoke at length with that professor, whose only comment of substance was, "You're making good observations. Be sure to get back to me if you have any other ex-periences like this," I have discounted my own observations at times, and I have tried to forget what I saw. I have wished that I had stayed home that night. I want to know what it was that I saw - I want to know everything there is to know about this phenomenon. I wish that it had never happened to me, and I'm glad that it did. I want to forget all about it, but I want to persist and follow through until I have settled some of these questions in my own mind. I enjoy the new contacts that I have made, and I fear them. I am looking forward to my copy of the latest book on the sub-ject, and I fear it.

So at this point, three weeks later. I have more questions and sense more uneasiness than at first. Each day I get up with the thought, "Well, I wonder what new thing will hap-pen today." And each night I go to bed thinking, "Well, how does this new information fit into the scheme of things as I now understand it?" I wonder sometimes why this has become so important in my life. Most of the time I don't wonder this was unsought, unwanted, and un-asked for. It happened to me, to us as a family, for a purpose. I want to know what that purpose is.

Darrell Evans was one of the Giants' hottest hitters in their 1962 stretch drive, and his 30-homer sea-son in 1963 led to a rich, free-agent contract with the Detroit Tigers. Af-CA

Af-ter his second three-run homer of the season staked the Tigers to a 5-1 victory over Texas in their home opener Tuesday, Evans said that his rejuvenation started with a UFO sighting at his Pleasanton home in 1982. San

"Soon after that, things turned around," he said. "During that time, it was something you think about rather than feel sorry for yourself," which Evans had been doing as he moved among first base, third base, shortstop and the Giants' bench. He was approaching the final war of CHRONICLE was approaching the final year of his contract, and the Giants had said nothing about a new one.

So he was contemplating his So he was contemplating his baseball future as he and his wife, LaDonna, sat on the back porch of their home that summer night. Sud-denly, they saw an object 30 feet wide, triangular in shape, with no wings ("It was more like a flying wing," Evans said) and with green and red lights on each side and white lights in back.

"There was no sound," Evans recalled. "It was 100 yards away, right over my neighbor's house. It was there maybe a minute, a minute and a half."

Skeptics insisted it was an air-plane, which would be logical, since there is a small field within sight of Evans' yard. But he doesn't buy explanation

"My wife was a stewardess," Ev-ans says, "so she knows what an airplane looks like. My dad works for NASA. He's one of the best men in his field. I've always been inter-ested in aircraft and outer space."

At LaDonna's suggestion, went to get his camera to take a picture of the craft. "But as soon as I got up it sort of tilted. It was like, 'Yeah, you see us, but you're not 'Yeah, you see us, but you're going to take a picture of us,' said.

By the time Evans retrieved his camera, the object was getting out of camera range. Then it was gone.

" 'Close Encounters' was one of my favorite movies," Evans said, ac-knowledging that he's been accused of seeing it once too often

"I believe there is something out there," he said. "And if there are, they've been out there longer than we have. They've evolved be-yond war; they've got through it and they want to come and show us how. I hope it happens."

Evans said the experience "definitely helped my career. It gave me something to think about besides myself. It sparked things for me."

Woman Reports, 'I Met Gal Who . . . Claimed To Be an Alien' Society Says UFO Skepticism Is Fading

By UPI A creature "3 ½ to 4 feet tall with a highly oversized, invert-ed pear-shaped head, wrap-around eyes, a little nose with two holes and a slit for a mouth," was described yester-day to a rapt audience. National UFO investigator Ray Fowler said the descrip-tion fits the alien most com-monly described by people re-porting so-called "close encounters of the third kind."

Fouler, an investigator for the Mutual UFO Network, de-scribed the being to about 75 people at a workshop on UFOs, sponsored by the Society for Psychic Research of New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

Hampshire and Massachusetts. Although participants at the all-day session reported no per-sonal encounters with alien be-ings, about half raised their hands when asked if they had ever sighted a UFO. About five people described what they said were spiritual or psychic contacts with extra-terrestrial beings. Gail Triff of Manchester said she has connections with "brothers" not from Earth Triff said she first became in-terested in UFOs and allens

terested in UFOs and allens

when she met "Linda" in Bos-ton. "In 1974 I met a gal. Linda, who was on the radio and claimed to be an alien," she

said. "I got to be friends with her," Triff said. "I believe it was her father who was an alien and her mother was from this plan-et." Triff reported observation

her mother was from this plan-et." Triff reported observing the father's spaceship land in Gloucester, Mass. The Manchester woman would not reveal her job, ex-plaining she was afraid she would be fired for linking her place of employment with UFOS. Eowler and Peter Coromia Fowler and Peter Geremia.

New Hampshire investigator for MUFON, said fear of public reaction is common among those who see UFOs, or uniden-tified flying objects.

"The people who have had the sightings are very afraid of ridicule. Once I can assure them of confidentiality, the full story comes out," Geremia Said

He noted studies show most people believe life may exist on other planets.

said he hears of Geremia about six UFO sightings in New Hampshire annually. In line with national statistics, he said 80 percent are later explained, usually as either aircraft or celestial bodies.

Fowler, who has written four books on UFOs, said about 100 sightings a day are reported worldwide. A program director at GTE

A program director at GTE Sylvannia, Fowler said he sees skepticism on extra-terrestrial life fading. Unlike 15 years ago, people he works with are now "very interested" in his work, he said.

"Enough accidents have af-fected equipment" that "high-level" employes are beginning to be notice, according to to take notice, according to Fowler

Fowler. A stint with the U.S. Air Force in the 1950s prompted the Wenham, Mass., resident to work on UFO investigations. "I learned (military) UFO re-ports were being channelled over (high-security) crypto-graphic lines" in the Air Force, he said. He said the government was

He said the government was "publicly saying (UFOs) don't exist, but privately, it was an-

other thing." UFO sightings have been concentrated heavily around


high-security military opera-tions, according to Fowler. He said the government thus has "no choice but to consider UFOs a high potentional threat to national security." More openness by the gov-ernment would help people "at least realize they aren't going stark raving mad," Fowler suggested.

stark raving mad, rowier suggested. Norm Gauthier, founder and director of the Society for Psy-chic Research, said UFO re-search is of interest to his organization because the Society tries "to get to know more about ourselves and our world. "It (psychic research) is

about ourselves and our world. "It (psychic research) is something totally unexplained and not necessarily accepted by the scientific community," according to Gauthier, who said he has researched more than 140 haunted buildings in the United States. The Society is like a "Weight Watchers" or support group for people interested in psychic things, according to its found-er.

er. "At a meeting with people with the same open-minded-ness and willingness to explore, you can gain inner strength and realize you're not an oddball at all "

CEDARBURG - A Cedarburg woman who claims to have seen an unidentified flying object here in December was featured last Thursday on More, the WISN-TV hour magazine program. The woman, who wishes to remain anonymous, was westbound on Pioneer Road near the I-43 on-ramp on Dec. 7 when she claims she saw "the big-gest, brightest light I have ever seen in my life." She was returning home to her apartment with her two children, ages 13 and 7. In a telephone conversation with a Cedarburg Police dispatcher shortly after the alleged sighting, the woman desribed the UFO as "round, but not perfectly round."

"It's rare to have a sighting reported in Wiscon-sin," said Schmitt, who noted only one or two reports a year. Two or three sightings are reported worldwide on a daily basis, according to Schmitt.

A dozen people report UFO over foothills near Chimayo

SANTA FE (AP) — The sight-ing of an unidentified flying ob-ject over the Rio Arriba County oscimunity of Chimayo last week hus been described as one of the be t in many years.

About a dozen people along the Rie Grande Valley in New Mexi-co have reported to state police and other authorities that they saw a lighted object hovering over the foothills near Chimayo, nerth of Santa Fe, April 24. John Warren, a physicist at Les Alamos National Laboratory and the designated investigator for the Mutual UFO Network, said the urusual event may be the best in the area in years. "I haven't seen a better one in a long time," said Warren, who has been following UFO sightings for the international or-ganization for about eight

"It was a real unidentified fly-ing object," he said. "Now our problem is trying to determine its size and its exact location."

Warren said Thursday that he has interviewed most of the peo-ple who saw the unusual event and should be able to determine the size, location and elevation of the UFO within a week.

the UFO within a week. Among those who saw the UFO were Mel and Diana Medina of Alcalde, who were sitting on their patio at about 7 p.m. the night of the sighting. "It looked very much like a commercial jetliner coming in for a landing," Mel Medina said. "The first thing that came across my mind was, "What the hell is that thing doing there?"" The flying, lighted object con-tinued to move in spurts to the west, occasionally hovering over

the Chimayo area, and Mel Me-dina said it was emitting a hum-ming noise. Diane Medina said she called her father-in-law next door, who brought over a pair of binocu-lars. Through the glasses, the ob-ject appeared to be football-shaped, with a red light that ap-peared to be searching the skies, she said. she said.

Mary and Crestino Barela were on their way home to Chi-mayo from Espanola when they saw the object.

Evans described it as about 20 yards across, 15 yards deep and he said it glowed. "My wife told me to go get the camera, but

when I started to, it gave kind of a wiggle to say, 'No, this is just for you.'" The UFO then disappeared, Evans said, but

Lorenzen and her husband Jim are founders of the oldest and largest UFO research organization in the world. Aerial Phenomena Research Organization Inc. was founded in 1952 in Sturgeon Bay, Wis, and is now based in the couple's home in Tucson. The organization has 1.200 members worldwide

The Lorenzens also have authored seven books dealing with aerial phenomena. The books are now considered classics in the field of UFO-ology, Coral said.

APRO conducts serious, scientific research into the UFO "problem," Jim said.

Why do they call it a problem?

"When something which obviously is a physical object is able to fly through our atmosphere at tremendous speeds and execute maneuvers which are outside our laws of physics and can out-distance and out-maneuver the best aircraft we have, and when the government doesn't know what they are, then I think we've got a problem," Coral said.

APRO's team includes 350 to 400 field investigators who conduct the initial probes when a UFO sighting is reported.

The investigators weed out the hoaxes and explainable sightings

and send the unexplained ones to APRO headquarters.

In addition, APRO has 30 consulting panels in the biological sciences, medical sciences, physical sciences and social sciences whose members are called upon to aid in the investigations.

In addition to investigating UFO sightings, the organization puts out a monthly newsletter and operates "I saw one," she said matter-of- a 24-hour UFO sighting report hot-

"A few people have called in and they are petrified. They have always thought before that these things don't exist and all of a sudden they are confronted with this on a dark road, late at night. It takes 10 to 15 minutes to calm them '

Most of the reports of UFO sightings are explained.

"If you take all the reports we hear about, then I'd say probably 80 percent to 85 percent of those are explained," Coral said.

Often the sighting turns out to be someone seeing a planet for the first time, or the object is identified as some kind of aircraft, based on the arrangement of the lights, apparent size, frequency of the sightings and the path it takes through the sky.

But of the 15 percent to 20 percent that field investigators label unexplained and send to the Lorenzens for further investigation, 80 percent to 90 percent remain unexplained and are labeled true UFOs, she said.



On May 21, 1952, Coral saw what she calls her most impressive UFO sighting.

"It was impressive in terms of what I saw, how long I saw it and how many people saw it with me," she said.

She said she had just come out of a drugstore in Sturgeon Bay when a lady ran up to her and told her that there was a UFO. She looked up toward the northeast and saw a silver cigar-shaped object.

"People were all up and down the street looking into the northeast sky," she said. The object was in sight for more than 40 minutes and more than 300 people saw it.

Coral and the local police estimated that the object was about 640 feet in diameter and was hovering 25 miles above the earth.

In earlier years, Coral had written to many people who had reported seeing UFOs. Someone suggested that she start a newsletter and, using her correspondence list as a beginning. Coral did just that

"We started out with a mimeographed newsletter and cranked it out on the kitchen table." Jim said.

From there, the organization grew to more than 4,000 members in the 1960s. The group had a public office on North Country Club Road from 1969 to 1981.

It was at that office that Coral sighted her fourth UFO. The Lorenzens and six or seven APRO members were in the office one summer night in 1973 when they received a phone call about a UFO. They went outside and watched a red object for 10 to 12 seconds before "it just blinked out," Coral said.

Jim also saw the object that night, but does not think it was a UFO

"It moved in a circle several times," he said. "I thought it could have been a remote-controlled device that someone was operating."

Coral's last sighting took place in March 1981 in the parking lot of Fry's Food Store at 290 W. Fort Lowell Road while she was waiting for Jim to come out of the store. She saw a small white ball that "almost looked like a pearl in the sky." Coral said.

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It moved from the north and disappeared into the southeast, penetrating the clouds. Based on the type of c said, the of clouds in the sky, Coral the object was about four said, the object was miles above the ground.

"For me to see something four miles away, it had to have been a good-sized object," she said.

Each of these sightings was acci-dental, she said.

Her husband, on the other hand, has not had any such encounters with UFOs. He said his interest in UFOs and involvement in APRO are both a result of his wife's initial interest.

"I mainly got involved because I was married to her," Jim said. "I think there are a lot of unknown things in the universe and I'm curi-ous "

He and his wife both believe that UFOs are extraterrestrial in origin and that the beings are here to re-search and investigate the earth.

"We are largely convinced that they are extraterrestrials and they have been around for thousands of years, at the very least 50,000 years," Coral said.

She thinks that the 1945 explosion of the atomic bomb prompted these beings to come and check up on us

Their visits have followed a pattern, she said

"It started with what appears to be a mapping expedition," Coral said. The beings then seemed to be checking military and power instal-lations and conducting resource

Coral said UFO sightings are frequent in Arizona and New Mexico and she speculated that this is because of the number of military bases in the two states.

She believes beings aboard the UFOs are rational and are conducting some kind of scientific exploration.

"They are after something," Coral said. "I think in terms of an objective, scientific project, possi-bly a record-taking.

"Possibly they have not taken a look at us in a couple thousand years and now they are taking a look."

Jim believes that they are here for purposes of their own and have not made contact with us because they do not consider us peers.

"Real explorers and investiga tors, unless they are dealing with peers, don't try to make contact," Jim said.

"If they did make contact with us, it would be a big cultural shock for us," he said. "Avoiding contact may be the kindest thing they can do for us."

There have been reports of peo-Inere have been reports of peo-ple being abducted by extraterres-trials who conducted scientific ex-periments on the captives, but Coral thinks the abduction phase is over

"I don't think we have had a legitimate abduction case in two or three years," she said.

The first abduction report was made in 1955 and in the years following, such reports increased.

"I think the large number of ab-ductions were in the 1950s and '60s," Coral said. "A lot of abduc-tions came to light, but a lot were boave." hoaxes.'

The abductions have tapered off since the 1960s because "they have finished their job," she said. "That would be logical from a human standpoint.

"I think they are on a time limit. When they complete a project, that's it," Coral said.


Interest in UFOs has waned in the last few years, and this was one the last few years, and this was one of the reasons APRO closed its pub-lic office in 1981. The Lorenzens at-tribute this decrease in interest to the rash of UFO-related produc-tions like "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and "E.T."

"It seemed to give all the answers," Coral said. "When you an-swer a question, whether it's right or wrong, people tend to accept it."

"(The movies) were not very factual," Jim said, "but it was emo-tionally satisfying and soothing to many people and they lost interest in the subject."

But the Lorenzens have not lost interest.

"The research on this subject is not over," Coral said. "We still don't know their motives."

Arizonan 'beamed aboard' UFO is bitter about the experience

"I'm writing a book," Travis Walton said, "and I'll tell you what it's not about — it's not about UFOS."

It has been nearly a decade since Walton shocked the state with his account of being abducted and held captive in a UFO for five days. captive in a UFO for five days. Today, Walton is trying to put that behind him and live a normal life with his wife Dana and three chil-

"It "It was a pretty rough time in my life," he recently recalled. Walton still lives in Snowflake, a

small town of 3,510 people about 160 miles north of Tucson

No one talks about the UFO inci-dent anymore, but "I don't think they have forgotten about it," he said.

They have not forgotten the story that began the evening of Nov. 5, 1977. Walton and six other loggers were in the Apache-Sit-greaves National Forest near greaves National Forest near Heber when they saw a glowing object.


According to news accounts, Walton jumped out of the truck they were in and started walking toward the object. As he ap-proached, a shaft of light lifted Walton from the ground and ap-parently "beamed" him aboard.

The loggers fled and reported the U.S. Forest Service personnel, members of the Navajo County Sheriff's posse, and friends and rel-atives searched the area of Wal-ton's disappearance, but nothing turned up.

Five days later, Walton's brother and brother-in-law found him at a and blocket-infaw found firm at a gas station in Heber, about 50 miles west of Snowflake, from where he had telephoned his family. Walton told them he had been held captive aboard the UFO by hairless beings, about five feet tall, with large eyes and small noses, mouths and ears, and dressed in loose-fitting coveralls.

Walton wrote a book about the incident "to set the record straight," he said. "The Walton Experience" was published in 1976.

He now thinks he might pursue a writing career, but says he will



take it one step at a time.

Walton was more close-mouthed about his new book than about the UFO incident.

"It is kind of like a painting," he said. "An artist doesn't want you to look at a painting until it is finished. That's why I don't want to talk about it." said.

But he did talk about wanting to move out of Snowflake. He said he would pick up and leave right now but cannot because of financial rea-

A hint of anger crept into his voice as he talked about the people of Snowflake.

"They think they know me, but they really don't. They have a con-cept of me but they don't have any idea what I'm really like," he said. He remembers a man who told reporters that if the beings in the UFO were looking for a perfect specimen to study then they would surely bring Walton back. But Wal-ton said this man had never lived in the town and did not know Walton.

"He doesn't know what he's talking about," he said.

The townspeople also do not un-derstand what happened to him, Walton said.

"They just haven't experienced it. They are not in a position to know what I know. I know what happened. They can draw conclu-sions and come up with theories,

but they are just shooting in the dark," he said.

"There is a general consensus of opinion, but they don't know the truth," Walton said.

Walton worries about his chil-dren growing up in Snowflake. He has two sons, aged 5 and 1, and a 3-year-old daughter.

Walton has tried to shelter his children, especially his older son from the stories about the UFO incident.

"It's just not the kind of thing a kid can know and not cause a prob-lem later. When he gets older I'll explain it to him," he said.

"I can't break it to them gently. It is best left until they have a cer-tain degree of maturity."

Walton said that people have al-ready said things to his older son.

"It doesn't seem to bother him," he said. "He's not old enough yet."

The effect of the abduction on his though. It helped to bring Walton and the woman who now is his wife together.

She is a long-time resident of Snowflake and Walton had dated her before the UFO incident.

"The possibility of losing me made her realize what I meant to her," Walton said.

He said that friends reacted negatively to her decision to him

"Her faith in me was considered naive," Walton said. They have been married for six years.

His UFO encounter also has made him more open-minded and insightful, Walton said.

"It has broadened my perspective. I'm not quite so narrow in my

scope. "Probably the most important thing is that I have gained a tre-mendous amount of insight into eople and the world and the way people act."

Even so, Walton does not think the UFO experience was worth it.

"A lot of people think it is a great oportunity," he said. "No way. opportunity,' Not me.''

State Author Claims UFO Cover-Up

COVENTRY - Sometimes fellow police officers tape E.T. on Lawrence A. Fawcett's office door, or stick E.T. decals on his coffee cup, but he takes the kid-ding good-naturedly. on

The Coventry police lieuten-ant's interest in Unidentified Fly-ing Objects is a serious one, and the government is just as con-cerned as he is, Fawcett main-

cerned as he is, Fawcett main-tains in his soon-to-be released book on the subject. The government has been cov-ering up dangerous activities by UFOs, says Fawcett in "Clear In-tent: The Government Cover-up of the UFO Experience," the book he wrote with Barry J. Green-wood, a postal worker in Stone-ham, Mass. "You think Watergate was big?

wood, a postal worker in Stone-ham, Mass. "You think Watergate was big? You wait to see this thing," Faw-cett said, pointing to stacks of government papers on his desk at police headquarters. "The gov-ernment has hidden the truth about UFOs because they think it will make people nervous "

about UFOs because they think it will make people nervous." Fawcett's fascination with UFOs began in 1965, when he saw a strange glowing object floating above an electrical substation in Manchester. A flash of electricity passed between the object and the substation, Fawcett said. Since then, he has studied re-ports of UFO sightings and he and others have amassed 4,000 pages of documents from the Air Force, the FBI, the CIA and the National Security Agency, which collects

Security Agency, which collects foreign intelligence and protects

the security of Armed Forces communications. communications. The truth about UFOs, Fawcett said, is that they have penetrated high-security areas in Strategic Air Command bases, where unau-

thorized craft are not allowed. The documents record hun-dreds of sightings of strange, glowing lights; mysterious, un-identified helicopters and other unexplained objects in the sky:

"The objects in the sky:
 "The object was a glowing orange light that flew on our wing at about 1 mile," Capt. K.E. May said in a report to his superiors at Michigan's Wurtsmith Air Force Base on Sept. 30, 1981. "We at-tempted to close in on it and it came at us on a 90-degree inter-cept." May twice closed in on the object, but it evaded his plane, seemingly reversing direction in

seemingly reversing direction in mid-air, and finally disappeared overhead, the report says.

• In September and October 1975, strange objects were sight-ed at five Strategic Air Command bases in the northern United States, reports say. "For two months, UFOs were

coming and going with impunity at these bases," Fawcett said. "Our latest planes couldn't stop them

them." In Cascade County, Mont., the sheriff's office relased this re-port: "A local veterinarian ob-served a white light in the sky with a red light on the side. His observation was that the cattle in the area started howling louder than he had ever heard." The Strategic Air Command was almost as disturbed as the

cattle. On Oct. 29, 1975, it re-leased the following memo: "As a short-term measure we are di-recting our Northern Tier SP (special police) units to assume security option III — Security Vigilance Posture during hours of darkness."

"These documents show that UFOs are real. They're not the result of hallucinations or air balloons. They show that UFOs display a technology far beyond ours."

Reports in the book were ob-tained by Fawcett, Greenwood and other members of Citizens Against UFO Secrecy of New York City. Most were obtained through Freedom of Information Act suits in U.S. District Court and the U.S. Court of Appeals in Washington, D.C. "These documents show that

"These documents show that UFOs are real. They're not the re-sult of hallucinations or air bal-loons," Fawcett said. "They show that UFOs display a technology far beyond ours." The official Air Force position

on UFOs is based on Project Blue Book, a report on UFOs seen by Air Force personnel between 1948 and 1969, said John Whit-aker, an Air Force spokesman in Washington. The conclusions, Whitaker said, were that UFOs do not threaten national security, do not display a technology superior to our own and do not suggest the existence of beings from another planet. Of the 12,618 sightings covered in the report, only 701 could not

in the report, only 701 could not be explained and the investiga-tion was closed, Whitaker said. A report NSA submitted for the private inspection of a U.S. ap-

A report NSA submitted for the private inspection of a U.S. ap-peals court judge in Washington, D.C., contends that releasing records of UFO sightings would give an enemy important infor-mation about the country's ability to detect foreign aircraft. When Fawcett got the report, it was so heavily censored with black pencil that fragments such as "In this document, the author discovers what he considers to be ..." were followed by a full page of blacked-out material. "I feel that UFOs do pose a threat to the security of the Unit-ed States." Fawcett said. If mili-tary aircraft could duplicate UFOs' ability to move and change directions at incredibly high speeds, "we'd have air superiority over the world. If the Russians could do it, they'd control us." "We have a right to know about UFOs," he said, "and the govern-ment has a duty to tell us." Prentice-Hall Inc. of Engle-wood Cliffs, N.J., will release the book in June.

EVEN the organisers of Saturday's conference on Unidentified Flying Objects in Leeds were surprised that 150 or more people turned up to hear the truth about the Things out there.

But everyone, even the most sceptical, likes a UFO story especially backed up with numerous slides of sightings down the years. The believers can thrill to the thought of all manner of hyperintelligent beings behind the blurred glows, the almost too saucer-like flying saucers and the weird atmospheric goings-on.

The less easily convinced can look for the bits of wire holding the UFO's up or learnedly detail the names of cloud formations wich give the same effect, especially when the instamatic taking the shot is held in the quivering hands of a UFO enthusiast. So there was plenty for everyone at the Yorkshire UFO Society's conference.

Sensibly the organisers ran through the slides without comment or defence of their authenticity. The chairman, Graham Birdsall, did mention, rather optimistically perhaps, that one of the slides was a fake and challenged the audience to spot it. Indeed he was not one to make too much of a sighting and on several occasions went into great detail on a particular anecdote only to disappoint us all.

One such was the Adel, Leeds UFO of September last year, a marvellous display of aerobatics from several mysterious light sources. There are pictures of that one and a recording of an excited family watching it through the window. It made front page headlines, but on balance Mr. Birdsall

tends to think it was some sort of natural phenomenon rather than a close encounter.

When UFOlogists went to the scene they found she was into meditation and parapsychology. Whether or not that lessened the impact of her story in their eyes we were not told, but the average UFO watcher prefers the Things to be far more palpable in their nature.

Tony Dodd, the North Yorkshire investigator for the society, is convinced that at least some of the sightings are real, solid flying machines intelligently controlled. As evidence he points out that many have been seen heading for aircraft then veering away at the last moment. Also most seem to be seen after people have gone to bed. "Whether they appear then so they cannot be seen we don't know." he said.





A RED BALL IN THE SKY OF LESQUIN - UFO OR PRETTY SUNRISE?

Mr. Andre Villette is still astonished. He was calmly going about his daily business in his fifth-floor apartment of a building on J.-B. Clement Street, when his attention was drawn to a strong red light.

It was about 3:30 yesterday morning. Mr. Villette thought at first it was a far-off fire. He estimates that the red glow was about five or six kilometers away, in the region of Ronchin or Lesquin. He took out his telescope to get a better look at the phenomenon.

What he then saw was much more precise. It looked like an immense ball, int-ensely red, apparently on the surface of the ground. Suddenly the ball rose into the clouds, then dropped back down, changing in shape to an oval, and rose again to disappear, leaving a reddish color in the sky.

Mr. Villette immediately wrote down a description of what had happened, which was signed by a companion who was also present. He then telephoned the Les-quin city hall. Apparently he was the only witness of the event, which no one else had noticed.

Mr. Villette is very sensitive to such phenomena, being the president and founder of "Lumieres Dans la Nuit." He thinks that he saw a mysterious celfounder of "Lum estial object.

For the moment, and without casting doubt on his veracity, he remains the only witness to have observed the phenomenon.

The local police, who are competent to investigate such matters, did not not-ice anything unusual yesterday.

Neither was there anything unusual at Lesquin airport. Several airplanes and a helicopter were taking off or landing about the time of the incident.

There remains the possibility that the phenomenon was natural. The Lesquin weather bureau noted a very pretty sunrise, both bright and intermittent. At times the sun disappeared completely behind clouds, coloring the sky red.

UFO, mysterious celestial object, helicopter, or pretty sunrise? Mr. Vill-ette would like to know if there were any other witnesses of what he saw yesterday morning. Strange, you say, strange....

Who doesn't have their own opinion as to the existence or non-existence of the well-known UFOs? From Jean-Claude Bourret to the humble Larzac farmer, everyone or nearly everyone has seen a saucer. Popular books describe lit-tle green men. Eminent scientists are won over to the extra-terrestrial cause, and it is almost incongruous to deal with the subject rationally. Police reports are down to earth and stick to the facts. We have gone through some of them, which were rather amusing.

If it is true that in France 62,500 policemen have received detailed in-structions on how to investigate all possible aspects of UFO incidents, the mobilization at Reunion is less intense. Lt.-Col. Lucas, in his off-ice at Verine barracks, does not find it necessary to keep the report sec-ret. There have been three reports since 1968. There is no difficulty about withdrawing the reports from the filing cabinet for inspection. The evidence is stronger for some cases than for others. he report sec-difficulty spection. The

Let's go back to July 31, 1968. About 22 kilometers from Plaine-des-Cafres, a farm worker, Luc F., well-respected in the community, states that he saw two individuals in diving-suits and helmets. So far not very sensational, perhaps a couple of Belgian tourists. However, the police report says that they did not descend from apes like everyone else. They descended from a surprising vehicle. two individuals resembled the advertisements for Michelin tires. Free pub-licity for this manufacturer, and a detail of importance, since it was relicity for this manufact peated in the 1975 case.

In 1975, Antoine S. was a clerk in a store at Petite-Ile, where he lives. He had never been involved in any scandal and had a good reputation. About 1:00 P.M. on February 14, he was at Calvary village when he was "stunned by a luminous ray coming from a brilliant ball." The police report continues that he saw "three little men descend from a strange craft which did not touch the ground." What did he do? He watched until he was "knocked to the ground by a powerful flash coming from the top of the saucer, which then rose into the air with a loud whistle." Beforehand, Antoine S. noted thet." her.

Once again the resemblance to the Michelin advertisement is troubling. Be-sides, the 1968 E.T.s were described as being about 1 meter tall. The 1975 E.T.s were described as being about 80 centimeters tall. Did they shrink in the course of time?

Although the 1968 case is difficult to explain, there is a possible explan-ation at hand for the 1975 case, which took place on February 14. An arti-cle appeared in this newspaper on February 12 entitled: "The planet Eros will pass close to the Earth today." The article stated that "during its last voyage in 1984 (sic), there was a year of catastrophes and important events" and further on, "When some of its particles left their orbit and headed for Earth, they escaped and disintegrated in Earth's atmosphere. Their luminous death-agony was briefly visible in the summer sky."

So perhaps Antoine S. saw what he expected to see: the planet Eros. Howeve Antoine S. was not the only person to see strange lights during February of 1975. There are other reports on file. The police report evaluates the character of Antoine S. as "of good conduct and morality, of normal equil-ibrium, not a liar. We do not think he was hallucinating, and take his statements seriously."

The similarities between these so-called extra-terrestrials are indeed strik-ing. Aside from the antenna, they are almost exactly the same. Either space men are passionately in love with Reunion Island to the point of returning again and again, or there is fraud, perhaps unconscious.

A detail difficult and perhaps impossible to explain: the medical report made on the condition of Antoine S. after the incident, signed by Doctor T.: "I the undersigned have examined Antoine S. and noted the following symptoms: state of extreme fatigue, collapse, anguish, inability to speak coherently, fixed stare, a crisis which may have been hypnotically induced during intense emotional shock."

We will probably never know what Antoine S. really saw, or what Luc F. saw. The mystery remains unsolved. Now let's have a look at the third case on Reunion Island, to see if it sheds any light on the UFO problem.

At 1:45 A.M. on December 25, 1983, at the end of an evening which had been a wild one, Jean-Hugues C. and Jacqueline O. were relaxing under the filao trees near the ocean shore at St. Paul's Pool. Suddenly a bright red light disturbed their activities. According to the police report, "The phenomeno was immobile and illuminated the surroundings strongly. There was no sound or smoke. It lasted about five minutes. The light then ceased but came on again a few seconds later at the same place. It had an oval shape about 1 meter long and 30 centimeters wide, and was deep red." As no one else sup-ported this testimony, and on this holiday night there were quite a few other couples relaxing along the sea-shore, it looks as if the two young people were either intoxicated or playing a practical joke.

Lt.-Col. Lucas closes his UFO file. The three reports return to their ob-scurity. We are no nearer the truth of the matter than we were before.

The skeptics cry out for evidence more substantial than these mediocre ex-amples. The believers need no further convincing. Meanwhile, the little Michelin man rubs his hands together a little, a lot, passionately. -- Philippe Bes.

The third volume of Victorino del Pozzo's series describes the circumstances under which a law-suit was brought against Eugenio Siragusa by two former members of the international movement he had founded to put into practice and to spread the messages he had received from the extra-terrestrials, the Cosmic Fraternity Study Center. In November, 1978, Kelly and Leslie Hooker, an American couple, brought charges against him, accusing him of rape, mind control, and fraud. Eugenio Siragusa was immediately locked up in the prison of Catane. However, the first results of the investigation showed the evid-ence to be so dubious that the judge released him on provisional liberty after two months in prison. ence to be so dubious two months in prison.

Investigations by the Spanish journalist, del Pozzo, show how dubious and con-trived the accusations were. For example, why did Leslie Hooker wait three years before bringing charges of rape? Why did psychiatric examinations in-dicate that the charge of mind control was without foundation? How come that out of the hundred thousand members of the Cosmic Fraternity during the thirty years of its existence, they were the only ones to be defrauded, raped and min controlled? Also, how come they had the benefit of unusual protection during the legal procedures? mind-

Victorino del Pozzo suspects that Mr. and Mrs. Hooker were no more than pawns in a larger game. Upon reviewing the details of the case, it seems strange that Siragusa was imprisoned before the charges against him had been invest-igated, and the multiplicity of restrictions imposed on his provisional liberty were very unusual. There were also attempts to poison him while he was in pri-son. Why did he have to wait three years for the trial that proved his innoc-ence?

Who wanted to shut him up, or failing that, to publicly discredit him? The statements of a man who for thirty years has been proclaiming the qualities which animate civilizations that are ethically and scientifically more ad-vanced than our own do not please the political, technological, and religious leaders of this planet. His difficulties with certain intelligence organizat-ions didn't start yesterday, any more than did the way the authorities manip-ulate information about UFOs. We now know that the authorities have scientific evidence that UFOs exist. Apparently they are reluctant to frighten the public.

Those to whom Eugenio Siragusa is only a crackpot will say it is all a bunch of lies. However, this would definitely not be the opinion of the Catane prison guards and prisoners, who witnessed a UFO landing during Siragusa's confinement. The UFO left a hexagonal burn mark on the prison courtyard before going back up to the sky at an astonishing velocity. Shortly before this incident, on the night of January 18, 1979, a prison guard saw on the prison wall "two individ-uals wearing luminous cloaks, with elongated luminous eyes, and long and pointed ears." His testimony was in writing. The prison directors transferred the guards involved and reinforced the surveillance of Eugenio Siragusa.

These events followed an unprecedented wave of UFO sightings, witnessed and re-ported by many police personnel both in Sicily and on the Italian mainland. Thirty-five thousand cases were reported during the two months that Siragusa was in prison. Since then, almost none.

Several other "coincidences" took place during the legal procedures. On June 10, 1981, the Italian constitutional council revoked the section of the penal code concerning mind control. This automatically caused the charge of rape to be dropped also. So the only remaining charge was the accusation of fraud, which was dropped because of an annesty decree announced shortly before the trial. Therefore, the case appeared to be closed before being brought to trial. However, Siragusa refused to benefit from these arrangements, insist-ing that the trial take place so that his innocence could be clearly proved.

On April 5, 1982, in the Catane court-room, the prosecutor went over the case point by point and asked that Eugenio Siragusa be released.

The defense attorneys went along with this, but were thus prevented from pre-senting the strong evidence for his innocence, or any of the 550 character witnesses, many of whom had come from different countries.

fter five minutes of deliberations, the court declared that there had not een any crime, that Eugenio Siragusa was innocent, and was released.

Justice had been rendered. However, there remained the damage done by a vicious media campaign of defamation of character in which many media organ-izations participated. Some of them had even attacked him before the accus-ations were made. French media organizations also participated in this defam-ation of character, some going so far as to accuse him of being the chief of a sect of assassins. The day after the trial an Italian newspaper editorial-ized that "It was one of the most vicious legal and journalistic persecutions ever made against a man who had done nothing more than to publicly state his beliefs." defam-

It's a completely different type of person revealed to us today by Victorino del Pozzo of Spanish radio and TV: a man whose only crime was to say he was in contact with extra-terrestrial beings, and to spread their messages of justice, peace, love, and fraternity in a world dominated more each day by injustice, war, and hate. -- Fric Dosnon.

A UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR SAYS HE HAS SEEN A UFO FLEET

OKLAHOMA'S BIGFOOT LEGEND

First Part of 2-Part Story **By Stan Morrison**

As with many states in this country, Oklahoma also seems to have its version of Bigfoot. But isn't Bigfoot supposed to primarily exist in the Pacific Northwest? Not so if we are to believe the interesting reports Evidently, some Oklahoma researchers and the witnesses do. carried in Oklahoma newspapers over the

It might surprise many people that reports of bigfoot creatures in Oklahoma are older than the state itself. Oklahoma Indians have long known of the "Tall People" who they believe inhabit the forest **and** wooded areas of the state. Among the Creek Indians there is a belief that if you were out in the woods and one of the Tall People happen to cross the path you are taking, you will lose your way. The Tall People of Oklahoma Indian legend have not only been seen by the Indians, but also have reportedly been seen by white men throughout the years. Some of these Oklahoma reports go back well over a century.

It would be erroneous to say that Oklahoma has its own unique species of Bigfoot because, according to eyewitness descriptions, the creatures reportedly sighted in our state are virtually identical to those sighted in neighboring states and other regions of the

"It was seven to eight feet high and about 500 "It was seven to eight feet high and about 500 pounds. I thought it was a bear first, but it wasn't," stated Kenneth Tosh (then 33) of Noxie, when interviewed by the Tulsa Tribune in August of 1977. "It had hair everywhere and it looked like a man except that it stunk and its eyes...I'll never forget those bright red eves."

That was Tosh's first encounter, which occurred back in late August of 1975, and he claims he eventually saw the creature(s) five, and possibly six, times; the most recent being in early August 1977. It seems that Tosh had encountered a creature that had already been known for years to the residents southwest of South Coffeyville, in Nowata County, as the "Timber Hills Monster."

Monster." It seems that we are dealing with different types of creatures in Oklahoma because, according to published reports, one type has green glowing eyes (Noxie) while another has red glowing eyes (Noxie and Stilwell). Kenneth Tosh claims to have seen both types in the small, almost non-existent town of Noxie. The one with the green eyes, he said, is grey, while the other is the green eyes, he said, is grey, while the other is bigger and brown in color with red eyes. Such with red eyes. Such differences in various bigfoot creatures' appearances have been noted by researchers investigating sightings in other states.

in other states. When the Noxie monster made Oklahoma newspap-ers in early September of 1975, the AP wire picked up the story and eventually the Noxie monster made national, and even worldwide headlines. However, in many out-of-state newspapers the Nozie monster was inadvertently misdubbed the "Mozie Monster." Out-of-state researchers and monster hunters relying on news reports must have had quite a time trying to find little Noxie, let alone the totally non-existent town 'Moxie.' of

Many people in the area of Noxie saw and heard the ionster (s) back in 1975). According to witnesses "it" grunted, screamed in a strange and eerie manner that was likened to the combined sound of an eagle and a cat, and made other strange noises during the dark late August-early September nights. One Noxie resident, a Vietnam veteranty September nights. One Note resident, a Vietnam veteran by the name of Marion Parret, actually shot the monster but apparently to no real effect. His description of the "thing" was identical to that of Tosh's. Parret told a Tulsa Tribune reporter in early September 1975 that although he served 13 months in Vietnam, he was more scared now than he had ever been in Indochina: "At least over there I knew what was out there. Here I don't."

It seems that these bigfoot creatures have appeared in increasing numbers in many areas of Oklahoma over

the last several decades. The first three following cases occurred in Oklahoma's Green Country; the first two in the county of Nowata: Watova (1950s and July 1974), Noxie (late August-early September 1975 and August 1977), Stilwell (August 1977), near Broken Bow (Summer 1978), and a very recent sighting by a Madill bouncerife pear Comparille in August 1981

housewife near Connerville in August, 1981. In each case the creature described is relatively same with slight variations on size, fur or hair color, number of toes, stenches (in some cases no stench is reported), and the color of eyes which usually glow even when there is no light source to cause a reflection. (it should be noted that in many cases the color of eyes the glowing characteristic is not reported).

Researchers have traced sightings of Bigfoot in our state as far back as 1849. Sam Powell, a columnist for the Tulsa World ("The Outdoor World"), devoted a long piece to the Bigfoot legend in Oklahoma in the Tulsa World for May 21, 1980, in which he mentioned that there are very old reports. It appears that the Noxie and Watova monsters are not at all new additions to Oklahoma. In addition to the 1849 sighting, there are reports from the early 1900s and there were several reports in the Spring of 1926. Most of these reports were from the mountainous southeastern region of the state. The 1849 sighting is the oldest known report in Oklahoma. It occurred on the 13th of May when a hunter/trapper was in an area southeast of Eagle Town and saw what he later described as a "big strange critter." One of the 1926 cases was mentioned in a recently published and well documented hardcover volume on monsters entitles "Alien Animals" by Janet and Colin Bord. Their source of the story was the Sunday Gazette (McCurtain, Okla.) for July 9, 1978. According to the paper, two hunters were near the Mountain Fork River when they saw a large ape-like animal and sent their dog after it. The dog never came back As how lotse they found their dog dead and back. An hour later they found their dog, dead, and "almost tore (sic) in two." The Bord's also mention in their book the 1974 Watova Bigfoot which seemed to have had a peculiar interest in women - it bypassed houses where only men resided but was extremely attracted to the female residents

Bigfoot hunt draws public criticism

By HENRY MILLER Bigfoot, if it exists, is a protected non-game species that cannot legal-ly be hunted in California, officials of the state Department of Fish and Game (DFG) said Thursday. That designation could put a crimp in the plans of Mark E. Keller of Arcata, who publicly an-bounced Monday that he plans to stalk and kill a Bigfoot. According to Sandra Wolfe, chief of the DFG's Conservation Educa-tion Branch in Sacramento, the state Fish and Game Commission would have to issue a permit for Keller to legally pursue or kill a Sasquatch (the Indian name for Bigfoot). The five-member state Fish and Game Commission sets hunting rules in California and issues per-Thompson

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Game Commission sets hunting rules in California and issues per-mits to capture certain animals, such as condors, for research. "If it (Bigfoot) was determined

to be an animal, he'd have to get permission to hunt it," Wolfe said. But that's not going to happen, she added, because, "No one's been able to get close enough to study it," to determine if Bigfoot is ani-

also to get close choice to get the bar of the possibility of Keller getting a permit, "kind of a moot point," she said. A newspaper account of the proposed Bigfoot hunt prompted several negative calls to a Redding radio station talk show Thursday. Shortly after the show aired, the DFG's Region 1 office in Redding hegan getting calls expressing the same opinion, according to dispatcher Jan Armstrong, who fieldeed four of the five or six calls. "The people who called were all

"The people who called were all very upset," about Keller's planned hunt, Armstrong said. Dave Nelson, patrol inspector for Region 1, which includes Arcata

where Keller lives, said discussions are under way and that DFG offi-cials in Eureka will inform Keller that his planned hunt is illegal. "The DFG's official position is that what this guy intends to do is illegal." Nelson said. "And we have the obligation to tell him that he'll be doing something illegal." Other aspects of the plan, as revealed by Keller, also bother the DFG, Nelson added. They include Keller's announced intention of using a "sniper scope" — a light enhancing device for night surveillance or hunting.

scope" — a light enhancing device for night surveillance or hunting. The California Penal Code makes it illegal for anyone to buy or possess such a device except police or peace officers or for "scientific research" purposes. Violations are punishable by a maximum fine of \$1,000 and up to one year in jail. Another DFG concern is Keller's



The law that makes hunting Big-foot illegal, Title 14, Section .472 of the California Administrative Code, says: "Except as otherwise provid-

says: "Except as otherwise provid-ed in this chapter, non-game birds and mammals may not be taken." The listed animals that can be killed "at any time and any num-bers except as prohibited," in-cludes mostly pests or predators such as: "coyotes, weasels, skunks, opossum, moles and (some) ro-dents."

Killing a Bigfoot would be a misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

Another interesting fact is that Bigfoot is not the only unusual creature to haunt Oklahoma. Oklahoma residents have reported actually spotting green-eyed, 4¹/₂-foot-tall kangaroos, black panthers, huge wolves, and an 80-pound, six-foot-long bobcat foaming at the mouth (average size for an adult bobcat in Oklahoma is 18 to 20 pounds and an unusually large one would weight 30 pounds).

ese reports, which are identical to other reports in many other states, are not merely made by drunks and little old ladies in tennis shoes (not that I have anything little old ladies in tennis shoes (not that I have anything against little old ladies wearing tennis shoes), but are reported by police officers, reliable, well respected citizens, and there are cases of multiple witness sightings. Also, there are cases where there is substantiating physical evidence. Either Oklahoma's backwoods and swamps sport animal life that are hitherto unknown and hitherto unknown to Oklahoma, or we are dealing with a

unknown to Oklahoma, or we are dealing with a creature phenomenon that is much more fantastic and enigmatic than merely unnown life-forms on the loose. Interestingly enough, the black panther and big wolf

sightings occurred not very far from Nozie. In fact, the big wolf was sighted in Watova during the Bigfoot big wour was signted in watova during the Bigtoot sightings there. It was suggested by a Watova resident that there was no Bigfoot and what they were seeing was the big wolf. Sightings made by other witnesses, iacluding the Nowata County Sheriff, seem to dismiss such a speculation because they definitely saw an erect animal which was in the habit of leaping over four strend hashed wire force and during du four-strand barbed wire fences at a tremendous speed It doesn't sound like a wolf could be responsible for all of the reports.

The black panther was sighted in Drumright in 1976 but there are reports of this creature as far back as 1939. The Drumright panther was said to have produced screams very similar to the Noxie monster. It has been suggested by some researchers that such mystery animals that resemble black panthers, kangaroos, and the like, are what they appear to be-exotics that were either brought into the country by people or migrated from their distant habitats. This logical theory was proven correct recently when a small, rabbit-like rodent from South America was captured in Tulsa. It was a pet of a resident. Also, aecording to the Tulsa World for September 3, 1981, a kangaroo 3¹/₂ feet in length was hit by a pickup truck and killed and the driver recovered the carcass. Two Tulsa Police officers were skeptical until they examined the fresh carcass in the bed of the pickup. There was no the fresh carcass in the bed of the pickup. There was no explanation given for the presence of the kangaroo in Oklahoma. I seriously doubt that it swam all the way from Australia and then hopped nearly halfway across the United States to the Tulsa area. So, someone must have brought it here. Or is there another explanation? Perhaps

When news of Noxie and its monster began to spread in 1975, researchers who investigate such specialized phenomena saw the case as an excellent opportunity for first hand investigation. Speculations varied as to the nature and origins of the creature. Hayden Hewes of Oklahoma City - a well known author-researcher -Oklahoma City - a well known author-researcher -suggested that perhaps the monster(s) was some kind of pet or experimental animal of those curious beings who pilot UFOs (and Oklahoma has plenty of those, too). I am in no way assuming that the kangaroo in Tulsa was the stray property of some spaceman from Alpha Centauri. However, there have been docu-mented cases of a phenomenon that physical research-ers call "teleportation" where animate and inanimate objects instantly disappear and reappear somewhere objects instantly disappear and reappear somewhere else; sometimes instantaniously and many thousands of miles away. It has been suggested in the past that alien space visitors utilize this phenomenon to travel across intersteller space. Could the kangaroo in Tulsa and other exotics have been teleported here by some freak of nature?

Next to the UFO-pet hypothesis, there were other meories for the presence of the monster in Noxie. One, which was echoed recently in a magazine article dealing with bigfoot creatures in the south and central United States, suggested that they migrated from their naturel habitat in the Pacific Northwest, taking such inconspic-uous routes as dried up river beds and wooded areas. It was suggested that these animals are careful in not leaving any tracks and other traces by walking on probleaving any tracks and other traces by walking on rocks and avoiding contact with plants and brush. Others suggested that there was no migration and that the creatures live naturally in our own uninhabited areas. Some of these researchers suggested that the reason why such creatures have developed glowing eyes is that it helps them to see at night. It has been pointed out that most creatures sightings were at night and so it was concluded that they were nocturnal animals.

Besides the Tall People, Oklahoma Indian legend Besides the fail reope, Oklahoma Indian legend also tells of another group of strange entities that supposedly live in the woods. They call them "Estakinie" and unlike the Tall People, these beings are "little people" and are very similar to elves. If you were to mention "Estakinie" to a Creek Indian he would probably change the subject and refuse to discuss the little people. This is not because the Indians fear physical harm from the Estakinie, but because they feel that the "little people" are sacred and would be insulted if their true nature were discussed.

Oklahoma Indians seem to view such creatures as the Estakinie and the Noxie and Watova monsters as supernatural entities rather than flesh and blood animals. And perhaps the Indians are much more closer to the truth than most people would suspect; since a growing number of Bigfoot researchers are coming to e conclusion that Bigfoot is not an animal in the

true sense of the word. A few of these researchers, of which veteran investigator John A. Keel is an example note the high-strangeness characteristics of bigfoot creatures and suggest that they are supranormal in nature, or a type of psychic phenomenon. These researchers point out that the luminous eyes quality, the strange stenches, and the banshee-like screams Bigfoot makes, are remarkably similar to ghostly and demoniacal phenomena. They also point out that the creature has the uncanny ability to vanish when creature has the uncanny ability to vanish when pursued by tracking dogs, expert hunters, and a large posse. This would not necessarily negate Bigfoot's occasional existence as a solid and objective entity

If Bigfoot ever happened to be apprehended or if someone ever acquired totally conclusive evidence of its existence, it would undoubtedly be one of the greatest existence, it would undoubtedly be one of the greatest scientific discoveries in history. Perhaps the only other discovery of this nature that would equal it would perhaps be capturing one of the Loch Ness monsters. And believe it or not, a Loch Ness type monster was reportedly sighted in Lake Eufaula in 1973 (Tulsa World, July 26, 1973). Over the last equation months I have been preparing to

Walla Walla and Umatilla county commis-sioners today condemned the potential killing of a Bigfoot in the Blue Mountains. The six commissioners signed the resolu-tion, with chuckles and expressions of doubt that Bigfoot even exists, at the request of Walla Walla resident Vance Orchard. Orchard has joined an effort in the state to prevent Californians from killing a Bigfoot. The two commissions were holding a joint

meeting in Walla Walla to discuss issues of mutual concern when Orchard asked for the resolution.

Orchard said that because the most recent Orchard said that because the most recent sighting of the Bigfoot phenomenon in 1982 occurred in the Blue Mountains south of Walla Walla, it is likely the area will be targeted for intense searching by the Bigfoot party. Orchard made the request because of re-cent publicity about Californians planning to

search the Northwest this year for and kill a Bigfoot, also known as Sasquatch. In a letter to the commissions, Orchard said

In a letter to the commissions, Orchard said he and several others think "any 'shooting' of Bigfoot in the Blue Mountains should be done with a camera only." He suggested the com-missions could pass ordinances at later meet-ings to make Bigfoot killings a misdemeanor and to call for a Bigfoot sanctuary in the Umatilla and Wallowa national forests.


reversed and snapped the steel line. Five or six years ago, a swimmer off the Sandpoint public beach, on the northwest end of the lake, re-ported being attack by a huge crea-ture resembling a cross between a crab and an octopus. The stories, unconfirmed but of-ficially recorded, go on and on, from as far back as anyone can re-member to just last summer. It seems North Idaho's Lake Pend Oreille has a monster, or a heretofore unidentified species of aquatic animal, or the tallest fish tales in all the land. North Idaho College's Crypto-zoology Club is determined to find out which. Formed just a couple of months

North Idaho College's Crypto-zoology Club is determined to find out which. Formed just a couple of months ago by anthropology/archaeology teacher Richard "Duke" Snyder and English teacher James McLeod, the 16-member club stud-ies hidden animals. It's also taken on the task of getting to the bottom of the "Pend Oreille Paddler" mys-tery — if not the 1,200-foot-deep lake itself. Naturally, the extracurricular activity is lots of fun, but Snyder, McLeod and the students are se-rious about their research. "There are just too many similar stories over too many years to dis-count this entirely." said McLeod, who leads NIC's annual trips to Scotland, where he's visited Loch Ness several times. "I don't think we have something like Loch Ness here," McLeod said, "but it's possible that an extraordi-narily large species of sturgeon or something is in there." The belief that everything on earth already has been discovered, he noted, has been shot down again and again with discoveries in the remote parts of the earth. "I can't think of any more re-mote and unexplored area than the bottom of Lake Pend Oreille," he said.

bottom of Lake Pend Oreille," he said. The second-largest natural lake west of the Mississippi, Pend Oreille stretches more than 43 miles from north to south. It has about 150 miles of shoreline. Dur-ing World War II it was the site of submarine testing from the now-de-funct Farragut Naval Training Sta-tion.

It was there that the first record-ed sightings of a strange creature are believed to have been made. In the early part of September, 1982, I wrote a two-art article for "The Exposure" on the mysterious "hairy bipeds" that have now been sighted in practical-ly every general region of our state. Many reports are somewhat recent and some are very old, such as a report of a sighting in southeastern Oklahoma in 1849. These sightings, which have involved scores of people and scores of monsters, seem to occur yearly. When I first began doing research on Oklahoma's Bigfoot, I collected a number of reports, but since that

e my file of Oklahoma reports has increased dramattim ically, and I have had the opportunity to conduct more personal interviews with some of the witnesses. Currently, I am in the process of writing a book-length examination of strange phenomena in the Sooner State. However, my main objective is to obtain a specimen of

summer of 1944, the mysterious ap-pearance of such a monster was reported from the Farragut Naval Training Station on Lake Pend Oreille in Idaho."

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More recently, while mapping the lake's caverns under the Monarch Mountains along the southeast shore, sonar equipment crews from the David W. Taylor Naval Research and Development Navai Research and Development Center in Bayview supposedly en-countered something alive and moving and about 30 feet long. But that, said McLeod, is only hearsay. Navy officials won't confirm it.

Still, a former Navy man claims he saw "huge, weird fish" deep in the lake while exploring in subma-rines, McLeod said. The man re-fuses to swim in the lake to this

fuses to swim in the lake to such day. "Most officials discount such things," said Cryptozoology Club secretary Nancy Henry, an NIC sci-ence student. "They don't keep records. So we're researching newspaper clippings in local librar-ies and conducting personal inter-views with people around the lake.

views with people around the lake. "Some folks are reluctant to takk," Henry said, "even if they've heard stories or seen things, be-cause they're afraid they'll be ridi-culed. But we're honestly interested in what anyone has to say. Ninety-mine percent of what we turn up may be discarded as tall tales, but you don't know what you'll find un-til you look and listen." The digging has turned up re-membrances of an incident that goes back even further than the Navy days at Farragut. Sometime in the '30s or before — no one seems to know for sure — a train derailment on the trestle over the lake outside Sandpoint brought divers to the scene to recover sunk-en materials. After their first de-scent, so the story goes, the divers refused to return to the underwater grave of the rail cars because of huge creatures in the area.

Besides such eerie accounts, the club also is collecting information about large fish like sturgeon, which, according to Idaho Fish and Game literature, can grow more than seven feet and live more than 30 years. A photograph in the book "Ida-ho," McLeod pointed out, shows a white sturgeon caught near Twin Falls in 1908 that measured 11 feet and weighed 632 pounds. Other ac-counts indicate the fish can grow to a half ton and live 100 years or more.

The problem with attributing the Pend Oreille mystery to sturgeon is that only river species are believed to exist here, club members ac-knowledge. That's why they're con-tacting limnology and fishery ex-perts at the universities of Idaho, Wisconsin and California-Davis.

"You have to keep an open mind," said club Vice President Mary Craig, another NIC science student.

student. "Discounting anything as possi-ble is just intellectual arrogance. Scientists often won't study some-thing without empirical evidence, but how do you get empirical evi-dence without studying it? It's a Catch-22 that maybe amateurs like us, who have the curiosity to nursue us, who have the curiosity to pursue it, can break."

it, can break. Snyder noted that all the stories about giant fish at Lake **Pend** Oreille have thus far only generat-

ed more tourist interest. A "hysterical" map of the lake, found in shoreline shops, features a full-fledged sea monster in the heart of the waterway. Lakeside taverns decorate with whale skulls, found as "committee that the skulls, taverns decorate with whale skulls, touted as "something that washed up out of Pend Oreille last week." And a community theater produc-tion in Sandpoint some years ago coined the name "Pend Oreille Paddler" and starred a papier-mache sea serpent. mache sea serpent.

"Everybody talks about it and wonders about it," Snyder said.

Although most reports emanate from eastern Okla-Although most reports emanate from eastern Okla-homa, several very impressive sightings have occurred in the western part of the state. In the winter of 1982, a number of individuals in Dewey and Roger Mills coun-ties observed a strange animal that they could not identify. One youth, who's family evidently had several experiences with the creature, seems to have been the first to see "it" that winter. The youth, 15-year-old Billy Deve of Vici went out to feed his hors a counle of Billy Parry of Vici, went out to feed his hogs a couple of Billy Parry of Vici, went out to feed his hogs a couple of days before the snow when he decided to scout for coyote tracks along Trail Creek near his home. A short time later, a strange growl made him stop in his tracks. Twenty yards away stood a curious, uright animal. "It was four or five feet tall and pretty wide . . . It stood upright and had kind of a reddish brown hair color," Parry was quoted as saying in a frong page "Daily Ok-lahoman" article for April 12, 1982. On the same day the Associated Press also issued an article on the Parry sighting. sighting.

A number of tracks supposedly made by the creature were quite unusual as far as Bigfoot tracks are concern-ed. Witnesses said the tracks resembled dog tracks but were as big as a man's hand. One characteristic that were as big as a man's hand. One characteristic that was reported, however, seems to be common with other mystery animal observations. "It smelled like a sew-er," was a remark mentioned by many witnesses. This characteristic has prompted many researchers to speculate that these creatures could be related to ghostly phenomena because the same identical odor has been detected during hauntings. "It smelled like it was dead," and similar comments are commonly re-ported in Bigfoot cases. John Green, a veteran Sasported in Bigfoot cases. John Green, a veteran Sas-quatch researcher-writer who firmly believes that the mystery bipeds are a hitherto unknown species of pri-mate, explains the "dealthy stench" aspect in Bigfoot cases by theorizing that bigfoot creatures, like dogs and other animals, roll on dead carcasses. But, in addition to the odd tracks left by the creature, other sightings tended to suggest that western Oklahoman's were either dealing with two different types of animals or something much more enigmatic than sightings of an something much more enigmatic than sightings of an


unknown animal was taking place. A month and a half after the Parry sighting and ap-proximately 40 miles southwest near Cheyenne in Roger Mills County, two cattlemen observed a creature that is not exactly unknown in the monster lore, but that is not exactly unknown in the monster lore, but which appears to not be your classic or average Bigfoot. "It was bigger and broader than a dog would be. Its head pretty much sat down on its shoulders, and it walked on four legs," states Alex Inman of Reydon after he and his son-in-law, George Springer of Roger Mills, observed the animal that "didn't look like every-thing they had ever seen before," southwest of Chey-enne where they were feeding cattle. Springer mention-ed that the creature was dark brown and wide. He also added: "It wasn't fuzzy or furry, but slick haired, like a added: "It wasn't fuzzy or furry, but slick haired, like a pig. It was kind of smooth moving. It didn't bounce any. It was pretty heavy, and had a pretty big body."

When the men first saw it, they had pulled their pick-up into the pasture and began honking their horn to at-tract the cattle. This seemed to not at all frighten the animal, for it took its time and slowly ambled off into deep brush.

Although the writer of "The Daily Oklahoman" article, which was entitled "Strange Beast Reported By Western Oklahoma Residents", mentioned that reports of the creature in this part of western Oklahoma go back about six years, I have traced such sightings in Dewey Countyback to 1968. Although there were a number of sightings at that time, the most interesting case involv-ed a man who saw a "gorillalike" animal cross the road in front of his car while he was driving from Canton to Oakwood, in the eastern section of Dewey County Plaster casts of its tracks were made some time late (though still in the same general area) that suggested the creature that made them was much more "Bigfootlike" than the animal observed near Cheyenne and Vici in 1982. Sightings of bigfoot creatures from moving vehicles, as with the above case and a sighting made by a young housewife near Connerville in south central Oklahoma on August 15, 1981, are the most common fact about the western Oklahoma sightings is that they occurred in winter and western Oklahoma tends to be a much drier region than central and eastern parts of the state. Most Bigfoot sightings occur in late summer or early fail; and, according to the landmark research of John Green, who personally investigated the 1958 Bluff Creek, California, tracks and sightings at the time the term "Bigfoot" originated, the majority of Bigfoot reports emanate from "wet" areas, or areas that receive 20 inches or more of rain a year.

"We're just the kind of people who go one step further and want to see what it's like to go out on our own and find out what it's really all about. And you know, that's simply science." Any amateur cryptozoologists

science." Any amateur cryptozoologists out there who feel the same way, Snyder said, are more than wel-come to come on board. They can do so figuratively, as club mem-bers, and literally, as members of this summer's boating and diving expedition around the lake — when North Idaho's monster of the deep may finally be unmasked.

OKLAHOMA'S BIG FOOT - SASQUATCH

On the evening of April 10, 1982, I interviewed an Okemah man about his unpublished experience with a "big hairy monster" at Okemah Lake in 1976, that produced an interesting effect on the observers that I've vered is very common in Bigfoot experiences total fear.

Geoff Franks, a young man in his early twenties, was with several other people in a wooded area near Oke-mah Lake on a semi-foggy night in the spring of 1976, when his cousin, Joey Franks, separated from the group to find some firewood. Geoff told me that his cousin had been gone for some time when he returned and said. "You guys, I've got to show you something. I want you to see this and make sure I'm not seeing things." The group followed him down towards the lake and when they were approximately 100 yards from the water's edge, they could see in the moonlight a large, dark figure with its back facing them standing on the dark ngure with its back racing them standing on the shore of the lake. "It was at least three feet broad at the shoulders," Geoff estimated. The astonished witnesses continued watching the figure for "a long time" and they noticed that the "thing" would sort of sway or rock from side to side (I've heard of other cases where this has been reported). Then it was gone. No one is quite use if it wolled off or inst disenseated though in has been reported). Then it was gone. No one is quite sure if it walked off or just disappeared, though in Geoff's opinion, he felt that the figure seemed to be coming gradually closer as he was watching it. "We could no longer see the silhouette of it against the water." As the group tried to sight the figure again, they all heard a noise very close to them, like a branch machine walks for a walks through brush cracking when something large walks through brush. Geoff's cousin bolted and ran and Geoff, "pretty spooked," followed him at full speed. The others also ran. By the time Geoff caught up with his cousin, he was in his pickup with the doors locked and about to drive off. Geoff was so frightened that he banged on the side window so hard that he broke a bone in his hand. "I wanted in," he said.

After Geoff managed to convince his cousin to let him After Geoff managed to convince his cousin to let him and the others in the pickup and they were driving off, they all saw a fox (the first one Geoff had seen in the area) and a number of rabbits quickly heading south -away from the area where they saw the large, dark figure. Almost at the end of our conversation Geoff's mother, Malinda, added that Okemah Lake (as it is derived in 100 and that there has long today) was constructed in 1928 and that there has long been stories (though undocumented) about strange

happenings in the area. On April 9, 1982, I spent the better part of the day interviewing a Mrs. Maggie Lee who lives on a farm in the small settlement of Watova in Nowata County, the small settlement of Watova in Nowata County, which is in northeastern Oklahoma. Her case was a very interesting one. Since 1974 up to 1980, Margie and a number of witnesses, including two Nowata County sheriff's deputies, observed four bigfoot creatures (which appeared to be a family including an offspring) on the Lee property where they would feed on apples and berries. This is the best case I've ever investigated. The two sheriff's deputies, Gilbert Gilmore and Buck Field, actually shot one of the creatures several times but amazinely, the slups did not seem to effect it and but, amazingly, the slugs did not seem to effect it and the Bigfoot ran off at top speed into nearby woods.

Although the Lee case did not receive as much publicity as the sightings at Noxie (20 miles north of Watova) a year after the first Lee sightings, the Watova observations, in my opinion, are much more interesting. (In "Oklahoma's Bigfoot Legend", "The Exposure", Sep-tember 1st and 8th, 1982, I wrote about the "Noxie Monster'' in detail). In early October of 1977, a seven foot, fur covered

statue of a Sasquatch was displayed at the Tulsa State Fair and it received some attention by area newspap-ers. One reporter lamely asked the Bigfoot expert on hand, "Since the smallest Bigfoot ever sighted was es-timated at over six feet tall, where are the young ones?" Instead of the expert correcting the reporter and if for the record that there are many and informing him for the record that there are many sightings of such creatures under six feet tall, he pre-ferred to add to the misnomer by telling the reporter that bigfoot adults hide their young from humans. Al-though it does appear that the Sasquatch are, indeed, very protective of their young, some of the oldest and some of the most impressive cases concern creatures under six feet tall. And I would go as far as to suggest (and I'm sure I would not be the only one to do so) that (and 1'm sure 1 would not be the only one to do so) that some of the smaller versions of bigfoot-like creatures are themselves adults. The creature sighted by Billy Parry and others in Dewey County in the winter of 1982, that was mentioned at the beginning of this article, is a fairly good example. I am not the only one who believes a Sasquatch should be taken in the only way that's apparently possible and absolute. Most researchers, I've discovered, no longer favor the ideal that we continue playing unrealistic games of hide and seek with the Sasquatch. Many experts now agree that Roger Patterson's 1967 color film of a Bigfoot (taken at Bluff Creek, California) is not only a genuine film of a Bigfoot, but also of pretty good quality. Ap-parently, this evidence is not enough. John Green is one of the veteran investigators who feels the same as I about obtaining a specimen. He points out in his excel-lent book "Sasquatch: The Apes Among Us" (1978), that it is highly unlikely (because of a number of factors) that one of the animals can be taken alive. Perhaps after a specimen is shot and killed, says Green, we will truly learn the facts about them (nature, habits, stc.) and money and large, respected institutions (of

Although on one point my views (the paranormal as-pects of some cases) differ from John Green's, I was very surprised (after reading "The Apes Among Us) how much we think alike concerning Bigfoot research. Like myself, Green is convinced that the Sasquatch is definitely much more animal than human. He points cast (after many years of research) that people seem to "want to believe" that we are dealing with some kind of "wildman." But, as Green has found, the evidence illustrates that we are dealing with a large, upright and ape-like primate that is a unique species in itself.

"Sasquatch: The Apes Among Us" is one of these rare classics that should be in every Bigfoot student's library. Chest and body shots do not seem to be vital areas to these powerful animals. Open hostilities toward humans are extremely rare and often unfounded. Animals, however, do not seem to be immune from the darker side of the Sasquatch. There

Such a case occur-red in southeastern Oklahoma in 1926. Since it is becoming widely known that bigfoot crea-tures not only exist in the Pacific Northwest, but have been reported in every state in the union with the ex-ception of Hawaii, many experts, including John Green, feel that a Bigfoot will probably be brought down in the least likely place, such as a midwestern state like Oklahoma. One thing about the characteris-tics of strange phenomena, even though some phenom-ena may not be related in any way, the unexpected and the unlikely always occurs. If you carefully study the history of Bigfoot research, you will probably be sur-prised to discover that there has really only been a couple of serious, long-term expeditions to search for Bigfoot. There are countless cases where the media publicizes a group's plans to conduct a scientific expepublicizes a group's plans to conduct a scientific expe-dition into the Northwest wilderness with the intention dition into the Northwest wilderness with the intention of finding a Sasquatch, but, as it often out, the group or organization is combined of a few, and often one, searcher who's whole motive is to make money to further his own personal needs, which is often not re-lated to Bigfoot research.

I have been meticulously planning for some time to go on a one-man, one-month (or longer), field investi-gation in an area of Oklahoma where sightings go all the way back to 1849. I have utilized a dozen topograph-ical maps, records of the area, climate and weather statistics, and investigative and research knowledge at-

iad maps, records of the area, climate and weather statistics, and investigative and research knowledge at-tanded from over a decade of study, to greatly increase my chances for success. The data shows that if you have had paranormal or strange experiences in the past, it is likely that you will have more of these experiences. During the course of my research, I have had a number of paranormal experiences and possess many photo-graphs of strange phenomena taken by myself and close relatives. One of these (an apparent demon photo-graphs of strange phenomena: The Eye and the Camera'' (January 5, 1983). But, perhaps more importantly, when I lived in southern California, myself and four others were some-what attacked by a probable Sasquatch. Some time after our en-counter, I discovered that earlier in the day and about 24 milles from where our experience occurred, near Grona, two youths observed a huge Sasquatch in a lemon grove.

It's sometimes hard to believe that the importance, advantages, and the reasons for the sometimes obsess tve determination of certain individuals in seeking to solve the Bigfoot enigma, is grossly underestimated and, with some people, completely incomprehensible. Even some of those who are somewhat interested in the subject underestimate the significance and value in ob-taining a specimen. I think this point was best illustrated by a comment made by Smokey Crabtree of "The Legend of Boggy Creek" fame who wrote in his book in reference to a \$10,000 offer to him for the Fouke monster - that he would be a little crazy to exchange a \$50,000,000 plus monster for a mere \$10,000. At this point, since I know for sure that such creatures actually point, since I know for sure that such creatures actually exist, I'm not only determined to find a backer to do the job right, but I'm even more determined to successfully complete the job. A very large monetary investment is not at all essential. In fact, such a field project would be surprisingly inexpensive. You really don't need a bunch of fancy, sophisticated equipment. All you really need is some tools and, most importantly, time. The Hunt Is On

Bigfoot, or Sasquatch, may be no more than an overgrown figment of the imagination, but that has not deterred former Army Ranger Mark E. Keller. He wants to hunt down and kill one — just to settle the controversy over

Fortunately, when news of Keller's intention leaked out in the area of Washington State where the hunt was proposed, some people rose immediately to Bigfoot's defense.

Eric Beckjord of Seattle said a group called Citizens Against Sasquatch Shooting is forming to thwart the plans of Keller, from Arcata, Calif. Skamania County commissioners have agreed to consider an ordinance designating the county, which encompasses Mount St. Helens, as a Bigfoot refuge. That would make it a misdemeanor punishable by up to a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine to kill one.

Erupting volcano changed face of Aegean island

S antorini, Greece—It is like no other island in the Aege-an Sea. Great, raw cliffs of red, black

and white rise precipitously from the sea.

On a plain a few miles away, tourists explore dusty passages through a once-buried city where artistic and evocative ancient frescoes have been found.

Dark islands rise in the harbor, remnants of a cataclysmic volcanic explosion 3.500 years ago that destroyed much of the island and altered the pre-eminent Mediterranean civilization of the period.

This is the Santorini of today, a popular stop for cruise ships and an island of singular beauty and peace.

But it may have been something very different: the fabled Atlantis that Plato described in two of his dialogues.

The story has long intrigued the world. Plato told of Atlantis and its advanced civilization disappearing under the sea in a night of volcanic convulsion. Science-fiction writers and moviemakers have spun innumerable tales around it : dozens of theories have been proposed about

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its possible locales. That it was a continent in the Atlantic Ocean is the most popular theory, although Atlantis also has been sited in such diverse locales as Bimini in the Bahamas and off Heligoland in the North Sea. In recent years, however,

some archaeologists have come to think that Santorini was part of Plato's Atlantis and that the legend of its subsidence into the sea stems from the mighty volcanic explosion that shattered that island about 1500 B.C.

Archaeologist A.G. Galanopoulos, who spent years excavating and researching in Santorini, thinks that the island was the "Ancient Metropolis" of Atlantis that Plato referred to and that the larger island of Crete 60 miles south sheltered the Atlantean "Royal City."

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

In any case, scientists do agree that about 1500 B.C., the Santorini volcano began a series of eruptions that culminated with an enormous explosion when sea water entered the volcano's emptied magma chamber. turned, into superheated steam and blew the mountain apart. "There cannot be a shadow of

doubt that the Santorini eruption was truly prodigious in scale," Mr. Galanopoulos said. Ash and pumice buried the towns on Santorini and covered the Aegean Sea for miles around. Seismic sea waves (tsunamis), the scientists say, wrecked the ships and ports of Crete and other Aegean islands, signaling the decline of the Minoan (Atlantean) civilization.

The same eruption and tsunamis, Mr. Galanopoulos thinks, were responsible for the biblical plagues of Egypt ("the waters that turned to blood," he says, were the red rain created when the red pumice of Santorini was pulverized, sent high into the atmosphere and returned to Earth with the rain) and for the miraculous parting of the waters for the Israelites during their exodus from Egypt. (Tsunami waves, when they approach land, typically result in a sudden and extensive withdrawal of water before the destructive high waves strike.)

The debate over Atlantis continues, but even if it didn't, Santorini still would be one of the most interesting and unusual islands in the Aegean Sea.

That an awesome cataclysm destroyed much of Santorini is evident even to the untrained eve. The fragmented island is obviously what remains of a volcanic mountain.

The broken edge of this volca- mas, or about \$1.80) no, its precipitous face colored with layers of red, black and white rock, stands silently above its water-filled caldera, so deep (more than 1.000 feet) that cruise ships cannot anchor there. They tie up to a large, specially made buoy.

High above the cruise-ship anchorage, the whitewashed chief city of Fira covers the cliff edge like cake frosting. When a cruise ship is in port, its narrow, pedestrian-only main street is crowded with tourists poking into its shops, pausing for refreshment at an outdoor terrace overlooking the sea or jockeying for camera angles.

From this perch 1,200 feet above the sea, you get an eagle'seve view that can keep you spellbound for hours. There is the always-pleasant aspect of white homes and churches silhouetted against the blue sky and distant purple cliffs. The rocks are bathed in flaming color and rays of gold as the setting sun flickers over silent islands in the huge harbor.

Strolling on the staircase-road through town is an adventure. Small shops, restaurants and boutiques line the street, which is touristy, but other side passages twist into less-traveled areas.

Until fairly recently, the only way to reach Fira from the port below was by riding a donkey up a zigzagging staircase-road that hugged the cliff and petrified many a tourist. Now you can ride a new cable car (fare: 180 drach-

Although Fira is the popular spot for cruise-ship visitors, many overnight tourists go to Oia at the tip of the island. Once the commercial center of Santorini, this is another white city astride a steep cliff. Twisting staircase streets wind down to two beaches, and each step is numbered, probably so that when you are gasping for breath on the way back up, you'll know exactly how much longer you have to suf-

Oia also has a new and attractive type of tourist accommodation. The Greek government has renovated about 20 homes in this city-some as much as 300 years old-and offers them as rentals to tourists. Each is different, with typically curved roofs and odd-shaped rooms, but all are newly equipped with stove, refrigerator, kitchen utensils and bathroom. Rentals are reasonable; many go for \$20 or so a night.

Court orders Big Foot 'expert' to return money

Jon Erik Beckjord must pay \$65,000

A crimp has been put in the adventuring of Seattle's Jon Erik Beckjord, a self-proclaimed Big Foot expert and hunter of the clusive hairy scenture. A King County Superior Court commissioner has ruled that Beckjord must pay a Seattle woman \$65,000 she says she invested in a Big Foot film that Beckjord was supposed to produce. The film has not been made made

made. The woman, Anya Lincoln, based her lawsuit on a contract she made with Beckjord in 1982. The contract said that for a share of the profits, Lincoln would help finance the Beckjord film for "television and theatrical release." But in her claim another Backlord Lincoln soid

Would help inlate the beckford mini for television and theatrical release." But in her claim against Beckjord, Lincoln said the promised film was both a "fraudulent and hopeless venture" and that Beckjord had made "intentional, false representations concerning his ability to produce and market the Big Foot film." The judgment was issued by default because Beckjord did not respond to the lawsuit. For his part, Beckjord said he was "bemused" by the judgment against him and claimed that the lawsuit resulted because of a "love affair" between the two that he called off. "Hell hath no fury like that of a woman scorned," he added.

he added. Lincoln's **attorney**, Robert Dawson, rejected **Beck**jord's **contention** that the lawsuit was the result of a broken love affair. Lincoln said last night that she would have no comment on the lawsuit or the judgment. Beckjord said he met Lincoln several years ago and she has traveled with him as an assistant on many trips to do research on Big Foot. He said she accompanied him to Scotland last year where he used

accompaned him to Scotland last year where he used time-lapse videotape equipment to attempt to photo-graph the Loch Ness monster. Beckjord said he intends to produce a Big Foot film which he has entitled the "Big Foot Solution." He said the film, which is intended for television, should be completed in early 1996. "I'm not wealthy," Beckjord said, adding that he has no intention of making any payments on the judgment until the film is completed. In a press release delivered to The Times yesterday, Beckjord said he did not bother to defend himself against the lawsuit because he had no money for an attorney and that he "did not want to dignify the case by fighting it."

Does Tahoe Hide a Monster? Hudson

Reports Persist of American 'Nessie' Lurking in the Lake E. CR:

United Press International TAHOE CITY, Calif. — Lake Tahet seems like a vacationer's paradise — except for the man-eating creature that myth says could lurk beneath is crystal clear and vastly deep water. There are those who claim the lake has its own answer to Scot-land's Loch Ness monster, and fear of "what's down there" is part of Tahoe's folklore. Some strange sightings have been reported on the lake, right up to the 1980s. ï E

been reported on the lake, right up to the 1980s. But, as with "Nessie," scientists have been unable to find any evidence to back the legend. One reason for the stories may be Tahoe's depth. As far as could be determined 100 years ago, Tahoe had no bottom.

Less than a decade ago, scien-tists used sonar to find the bottom of the 22-by-12-mile lake. At an average depth of 989 feet and reaching 1,645 feet at one point, it is one of the deepest lakes in North America

The Washoe Indians, Tahoe resi-dents for thousands of years, warned early settlers not to ven-ture too far from shore because of the most entry work to new or the dente the monster waiting to prey on the unwary.

Indian legend described a large animal with a lizard-like head and long neck. The legends say the creature made lunch out of those who went too far out onto Tahoe.

The settlers soon began to add their own tales of strange, huge forms swimming in the lake. The stories gained credibility because so few of Tahoe's drowning vic-tims were ever found.

Scientists say that is because the lake's unusually cold water retards the decomposition that causes a body to float in most lakes.

The tales come not just from oldtimers. Even today, with the lake one of the most popular vacation spots in the West, the Coast Guard still gets an occasio-nal monster report.

In June 1982, waterskier Kris Seebe saw something black, slimy and huge swim past as he waited for his partner to turn the boat around. Jerry Jones saw it, too, from the boat. "We didn't just think we saw it:

"We didn't just think we saw it: we saw it," Beebe said. "It wasn't threatening us. It was just gliding right past.

We checked into everything "We checked into everything — and divers, subs, everything — and we're convinced it was some very, very large creature." Both men were police officers. Neither man had been drinking. It was not the first such report. Exymers Taboc Caset Guard chief

Former Tahoe Coast Guard chief Anderson said there have many sightings of "crea-

bon Anderson said there have been many sightings of "crea-tures," but he believes most were wind-created patterns that seem to glide across the lake. But Beebe and Jones were only 25 feet from whatever they saw. Last year, two nuns told Coast Guard officials they saw a monster-fish in Lake Tahoe. Boats-wain's Mate James Cavin said it turned out to be a piece of plastic drainage pipe that had floated away from the Tahoe City Public Utility District plant. Even after

Utility District plant. Even after officials showed them the pipe, the officials showed them the pipe, the nuns were unconvinced. "The University of California-Davis had a submarine down in here in '79 and they didn't see anything," Cavin said. "Of course, I imagine a monster would stay away from a sub. You never know what's down there. It's a really deep lake and there are crevices at the bottom that could hide things." things.

Reno restaurateur Miguel Ribera offered another explana-tion. He said he and his wife saw what appeared to be a 2.5-foot snake-like animal while boating at snake-like animal while boating at Pyramid Lake 50 miles northeast of Tahoe in the 1960s. On closer examination, Ribera said it turned out to be a school of minnows banded together in an apparent attempt to discourage attacks by larger fish. Bill Bechdolt of Tahoe City, a lifelong regident of the Tahoe

lifelong resident of the Tahoe Basin, says perhaps Beebe and

Jones saw "Herther, the big fish in Tahoe."

Bechdolt said several fishermen have claimed over the years to have hooked a fish so large it broke have hooked a fish so large it broke the strongest lines or ripped rod and reel from the mounts on the stern of the boat. "The one guy who claims he saw it claims it's about 16 feet long,"

Bechdolt said.

Bechdolt said. Scientists say Tahoe's largest known denizens are Mackinaw, a variety of lake trout known to surpass 60 pounds. Several scuba divers have claimed they saw "mackies" more than 6 feet long.

Tiny invertebrates such as the Taboe Stonefly and Scud live in the lake's depths. But some fishermen say there must be something else down there. There are reliable reports of trophy-sized Mackinaw bitten in half by a foot-wide set of jaws as the fish was reeled in.

John Rousch, in his book, "Suc-essfully Fishing Tahoe," theo-John Rousch, in his book, "Suc-cessfully Fishing Tahoe," theo-rized that the monster fish could be sturgeon, gar or muskellunge accidentally planted with lake trout at the turn of the century. Maybe that would explain "Herther."

He speculated the teeth marks could be from a muskie, a huge variety of pike and a voracious predator. But, he wrote, some believe the monsters are descen-dants of prehistoric Ichtheosaurs that lived in Lake Lahontan, the ancient inland sea that once cover-ed much of Nevada.

Evidence of what those crea-tures were like can be seen at a state park outside of Berlin, where skeletons of Ichtheosaurs with jaws six feet long and bodies upwards of 60 feet are on display.

"It seems the more you know about the water, the less mysteries you see," Cavin said. But he pointed out that with Tahoe's depth and size there's plenty of room for the unknown.

"The Abominable Snowman — I haven't seen him either," said Bechdolt. "But everybody would like to know what's down there."



They have been portrayed as benign creatures that just want to be left alone. The Skamania County commissioners recog-nized that 15 years areo. They nessed an

benign creatures that just want to be left alone. The Skamania County commissioners recog-nized that 15 years ago. They passed an ordinance making the killing of a sasquatch a felony, punishable by up to five years in prison and/or a \$10,000 fine. Life, sometimes, is not all that serious in Skamania County. It should be noted that the ordinance was passed on April Fools' Day of 1969. Roy Craft, former publisher of The Skamania County Pioneer and onetime press agent for Marilyn Monroe, had a heavy tongue-in-cheek hand in that first ordinance. So some are saying that Keller and his two California hunting companions had better stay out of Skamania County during their planned five-month expedition. Keller says he's not headed for Skamania County or its famed Ape Caves near Mount St. Helens. Legend has it that the place once crawled with sasquatches or, as some would say, bigfeet. The latter is from reported footprints of size 18 tootsies attached to 8-to-9-feet tall upright bodies. Nevertheless, Skamania County officials have taken note of Keller's plans. On Monday they'll have another ordinance before them to revise the 1969 sasquatch law.

they'll have another ordinance before them to revise the 1969 sasquatch law. Robert Leick, longtime Skamania County prosecutor, says the county exceeded its authority in 1969 by making sasquatch killing a



felony. The new proposed ordinance would make it a gross misdemeanor if done with malice, or just a misdemeanor in the absence of malice. Conviction on the former would get an offender only up to a year in the county jail and/or a \$1,000 fine. The ordinance also would eliminate all insanity defenses for killing a sasquatch, except the long-standing M'Naghten test — knowing right from wrong. Under the ordinance, all Skamania County would become a sasquatch preserve.

ordinance, all Skamania County would become a sasquatch preserve. I don't want to prejudge the seriousness of the new ordinance, but its presentation to the commissioners is suspiciously close to April Fools' Day. Leick pointed out that April 1 is a Sunday, and the commission doesn't meet on the Sabbath.

the Sabbath. Some people take the search for the elusive sasquatch more seriously. Keller does. So does Grover Krantz, a Washington State University anthropology professor who is convinced of the creature's existence. Krantz considers Keller's death mission proper Sightings footprint reproductions still

would serve science, Krantz says. What about the belief that the sasquatch is combined.

What about the benefit that the sasquatch is semihuman? Even if that were the case, Krantz contends it would be immoral not to kill one. "The species may be on the verge of extinction because of the destruction of its habitat," he surmised. "If we are going to protect it, we must establish its existence. The only way to do

that is to bring in a body." Krantz estimates there are no fewer than 200 sasquatches and no more than 2,000 in the West Coast states. How does he come up with such a census? If there were fewer than 200, Krantz explains, there would not be enough to breed and keep the species going. If there were more than 2,000, they'd be underfoot — getting bit by cars and trains.

more than 2,000, they'd be underfoot — getting hit by cars and trains. Keller, 33, a veteran of three combat tours in Vietnam, a onetime musician (bassist) and house painter, is giving up his post-office job in Eureka for the shoestring adventure. He says his hunt will be financed almost totally from about \$7,000 in personal savings. Keller won't be specific about where he and his two partners will hunt — only that it will be somewhere in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, or possibly British Columbia. He said he will avoid areas previously tracked in search of sas-quatches. The California hunter has hinted that if he bags a bigfoot, he might turn it over to

bags a bigfoot, he might turn it over to anthropologist Krantz for research. Beyond that, Keller is not unaware that documentaries

that, Keller is not unaware that documentaries books and appearances would make him rich. So far, a lot of hucksters and sincere people have struck it poor trying to get rich off sasquatches. The sasquatch has become such a wonderful and mystical part of Northwest lore, I'm on its side in this one.

My advice to sasquatches — if there really are any out there — is: Head for Skamania County.

Secret of pyramid 'gas' told: Visitor's lost Mace

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CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) -- It wasn't the revenge of the mummy or any other mys-tical force that irritated eyes and choked several tourists at a 4,500-year-old pyra-mid this week. It was just Mace, a form of tear gas commonly used to fend off attackers, a lab report concluded. The Middle East News Agency said the Eavotian Antiouities Department's chem-

The Middle East News Agency said the Egyptian Antiquities Department's chem-ical laboratory speculated that a visitor accidentally dropped a container of Mace while touring the Chephren Pyramid, the second of the three pyramids of Giza. The presence of the gas inside the pyra-mid's burial chamber last Monday prompted breathing problems and eye ir-ritation among a group of Spanish tour-ists.

ists. Officials closed the pyramid for an in-vestigation and speculation ran rampant, with some observers theorizing the gas was methane leaking from cracks in bed-rock underlying the structure. But according to the Antiquities De-partment report, "The gas which caused cases of choking to some of the Chephren Pyramid visitors this week is the tear gas known commercially as Mace. "This gas is used by individuals in most

European countries in aerosol containers for self-defense in the event of any as-sault, as it incapacitates the assailant temporarily and gives him a running nose and hard breathing temporarily," the re-root said port said.

"It is possible that a Mace container fell accidentally from a visitor," the report said.

port said. Experts wearing gas masks searched the pyramid Tuesday and took small samples for lab analysis. The interior of the pyramid was scoured and sprayed with disinfectants. Local newspapers said an initial inves-tigation showed that one of the visitors brought a gas container inside the pyra-mid.

mid "The gas leaked out, either deliberately or unintentionally," the newspaper Al Ahram said.

ram said. Later, local newspapers said a sponge, from which the gas must have leaked out, was found in the burial chamber, wrapped in a handkerchief. Instead of scaring away visitors, the incident attracted more than the usual number, especially Egyptians. Many traveled long distances in hopes of solv-ing the mysterv. ing the mystery.
