Talk of abductions not alien to 800 at UFO symposium

ROSEMONT, III. — Debbie To-mey's tale of being abducted by alien beings was greeted with un-derstanding nods at an interna-tional symposium dedicated to un-

tional symposium dedicated to un-raveling the mysteries of unidentified flying objects. Chitchat at the 22nd annual gathering of the Mutual UFO Network included discussions of a mysterious substance called "angel hair" left behind by UFOs, cattle that have been neatly cut open and drained of their fluids, and of be-ing whisked away and studied by alien beings.

Many of the 800 people at the gathering Saturday also browsed through an assortment of T-shirts, bumper stickers, tapes and books with titles including "Mystery of the Sky Men" and "Elvis UPO. Connection."

Tomey claimed the space aliens who took her said they were sorry they had to hurt her, then filled her with a light that felt "like being hit with a bolt of lightning." It was June 1983, and she had gone to see why the door of her parents' garage was open at their Indianapolis home.

"I started feeling really hot, like I was on fire," she said. "I tried to run, and that's when I lost my memory."

Tomey said she is not asking people to believe her.


"I'm just asking them to hear me," she said.

One who has heard her is John Carpenter, a psychiatric social worker from Springfield, Mo., who said he has hypnotized about 40 people who recalled being abducted by aliens.

Md. researcher dishes up evidence he says proves existence of alien beings

ELK MILLS, Md. — George M. Reynolds Sr. knows a lot of people think he's crazy. And some days, he says with a smile, he's not too sure about himself. Reynolds, 68, is president and founder of the northeastern Maryland chapter of the Mutual UFO Network, the world's largest

and oldest international organization re-searching extraterrestrials. A Methodist minister and retired Army electronic design specialist, Reynolds believes Earth has been a stop-off point for galactic neighbors for thousands of years. He also believes that aliens occasionally abduct earthlings to take chunks of skin, extract its genetic content and replenish their own stock, and that they take unfertilized eggs from women to breed alien-human hy-brids on Earth and back home. No matter what people call him, Reynolds said they can't call him illogical. The Elk Mills resident notes that for every grain of sand on this planet, there is a star somewhere in space.

And around each of those zillions of stars could be a grouping of planets just like our solar system. So, Reynolds asks, why should we be the only hunk of matter in the universe with living tenants?

He said people would be crazy not to be-lieve in little gray (not green) creatures with big heads and oversized wraparound eyes and the vessels that brought them here — once they consider the evidence. Reynolds, a UFO network researcher, said there is enough evidence in the form of pic-

Air Force says claims of sightings don't fly

"We have no doubt that if we went into a courtroom in a mur-der case with the [amount of] evi-dence we have, the person would be convicted," Reynolds said. "Re-sponsible people from all walks of life experience UFOs every day. We can't just stick our heads in the sand." A prominent theory among

We can't just stick our heads in the sand." A prominent theory among UFOlogists, as they're called, is that UFOs are propelled by elec-tromagnetic force. Reynolds, who received electronics training at MIT, the University of Delaware, is attempting to design a device that signals changes in the magnetic field in a two-mile radius. Reynolds uses a detector de-signed by a fellow researcher. The device has gone off a number of times, he says, but he has yet to see a UFO. It's Reynolds' job to track down and interview people who have seen UFOs or ETS — a job that's often difficult. Witnesses don't want to share their expreiences because they're afraid of being called nuts, he says. Reynolds carries a 161-page in-vestigator's manual that contains everything from standardized sur-veys and descriptions of things

everything from standardized sur-veys and descriptions of things

that could be mistaken for UFOs to artists' renderings of basic alien types. Reynolds' only personal sight-ing came in 1945 from the deck of his submarine off Okinawa. Al-though he couldn't make out the details, the young sailor who grew up "cutting my teeth on Flash Gordon" knew the dot of light dancing in the night sky wasn't of this world. Reynolds said he has inter-viewed seven or eight Maryland and Delaware people who claim they've seen UFOs or met their pilots. But he said he was able to find just one willing to speak to a reporter.

That just one willing to speak to a reporter. Walter Hushour said one word describes what he saw one night while driving to his Kent Island home three years ago: "Awe-some"

some." On that crisp, clear November night, Hushour said he saw three triangular objects rise from a field triangular objects rise from a field to the height of the treetops. He said he was so mesmerized that he stopped and left his car to watch. Each was 50 to 100 feet long and bordered with 12 red and white lights "the size of a gallon paint can," he said. And none of them made a sound. "I could throw a stone and hit it," Hushour said. "It was just like a movie without sound." Hushour, who describes himself

our said. Reynolds claims a handful of his interviewes reported seeing similar phenomena around Red Hill on the outskirts of Elkton. He believes the crafts may be si-phoning power from high-tension power lines that cross Maryland 281 near Muddy Lane. Elkton Police Chief Calvin T. Krammes said that in his eight years on the force, he can recall one report of aliens visiting, three miles north of Red Hill. Krammes said one Meadow View man re-ported seeing a UFO, but detec-tives didn't record his complaint because they "thought he was crazy and laughed at him." But Krammes doesn't think it's crazy to believe in life forms on other planets. Reynolds said witnesses have reported seeing the same kind of triangular or round lighted ob-jects traversing the skies all over the world. He thinks that's proof enough that ET's are visiting. But journalist and UFO de-bunker Philip J. Klass believes such sightings only prove how the power of suggestion can manipu-late an imaginative mind. "If I were to ask a hundred other people to draw a picture of a ghost, many of them would probably look similar," said Klass, 71, a founding member of the Committee for Scientific In-vestigation of Claims of Paranor-mal Intelligence. "That is a cari-cature that has become acceptable by society." Klass said during a telephone interview from his Washington. D.C., office that Mutual UFO Net-work members have concluded that UFOs exist without a shred of solid evidence. He said the Air Force researched "Ilying saucers" from 1948 to 1969 and came up with nothing. Klass said that if simple devices such as the electromagnetic UFO detector worked, "The mystery would have been solved long ago. and NASA's goal would be to join up with the ETs and visit their olanet."

Close encounters of the weird kind

UFO investigator says he's skeptical of tales about extraterrestrial visitors

There's bound to be life on other planets, but Skip Schultz said he won't believe it until he ti soos

sees it. Schultz is the Oregon director of the Mutual UFO Network, an international organization that investigates, studies and cata-logues unidentified flying object sightings around the world. He said he's still not convinced be-ings from outer space are visit-ing our planet despite a number of "really weird" cases he's in-vestigated. MUEON is not a hunch of

of 'really werd' cases he's in-vestigated. MUFON is not a bunch of crackpots, Schultz said, al-though he said there are plenty of crackpots out there. MUFON members are scientists, physi-cians and other professionals who take their investigations very seriously. They're curious, not crazy. But there are people out there who actually claim to have been visited and even abducted by space aliens. Some claim to have even spotted bigfoot. Others claim the government is trying to cover up evidence that beings from other planets are contact-ing Earth and try to warn Schultz to beware. "There are some really weird stories out there," he said. It's MUFON's job to sort through those reports and find the truth he said.

It's MUFON's job to sort through those reports and find the truth, he said. Most people tell tales that are a little less far fetched. They re-port spotting strange lights in the sky and wonder if they've seen a UFO, Schultz said.

Schultz said he first became interested in UFOs as a kid. He read every book on space and flying saucers he could find at the Woodburn library. "They just intrigued me," he said.

said. Later, as an Air Force me

chanic stationed in Alaska, he had what may have been a close encounter of his own. Late one night he watched an unusual

light descend into the trees just outside the military reservation. He thought it was a helicopter, but later discovered there were no flights in the area. To this day, he has no idea what he saw. But he refuses to call it a UECO UFO

I'm kind of down the middle I'm kind of down the middle of the road, "he said. "I believe there could possibly be other beings in this universe but I have to have proof before I can say yes, there are UFOs. I have to have provide the same for

He's collected shelves full of books on space, astronomy and UFOs and keeps a telescope **pointed cut a window** of his Hardcastle Avenue home. **He** joined MUFON five years **sep and** now coordinates the group's investigations statewide. The walls of his home office are plastered with star charts.

plastered with star charts, plastered with star charts, drawings of UFOs made by wit-nesses and maps dotted with pushpins marking the locations of recent UFO sightings. One of his first cases was right here in Woodburn. On July 16, 1988, a Gervais family reported watching a space ship as big as a house fly over their farm.

family reported watching a space ship as big as a house fly over their farm. A man and his wife were out-side checking their livestock when they spotted a huge object in the sky. The object was low in the sky and moved slowly to-ward their farm over a nearby power substation, powerlines and railroad tracks. They roused four other family members from bed to watch as the UFO moved over their fields, shops and house and finally disappeared into the trees 15 minutes later. Witnesses described the object as looking like **two b**owls stuck together with a dome on top and four legs. The UFO was quiet and almost as big as the family's three-bedroom house, they said. Investigators determined the craft was not an **airplane** or helicopter because **of** its shape, size and movements. Local air-ports reported there were no aircraft in the area **that** night.

Investigators still aren't sure what the family saw. They've have been unable to find any reasonable explanation for the sighting. The case re-mains open. It's one of those mysterious 10 percent of all UFO sightings that in-vestigators can't explain away. Three years later Schultz said the family is still sticking to its story. They've never strayed on a single detail, he said. He said he doesn't think they're making up the story.

they're making up the story. "These people don't have any-thing to gain from it," he said. They honestly believe they saw a UFO.

Schultz said he's seen some elaborate hoaxes. In Dallas, a man faked a series of UFO pho-tographs by hanging two care-fully disguised soup bowls in the air. The photos were so con-vincing that he was able to con-vince a local newspaper to print them.

Careful investigation of the photographs revealed a plank from which the bowls were sus-pended with fishing line. "They got caught," Schultz said.

The group has been getting a lot of publicity lately, but not all of it has been good. The Orego-nian recently ran a lengthy arti-cle detailing a Portland man's love affair with an extraterres-trial woman he claims visits his home remulative home regularly.

MUFON earned a brief men-tion in the article, which in-cluded drawings of the alien woman and photographs of a smoke detector, a kitchen colan-der and other items suspended in the sky to look like flying

That kind of publicity really hurts the organization, Schultz said. After reading stories about space aliens, abductions and government cover-ups in the supermarket tabloids, a lot of people snicker at the idea of in-vestigating UFO sightings.

in the Soviet Union about her sight-ings and work. "We understand how busy you are, how tired you are (of) being interviewed by reporters, but we still hope you'll devote a dozen minutes to the readers of our news-paper hungering to know more about (the) unordinary woman liv-ing in Peoria," Shpak wrote to Smith. Smith.

ing in Peoria," Snpak wrote to Smith. Smith responded to his request and sent information, a photo of herself and a tape of her music. Along with reporting, Shpak teaches English to high school stu-dents and used information Smith sent for his class. "Your ideas are so human and fresh that your name is becoming more and more famous here," Shpak stated. "Don't forget that here, in the Soviet Union, there are friends understanding and support-ing you." There are many UFO experi-ences occurring in the Soviet Union, Smith said.

"I wrote a love letter to the Rus-sian people," Smith said. "Actually it was more of an outpouring of joy in positive communication with each other."

each other." The lyrics of Smith's tape, "White Light," were taught to Shpak's students to help them with English lessons. "Now you can imagine that we study English using a superb text-book whose author is Connie Cook and we are happy to be personally acquainted with this talented au-thor!" Shpak wrote. Smith said tears streamed down her eves at the thought of her songs

her eyes at the thought of her songs being sung everyday in Kiev. e has since mailed additional

information to the Soviet Union and shared deeper aspects of her experiences.

experiences. The Soviet teacher/journalist has suggested that Smith visit Kiev, perhaps through a student exchange program for her daugh-ter. She is considering a trip there, but said she would like to learn some Russian first. Smith said har first LFO sight

Smith said her first UFO sight-Smith said her first UPO signi-ing was in 1981. Through April and May of 1987 she reported numerous sightings and began writing many songs. She currently **lectures and** performs concerts of her music.

Still, recent UFO sightings in the Burns area managed to at-tract a lot of attention. In April, a family reported their car was buzzed by a UFO as they drove

buzzed by a UFO as they drove down a rural highway. MUFON investigators deter-mined the lights that fell from the sky in front of the car were actually parachute flares fired into the sky illegally by a Burns man. Ashes from the burned flares were discovered in little flares were discovered in little piles on the roadway. Schultz said about 90 percent of all sightings investigated by his group can be explained.

his group can be explained. But there is always that other 10 percent for which investiga-tors have no explanation. Schultz said that doesn't neces-sarily mean they are genuine UFO sightings. It simply means investigators can't explain what happened.

"You've got to have positive proof to say yes that was a UFO and I don't know anybody who has got any," he said. Most sightings turn out to be stars or planets obscured by clouds or haze so that they ap-pear to hover or move across the sky, Schultz said. The planet Venus, which ap-pears as one of the brightest objects in the evening sky, can appear to move or hover under the right conditions, he said. It's often mistaken for a UFO, he said. said.

said. The moon, clouds, airplanes, helicopters and even satellites can also fool people into believ-ing they've seen an unidentified flying object, he said. "There are a lot of things out there that appende see that aren't

there that people see that aren't UFOs," he said. They simply misjudge what they're seeing, he said.



Japanese crew films in **Gulf Breeze for NIPON TV**

On May 10, 1991, I, Jun-ichi Yaoi and my Japanese film crew arrived in Gulf Breeze in the hope of documenting the local UFO sightings, NIPON televi-sion metwork, the largest/oldest commercial broadcasting com-pany of Japan, sponsors our investigative documentary to be aired as part of the two-hour special nationwide in Japan.

special nationwide in Japan. Bob Oechsler, a former NASA systems specialist, from Washington, D.C., accompanied us as a consultant to advise and analyze any evidence that we might be able to capture on film film.

At approximately 11:30 p.m. Bob Oechsler told us that a "red UFO" had been sighted to the northwest of the Holiday Inn where we were staying. We were preparing for bed but we were preparing for bed but we quickly got our cameras and set up a "sky watch" near the hotel swimming pool overlooking the Pensacola Bay. Fifteen or twenty minutes passed. Then. out over the water, a bright red object sud-denly appeared. The sky was clear over Gulf Breeze and the

Bay, with most of the rain clouds still visible over Pen-sacola. What we saw and film-ed was amazing! It was brilliant and I must say, beautiful. As recorded on our 36 to 1 zoom lens, the UFO moved to the northeast for one minute and twen-ty seconds before suddenly winking out and then returning for a few seconds as a small white ball of light which then also winked out.

Our film of the UFO clearly shows a circular ring of red "energy" with a center glowing orange core. It will be further analyzed to identify any structure. We have interviewed do-zens of local witnesses who have taken video and photos of the UFO but we are particularly im-pressed with the similarity with photographs taken by Ed Walters in 1988.

UFOs here? Local sightings inspire detection invention

Special to the Whig There are UFOs right here in Cecil County. In fact, there is a history of UFO activity here, according to George Reynolds of Elk Mills, the Maryland State Sectional Director for MUFON (Mutual UFO Net-

MUFON (Mutual UFO Net-work) in the Cheseapeake area. Reynolds joined MUFON in 1987 and in his four years as a field investigator he has handfield investigator ne new led at least four cases involving actual UFO activity, three of which can be classified as sightings and one that can be classified as an abduction/time loss case

Many scoff at such ideas as UFOs, but as a recent USA To-day poll shows, 60 percent of college educated people believe in UFOs, and as the success of such movies as "Close Encoun-ters" and "E.T." indicate, many are willing to believe the sug-gestion of the phenomenon. As a field investigator, Rey-nolds investigates all strange phenomenon taking place in Harford, Cecil and Kent coun-ties. He asked residents to re-Many scoff at such ideas as

ties. He asked residents to report sightings to him at 398-4124 or write him at P.O.

Box 3, Elkton, 21921. Most of the UFO activity here has occurred in the Red Hill/Delancey Road area, with the most fascinating case being an abduction/time loss.

In an abduction/time loss case a person or persons are ab-ducted by aliens and are often left without memories of the events during that time period except for what directly pro-ceeded and followed the abduction, though there are some cases where some people re-member what happened.

Because field investigators uphold the confidentiality of witnesses no names can be given, but Reynolds will attest to the veracity of these reports.

Elkton abduction case In October 1988, a man and woman with their two children. left Elkton to have dinner at Howard Johnson's on U.S. 896 in Newark, Del. They recall leaving the restaurant at 8:30. They traveled down Old Post road on their way home when the children cried out that there were lights following them. The area was flooded with intense light bright as a flash from a camera. The car lost power and stopped. And the man's last memory is of his wife leaving the car. The next thing he remembers is that he was driving back towards New-ark where he was pulled over They traveled down Old Post ark where he was pulled over by a state trooper for driving erratically

When the man and his family finally reached home, he turned on the TV to the 11:30 news. What happened to that three hours?

This is still to be determined. And Reynolds has requested that the family speak to Dr. David Jacobs, an assistant professor of history at Temple Uni-versity, who runs his own group which investigates the abduction phenomenon, and uses the technique of hypnotic regression to help reveal de-

tails of the experience. Later Reynolds learned the family received a phone call the next day and were told by a man they presumed was the po-liceman "about last night, you live in a beautiful world; don't do anything to upset it. Don't talk about what happened."

Government interference Revnolds believes this is an cample of government inter ference to cover up any evi-dence of the existence of UFOs. Abductions, according to Reynolds, seem to follow a simipattern from country to lar

country and person to person. "We have thousands of people in this world who claim to have been abducted. They got lost time in their life and claim to have been taken away. We have been taken away. We hypno-regress them and they all tell the same story."

True research in this area is done by MUFON. And its members speak to each other nationwide on shortwave radio every Saturday from 8 to 9 a.m. eastern time to exchange infor-mation. Detailed manuals inform investigators how to in-vestigate a case, and detailed questionnaires on encounters are filled out and put into a computer network to collate all available information on

available information on encounters. Reynolds first became inter-ested in UFOs as a child through Buck Rogers and Flash Gordon serials, and later in high school his interest in science led him to believe there was a possibility of life on other planets.

He recalls his first incident ith the unknown in Septem-He recalls his hirst incident with the unknown in Septem-ber of 1945 while he served in the Navy. He observed a bright white bluish star that moved in many directions and he won-dered what it was. This interest led to his association with APRO (Aerial Phenomenon Research Organization) in Tuc-son, Ariz., where he served as an investigator from 1953 until the organization folded in 1987 whereupon he joined MUFON and continued his work.

Most are sightings Most UFO incidents, how-

er, fall under the category of sightings.

The most spectacular sight-ing in this area was witnessed by many people from New York


to Maryland on Aug. 23, 1988. Observers saw a flash and then a vapor like trail which at first was believed to be a meteor shower, until it was seen to move horizontally.

move horizontally. In Reynolds' investigations, he interviewed two boys who witnessed more than anyone else. But due to their religious convictions, which interpret UFOs as demonic, they did not go public with their information information.

The boys witnessed a mili-tary plane approach the object and fire a missile. Every other and fire a missile. Every other witness saw the object explode and a luminous cloud form in the area. But no one else saw the object come out of the cloud and take off. Later the boys witnessed several planes fly into the area of the object, pos-sibly to investigate. And then witnessed a triangular plane, possibly a Delta wing, come in at a low altitude in the area. Reynolds believes that the military was probably investi-gating the incident, but since the government doesn't offi-cially recognize the existence of

the government doesn't only cially recognize the existence of UFOs, it doesn't ever admit to such activity. He said the U.S. government has spent most of its time suppressing such infor-mation while appearing to clear it up

it up. Famous 1947 case Such government interfer-

ence, dramatized in the movie "Hanger 18," documented by MUFON and currently being investigated by Bob Exeter, a former mission specialist at NASA, can be traced back to an incident in Roswell, N.M. on July 7, 1947. A UFO crashed July 7, 1947. A UFO crashed with at least four alien bodies and was witnessed by some 200 people. President Truman sent out a team to investigate, which included Secretary of Defense Forrestal. The bodies and ship were then placed into Hanger 18 at Wright Patterson AFB in Dayton Ohio, and the government denies the exis-tence of such an event despite the witnesses.

Monitor device

The most current research in the UFO area has been done by people like George Reynolds. He and many others like him are using a device to monitor the electro-magnetic waves in their area, as a way of detecting UFO activity. The device has a visual me-

ter, an electronic compass and an output for a chart recorder an output for a computer. Rather than spend their time search-ing the skies they monitor their device looking for a rapid change in the field that UFOs create, which are often power-ful enough to stop cors, interinterful enough to stop cars, fere with radio transmissions, and have even been reported to rip off the corrugated iron roofs

of homes in Africa. Every day Reynolds records the measurements of the electro-magnetic field in his area and shares the informa-tion with MUFON members across the country. The device is experimental and its value as a UFO detector is still being

a UFO detector is still being determined. Reynolds is the head of the local MUFON chapter in the Elkton area. His group meets periodically to discuss UFOs and says that in the future some meetings will be open to the public. He is as passionate about

the public. He is as passionate about this field, as his other more "ac-ceptable" pursuits in archaeol-ogy and electronics and is con-sidered by many to be an expert on the subject. But he does not pursue this field for recognition but rather, as Albert Einsten once said, he does it because "to investigate the unknown is the true love and joy of science." true love and joy of science.

UFO convention lands here to discuss close encounters

Bringing stories of abduction, strange circles on the ground and other mysterious goings-on, some 100 UFO devotees had a close encounter with Salisbury on Sun-

day. Meeting at the Agriculture Center on Old Concord Road, members of the Mutual UFO Network of North Carolina swapped theories and looked at drawings and photos of aliens and. flving saucers. flying saucers.

flying saucers. Exhibits included a plaster cast of the head of an alien and the nude model of a space vixen said to have seduced a Brazilian farmer into otherworldly sex. There were line drawings of UFO sightings in North Carolina and two full scrapbooks of news-

paper clippings going back to the 1950s.

Salisbury has had its share of Salisbury has had its share of UFO reports, club founder George Fawcett said, including a 1979 landing in the yard of Sam Martin. Martin and his son were awak-ened during the night by a strange beeping sound coming from outside the house, Fawcett said. They got up to investigate, but then changed their minds and went back to bed.

The next morning, Martin said, The next morning, warun sau, they found a 12-foot circle im-pressed onto their front yard. Inside the ring were marks that they said appeared to have been left by the craft's landing gear. Martin said he's seen UFOs as recently as Christmas of 1990.

recently as Christmas of 1990. "I was on Patterson Road near China Grove about 10 p.m.,"

Martin told a reporter. "It was basically just three big circles of light that turned from orange to white." He said he watched the UFOs fly in and out of formation. One of them zipped up and hov-ered, he said, remaining sta-tionary as a star.

A Davie County man who wouldn't give his name hasn't been as lucky: He's been interested in UFOs since the 1950s but has yet

to make his first sighting. Like many UFO believers, the man wouldn't give his name for fear of being ridiculed. His wife claimed to have seen UFOs on two occasions.

Martin said people who believe martin said people who believe in UFOs are more likely to have an encounter with one. "Sometimes if you go looking for things, you find them," he said.

"At Begeland Abbey in North Yorkshire, while the Abbot and Monks were in the Reflectorium, a flat, round, shining, silvery disk flew over the Abbey and caused the utmost of terror." Space Ship Crashes John W. Ellis, owner of the Ellis ranch located in Dundy County, Nebraska, and several of his cowboys were branding cattle in the north section of the ranch when they witnessed the crash of a starship on June 6, 1884. The men heard a loud whirling or roaring noise overhead. Looking up the men saw a flaming object hurding loward the group quickly rode to the crash size. The group quickly rode to the crash size There they found acceted over.

The group quickly rode to the crash site. There they found, scattered over a wide area, parts of a cigar shaped airship and pieces of machinery that were still inte sely hot.

This strange craft had hit the ground and skidded for more than half a mile, leaving a trail of machinery and metal in its wake.

its wake. The ground around the wreckage was white hot and bubbling like a lava flow. One of the cowboys approached the wreckage and was severely burned and hospitalized. An account of the wreck

was reported in "The Nebraska Nugget." The main section of the airship he come to rest in a ravine. Sand in the arc where the craft first hit, was fused in hed

where the craft first hit, was fused into glass over an area of approximately 20 feet in width and over 30 feet in length. Cowboys from the neighboring ranches visited the crash site and for hours the wreckage continued to give off intense heat which prevented anyone from getting close to the wreck. The next day, Brand Inspector, E.W. Rawlins, Alf Williamson a local ratcher and others inspected the site and were able to get a closer look at parts of the wreck which were some distance from the main part of the still white-hot wreckage. An inspection showed that the craft An inspection showed that the craft

An inspection showed that the craft had been cylindrical in shape, about 60 feet long and 12 feet in diameter. The Lincoln Daily Journal speculated, "that the craft no doubt was from another planet."

That the craft to doubt was from another planet." Aliens are still figting over the Dundy County area twelve years after the crash of one of their space ships. From The Hebron Journal (Kansas) 26th February, 1897. "For several weeks the state papers have been mentioning the appearance of a supposed air ship which has been visible only at night, The State Journal has the following: "People of Beatrice, Wymore and Hastings were excited last night over the appearance of a strange light about half a mile above ground. The light was kite shaped and the color of a lantern. It was visible to the people of Beatrice for a time. Then it would recede to appear again more plainly at some other point.

time. Then it would recede to appear again more plainly at some other point. It was proceeding in a northern direction. It was seen about 10:40 at Beatrice. At Hastings it seemed to be about half a mile above ground and was moving towards the Kansas line. The Charleston Area reports: "At Edina, Missouri on November 23, 1886, a man and his three sons were pulling corn on a farm. Something flashed from the sky. The man was slightly injured, one son was killed, the other seriously injured, the third disappeared."

disappeared." The British Academy reported in April The British Academy reported in April 9, 1876, the explosion of a highly luminous object in the sky over Bohemia. The glare was said to have been as bright as the sun and immediately after the flash was a detonation that lasted for nearly two minutes.

The following day there was a explosion approximately 250 from the first. imile

explosion approximately 250 miles from the first. Astronomers investigating the phenomenon have determined that the source of the explosions came from nearly the same points in the sky. It appears that the explosions originated in the constellation Cassiopeia, with only 2 degrees difference in the right ascension and absolutely no difference in declination. The constellation Cassiopeia is not too distant from Earth. One might speculate that the inhabitants of Cassiopeia developed the Atomic Bomb, one hundred years before us, and vaporized themselves before our very eyes.

In 1896 and 1897 there were dozens of reports of strange flying lights and cigar shaped crafts in U.S. newspapers. In February of 1897 reports of a strange craft and mysterious lights in the night skies issued from many parts of Nebrasks. By March, sightings were made in

neighboring Kansas. In April, more than 10,000 residents of more than 10,000 residents of Kansas City, Missouri, watched a large black airship hovering in the sky over that city. The object apeared very swiftly, then appeared to stop and hover over the city for ten minutes at a time, then after flashing green-blue and white lights, shot upwards into space. "In July 1896 a railroad mail clerk named Croisenberg, reported a round

named Crotsenberg, reported a round light that floated about 100 feet above light that Hoated about 100 rect above the ground, suddenly rose to a great height and went off in a horthernly direction. This sighting occurred while the train he was on was traveling northward out of Trenton, Missouri" -Monthly Weather Review

Monthly Weather Review. "On the night of April 2nd 1897 there were mysterious lights in the skies over Kansas City. The lights are much like a very powerful searchlight. The light was beamed down to the start of t

very powerful searchlight. The light was beamed down to the ground from some sort of airship, moving at a rapid rate of speed." New York Sun. "During the night of April 9th 1897, lights were seen over the northwest section of Chicago. Thousands of spectators claimed the lights were on an airship or some object traveling miles above the earth." - New York Herald. This might be the same airship that was sighted over Kansas City the week before.

Was signled over Kansas City the week before. Neosho Rapids, Kansas: Alexander Hamilton, reported in 1890 that an airship descended from the skles to gather up one of his fat helfers and salled away with it. He even swore he could see the people in the airship as it departed. About a century ago the State of Alabama received its share of UFO sightings: "An object shaped like a cone was seen flying through the air

"An object shaped like a cone was seen flying through the air leaving a trail of fire and smoke and making a roar like a speeding train. The force of it passing overhead, knocked down small trees, small buildings, and smashed windows and fences. The citizens of Birmingham, Alabama were in a state of near-panic. The authorities were as bewildered as the people." Birmingham Morning News, 7th December 1872.

Birmingham Morning News, 7th December 1872. This is not the account of a hysterical individual which can be written off as a hallucination. Here we have hundreds of witnesses and physical evidence. Damage to physical evidence. Damage to property, which can not be denied, is surely conclusive evidence that a rocket propelled airship passed over Birmingham on that day in 1872. But, no one in this world had a rocket ship; no one had an airplane. There are more than 200 billion stars in our own Galaxy, the Milky Way. It has been estimated that within our Galaxy there may be a million stars on which intelligent life exists.

Sightings by residents of Chariton County: Your author has never seen an Uniden-tified Flying Object. What he has seen is an Identified Space Craft. One night about midnight, nearly forty years ago, I was standing in front of my house and heard a loud noise, simi-lar to a fast freight train. massing overlar to a fast freight train, passing overhead

Looking up I saw a huge rectangular shaped craft, passing directly overhead at a high rate of speed. I could only see the bottom of the craft, which contained of hundreds of yellow lights. I could not de-termine the altitude of the craft nor the size. There was a body above the banks of lights but it was unlit and appeared as a dark mass of undetermined form.

This strange craft was in view for

only five or six seconds. I never saw a space craft again until October of this past year... I was walking my dog, at the rear of the Brunswicker office, at about 10 p.m. The sky was excep-tionally clear, except for two small strings of dark grey clouds which ap-peared to outline an opening in that portion of the sky.

tion of the sky. Looking towards the west I noticed some bright lights heading to the east. I presumed it to be a plane coming out of Kansas City Airport. As the craft reached a point nearly overhead, I realized it was not a plane. There were rows of hundreds of vallow lights becauth the ship. I ware not a plane. Inere were rows of nunareas of yellow lights beneath the ship. I was able to see a large form above the lights which was the super-structure of the craft. This huge bulk was unlit but it was gi-gantic. I was able to distinguish the form because of the bright sky and the moon-light. The bottom of the craft was rect-angular. The upper structure was cylindri-cal. This craft looked exactly like the one I had seen forty years before.

The space ship continued east. I con-tinued to watch the yellow lights. Then it appeared to enter a point somewhere between the two strings of grey clouds. It entered what I believe to be an opening, and then, it suddenly disappeared. There is no question in my mind. I

saw the same type craft on two occasions, forty years apart. What I saw were two

two space ships. Not from this planet, but surely from some other planet.

years. Even his boss, Sheriff Clarence Dupnik, says Dean is out of this world. But that's exactly Bob Dean's problem. Dean accuses the sheriff and other county officials of failing to name him as years

Pima County's top emergency-services official because of Dean's interest in TIMES.

official because of Dean's interest in UFOs. Does Dean, a veteran of 27 years in the Army, believe in unidentified flying objects? He replies, "That's like asking me whether I believe in Boeing 747s. I've seen military documents about UFOs. I was assigned to NATO, had top-secret clearance and I read studies about them." about them.

about them. Dean, who's affiliated with a couple of networks of UFO buffs, makes no attempt to hide his interest in the subject.

subject. "But I'm not a flake," he says. "Tve not been one of these people who runs around wearing little hats and tee shirts and go off to all these strange conventions.... I don't run off on little tangents and talk about little green men, and I have a right to the den igh

tangents and talk about little green men, and I have a right to the damn job because I earned it." Whatever is going on up in the sky, Sheriff Dupnik is taking a drubbing down on the surface of the planet. Dean has filed suit in Pima County Superior Court, alleging violation of his right to free speech and also accusing the county of age/gender bias (a charge supported by the results of county and state probes). The national magazine UFO calls the

state probes). The national magazine UFO calls the case "perhaps the first lawsuit of its kind." And when it comes to UFO buffs, count former Attorney General Bob

Corbin as a sympathizer. "People have a right to believe in whatever they want to believe," says Corbin, who makes no secret of his own avid interest in such subjects as the legendary Lost Dutchman gold mine. "I have an interest in UFOs, too. I don't know whether I 'believe' in them or not. But I'm sure interested in them. It's fun. Does that make me not qualified to be attorney general?" That's a sentiment echoed by Karen Paulsen, Dean's top rival for the position, who describes him as a "highly competent professional who's deserving of the job." Paulsen says, "He's interested in UFOs; I'm interested in antiques. He pursues his interest on his ure time Why where hid its mettere?"

Interested in OFOS, 1 in interested in antiques. He pursues his interest on his own time. Why should it matter?" More than a year ago, Dean finished No. 2 to Paulsen in a formal competition for the job. Despite county procedures, after Paulsen turned down the post,

Do you believe in UFOs? "That's like asking me whether I believe in Boeing 747s."

Dean never was offered it. The current boss wasn't even a candidate for the job, and in fact, served on the panel that gave Dean his lofty ranking. The lawsuit is a long way from a trial date, but just last week, the civil-rights division of the Arizona Attorney General's Office told Dean it had decided there is "reasonable cause to believe that discrimination has occurred" on the age/gender issue. A

believe that discrimination has occurred" on the age/gender issue. A Fima County investigation already had produced a similar finding. The results of the attorney general's investigation are still confidential, and assistant attorney general Heather Sigworth won't comment. Officials in the Sheriff's Department aren't talking

about the case, either. "Our official comment is that we won't comment," says Sergeant Rick Kastigar. But one theory, according to a source close to the case, is that Dupnik wanted to hire a woman for the job, but couldn't cite Deay's gender or age as a reason to bire a woman for the job, but couldn't cite Dean's gender or age as a reason for not offering him the post after Paulsen turned it down. According to this scenario, Dupnik decided to cite Dean's interest in UFOs. That has left the door open for Dean and his attorney, Ron Stolkin, to claim that Dupnik is violating Dean's First Amendment right to free speech. A key piece of evidence in the case is Dupnik's sworn testimony last January 9 to the attorney general's civil-rights investigators. In Dupnik's statement, according to Stolkin, the sheriff said of Dean: "Here's a person who in my opinion has an unusual belief. I am not saying a person can't believe whatever

saying a person can't believe whatever they want to believe, and there are a whole lot of well-thought-of people— scientists included—who happen to believe in UFOs. I don't happen to be

As I was going up the stair I met a man who wasn't there. He wasn't there again today – Oh, how I wish he'd go away.

ANON That's the way it is with UFO After 44 years no one has pro-duced one. But they refuse to go

away. I was working the night shift at I was working the night shift at The Oregonian newsroom June 24, 1947, the day that Kenneth Arnold, then 32, triggered the UFO avalanche. He reported see-ing saucer-like objects so bright that they blinded him flying be-tween Mt. Rainier and Mt. Ad-ams at 1200 miles an hour. He said first there was one, undu-lating like a fish, then it split into three, then nine, then merged back into one and vanished. three, then nine, then merged back into one and vanished. He didn't report them to aero-

nautical radio stations at the time. But when he landed in Pendleton, Associated Press put a bulletin on the wire. The story spread like wildfire.

spread like wildfire. THE SAUCER'S reported speed of 1200 miles an hour was twice the official world's speed record of 647 miles an hour, had recently been set by a U.S. Air Force P80. Some "experts" spec-ulated that Arnold had seen a se-cret new Army fighter alane cret new Army fighter plane. Others speculated that it was a mirage or optical illusion.

Other pilots were in the vicini-ty, including United Air Linës captain C.J. Smith who was fly-ing a DC3 over the route. But none of them saw the "saucers." Later, on July 8, captain Smith reported that as he approached Boise, he saw flying saucers fly-ing just off his left wing. He said first there was one, then five, then they vanished suddenly. He said his co-pilot and stewardess Marty Morrow also saw it. The passengers all said they saw nothing.

nothing. Within a few days mass hy ria swept the country. Everyone from Seattle to Kansas City and Miami to Matanuaka was seeing Miami to Matanusia was seeing flying saucers. UFOs were re-ported skimming over Portland, Vancouver and Woodland. Every new UFO headline triggered a deluge of additional sightings.

ONE TEXAS PREACHER de-

clared this was a portent of the second coming of Christ. The Rev. Lester Carlson, La Grande Gospel pastor, issued a public statement declaring that the sau-cers signaled the end of the world cers s world.

On July 5 Oregonian reporter Paul Ewing took off from an Ore-gon City airstrip in a light plane flown by a private pilot to chase reported UFOs, but wound up "disc-gusted."

"disc-gusted." I'll reluctantly admit that I, too, briefly flew "UFO patrol." While on a night training flight in an Air Force C46 twin-engined transport we responded to re-ports of a flying saucer over Port-land, but found only a lighted weather balloon, released by the meteorologists to measure winds aloft aloft

By July 7 Air National Guard pilots at Portland Air Base, Boise and Spokane were patrolling the skies for the elusive saucers, with negative results.

THE SAUCER SCARE later turned serious when saucer be-lievers claimed that an Idaho Na-tional Guard pilot had been shot down by a UFO.

down by a UFO. Investigators reported that two jet fighter pilots, without oxygen, had scrambled to chase a report-ed UFO. The wing man broke off when he reached 15,000 feet and returned to base. The flight lead-er continued to climb until he passed out from lack of oxygen and crashed.

Controllers in the tower identi-id the "UFO" as the planet Ve-C

Arnold later said he believed the objects he saw were living beings, with a round, pulsating heart in the middle of their backs. The last time I saw Ar-nold, years later, he came into the Oregonian newsroom and said he was searching for little green men from Mars about two feet high. He said you find them in the shrubs at the edge of your garden

Finally, in the late 1960s, the Air Force contracted with Ed-ward Condon, a recognized authority on physics, to investigate the UFO phenomenon in Project Blue Book. After studying hun-dreds of reports the scientists explained all but a handful of inci-dents as natural phenomenon – lights of airplanes, helicopters, balloons, mirages and optical il-lusions. Physicists pointed out that nothing but a beam of light could dash across the sky at thousands of miles an hour and change course 90 or 180 degrees instantly as some UFOs were reported to do. THE FACT that a handful of

incidents could not be explained does not mean that they involved little purple people-eaters from Pluto. That was the conclusion of Robert J. Low, project coordina-tor, who later became assistant to the president of Portland State

University. Over the years UFOs faded out of the headlines, but the surveys indicate that some 15 million Americans still believe in them and their alien passengers from outer space. Scores of believers

He says he was surprised that Dupnik even knew of his interest in the subject. "If I were out here on the street making a damn fool out of myself and being on the front page of the papers and being on television and acting like an idiot, yes, I can see where the sheriff might find that that would be troublesome," says Dean. "But a bunch of people decided, having examined my credentials and my having gone of people decided, having examined my credentials and my having gone through the entire hiring process, that I was qualified enough to be No. 2 on a list of final selectees. They must have determined that my professional capabilities were the things they were looking at." Stolkin says he gave the sheriff's office "an opportunity to resolve this


office "an opportunity to resolve this case with no embarrassment" but that "the word from on high—the sheriff—is 'no deal.'" Well, Dean says, he's not giving

Well, Dean says, he's not giving ground, either. "I'm an old retired command sergeant major, and I didn't take this easily." Dean says. "It really angered the hell out of me." With a chuckle, he adds, "I have since kind of settled down. I've copied a little cartoon out of a newspaper, with an old guru telling a guy, 'Simply sit there, center yourself and sue the bastards." While the legal battle continues, Dean still works as an emergency plans and

While the legal battle continues, Dea still works as an emergency plans and operations officer and the city/county radiological training officer. Among his duties, Dean trains deputies, cops and fire inspectors and responds to hazardous-material spills. hours. Residents first reported seeing a strange light around 5 p.m. and, as night fell, the unidenti-fied light source drew several spectators out of their homes to gaze into the heavens. The talk of a UFO brought other passersby to the area. "It was a great big blue light

that looked like something was shooting out of it," said Nancy Steen of Killian Drive off High way 105. "It was between East High and Draytonville ... had never seen anything like it ... most wierd looking thing I ever seen in my life. I kept thinking little green men would start flying.

"We watched it until about 12, trying to figure this thing out," said Steen, who took to the street in her car to look for the origin of the mysterious beam.

Ledger photographer Steve Earley was on the scene and went back to the area this morning to investigate further. He found a recently-erected mobile telephone service tower at the end of Frye Road (see photo on this page) off Highway 105 that was probably the source of the confusion.

The Cherokee County Sheriff's Department nor the Gaffney Police Department have record of any calls concerning UFOs last night, dispatchers said this morning, but reporters' lines did stay busy until well past midnight.

The sighting was in very close proximity to a spot near Dray-tonville Baptist Church where residents claimed to see UFO's for several nights in a row during the later 1960's. At that time, large groups of people would gather in the Draytonville area to watch the strange lights appear and then disappear in the night sky. That sighting was also in early summer and has never been officially explained. UFO sightings have not been

uncommon in Cherokee County but it has been a number of years since any significant number were reported.



UFO experiences hit common chord


Support groups can lend an ear

Times staff reporter Imagine this: You're an aver-age, middle-aged engineer and builder, a father, husband and resident of a traditional-values town in Nebraska. Over a short period of time, you come to realize you've spent the last five decades of your life being intermittently abducted and studied by aliens. Quick — what do you say to your wife? And if you're the wife, what do you reply? John Foster doesn't remember what the said exactly. His wife remembers a little more. "I laid in bed and said, 'Oh yeah?'" she recalls. Foster does remember the fear he experienced when the memo-ries began to pound a crack in the mental wall he believes aliens erected to prevent him from re-membering. Slowly, he says, he remem-

erected to prevent him from re-membering. Slowly, he says, he remem-bered thousands of encounters, and even the size and shapes of the ships or enclosures into which he was taken. He remembered an examining table, an alien with a wig ("To make you more at ease," she told him) and conversations with extraterrestrials who called themselves the "monitors of the Earth." Earth.

Larth." The emerging memories shat-tered him. "I was completely dev-astated," he remembers. "I had to change my concept of what reality was." TIMES/POST-INTELLIGENCER, Seattle

Coming out isn't easy for those who have spent years in the UFO closet, and Foster, now 53, says he's deeply grateful for the support he finally found in groups such as Seattle's UFO Contact Center In-ternational ternational.

At an open house yesterday at West Seattle's Camp Long, the UFO Contact Center's director and founder, Aileen Bringle, said her group acts primarily to help people "examine and assimilate their traumatic abduction experiences." That might include hypnosis or group support said Bringle who

That might include hypnosis or group support, said Bringle, who started the group after what she believes was an other-world en-counter in 1953, when she awoke from a nap in a car being driven by her husband to find the nighttime Oregon landscape fully illuminated by bright green lights. Now there are 17 centers around the U.S., and the local group holds two meetings every month – one open to the public. (For more information, call 946-2248.)

Wearing a silver mylar top and UFO earrings, Bringle isn't shy about her work. She explained that she has become a hypnotist, work-ing with those who have had "abduction experiences" to help them recall – the first step to assimilating. "They get depressed. It's a whole change of life, a change in the way you see everything," she said. After John Foster began re-

After John Foster began re-After John Foster began re-membering his experiences, he looked for others who had had similar encounters, he remembers. "I couldn't find anybody. I almost went crazy," he says. "For over a year, I thought I was the only one in the universe who had this knowledge." His wife, Annie, believed hm but couldn't really offer much, she says. "Even as much as I care

says. "Even as much as I care about John, I couldn't really under-stand. I could support and empath-ize, but I couldn't really under-stand it," she says. Finally, he found a group simi-

lar to Seattle's UFO Center in Nebraska, which brought him to-gether with a number of others who believed they'd had encoun-ters with aliens. It was an incredi-ble relief, he recalled, to be able to share and compare his experiences with others.

share and compare his experiences with others. Yesterday, Foster talked to a group of about a dozen who gathered at Camp Long and showed the skillful pencil draw-ings he made of his experiences, including renderings of spaceships and long-limbed aliens. His thousands of visits with these aliens, he said, included ceremonial events similar to initi-ations, and a "time travel" visit to a huge project to come, a swath of learning and healing centers, or-phanages and nursing homes from the Mississippi River to Jackson Hole, Wyo. He will have a role in that project, he believes. Foster has finally gotten com-fortable talking about the encoun-ters, he said. The first time he discussed them, about three years ago, he remembers feeling trauma-tized. Right afterward, he had a heart attack, which he said the aliens predicted. These days, Annie Foster said, their lives are settling down. "At

aliens predicted. These days, Annie Foster said, their lives are settling down. "At first, our lives were obsessed. It creates quite a strain in a family," she said. "As time goes on, it's getting better. It doesn't consume our lives – we can actually do other things." He's not sure what the UFO encounters mean, but John Fos-ter's sure what he'd say to others: If you've had an experience, he says, "Get help as soon as possi-ble, because it's really devastat-ing."

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WHY ASK **RYE?**

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Tere Kristovich and Kit McCrav have turned their summer vacation into grand obsession. While traveling in England last year,

the two women visited several crop circles, mysterious formations that pop

up overnight in grain fields. Wheat, rye and other grassy crops are found cleanly bent into strange patterns, not only circles but also dumbbells, arrows only circles but also dumbbells, arrow and lines hundreds of feet long; in recent years, some have been found with the plants intricately woven together. No cereal killers, the formations leave the plants undamaged and last until the crop is harvested or dies back in the winter. The first crop circle to be documented was drawn by artists in seventeenthcentury. Furope but these

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documented was drawn by artists in seventeenth-century Europe, but they are now found all over the world. Last year, more than 400 were reported in southern England alone, where the enigmatic patterns are becoming as common as fish-and-chip shops. While a handful of scientists are actively studying the strange phenomenon, Kristovich and McCray wonder why it hasn't captured the rest of the world's imagination. Perhaps that's because much of the debate on the origin of the circles has come from the fringe, new-age nonsense that attributes the circles to UFOs or supernatural beings. People UFOs or supernatural beings. People find the circles easy to dismiss, admits Kristovich, a Louisville psychotherapist, because many of the theories surrounding them are,

well, goofy. Still, she points out, the circles are as real as they are unexplainable. Unlike the Abominable Snowman or the Bermuda Triangle, the crop circles

are easily photographed, touched and visited. There's no denying they exist. "Don't you think it's odd that something this widespread and prolific is hardly discussed in the news? Maybe it's because people don't feel safe to say what's on their minds," says McCray, a Boulder nurse. "But there's also a great deal of freedom in asking the bigger questions." After their trip, Kristovich and McCray formed Wider Circles, dedicated to spreading the word about

McCray formed Wider Circles, dedicated to spreading the word about crop circles throughout the Denver area with slide shows and lectures. They have emerged as two of the foremost American experts in the field, and they've been invited to present the American perspective on crop circles later this fall at the First Annual Cerealogist Conference in England.

"There's really no one good explanation," Kristovich says. "None of the theories answer all the questions." Which is fine with the heads of Wider Circles. They'd rather ask questions than provide answers. "We don't like to give our own views or any conclusions," says Kristovich. "We just like to point out that our view of the world could be bigger than it is. To give the answers would stop the questions." questions.

Some scientists who would rather have answers believe the crop circles are caused by whirlwinds, the Earth's magnetic energy, weather patterns or fungi. Others claim they're created by hopped-up hedgehogs running around the fields.

But these ideas haven't really panned out. What is clear, however, is

that the circles are neither man-made nor the product of a hoax. Researchers haven't found tracks or footprints near the circles, and the crops nearby are undisturbed. Scientists who try to reproduce the patterns by bending or heating the plants find it's impossible to do without breaking the stems or killing the plants.

to do without breaking the stems or killing the plants. "The curiosity of this should pull you in," says McCray. "Unfortunately, in Western culture there's not much left to be curious about. But if you don't keep asking questions about the mysteries of the world, we're dead." Not that the women don't have their own pet theory. "My personal feeling— and this is not an explanation, since this is still a mystery—is that it's

and this is not an explanation, since this is still a mystery—is that it's not alien," explains Kristovich. "It's something that's part of us, an intelligent energy that we have lost touch with or have never gotten in touch with before. We do know that there's some form of energy level involved, since the circles throw off compasses."

involved, since the circles throw off compasses." There haven't been any recent reports of crop circles in Colorado, but a 90-year-old woman who attended a recent Wider Circles lecture remembered strange patterns that used to show up in the fields near her childhood home in Pueblo. While many English farmers are afraid the circles will somehow taint their crops, making them unmarketable, Colorado growers are more open-minded.

"We recently did a lecture at the Louisville Rec Center that was attended by a lot of farmers, guys who have seen everything," Kristovich says. "When we finished, the biggest question they had was, 'How can we get some of these crop circles in our fields?"" --Mike O'Keeffe

Personally. I have had two episodes which are difficult to explain. During the summer of 1953, when I was 14. I had the distinct impression that I had been car-ried from my bed by strange non-human-look-ing beings and taken to a remote coal strippings operation about a mile from my home. I boarded a "flying saucer" kind of craft, and the strange beings examined me for what appeared to be an hour.

hour. When I awoke at 8 a.m., I was in my bed. Ev-erything seemed precisely the same as when I went to bed just before midnight. I figured it was a bad dream brought on by the terror I ex-perienced having seen War of the Worlds just a

Later that day, my mother scolded me for tracking coal through the house from the cellar.





But I hadn't been in the cellar in several days and, as best I could figure out, hadn't been around coal to get the soles of my shoes dirty. Had I really been walking in the strippings the night before? night before

night before? Then, nearly 20 years later, on March 1, 1973, I fell asleep on the living room floor while watch-ing television. At about 8 p.m., I awoke with a start, and for some inexplicable reason, I was compelled to go into the front yard and look into the sky — some-thing I never did before.

I saw eight UFOs. They were flying in a "V" formation in a southwesterly direction (toward **Saylorsburg, Pa.J. The objects seemed to be** rounded masses, maybe 10 times the size of the evening star (Venus) on a bright, cloudless night. The objects seemed to emit a bluish-white light with a pinkish glow.

They stopped periodically as if assessing the situation, moved a bit further, then stopped again. They continued doing this until they disappeared about 10 minutes after I first saw them

The next morning, when I arrived at work, I heard that many people in the Saylor's Lake area of Monroe County had seen and described similar objects at about the same time. Among them was state police Trooper Jeffrey Hontz who saw four of the objects.

What made me awake at precisely that mo-ment, but more scary, what made me go outside to look heavenward? Was it coincidence?

Later that year, on Oct. 11, 1973, two shipyard workers out fishing in Pascagoula, Miss., claimed they were taken aboard an egg-shaped UFO and examined by three silvery-skinned creatures with no eyes — an apt description of the creatures in my dream of 20 years earlier. These creatures examined the men, photo-graphed them, then took them back to the river-side pier from which they were picked up. I am not a believer. In fact, I am skeptical and cynical about UFO sightings, but I can't wait un-til 1993 to see whether these 20-year episodes will continue.

Unusual field marking leaves residents baffled for explanation.

A typical hot and humid Friday in May became a very unusual day as soon as Linda Parsons opened the mini-blinds in her office. In the field below her window a large, semi-circu-lar pattern appeared in the 3-foot tall, reedy grass which now lays flat against the ground. About the size of a small house, the area shows

About the size of a small house, the area shows no car tracks or footprints in or out. As unusual as it was, Parsons recognized something very familiar. 
Parsons, who is Office Manager of PHCC Indiana, called a local radio station. Following its initial report, the station took phone calls regarding the incident most of the morning. By the crowds of people at the site, it was evident her directions this year were quite clear. Onlookers and gawkers came armed with cameras and theories.

"It's probably just migratory birds. That would explain the 'every year at the same time' occurrence," says one spectator. However, the absence of feathers or droppings seems to shoot that theory.

Other possibilities include a down-wind current, a helicopter hovering, animals bedding down during the night, or, perhaps the most unusual explanation, a UFO landing. Whatever it was made very little noise, ac-

cording to local law enforcement authorities. There were no reports on file with either the Marion County or Hamilton County Sheriff's office regarding the incident. **

Roswell, N.M.: The UFO story that won't go away

On July 8, 1947, something crashed in the desert near Roswell, N.M., that has been the subject of speculation for decades despite countless denials by the Air Force that it was a UFO.

Strange lights in the New Mexico sky 44

Strange lights in the New Mexico sky 44 years ago this weekend may have been any-thing but fireworks. A dedicated band of UFO researchers thinks an alien spacecraft – or possibly two – blew apart and crashed in the desert near Roswell, N.M., on July 8, 1947. They say local ranchers and Air Force officials found the bodies of three wrinkled little humanoids near strewn collections of unknown light-weight ultra-strong materials

near strewn collections of unknown light-weight, ultra-strong materials. But you've never read about it in anything other than the supermarket tabloids. It was covered up, says Ron Westrum, a so-ciology professor at Eastern Michigan Uni-versity. After initially reporting that they had found an alien spacecraft wreck, officials at the Roswell Army Air Field retracted the statement and reported that they'd only found parts of a weather balloon.

Westrum and his colleagues in the Fund for UFO Research are confident there were aliens and the Pentagon went to extraordi-nary lengths to erase it. Accounts of the Roswell incident have been

Accounts of the Roswell incident have been pieced together through interviews with about 70 witnesses to various portions of the crash and recovery, including Air Force intel-ligence officials who said they were ordered to make up a story about the strange materi-als that were recovered.

"Here is something that – if it's true – changes the whole way we think about things," Westrum says from the book-lined den of his Ann Arbor home.

Westrum is a board member of the Mary-land-based Fund for UFO Research, which has bankrolled some of the research leading to the book "UFO Crash at Roswell," which was published last month. Another book, as yet untitled, is in progress.

Don Berliner, an aviation writer from Alex-andria, Va., who also is on the UFO Fund board, is working on an account of the other. less-publicized, July 8, 1947, crash that oc-curred 75 miles from the Roswell crash. There, searchers allegedly found a largely in-tact saucer-shaped craft with a gash in its side. In the shadow of the machine, they found two dead aliens, another one dying and a fourth alive and very frightened, Berlin-er says. er says

and a fourth alive and very frightened, Bertin-er says. In both instances, the evidence is motinting that something happened and that the gov-ernment covered it up, Berliner says. "It's so highly classified that hardly anyone in the government would know about this." The Air Force did not respond to inquiries about the UFO reports of people being abducted by aliens are what Westrum calls "hidden events." Child molestation, ball light-ning and spontaneous combustion are things people don't talk about because it re-flects poorly on them, he says. "It's not the kind of thing that's going to get you promoted and if you want to be the captain of a 747. you're not going to make it," Westrum says. Westrum says his colleagues at EMU are amused by his pursuit of extraterrestrials, but he notes that editors of journal articles he has written about hidden events have cut out references to UFOs.

references to UFOs.

references to UFOs. The UFO research focus now is toward re-ports of abduction by aliens, an incident which may have happened to one out of 30 people, Westrum says. "You're really talking about your worst childhood nightmare. The thing comes in the middle of the night, weap-ons don't work on it and mommy and daddy are frozen." Alleged abductees report being held for hours against their will and having the sensa-tion that their private parts are being probed.

tion that their private parts are being probed. Westrum says. Post-traumatic stress disor-der is a common mental health malady after-

is a common mental health malady a ward, leaving victims with a strange sensitivity to things like flashing lights, leprechauns or the almond-eyed alien pictured on the cover of the paperback "Report on Commu-nion," by Ed Conroy. The victims of such abductions say it happens again and again and they are helpless to stop it, Wes-trum says. "I can't imagine what this does to families." The reports of sexual molesta-

they are helpless to stop it, wes-trum says. "I can't imagine what this does to families." The reports of sexual molesta-tions sound a little suspicious, par-ticularly if they are coming from children, says Neil Kalter, director of the University of Michigan's Cen-ter for Child and Family. "It sounds like a way for kids to try to commu-nicate something that was scary and had a forbidden quality to it." Westrum says abduction happens to adults, too, and to people in all parts of the country and all walks of life. "As far as I can tell, there's no-sociological pattern to it." he says. Bring it up in a group and you'll find that experiences of UFO ab-duction are quite common, Wes-trum says. "Until you do a survey, you don't know. We're thinking of doing a national survey." Simply sighting a UFO also is more common than you might guess, he says. Although the Air Force officially disbanded its UFO study "Project Blue Book" in 1968, Westrum and Berliner feel confident there still is a a high-level group in the govern-ment working on UFOs. "It's very hush-hush," Westrum says. With countless billions of stars in the universe, and unknown num-bers of planets around them, statis-tically, many believe Earth isn't the only pebble with life on it. "You're

bers of planets around them, statis-tically, many believe Earth isn't the only pebble with life on it. "You're probably talking about thousands of other technological civilizations out there," Westrum says. So why is it the aliens that Earth-lings describe always have two legs and a face with two eyes, a nose and mouth?

and a face with two eyes, a nose and mouth? "I don't know," Westrum says. "One can make an argument for parallel evolution." So where are the bodies of the 3½-foot-tall aliens that were recov-ered in New Mexico? "We haven't the foggiest idea," Berliner says. "They could have been moved 96 and a half times since then. They could be buried under the White House." Berliner blames the supermarket

under the White House." Berliner blames the supermarket tabloids, the government and the scientific community for the paucity of solid UFO research. Science "has left a vacuum that amateurs have had to fill." The tabloids almost seem to be working with the gov-ernment to make UFO reports seem silly, Berliner says.



A CHILEAN MAN CLAIMS HE MADE LOVE TO AN EXTRATERRESTRIAL WOMAN

SANTIAGO DE CHILE. (EFE) - A 56 year old Chilean man claims that twelve years ago he had intercourse with an extraterrestrial woman.

The man's statements are published in the paper "La Cuarta," included in a report related to unidentified flying objects (UFOs).

Gaspar M.H. disclosed that he spent four hours inside a spaceship, talked telepathically with the crew and had intercourse with an extraterrestrial

His account goes back to 1978, when at the time of the southern winter in a Chilean region a thousand kilometers [621 miles] from Santiago, the engine of his vehicle stopped while he was astonished looking at a large spaceship with many bright lights that was hovering above his car.

In his report to the paper he says that the extraterrestrials managed to communicate telepathically with him, and later on took him up to the ${\sf UFO}$ where he was laid on a table that adapted to his body and skin samples were taken.

They later threw water at him which, they said, was to decontaminate him, and he had intercourse with the extraterrestrial woman.

He also said that physically the woman had a white-pinkish skin, blue eyes that were bigger than those of earthlings, and her height did not exceed 150 centimeters [4.92 feet].

He still has some burn scars on his head which, he claims, were produced by a light that came from the spaceship.

Gaspar M.H. is one of fourteen persons registered by MUFON-Chile - an organization that studies these phenomena - who has experienced the so-called CEIII.

The paper claims that the man was examined by psychiatrists and under deep hypnosis he recounted his experience in the same terms.

GIANT UFO SEEN IN CHILE

SANTIAGO DE CHILE - A giant unidentified flying object (UFO) was seen by more than a hundred people, among them two carabinieri (military police), when it landed on top of a hill in the coastal sector of the town of Limari, 400 km [248.5 miles] north of Santiago. The event, which was reported by the newspaper "La Tercera" took place last Wednesday and aside from the policemen, miners, peasants and truckers were also witnesses and confirmed that the UFO became visible at about 1:30 pm that day.

Several of the witnesses who reported the event said that at first they thought it was a satellite dish, but however, when they approached they could see it was a space ship measuring some one hundred meters [328 feet] in diameter by some 20 meters [65 feet] in height and emitted strongly colored lights.

Francisco Pena Diaz, who is second corporal in the carabinieri and his partner, Luis Lobos Medina, stated that the UFO had landed in an inaccessible place. Just three months ago, according to the witnesses' criptions, two other spectacular UFOs were seen in the city of Arica, bordering with Peru, 2,050 km [approximately 1,273 miles] north of Santiago. The skies in northern Chile are considered to be the fairest in the planet just as those of Bolivia and Peru, have been witnesses to the presence of alleged UFOs many times.

Jorge Anfruns, a UFO expert, claimed that Chile is one of the countries where more sightings of alleged space objects have been made, especially in the high plateau. "UFOs are no longer news there," he said.

UFO TRACKS ONCE AGAIN

SANTA FE (Telam) - Mr. Victor Imhoff, who was a mayor of the San Jeronimo del Sauce community and held that post for several terms, said that he found some perfectly linked semicircles in a field he owns near the city. They measured 17 meters by 12 meters in depth and 40 cm wide [55.7 feet by 39.37 feet by 15.75 inches], "and were free of weeds as if they had been made with a shovel."

On the inside of these circles, which were found on a chicory plantation located at a distance of 400 meters [437 yards] from national highway #19 and 300 meters [328 yards] from two houses, "weeds are growing, but not the vegetables which disappeared from the surface but grow normally from the edges outward," said Imhoff.

The tracks were discovered last Thursday by Mr. Imhoff, but "he could not say how old they were" because nothing strange was observed in the surroundings in previous days "except for a cow which was in the field with others and now walks with difficulty."

The owner of the field recalled an experience seven years ago which he considered to be "not too pleasant," when he was returning from San Jer-onimo Norte where he attended a Rotary meeting. "An unidentified flying object with a bluish, very bright light, flew low over my car, stopping the engine," he said.

He also added that the driver at that time, Mr. Armando Meriggi, and other local residents "were witnesses to the UFO's maneuver, which now seems to have returned to the area, considering the strange tracks that were found."

UFOs: DREAM OR REALITY -- A FANTASTIC STORY

This is the account of a man who lives in Lanus and owns a well-known restaurant in that city. His name is RICARDO ALI, he is 35, married, and the incident happened in 1976, but only became known now.

It's nice talking to him, and he confesses he never believed in the UFO PHENOMENON, saying: "WHAT I DON'T SEE...I DON'T BELIEVE."

But the story he will tell seems to corroborate the opposite.

RICARDO ALI begins his document like this:

"There's a question nowadays. Whether extraterrestrials do exist or not. I think some people believe they don't, others believe in the real possibility that unidentified flying objects fly around in the sky. But, which is the truth? I leave it up to you.'

Ricardo goes on to say:

"The story I'm telling you happened in 1976, and I can assure you that even I had my doubts at the beginning. I kept it to myself for a long time because I feared ridicule, but the years and other events made me see the truth."

"In August of 1976" – the story goes "in crescendo" – "a somewhat strange event happened to me. At that time I was approaching my 21st birthday and worked in a store in the Once district (in Buenos Aires) and at night classes in a commercial school. I did not drink nor did I ingest anything strange that could lead one to believe in a hallucination."

THE PHENOMENON IN SIGHT

Ricardo goes on, in all seriousness:

"One night in August I was getting home at about 11:30 pm. After a few minutes, I went to lie down in my room and read a geography book. At that time, I lived in Deheza 3250, East Lanus. After reading for a few minutes, I felt sleepy, put the book aside on the night stand and fell asleep peacefully. estimate that some 2 or 2 and a half hours may have passed when I started to hear a very deep but high-pitched noise, it was something like the buzzing of a wasp amplified about a thousand times."

Ricardo goes on telling about his experience very seriously and calmly: "It was becoming louder each time and the sound entered my ears and seemed to make me sleepy. In spite of its intensity the humming did not hurt me, it was just as if it was robbing me of my willpower. I saw flashes in my room, light beams of undefinable colors, until I entered into a strange state, like some kind of trance. I could see, feel, hear, but was incapable of moving. In a superhuman effort I tried to get up, but when I tried to, I seemed to lose all my strength and it was impossible for me to move in any way or to scream.

'But something was telling me that nothing would happen and I was not frightened. The room was very warm and an internal voice like I never heard before invaded me. It was then that I saw them" - he cried with energy - "They appeared from nowhere, as if they had come out of the same light that flooded the room.

"They were three beings dressed in silvery suits, two of them were men, the third one was a woman, the most beautiful you could imagine. She was perfect. I don't remember the men's faces. All I know is they were men.

The woman had very deep eyes. They all looked at me and talked to me but didn't move their lips, they didn't say words. It's as if they entered my

mind through their eyes and discovered all my secrets. The two men by my side didn't seem to intervene, they were simply looking at me.

"A step behind them was the woman. For a minute I felt to completely faint. I couldn't estimate the precise time when I came to. But the woman was there by my side. She bent over me and passed her hands over my face and over all my body, caressing it but keeping her hands at a distance of some 30 cm [11 inches]. She didn't touch my body, but I could feel the caresses and the warmth of her hands. A few minutes later, I felt a sexual contact with that woman, in spite of her being apart from me and her never having

"I again felt faint" - Ricardo went on at the peak of his story - "and

once again I heard the intense humming of the wasp until it became slower and quieter."

DREAM OR REALITY?

"When I woke up next morning I felt great. I tried to analyze what had happened and asked my mother if she heard anything, and also my friends. But nobody heard anything. Pondering about it, I searched for a more logical explanation of the matter and thought it had simply been a dream until some years later I verified it hadn't been so. But that is another story, another event happened to me afterwards, which I will tell you about."

RICARDO'S THOUGHTS

"I believe that I really had an encounter with people from other galaxies. I was studied like a guinea pig" - Ricardo ends his thoughts - "but I assure you that they know us better than what you think. I lived it and can assure you it's so."

FISHERMAN DENOUNCES EXTRATERRESTRIALS THREATENED HIM

SANTIAGO DE CHILE (EFE) - Dolorindo Asencio, a fisherman who lives in the lakes area, 750 kilometers [466 miles] south of Santiago, denounced that he has been threatened by alleged extraterrestrials. The report, published by the newspaper "La Cuarta," says that the victim has witnessed several UFO appearances, which Asencio himself divulged, for which reason he allegedly was threatened.

According to Asencio, one of his experiences took place the night of October 20 last year, while he was sailing together with his brother Sebastian in the Llanquihue lake. They were terrified to see how an immense flying object approached them rapidly in the darkness, accompanied by a deafening noise. The fisherman adds that the space ship, whose structure was surrounded by radiant colors, hovered over the boat and projected on them an intensely warm sensation for which reason they desperately rowed towards the shore and hid among the vegetation.

Dolorindo Asencio claims that due to the UFO appearances he witnessed, he has been the subject of serious threats from strange people who ordered him not to reveal what he saw. He said that after the appearances, he was visited in his home by "a man and two women, with an unmistakably foreign accent who threatened me severely and warned me not to talk to anybody about the sightings and they even offered me a reward if I kept quiet, but they never returned."

A STRANGE FLASH

At midnight on Wednesday - it was approximately 11:50 pm - January 9, a strange flash of light lit up a vast region of the eastern coast of the Entre Rios province, surprising and scaring the few witnesses who saw the phenomenon.

The newspaper "La Calle" of Concepcion del Uruguay, in its editions of Friday the 11th and Sunday the 13th, referred not only to that event, citing places and witnesses, but to many other similar ones that happened in Entre Rios, especially in that region.

Yesterday, CLARIN went to the Molino district that belongs to the department of Concepcion del Uruguay where the event was seen by more witnesses, some of them very qualified ones. There, more precisely in Arroyo Molino, lives Claudio Mac Loughlin, a 48 year old German citizen, who is a medical doctor who graduated from the Faculty of Medicine of the Buenos Aires University, and owns a 36-hectare farm dedicated to dairy, poultry and agricultural production.

Claudio, his wife Norma and their three daughters, as well as other family members, were witnesses to that phenomenon whose source they cannot establish.

*A light that came from the sky

"I want you to put yourself in my place: I am a doctor, as is well known and consider myself to be a cultured person. The comments about this type of sightings usually lend themselves to all kinds of jokes, so I will only limit myself to tell you how, when and what we saw, without going into any details or personal opinions," stressed Dr. Mac Loughlin. He then told CLARIN that the night of Wednesday the 9th was very warm "so after dinner the three girls (they are 19, 17 and 14) went out among the trees where it was cooler; I stayed inside reading and my wife was washing the dishes."

"What happened then?"

"What happened was that the two older girls came in at about 11:30 pm, only Picky, the youngest, remaining outside with two dogs. Suddenly I saw a very strong light outside that was incredibly intense. I thought it couldn't be a tractor or car; furthermore, it was clearly coming from above, from the sky."

"And then?"

"Then Picky came in, very disturbed. She said that at first the dogs became very nervous and suddenly everything lit up as if a giant light bulb went on from above. The words gushed out of her mouth, she was so nervous. She claimed she saw a rectangular flying object that moved noiselessly."

"Did you see that rectangular craft?"

"Not at first. I ran outside and everything was dark again. Everybody came out after me. Of course, I couldn't assume Picky had made it all up because all of us in the house had been blinded by that strong flash of light. But, again, the night was as calm as always and no light could be seen in the moonless sky. Really, we were all excited. It had all been so strange."

"Did you go back in the house?"

"Fortunately, not. And I say fortunately because a few minutes later we saw the phenomenon again. Here I want to be very precise and honest. I saw no rectangular flying object emitting lights. But I did see how the whole place was suddenly lit up. It was incredible. You can't imagine. The trees with all their leaves, the arms of the old mill, the animals, everything was illuminated as in broad daylight. Just as it came, the light disappeared. Look, I have been and am very skeptical of everything that is being said about flying saucers and things like that. Moreover, I don't even know if this phenomenon is related to all those things, but I state that on Wednesday the 9th at midnight, the fields in Arroyo Molino were lit up from above like a stage. Don't ask me why."

Jose Alejandro Vernaz is a young man who often goes fishing and hunting, and together with his father visits the area of Arroyo Grande.

That Wednesday night he was there camping with his family. Close to midnight a mysterious flash of light made him leave his tent, thinking lightning had struck. But there was no storm. Only a very strong light that lit the whole place up. When he looked up he claims he saw a rectangular object that moved silently in the sky. Similar comments were made by other witnesses, such as a salesman who was driving along highway 14, at the entrance to Colon.

Reports from the newspaper "La Calle" say that this kind of phenomenon is not new in Entre Rios province, and they recall an event that happened in the area of Villaguay when representatives from the Air Force showed up in Dr. Carlos Liberman's office. He is the director of the paper "El Heraldo" in the city of Concordia. They wanted to recover a metallic piece that was found in the rural region after an impressive explosion was heard in space. Witnesses said that afterwards pieces of incandescent metal fell to the ground like a giant Bengal light.

A rescue plane carrying a crew of 12 went out to look for them the same day. It never came back. Despite one of his-tory's most extensive searches, involving 300 aircraft and doz-ens of ships, they were not found.

Baffling

They didn't even discover so much as floating wreckage or a telltale oil slick ... until now, when hi-tech explorers claim to have pinpointed the intact fuselages of the ill-fated Squadron 19.

If true, they appear to have solved one of the most baffling mysteries of the accident-plagued Bermuda Triangle — a vast area of ocean stretching south from the island it is named after, to the Florida coast and Puerto Rico.

But will they have solved it? Even if it is the missing flight, we still don't know how and why they went down in broad daylight.


And what about the 1,000 other airmen, sailors and pas-sengers who have disappeared in over 100 other aircraft and ships?

Among seamen, the Triangle is also known as The Triangle Of Death and The Graveyard Of The Atlantic.

Lights

For centuries, they have been baffled by its mysterious caims and sudden storms — right from the time Christo-pher Columbus entered this stretch of Atlantic and noted in his log, curious glowing streaks of "while water".

These mysterious patches of lights and foam are still visible today, and so bright, they have been seen by U.S. astronauts from outer space. A flurry of hot-selling books

The investigation found no evi-dence of foul weather, no mes-sages for help, no wreckage and no sign of the 309 crew. Stranger yet, at least a dozen 'ghost' ships have been float-ing crewless within it. On one occasion in 1881, the cargo ship Ellen Austin discov-ered a schooner, sails fluffing in the wind, a full cargo of mahogany on board, but no sign of human life.

Violent

Violent The U.S. Navy still does not recognise the Triangle as a damper zone, and the Coast Guard is convinced that the majority of disappearances can be attributed to the area's unique environmental fea-

tures. These include the swift Guilf Stream current, the unplumbed underwater can-yons of the Atlantic, and the often violent weather patterns within the mystery zone. Also, the Triangle is one of only two places on earth where a compass needle points to true rather than magnetic north. (The other is The Devil's Sea, an equally treacherous body of water in the Pacific off Japan).

A navigator who fails to take this quirk of nature into account may find himself way off course. But others are not con-vinced. "There are mysterious and strange things going on out there," says Richard

Winer, who wrote The Devil's Triangle, a book that has sold 2 million copies. "I believe not all the answers lie in human error, mechanical malfunc-tions, freak weather and mag-netic anomalies."

Fanciful

ranciful And officials of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration say: "Despite efforts by the U.S. Air Force, Navy and Coast Guard, no rea-sonable explanation to date has been found for the vanish-ments."

UFO buff John Wallace Spencer, author of Limbo Of The Lost, which has also sold over 2 million copies, fancifully argues that beings from outer

space have established a highly advanced civilisation in the unexplored depths. There, he believes most of the missing vessels — and their crews — may still be on display for study by these higher intelligences. "It sounds weird," he admits, "until you realise that it's the only explanation that covers the facts." Charles Berlitz, a Yale grad-

only explanation that covers the facts." Charles Berlitz, a Yale grad-uate with a fascination for the legendary lost continent of Atlantis, has a theory that a giant solar crystal, which once supplied the city, lies on the ocean floor. He theorises passing ships and planes trigger the crystal which befuddles their instru-ments and sucks them into the impassable deep. In 1955, 12 Japanese sci-entists went on an expedi-tion to the Triangle to try, once and for all, to unravel its mysteries. They were never heard from again...

A year later, its sister plane, the Star Ariel, dis-appeared without trace over the same area, en route to Jamaica. and documentaries have sifted every fathom of the Triangle for an explanation of the dis-appearances. There have been theories of underground cities, unknown monsters, and even that it's the hunting ground of extra-terrestial beings. Whatever the truth may be, planes and ships go missing in this area with eerie regularity. On July 3 1947, a U.S. Army C-54 Superfort dis-appeared 100 miles off Bermuda without broad-casting a word of diffi-culty. On January 30 1948 a Tudor

Flight 19 – "the lost patrol." An article the other day said that "The Deep See," an exploration vessel equipped with state-of-the-art sonar and underwater video cameras, was searching for a Spanish galleon at the time. The flight vanished without a trace on Dec. 5, 1945, while on routine submarine patrol into the Ber-muda Triangle without sending any "Maydays." Deepening the mystery all the more is the fact that the planes were found on the ocean floor in 600 feet of water only 10 miles from their naval station base at Fort Lauderdale. And that all five planes were said to be in excellent condition, four of them standing upright with their cockpit doors open – all within a 1-mile radius of each other. The fate of the 14 crewmen is anyone's guess, of course, but how odd that the massive air-sea search at the time – the greatest ever made till then – failed to locate them so close to shore, the weather being clear and sunny, despite a current news story that says they encountered bad weather. Especially since all of the crewmen wore life jackets and their planes carried self-inflating life rafts and distress equipment. Another mystery is what happened to the huge

equipment. Another mystery is what happened to the huge air-sea rescue plane sent to guide the lost flight home? It also vanished without a trace – a 77-foot-long Martin Mariner "flying boat" with 13 crewmen

aboard. News accounts of the Avengers' discovery on

aboard. News accounts of the Avengers' discovery on May 8 don't even mentioned that part of the mystery. At any rate, each plane's crew normally included a pilot, a gunner and a radio operator, but one crew-man had failed to report for the mission. The naviga-tion plan was to fly a triangle 160 miles eastward toward the Bahamas, then north for 40 miles, and, to complete the triangle, directly back to Fort Lauder-dale. The entire flight required only about two hours. But an hour and 15 minutes into the mission, the worried flight leader radioed the Fort Lauderdale tower that they were off course and unsure of their position – as though the compasses in all five planes were simultaneously malfunctioning. An hour or so later, the flight leader, in panic, was overheard relin-quishing command to one of the other pilots. Then, 25 minutes later, the last message to the tower was that they were still lost and thought they were 225 miles northeast of the base.

they were still lost and thought they were 225 miles northeast of the base. That's when the Martin Mariner, capable of with-standing rough sea landings, was hurriedly dispatched. The tower then radioed the lost flight to say that help was on the way, but there was no answer. A few minutes later, when the tower tried to check on the Marin Mar-iner's position there was no response from it – and it iner's position, there was no response from it – and it was never heard from again.

was never heard from again. Speculation over the years as to the fate of Flight 19 has been fictionalized into Bermuda Triangle and UFO lore, the most famous, of course, being the movie "Close Encounters of the Third Kind." And the television show "Unsolved Mysteries" recently had a segment on it. But what actually happened to Flight 19 is likely to remain a mystery, though the discovery of the five Aven-gers is bound to revive speculation and create even more elaborate lore about one of the most enigmatic legends of the Bermuda Triangle.



K ELOWNA, B.C. – Seems every-one in this vacation playland halfway between Vancouver and Calgary has a sea-serpent story to spin. Some actually claim to have seen the beast, 70 feet in length, high-tailing it across the dark waters of Okanagan Lake

It across the dark waters of Okanagan Lake. It's a whale of a story. Each year, there are 30 to 40 "sightings" of the large, unidentified swimming object, the Canadian equiva-lent of Scotland's Loch Ness monster. "It looked like a submarine surfac-ing, coming up toward my boat," Lionel Edmond recounted of his close encoun-ter with the creature. "I've seen it, all right. I saw it moving faster than my speedboat," said Herb Rashke as he watched snowflakes light on the legend-steeped lake last week.

week. It had been a bad day for sea-monster watching. They say the crea-ture is a fair-weather monster, which chagrined a Japanese television crew that had come armed with remote underwater camera and a tiny subma-rine to find the bashful beast, the one they call Ognongo

rine to find the bashful beast, the one they call Ogopogo. The lake may be 80 miles long and more than 1,000 feet deep in places, but Tokyo-based Nippon TV insists Ogo-pogo can run but it can't hide. Fusako Suzuki watched happily in the snow as the Nippon crew tested the underwater camera in a hotel swim-ming pool. The sub, equipped with gyro, sonar and acoustic gear, had not yet arrived. But that didn't stop a steady stream of ouizzical hotel guests steady stream of quizzical hotel guests

from watching the preparations, their noses pressed to the lobby windows. "They're looking for Ogopogo," someone explained.

"They're looking for Ogopogo," someone explained. "Oh, yes. Ogopogo," people nodded. With a radiant smile, Suzuki said, "Yes, we shall find it." Suzuki is part of a 15-person crew that arrived a week ago to begin an 11-day search for the elusive monster. This is the second Nippon expedi-tion. Last summer, 80 million Japanese TV viewers gobbled up the first Ogo-pogo segment, which showed a large object surfacing in the Peachland area of the lake, as well as a 30-foot-long wriggling object on sonar. It was the sonar reading that partic-ularly inflamed the Japanese crew's curiosity. Ogopogo, ever the tease, has brought them back, much to the amuse-ment of many of Kelowna's 71,000 citizens.

citizens.

citizens. "Maybe they're going to bring it back (to Japan) and make it into sushi," joked George Tinling, Kelowna Cham-ber of Commerce tourism manager. "We like mystery. We find Ogopogo this time," a grinning Sakuji Yoshi-mura said shortly after arriving in Kelowna. Yoshimura is an archaeolo-gist brought along to serve as technical adviser on the monster hunt.

True or not, few can resist a good Ogopogo story. Several years ago, the Kelowna Chamber of Commerce of-fered \$1 million if someone could prove that the monster lived. The reward went unclaimed. In 1949, Ogopogo gained shelter under the province's Fisheries Act after three youths fired at it with a .22-caliber rifle. Or so the story goes. It is fact, however, that Ogopogo was put on a list of protected species, making it illegal to kill or capture it without a permit, according to Jim Walker, director of the wildlife branch of British Columbia's Ministry of Envi-ronment.

"I don't want anyone to ever find Ogopogo," said Celeste Bonnet, a bank manager in Kelowna. "It's better not to "now for sure."

Ogopogo," said Celeste Bonnet, a bank manager in Kelowna. "It's better not to know for sure." "I shudder to think what might happen if they found it." said Kelowna Ogopogo expert Arlene Gaal. "We've had people say it should be captured and chopped up to determine its origin. Then there was this one fellow from Bellingham who recommended using underwater explosives to flush it out." Clearly, it's Kelowna's monster. The city's name may be an Indian word for grizzly bear, but Ogopogo is represent-ed on the city emblem. "We're a little protective of our little monster," Kelowna resident Sally Robertson acknowledged. In virtually every sighting recorded, the lake has been glassy smooth. Then, out of nowhere, the famous serpent makes its entrance with its usual flair. Seething white froth and a jagged line of waves ruffle the surface. The crea-ture reaches up, its reptilian torso tickling the water. Oh no, it's Ogopogo! "Maybe it's just a cry for help," Kelowna resident Elson Johnson quipped. With sobering detail, eyewitnesses say the monster is green. Others say it is endowed with a large head and long neck.

is endowed with a large nead and rong neck. Grown men and women, the kind who discarded their parents' tooth-fairy claims from the very beginning. have insisted that the monster has at least two huge humps and measures at least 30 to 40 feet long. "There's got to be something out there," said Fred Stephen, a Kelowna businessman. "I've seen something. I've seen the strip of waves after it was like glass."

like glass." Amused local residents enjoy chuckling over the fact that the snake-like critter typically surfaces on sunny afternoons and that it is invariably a tourist who encounters the legendary monster, usually after a lengthy tour of one of the local wineries. Sometimes it is difficult to take the monster too seriously. Several years

Sometimes it is difficult to take the monster too seriously. Several years ago, for instance, a Kelowna disc jock-ey named Paul Burke organized an on-the-air contest at station CF1F to try to catch, then barbecue, Ogopogo. Dozens of people called in suggesting recipes. "How do you dress an Ogopogo?" Burke asked. "Do you serve white wine or red wine with Ogopogo?" "It is a basically a throwback to the age of dinosaurs," maintains the ever-serious Gaal, who has written two books about the venerable monster (in-cluding the 1985 classic "Ogopogo: The True Story of the Million Dollar Mon-ster") and has spent more than a de-(continued on page 17)



Two Teams Put New Life in 'Cold' Fusion Theory of Energy

By WILLIAM J. BROAD Defying reports of the demise of "coid" fusion, two teams of scientists yesterday announced what they said was new support for its existence. The findings of both teams, an-nounced at separate news conferences, are being published in Fusion Tech-nology, a journal of the American Nu-clear Suciety, a professional group based in La Grange Park, III. The jour-nal, which only publishes reports that have been reviewed by scientists, has been generally supportive of claims of achieving codd fusion. Both teams have new theories and new evidence to explain the purported phenomenon, which two years ago was balled as the discovery of the century but quickly fell into disrepute as few scientists were able to duplicate the findings.

Scientists were able to oupneate and findings. Moreover, both teams believe the phenomenon will ultimately yield a safe, cheap and virtually inexhaustible form of energy, ending mankind's de-pendence on oil and other fuels. "We think it's important that this be gone after in a big way." Dr. Frederick J. Mayer, the leader of one team, sai-dyesterday in a telephone interview. "If this is right, the ramifications are very large." Force That Powers the Sun

Nuclear fusion is the force that powers the sun, the stars and hydrogen bombs, fusing atoms rather than beraking them apart as nuclear reac-tors do. Fusion normally takes enor-

New Subatomic Particle Reported

His new work, done in collaboration with Dr. John R. Reitz, also a physicist, posits the existence of a new kind of subatomic particle that the scientists ratic results from cold-fusion experiatic results from cold-fusion experiate characterized by irregular bursts of heat and scattered reports of nuclear byproducts. The hypothetical

subatemic particle, they say, also ex-plains other riddles of physics, such as the ease with which hydrogen passes though some metals. The theoretical particle is envisioned as a fleeting union between a proton, which carries a positive charge, and an electron, which carries a negative charge. The union yields a neutral par-ticle that has no repulsive forces and under some conditions can fuse with other particles. Dr. Mayer and Dr. Reitz have done no experiments themselves, instead using their theory to attempt a clarf-fication of conflicting cold-fusion claims. They say, however, that their theory points to ways to change the usual cold-fusion apparatus and that they are embarking on such modified tests in Ann Arbor. Their paper, "Nuclear Energy Re-lease in Metals," appears in the May issue of Fusion Technology. On Wednesday, the two physicists pre-sented their findings in a seminar at the Massachusetts Institute of Tech-nology in Cambridge, Mass.

Dr. Mills says the cold-fusion process is a previously unknown type of chemi-cal reaction, rather than a nuclear one. The apparatus uses a nickel electrode in an aqueous solution of potas-sium carbonate, a compound commonly used in the manufacture of soap and glass. Excess energy is purported when an electrical current passes through the solution. The theory sees the excess energy as being released when hydrogen atoms from the water contract into an unusually dense state heretofore undescribed in modern physics.

NEW ORLEANS - The 1989 California earthquake caused weird-sounding reactions, such as a sense of detaching from one's body, even in mentally healthy people not involved directly in the devasta-

A survey taken shortly after the quake also found that some people had experienced a sense that their surroundings were not quite real. Some mentioned unusual body sen-sations such as some input or follow sations, such as spinning or falling down a tunnel.

down a tunnel. Others said that they had felt that time slowed down or that personal experiences sometimes seemed to be happening at a psychological distance, almost as if they were ap-pearing on television.

People who have such reactions to a traumatic experience should be assured that those things "happen to normal people, and they're not crazy," said researcher Etzel Carden

Prior research has also found such reactions to traumatic events. he said.

Cardena is a research fellow at Stanford University and an assis-tant professor of psychology at Trinity College in Hartford, Conn.

Trinity College in Hartford, Conn. He presented the study Wedness-day at the annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The report was co-authored by Dr. David Spiegel of Stanford. "If the sasquatch is real, it will be a major scientific discovery," Steenburg said. "If it doesn't ex-ist, it has to be studied anyway because it is an important part of Canadian folklore.

In a small, map-covered office at the back of his log house, Steenburg marks sightings and footprint locations with colored pins.

He has a shelf filled with plaster castings of footprints and a cabinet stuffed with carefully classified files, interviews with witnesses and a folder labeled "lunatic fringe."

Most of the lunatic fringe is in the United States, he said, holding up a Montana tabloid news-paper headline: "First Bigfoot Captured."

"Ridicule is the biggest prob-lem," he said. "I think less than half the sightings are reported. They are told they are crazy, so they don't want to talk about it."

Most ranger stations and Royal Canadian Mounted Police offices have his card and call him about sighting reports.

around the world, leading people to believe there may be more than one Bigfoot—most often described as a large, furry animal or man with big feet and a shy nature. With other researchers, Guttilla and Albright recently formed a nationwide network to exchange information and investigate sight-ing reports. Many of these come in on hot lines the group operates with (800), (900) and (714) area codes.

Many of the reports make their way into a newsletter called the Bigfoot Coop, edited by Constance Cameron, curator of the anthropol-ogy museum at Cal State Fullerton and a longtime follower of strange phenomena.

For Cameron, who has never seen a Sasquatch, the newsletter means spending a few nights a month typing reports, photocopy-ing and getting the publication ready for mailing. For Albright and Guttilla, Bigfoot is a time-consum-

ing passion. "The time I spend on this varies, "The time I spend on this varies, but in general, it's every spare moment," Guttilla said. "If I get a good sighting report, I will lose sleep. I run my own cleaning business, and I have a supervisor who conducts the actual day-to-day activity of the business so I can pretty much do what I want within reason." reason

His search has led him to Canada and Mexico, and each summer he and Albright travel to tiny Willow Creek, a Northern California town known as "Bigfoot capital of the world" because of the number of

world" because of the number of sightings. "Somehow ordinary vacations lose their luster," Guttilla said. "I just don't find it fulfilling to go to Bermuda when I know I could go somewhere clse and possibly have the experience of a lifetime." Scientiste, and others, bouwage

Scientists and others, however, scoff at Sasquatch. Groups includ-ing the Buffalo, N.Y.-based Com-mittee for the Scientific Investiga-tion of Claims of the Paranormal have considered photographs, hair samples and footprints and remain

samples and footprints and remain unconvinced. "I think at the moment Bigfoot is an interesting, exciting kind of space fiction character, but there's space fiction character, but there s no proof that such a being exists," said Paul Kurtz, group chairman and professor emeritus of philoso-phy at the State University of New York at Buffalo. "The best efforts of scientists to discover such a creature have end-

discover such a creature have end-

ed up with zero results," Kurtz said. "If such a species existed, there'd be hard evidence—but there's not. It seems to be largely speculation and fantasy."

Such skepticism has given Gut-tilla a thick skin.

Tilla a thick skin. "Tve got nothing to protect," he said. "My reputation was shot down in the clumps long ago. It doesn't matter... I'm not running for public office. I don't care if there are people out there who think I'm crazy. I've lived with that all my life, and I'll probably live and die with that stigma. But I believe in what I'm doing." Tabloid newspapers with stories

Tabloid newspapers with stories on Bigfoot alongside those about

on Bigfoot alongside those about people being shrunk to the size of martini olives have also done little for the subject's credibility. Said Guttilla: "These tabloids know that when they don't find a legitimate report—and those of us who are legitimate researchers know how hard that is—they make them up." He said they have looked into tabloid claims and none have ever panned out. But he continues his search. Guttilla and Albright begin a

Guttilla and Albright begin a sighting investigation by consider-ing the credibility of the witness, questioning him or her, examining any evidence recovered and then going to the spot to take measure-ments of the location and to look for trail evidence. If they find a print, they make a plaster mold.

Guttilla and Albright, who works in the film industry, said their families are understanding about their passion. They routinely pile their wives and kids into four-wheel-drive vehicles and traverse humpy dirt roads to remote locabumpy dirt roads to remote locations, where they gather around campfires to tell Bigfoot stories.

Albright's 5-year-old daughters, Kimberly and Kara, are budding Bigfoot fans. They enjoy hunting for Sasquatch and have a little song they sing about "Harry" while hiking through the wilderness. If they ever meet him, they said, they would ask him if he has a griffriend would ask him if he has a girlfriend or is married.

For others, family life and Big-For others, family life and Big-foot research have not been as compatible. Rich Grumley, 56, a Palmdale traffic violator instructor who works with Albright and Gut-tilla, said that although his ex-wife initially encouraged him to become active and pursue some interest, he thinks his frequent absences led to their divorce. their divorce

They're on the Trail of Something Big



Bigfoot fest backers seek ban on hunting

DEMING — Mount Baker Foothills Chamber of Commerce wants to ensure the safety of human revelers, as well as any legendary Bigfoot, during its first Bigfoot at Baker festival scheduled June 21 to 23 in

Baker festival scheduled June 21 to 23 in the foothills communities. The chamber tonight plans to ask the Whatcom County Council to adopt a resolu-tion to protect any Bigfoot, or people in Bigfoot costumes, from hunting. "There is one serious side to this resolu-tion, apart from any publicity this resolu-tion should generate," said Al Magnuson, chamber Vice President for Promotion. The festival will have an official costumed The festival will have an official costumed The festival will have an official costumed Bigfoot, and others may be dressed to re-semble the legendary, ape-like creatures some believe roam the wilds of North America. Magnuson said he wants to deter anyone who may consider bringing weap-ons to attempt to capture or kill a Bigfoot. "It could be easy for someone who didn't know what was going on to decide here (a costumed Bigfoot) is something they need defense against," he said. "This Bigfoot might be walking down the street." The resolution asks the council to "de-clare that any premeditated, willful or wan-ton slaying of such creature shall be deemed a felony..." Event organizers have not planned a search for the creature, "although as re-cently as three or four years ago there was a sighting of a Bigfoot on the Nooksack (River) by two Lummi fishermen," Magnu-son said. "We've got legends all the way through of Bigfoot in this area." Bigfoot, and others may be dressed to re

Despite their years of searching, the trio's firsthand experience with Bigfoot has been limited to brief encounters. Guttilla said he sighted a creature from afar in the Mojave Desert in 1974. Albright claims he saw one leap across a road south-east of Palmdale in 1975. Grumley said he saw two in Kern County about the same time Albright

about the same time Albright sighted his. The men say they have inter-viewed many people they believe have sighted Bigfoot. Guttilla was one of the first in the Bigfoot camp to suggest a possible connection between Big-foot and UFOs. He points to Amer-ican Indian legends in which the creature was linked to "shiny sil-ver moons." But there's not enough evidence

But there's not enough evidence to determine whether the creature to determine whether the creature is a visitor from another planet, a throwback to primitive man or a member of an obscure Indian tribe that somehow remained aloof from the rest of the human species, "Nobody really knows," Guttilla said. "It's anybody's guess."

The three researchers say they would like an extended en-counter with a Sasquatch, a chance to photograph it and possibly tag it with a radio transmitter. Through with a radio transmitter. Through the 900 number and other sources, they are trying to raise enough funding for air support, night vi-sion equipment and cameras they could set up at a remote location for an extended period. With such equipment they could produce sci-entific evidence of the creatures, who Guttilla believes may possess great intelligence.

who Guttilla believes may possess great intelligence. "From my research, I'm con-vinced they are able to process information," he said. "They make-judgments, they have family units, they transmit information from one generation to the next." Although Bigfoot information is just as scarce now as it was 40

just as scarce now as it was 40 years ago—the researchers rely primarily on hair samples and foot-prints—the men say their work is

"We're not doing it because we like ghost stories or we want to frivolously waste our time tracking Involously waste our time tracking down gremlins or hobgoblins," Guttilla said. "We're doing this because we think it will have an impact on mankind, that it's impor-tant for human beings to know that their universe is filled with life, life bayend that which they're hence beyond that which they're being told about in school from the conventional Establishment."

And a former Hellertown, Pa., man has linked up with Hoagland after obtaining trademarks and copyrights for a Mars logo and collectible medallion. Craig Potter, president of Objec-

medallion. Craig Potter, president of Objec-tive: Mars, has signed an agreement with Hoagland, allowing him to mar-ket the logo of the face on Mars. "Our mission is to make sure the unmanned Mars Observer mission in 1993 takes a look at the Cydonia Re-gion," said Gary Gunderson, director of marketing for The Mars Mission. "There are some people in the sci-entific community opposed to it. But

it would be ludicrous not to take a "The geometry is somewhat sim-ilar to that of ancient Mideast cities, where there are pyramids and the Sphinx. In fact, Cairo means Mars in ancient Arabic."

By stirring up interest in the Mars missions — its Cydonia Region — Hoagland and others feel the exis-tence of extraterrestrial life can be proven.

Perhaps most intriguing of the NASA photos is the series of images — including the face — on the Cydon-ia Region of Mars, which are likened to those at Stonehenge.

The face, Gunderson said, is sim-ilar to the Sphinx in Egypt. Hoagland, who helped develop the famous "man and woman" message to aliens for the Voyager mission in 1971, feels there is a message on Mare

Mars Using mathematics, Hoagland dis-

Using mathematics, Hoagland dis-covered messages that "contain major decipherable clues to a poten-tial new energy resource which could totally transform the energy econ-omy and 'politics' of planet Earth." Hoagland and NASA have battled over his theories, with the space agency canceling a satellite trans-mission to television stations across the country in 1990, he said. "When NASA sent up the Viking in 1976, scientists were looking for mi-crobes," Gunderson said. "Instead they found pyramids and faces. They weren't ready for that. The key is geometry." But regardless of Hoagland's rela-

But regardless of Hoagland's rela-tionship with NASA and the rest of the scientific community, Potter foresees increased interest in space during the next two decades — and a market for his Mars logo. "There's been a lot of interest in space with the recent study of Presi-dent Bush's Space Exploration Initia-tive on how to reach Mars," Potter said.



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Orbiting astro-nugget carries massive fortune in gold and platinum 1

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The Washington Post The Washington Post An astronomical El Dorado containing some 10,000 tons of gold and 100,000 tons of platinum has been found orbiting the sun tantalizingly close to Earth, according to a report in today's issue of Science. Asteroid 1986 DA, as the solid metal "near-Earth object" is known, is 1.2 miles wide and shaped roughly like a canned ham. The itinerant astro-nugget also contains approximately 10 bil-lion tons of iron and a billion tons of nickel. At today's prices, the commodity value of 1986 DA is appro-priately astronomical: The gold alone is worth about \$90 billion and the platinum nearly a trillion dollars. Immediate prospects for mining, however, are dim: The near-est the asteroid gets to Tiffany's is about 20 million miles. According to astronomer Steven Ostro, who helped discover the orbiting ingot. "if in the next century we go into space robotically or in person, this asteroid — or many others yet to be discovered — could be used for construction in space." Current theory indicates that such extraordinary metallic abundances can only form in the cores of planet-like bodies; and the researchers report in Science that 1986 DA appears to be "derived from the interior of a much larger object" that existed billions of years ago and "subsequently was disrupted by a massive collision." A collaborative team from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Cornell's National Astronomy and Ionosphere Cen-ter, the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics, Washing-ton State University and the Arecibo radio telescope in Puerto Rico spent nearly five years analyzing data collected during 1986 when the asteroid reached its closest approach to Earth in a multimillion-mile elliptical orbit that reaches out near Jupiter. Arecibo's 20-acre dish fired a radar beam at the asteroid, which reflected back an astonishing 58 percent of the signal.
