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UFO Flap in Kansas City, Missouri

An unusual amount of UFO activity in the Kansas City area in April and May, 2011, has prompted a serious investigation by the Missouri Mutual UFO Network (MUFON).

MUFON Missouri Assistant State Director Margie Kay has received reports from multiple witnesses who saw UFOs, orange orbs, and an entity.

The following press release was issued by Missouri MUFON.

May 18, 2011 Kansas City, Missouri

A large number of calls were received at the MUFON office by Margie regarding orange orbs and a large silver UFO on the evening of May 14 and the early morning hours of May 15. The sightings occurred during a 9 1/2 hour period from 7 p.m. Saturday until 4 a.m. Sunday. Some of the reports were filed at mufon.com.

A 7-year-old was riding in a car with his mother on Highway 635 headed south in Kansas City North at 7 p.m. on May14. He told his mother that he saw a large, round orange colored UFO moving in the clouds. The mother is a UMKC University professor and a member of the Kansas City chapter of MUFON.

Orange balls of light were spotted East of I-435 southbound at Gregory Boulevard (Raytown)

low in the tree line, going from north to south at 9:30 p.m. on May 14. Witnesses pulled over to the side of the highway to watch. The objects appeared to be shooting out of something at about 90 mph, then slowed to about 50 mph. All then rose into the clouds and disappeared. There were approximately 125 of these orbs appearing in a half-our period, according to a local insurance agent and a friend who witnessed the objects. Another witness, who was called by one of the men watching the scene from I-435, claims to have photos taken from his house.

A woman saw a lighted craft just above the clouds on Saturday night, May 14 at approximately 10:32 PM over Independence, MO, South of 39th Street and Lee's Summit Rd headed in a NW-SE direction. It was not defined and difficult to see - only the large bright circular white light was clearly visible.

A very large Grey metallic saucer-shaped craft with a dome and one large horizontal long light and two smaller lights on the side was sighted in Lee's Summit, MO at 4:00 AM Sunday morning, May 15. Seven witnesses reported a similar craft. One witness to the event also reports seeing Apache helicopters, fully armed, circling Lee's Summit and Blue Springs for 7 days before this sighting. None were in the area at the time of the sighting.

Additionally, several reports were received in the month of April, including a sighting by a retired Raytown, Missouri police officer who saw a 50-foot triangular craft hovering over his back yard in the early morning hours, and a 4' tall green color entity standing 50 feet away from him near a fence. The witness had two hours of missing time.

Review: New book says secret at Nevada's Area 51 is espionage, not UFO aliens

At the beginning of "Area 51," Annie Jacobsen's cauldron-stirring book about America's most mysterious military installation, she offers a passing glimpse of a large-headed little space alien being interrogated by scientists in white coats. This is both a tease and a distraction. Yes, Jacobsen will eventually address the UFO issue with which conspiracy theorists eagerly associate Area 51, but her book is not science fiction. It is a levelheaded, revelatory but also mystifying account of the long-hidden U.S. weaponry and espionage programs to which she says Area 51 is home.

What has made Jacobsen privy to such inflammatory material? Her answer is strange and byzantine in the way that all things about Area 51 seem to be. Jacobsen, a national security reporter and contributing editor to the Los Angeles Times Magazine, happened to be at a 2007 family dinner with her husband's uncle's wife's sister's 88-year-old husband, the physicist Edward Lovick, when Lovick leaned over and said, "Have I got a good story for you."

That happened to be the year when formerly top secret records about the development of certain stealth technology -- notably the CIA's A-12 aircraft, code-named Oxcart -- were made public, even though the creation of the A-12 occurred nearly 50 years before. Lovick had been instrumental in A-12 research, and he did much more than relate his own story.

He plugged Jacobsen into a network of elderly scientists, pilots, engineers and other witnesses who had firsthand accounts of Area 51 and its surrounding area, the Nevada Test Range in the southern part of the state. ("I tell you all this, Annie, because you give a damn," one of them told her.) This testimony pointed her in the direction of extremely arcane documentation.

Using these sources, Jacobsen has put together a set of strong allegations about Area 51's covert history. Part of her book is devoted to the nuclear weapons testing that began with the Manhattan Project and continued under the aegis of the Atomic Energy Commission at Area 51. Jacobsen recoils at the weaponry developed and the ghastly results of atomic testing, but acknowledges ways in which it wound up keeping Americans safe.

Her book moves on to the surveillance technology that was meant to override the need for nuclear arsenals. And her research into the world of the "overhead" espionage, developed in extreme secrecy, is compelling and hard-hitting. One of her sources is Col. Richard S. Leghorn, whom she calls "the father of peacetime overhead espionage."

She has also spoken to Col. Hervey S. Stockman, the first man to fly over the Soviet Union in a U-2; Col.

Hugh Slater, an Area 51 base commander; and Jim Freedman, an Area 51 procurement manager and one of the few people privy to a wide range of the base's activities.

"Area 51" is guided by its author's political assessment of changing U.S. military strategy, particularly during the Cold War. It describes Area 51's strategic importance during the eras of Sputnik, the Bay of Pigs, the lunar landings and the Vietnam War, with a strong account of CIA-Air Force territorial fights about whose aircraft were better suited to combat situations.

She also writes about the reverse engineering -- analysis of equipment by taking it apart and reassembling it -- at which Area 51 scientists are thought to excel. She acknowledges the work on a Soviet MiG plane that was hidden inside a cargo plane for its trip to Nevada. But she does not take seriously rumors that alien spacecraft are reverse-engineered there.

Back to that little gray alien allegedly seen at Area 51: Jacobsen does have a theory about the base's alleged UFO connections. It goes back to the radio broadcast of "The War of the Worlds" in 1938 and the panic it engendered. Making a series of implications that are her book's most controversial aspect, she connects this kind of hysteria to the 1947 alleged flying saucer crash in Roswell, N.M.

Jacobsen links the appearance of a real, disc-shaped, hovering object with Stalin-era Soviet intrigue. She hypothesizes that the relic found in Roswell was the opening shot in the Cold War. She suggests that the supposed space creatures were human guinea pigs, the results of American experiments as monstrous as the Nazi ones conducted by Josef Mengele. And she argues that, once the rumors of a Roswell landing and cover-up began, U.S. intelligence sources may have found UFO rumors to be excellent cover for their own activities.

Although this connect-the-dots UFO thesis is only a hasty-sounding addendum to an otherwise straightforward investigative book about aviation and military history, it makes an indelible impression. But the book is most noteworthy for its author's dogged devotion to her research.

When it comes to EG&G, the secretive engineering company that plays a major role in the Area 51 story, she describes pressuring one unnamed EG&G employee persistently, no matter how hard he resisted.


"You don't want to know," said this anonymous source, when grilled about the most nefarious part of Jacobsen's UFO theory. She asked again. "You don't know the half of it," he replied, still stonewalling. And then, over lunch, she put a crouton on a plate and asked how the extent of her knowledge to the whole Area 51 story compared with the crouton-plate ratio.

The still-untold truth, this man finally told her, is bigger than the crouton. Bigger than the plate. To the delight of conspiracy fans everywhere, it remains bigger than the whole table, he said.

A companion documentary on this subject -- "Area 51 Declassified" -- premieres tonight at 10 p.m. (Pacific time) on cable TV's National Geographic Channel.



It's not the mark of a great exposé when you come away knowing almost exactly what you knew going into it.

"When Aliens Attack" presents itself as a serious discussion of how Earth could or should respond to an invasion from another planet.

"Area 51 Declassified" promises that we will see previously unrevealed pictures and hear untold stories from some of the men who worked at one of the government's most secretive installations.

The appeal is obvious.

We've been fascinated since the beginning of civilization with the possibility that beings from somewhere else could drop in on us, possibly with hostile intent.

Area 51 has been Mecca for people who weave elaborate theories about how the government, or some other entity, is manipulating the world or hiding big secrets.

National Geographic gets credit, up front, for finding people who can talk about an alien invasion without sounding like late-night radio callers who hear the voice of the Lord coming out of their toaster.

Though it must be noted that the actual government officials here do seem to consider alien invasion a remote possibility and a low defense priority.

The problem with combating an alien invasion, and thus with constructing this special, is that we have no idea what form aliens would take.

Would they be reptiles disguised in human skin, as they were in the recently canceled ABC revival of "V"? Would they look like E.T.? Would they look like giant spiders or insects? Or would they look like splotches of green jelly? Or would they not be visible at all?

The possibilities are as wide as our imaginations, and the fact that writers and filmmakers have given us certain tangible images in the past doesn't make those forms any more likely than others.

It's tough to defend against an invasion when you don't know whether you need to be armed with nuclear weapons, Pop-Tarts or penicillin. So the discussion becomes so abstract that by the end, only the hard-core alien crowd is likely to remain riveted.

"Area 51" is at least a tangible, definable place. But all that's "revealed" here is that in the years after it was established in 1955, it was used to develop Cold War spy planes.

None of the several interviewees suggests there was anything like an alien compound or research into the forbidden. They talk about test flights, an all-male work force and Spartan conditions.

It all ends up sounding rather mundane.

Fortunately for conspiracists, the interviewees also say they didn't know everything, then add they aren't telling everything they do know.

So no theories are conclusively disproven here, which means those theories can continue to circulate and flourish.

That remains the real fun of Area 51.



Ufologist questions government cover-ups of Roswell, Area 51

Dennis Balthaser's quest is to question the government and hold it accountable for the truth.

He has spent a second lifetime, after retirement, investigating UFOs and secret government projects such as Area 51 and underground bases. His program Wednesday at First National Bank's Lunch and Learn series was about his journey scrutinizing the 1947 Roswell incident, Area 51, underground bases and the Pyramids of Giza.

"Whatever happened at Roswell, after 64 years, it refuses to go away," Balthaser said at the beginning of his talk. "There is no doubt in my mind the government is failing to disclose."

According to a Roper poll, he said 72 percent of Americans believe the government is not telling the public everything it knows about UFO activity.

"Today, cover up is a way of life," Balthaser said.
"Most of us have been raised in a box. But I want my children and grandchildren to know what is in store for them."

When someone in the audience asked why those piloting UFOs have not communicated with humans, Balthaser responded by asking why they would want to.

"Their intelligence, knowledge and technology is far superior," he said. "Why would they want to communicate with us?"

Balthaser said it is time for the government to come clean and tell the public what happened in Roswell. There is no more reason to keep it secret, he said.

"What if we received bodies and some 60 years later we don't know what we have, where it came from or how it works?" he said. "I don't buy into the idea that it would cause panic not anymore."

Balthaser demonstrated some evidence that photos and claims made by the government at the time of the Roswell incident is falsified. He said he has interviewed 100 to 150 witnesses in the case and "probably 1,000" have been interviewed altogether

by researchers. These are not only first-hand witnesses but second- and third-hand, too, he said. Balthaser said there are always reports that don't coincide and people who exaggerate accounts. Balthaser believes the only way now to get real information from a witness will be in the form of deathbed confessions because, he said, there comes at a time when a person can no longer be threatened by government entities.

"I am completely frustrated with UFO research," he said. "I think the answers will come from good research and science."

He said the military personnel who "saw" the Roswell incident are the same ones who planned and deployed atomic bombs.

"How can they be capable of delivering atomic bombs, but incapable of telling a weather balloon from a UFO?" he said.

Then, Balthaser said, 50 years later the Air Force claimed the bodies recovered from the desert were anthropomorphic crash test dummies. The problem with that, he said, is the incident occurred in 1947 and crash test dummies were not in use, or even invented, until 1953.

When talking about Area 51, Balthaser said many secret aircraft, including the F-117A Stealth bomber, were tested in the Nevada desert. The area is included in the property attributed to Nellis Air Force Base. They may be working on a daytime stealth aircraft that cannot be seen during the day because it takes on the appearance of the background sky, he added.

Balthaser said rumors persist that there are up to 22 levels underground at Area 51, but there is no proof because no one can talk about it.

"Credibility and validity are the cornerstones of UFO research," he said. "You and I are paying for something the government says doesn't exist."

On the subject of underground bases, Balthaser said there are numerous rumors of such areas. For example, there is said to be such a place in New Mexico near Dulce on the Jicarilla Apache reservation where biogenetic research on animals and humans is occurring.

About the great pyramids, Balthaser said there is no evidence the great pyramid was ever even made as a tomb for a king.

"No mummy has even been found in the great pyramid," he said. There are no drawings on the walls or coffins. There is an entrance and exit vent for air, whereas in most pyramids made as tombs there is only one vent.

"Dead pharaohs don't need air," he said. "So why were air shafts built in?"

Balthaser believes the great pyramid is much older than people have been led to believe by researchers and it appears not to have been finished.



UFO conference set for Kingman, site of reported landing

KINGMAN - Planes taking off and landing at the Kingman Airport isn't unusual, but more than 50 years ago, a much more unearthly aircraft is said to have crashed north of town in the area near the airport.

UFO researchers believe that a saucer-like craft crashed here May 21, 1953, although it wasn't disclosed until a member of the U.S. Air Force went on record 20 years later and said he worked on the investigation.

Researchers will present information on that and other ET incidents during "The Arizona UFO Sightings First Annual Kingman Conference," slated for Friday through Monday.

The schedule includes a Friday evening "Meet and Greet" while a day of lectures will follow on Saturday at conference rooms in Hualapai Mountain Medical Center.

One of those lectures will be from Michael Schratt, a military aerospace historian, draftsman and researcher. Schratt will talk about a body, believed to be extra-terrestrial, that was allegedly found in the wreckage of the Kingman crash.

Roswell expert Donald R. Schmitt, who is the former co-director of the J. Allen Hynek Center for UFO Studies, will also talk about three archaeological dig projects he's organized at the alleged Roswell crash field in 1989, 2002 and 2006.

During the dig in 2002, Schmitt said excavators noticed a 10 foot-wide gouge in the earth that ran several hundred feet in length. After excavating some of the dirt, Schmitt said they found a symmetrical V

in the ground, which seemed to indicate something had crashed there.

Another dig is planned in Roswell this fall.

Schmitt said time is running out for researchers to contact witnesses who have information on or have heard stories about the Kingman crash. Organizers are hoping that those with any information will attend the conference and share what they know.

"We see it as being one last attempt," he said.

Schmitt said that when it comes to Roswell, many military eye witnesses who are now in the end stages of life are making "death-bed" statements about what they saw, including occupants inside the crashed craft.

"They sure weren't from Texas," Schmitt said one man said. Schmitt and his team have interviewed more than 600 people in 20 years as part of his Roswell investigation.

The conference will include a "Contact Day" on Sunday where participants will take a field trip to the alleged Kingman crash site. They will also visit a plot of privately-owned land near Meadview, where Charles Balogh of Phoenix will teach lessons developed by Dr. Stephen Greer of the Center for the Study of Extra-Terrestrial Intelligence. The night will end with a sky watch and "galactic meditation."

The conference will close Monday with a round-table discussion and talk by Len Kasten focusing on the challenges he says humanity faces as we realize we are not alone.

Cost for the full 4-day conference is \$150. The "Contact Day" excursion may also be purchased alone for \$105. Special rates are available for students and those who cannot attend the whole conference.

'Saucers' Seen ver Korea

The Air Force disclosed today that objects resembling "flying discs" have been sighted over Korea by crew members of two U.S. bombers.

Top officials have ordered a full investigation of the reports,

full investigation of the reports, which came thru regular military intelligence channels.

A spokesman said the objects were described by four eyewitnesses as globe-shaped, bright orange in color, and emitting an occasional flash of bluish light.

He indicated that several were sighted, but did not give the number.

The Air Force, which has thrown cold water on hundreds of previous "flying saucer" stories, apparently was impressed by the circumstances under which the new sightings were reported by its own personnel.

The first report reached Air Force intelligence officers from two crew members of a B-29 Superfortress who said they saw the objects flying parallel to their plane at about midnight on the night of Jan. 29. The plane was over Wonsan, Korea, at the time.

This report might have been discounted as over-imaginative. But on the same night, a B-29 from a different squadron returned to its base after a flight over Sunchon, Korea, at considerable distance from Wonsan. Two crew members told intelligence officers that they had seen "flying discs" moving parallel to their plane at a high altitude.

ATTITUDE A CONTRAST

"The objects remained with the B-29 over Wonsan for five minutes and with the B-29 over Sunchon for one minute," the Air Force said.

While officials declined to elaborate on the bare announcement that a full investigation is underway, the open-minded Air Force attitude toward the new reports contrasted sharply with the blunt skepticism it has voiced about previous sightings of mysterious objects in the skies.

'UFOs are a familiar sight in the borough'

UFOS are often seen in the borough according to the professor who pressured the Ministry of Defence into releasing classified files this week.

Dr David Clarke singled out a sighting in Bromley, in 2003, from thousands of reports which were revealed in the biggest ever disclosure by the Government's National Archives.

More than 8,500 pages, including a file which states the country thought it could be facing an alien invasion in 1967, were released.

Dr Clarke, who lectures on folklore and the supernatural, said although many happenings could be explained by aircrast and other natural phe-

nomena, the occurrence in Bromley left many questions unanswered.

The report, dated November 18

2003, sent to the MoD states: "Two adults and 1 child in Bromley. Kent, saw 20-30 red flashing lights in the sky accompanied by a whirring noise and they recorded the occurrence on video tape. The family called the police who confirmed the sighting. The policeman, using a lamppost as a marker, concluded the lights were zig-zagging / turning across the sky at a speed faster than any man made aircraft


"A crew of police helicopter airborne at the time also confirmed the lights but they thought they might be lights of an aircraft on approach to LHR (London Heathrow). However Swanwick Mil (a military air traffic contol centre) declared that there were no aircraft in the approach pattern, at that time all aircraft on their radar were at high level."

> Dr Clarke, who teaches in Sheffield, said: "Bromley and Kent in general have a lot of reports. The Bromley report did stick out as one of the highlights because it had a police helicopter crew which is seen as a credible witness. It is unexplained but there are possible explanations.

> "There's got to be something interesting about the fact that the government has collected all these reports. Thousands of people have seen things but there are lots of bizarre things that go on that science has not yet explained."

Another report from Septem-ber 27, 2000, also tells of 'revolving' red lights which looked like a 'tornado spinning' along the A20 by Bexley.



The truth is out there in these UFO papers

UFO activity in the skies above Faversham has been uncovered in newly released top-secret documents. Flying saucers, a "spinning

Flying saucers, a "spinning top" and an aeroplane's close encounter with a missile-shaped object are among the weird and wonderful sightings in the county, revealed for the first time on Thursday last week.

The previously hushed-up and hidden papers hold the tale of a motorist who called police to report a cluster of UFOs. The mystery craft, which were up to 50ft wide, were said to have hovered over his car as he drove coastbound along the M2 to Faversham in April 1999.

Dozens of sightings in the county are contained in the latest batch of previously top-secret documents, released by the National Archives.

They also include letters between the Ministry of Defence (MoD) and a TV journalist, who was investigating a "War of the Worlds" incident in 1967, in which six small "flying saucers" were spotted in a perfect line from the Isle of Sheppey to the Bristol Channel.

Officials were treating the



incident as a real alien invasion until it emerged the objects were in fact a student prank.

But the documents reveal the MoD intervened in the journalist's investigation, amid fears that intelligence interest in UFOs might be jeopardised if a retired RAF Captain was interviewed for the programme.

A separate file tells how one

person's breakfast at a Folkestone cafe was interrupted in January 2001, when he saw a sinter "spinning top" yo-yoing in the sky.

On the same day, he also saw

On the same day, he also saw unidentified "air jets" zooming around above the town's harbour, while in April that year he reported three more UFOs, which he said looked like "silver tinsel stars", bobbing above Ashford's Tesco store.

Another person reported a near miss involving an Alitalia flight and a brown, missileshaped object as the aircraft – en route to Heathrow from Milan – flew above the Lydd Army ranges in April 1991

"It was a large cigar-shaped vehicle with big projectiles on each side like wings. It seemed to have two very bright lights at the front and a white light flashing underneath. I think there were also coloured lights at the ends of the projectiles but I'm not certain – I was too terrified."

The MoD said it did not have the resources to investigate the sighting, in October, 1998, but believed it could have been an airship.

Top-secret files reveal hundreds of UFO sightings

HUNDREDS of previously top-secret documents have been released by the National Archives, detailing sightings of UFOs.

Above Folkestone harbour, on January 28, 2001, a UFO was spotted by someone on their way for breakfast.

He said: "I witnessed a silver spin top bobbing at height 300ft. It appeared to be yo-yoing in the sky and was the size of a football. I witnessed the object for a good 10 minutes.

"At this point I went to a cafe for breakfast.

"After breakfast I came out and the object had gone. On this day I did go to hospital as a patient, admitted for my own safety."

Two months later, on April 4, 2001, the same person saw three more UFOs that "bobbed about" over the Ashford Tesco in Park Farm.

He said they were low in the sky, about 200ft up, and took the form of three "silver tin-

sel stars". He added: "I believe these UFOs to be three wise men in spirit form, checking that I was safe in my bed after my rebirth."

The 35 files published online by the National Archives last week contain about 8,500 pages of UFO sightings and reports, including some colour photographs and drawings.

Another unexplained occurrence took place in Tenterden on August 13, 1999.

It was filed by a woman who said she was watching the

sun set when a "large brilliant light in the sky" appeared and after a while "moved off fairly quickly".

Folkestone police were also called after a "squashed elongated disc with a yellow glow" was spotted in Hythe.

Recorded on July 22, 1998, the observer said it lasted for about 20 seconds before fading away.

The man took the pictures while he was on holiday in Habarana, Sri Lanka, in March 2004.

MoD investigators, who examine alleged sightings to see if there is any threat to UK airspace, advised the man to contact the Sri Lankan authorities.

Release of secret files shines light on UFO 'close encounters'

In January 1979 – during the peak of the winter of discontent – in addition to discussions on trade union strikes, the House of Lords had the only full debate on UFOs ever held in Parliament.

The previously-classified records show that in December 1977 the Government used its influence to talk down a call by Grenada president Sir Eric Gairy for a UN agency to conduct research into UPO sightings.

Gairy eventually withdrew his proposal, but continued his campaign for a full UN debate on UFOs – calling on the UN General Assembly to make

1978 "the year of the UFO".

And the documents show that between 2002 and 2005 the MoD dealt with 28 official reports of UFO sightings over Wales.

They included objects with legs spinning over the Valleys, a flying disc above Newport and a large black object hovering over Rhyl.

The files shows that on January 31, 2005, an orange ball of light with "spiderish legs" was spotted over Port Tulbot.

Also on July 12, 2003, two round black objects with legs were sighted spinning over the Rhondda

And on November 11, 2002, two objects of different colour were spotted moving up and down above Cardiff docks.

Beyond Wales, the files reveal a resident took a picture of a triangular-shaped object tracking a Lancaster bomber during an air show in Withernsea, Yorkshire, on June 15, 2002.

The MoD said the object might have been a commercial

helicopter from an off-shore oil or gas installation.

One of the 35 newly-released files shows 15 unidentified aircraft were detected on radar approaching the UK between January and July 2001 in the months leading up to 9/11.

The MoD received just one UFO report – with no radar corroboration – on September 11 itself.

The files also feature claims the Home Office had emergency procedures for dealing with landed and crashed satellites and UFOs.

And they include US policy files, including CIA papers discussing the use of UFO reports for "psychological warfare".

The files further detail an alleged UFO sighting by the crew of HMS Manchester off the coast of Norway and how the logbook recording the incident could not be recovered.

Dr David Clarke, author of the "The UFO files" and senior lecturer in journalism at Sheffield Hallam University, said that following the ntroduction of the Freedom of information Act, requests for details about sightings have increased dramatically.

Mr Clarke said: "I was one of the MoD's most 'persistent correspondents' and eventually persuaded MoD and other government departments to release their information on this perplexing and controversial subject.

"You can see from the files that I wasn't the only one interested in the subject, with the phenomenon discussed at the highest level of government right across the globe."

UPO enthusiast Russ Kellet, 47, says it's "convenient" that the ship's logbook covering the period when men on HMS Manchester and other Royal Navy craft reported seeing the unidentified object went missing.

He said: "If somebody has got it (the logbook) on their desk and then somebody official comes in and they're talking and it just goes then it's

Today's release is the largest disclosure of documents so far by The National Archives.

The files contain more than 8,500 pages of UFO sightings and reports, colour photographs and drawings, RAF investigations, unusual radar detections, parliamentary briefings and – for the first time – documents on the Government's policy on UFOs.



ARE WE

Eamonn Ansbro believes we receive regular visits from UFOs, and he claims he can pinpoint where and when they will appear. **Fionola Meredith** meets the astronomer at the research-grade observatory he has built in Co Roscommon



Ansbro first became interested in unexplained flying objects in 1990, when Hermann van Bellingham, an astronomer at Schull Planetarium, mentioned that the planetarium had been receiving phone calls about odd lights in the sky. With his background in meteorology, Ansbro was intrigued. "Restaurateurs, solicitors, farmers—all kinds of people had been phoning in. Over the course of 12 months, I met all of them. I was totally confused by their stories. They just didn't fit. There were multiple sightings of balls of light, and disc-shaped objects. There was nothing in meteorology or physics that could explain it. I became convinced that we were dealing with something strange that did not fit into our paradigms."

Ansbro says some people who witnessed these constructs" found it difficult to cope with what they had seen. "There was one case that made the hairs on the back of my neck stand up. It appened in July 1993 and it concerned two families living about a mile apart in remote west Cork. In one house, a man woke up one morning and found himself lying on top of the bed. The loor was open and the room was covered with stones. He knew something extraordinary had appened.

"He went to his sister's house a mile away and old her what had occurred. His sister then told him that she had got up to go to the bathroom in he night, and had glanced out of the window. The saw a disc shape hovering above her brother's house. She got her two teenage children out if bed, and they witnessed the disc too."

Ansbro says the encounter profoundly hocked both families. "It really challenged their whole world view. It affects the whole notion of our existence that we are not alone."

OU GET THE sense that astronomer Eamonn Ansbro is a man weary of being ridiculed. He does not want to be regarded as a kook, an eccentric, part of a wild-eyed, credulous band of hysterics. He is a serious man, a scientist, and he speaks quietly, with down-to-earth conviction. But what he has to say is deeply controversial, leaving him shunned by mainstream science. Ansbro believes that extra-terrestrial intelligence exists, and that surveillance spaceships regularly visit Earth, travelling on specially programmed orbital tracks.

Governments are aware of these UFOs, he says, but are helpless to intervene. Most challengingly of all, Ansbro claims that, using a theory developed by the British aeronautical engineer Roy Dutton, he can predict where and when UFOs will appear, with 80 per cent accuracy or more. "They are not a million miles away," announces Ansbro. "They are here in our own backyard."

Ansbro lives with his wife Catherine on a remote, windswept hillside near Boyle in Co Roscommon, where the skies are large, clear and unpolluted, and Eamonn can get on with his work undisturbed.

Tucked away down a lane, their house looks unremarkable, until you notice the 360-degree sky-scanning cameras mounted on the roof, mon-

itoring the heavens for any unusual activity. Out in the back garden, among the daffodils, and watched over by the couple's sheep, is Ansbro's research-grade astronomical observatory: two large robotic telescopes and a range of advanced optical equipment are housed in a series of corrugated iron sheds and containers. This is a home where the solar system is under constant surveillance, where interstellar probes and the limits of astrophysics are the stuff of everyday conversation.

Ansbro chose Boyle as the site for his observatory precisely because there have been so many sightings of UFOs – or Anomalous Observational Phenomena, as Ansbro prefers to call them – in the surrounding area. "Serious people run screaming from the term UFO," it really has become debased," he says with a wry smile.

He claims that the town commissioner first invited him to Boyle in the mid-1990s to investigate the odd things that local people had apparently witnessed in the night sky. Eighty or 90 residents queued up to describe what they had seen. One couple, both in their 20s, told Ansbro that they had noticed what they first assumed to be a lorry sitting in the middle of a field, and were shocked to see it suddenly start rising up into the air.

Another man, who lives at the edge of Lough Key - by all accounts something of a UFO hotspot - was out on the forested eastern shore of the lake with some friends, just as dusk was falling, one evening in October. Using a pair of binoculars, he says he saw something the size and shape of a bus moving through the sky at roughly double the height of the trees. The man's two friends took fright and legged it, but he stayed and watched the craft slowly descend towards the lake.

Strange tales indeed. But where is the proof? Ansbro acknowledges that it is vital to begin from a position of scepticism, but – to use the classic X-Files terminology – he evidently "wants to believe". He insists that there is "compelling documentation" that physical objects, with flight characteristics not yet achievable by known technology, are being routinely reported in our skies. "There have been 3,600 military and commercial aircraft encounters worldwide, most cases corroborated with radar and multiple witnesses both on the ground and in the air. There are over 4,000 landing-trace cases where these UFOs have left physical evidence. There are numerous daytime and night-time photographs of clearly non-human constructs from all over the world; files and video evaluated and deemed authentic by competent experts in optical physics and related fields."

Ansbro says that these reports often come from exceptionally qualified and unbiased first-hand observers such as airline crews, police officers and military pilots; they aren't spurious friend-of-a-friend accounts, or the kind of stories that begin, "there was this guy...". As far as he is concerned, they are credible, and worthy of further serious-minded scientific research.


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


But Ansbro is ploughing a fairly solitary furrow. He is frustrated that so many mainstream scientists in the Search for Extra-Terrestrial Intelligence (Seti) project refuse to see his work as legitimate. He says that conventional Seti strategies, focusing on distant stars, and working on the basis that other civilizations use an advanced technology that is nonetheless similar to our own, is a logically flawed approach that - despite more than 40 years of effort - has yielded no data. "It's like trying to find an Italian restaurant at the end of the galaxy - it's just not going to happen," Ansbro says impatiently. Instead, he advocates a programme of "rigorous and coordinated Setv [Search for extra-terrestrial visitation] research", to test the numerous reports of near-Earth visitations.


Putting it bluntly, few people seem to be listening. Presenting his case at a Seti conference in the US, Ansbro was resoundingly snubbed. In his own words, his views "caused ructions". Fellow scientists stormed out of the room, and Eamonn and Catherine were rather pointedly not invited to the conference dinner. But Ansbro is used to these kinds of reactions. He quotes a line from the 1994 Harrison Ford film, Clear and Present Danger: "I'm afraid if I dig any deeper no one is going to like what I find."

It's impossible to tell whether Eamonn Ansbro is a genius pioneer or a deluded maverick. Even he admits that no one knows for sure what the UFOs he has spent decades chasing, recording and researching are. But whatever the truth, Ansbro insists that they present "tangible, mocking proof that the universe is a much stranger place than mankind wants to accept". In the meantime, the sky-scanning cameras in Co Roscommon maintain their lonely vigil.

Bobbies dazzled by mystery sighting

I write regarding Tristan Cork's article on UFO sightings.

You have obviously received a lot of correspondence on the above subject. See what you think I might have seen one night in 1957, as follows.

I was a member of the Somerset Constabulary and I was a road motor patrol officer stationed at Keynsham in 1957



An FBI document dated January, 1979, said: "The Department of Justice advised that their criminal division has been aware of the phenomenon of animals being mutilated in a manner that would indicate such acts were performed by persons as part of a ritual or ceremony."

Swoop

Kenneth Rommel, who led the FBI's Animal Mutilation Project probe, wrote a bombshell memo on March 5, 1980, on one alien swoop. It stated: "In July 1978 a UFO was reportedly sighted by a resident of Taos, New Mexico, hovering over a pick-up truck. The following morning powder flakes were reportedly recovered from the truck roof."

Locals told the FBI the flakes came from COW HIDES, he added.

Possible theories for the mutilations examined by the FBI included claims the CIA or US Department

of Energy had carried out biological warfare tests on the cows, that religious cults were to blame or that "they have some connection with unidentified objects".

Ex-MoD UFO expert Nick Pope said: "These documents show how seriously the authorities took the matter and that they were prepared to debate theories about extraterrestrial involvement.

"The papers also show there is confusion about which part of the government should take the lead. I had similar problems while on the MoD's UFO project.

"When reports of animal mutilations occurred in the UK it wasn't clear whether MoD or the Ministry of Agriculture Fisheries and Food—now DEFRA—should investigate."

Last May The Sun told of a string of sheep mutilations in a 50-mile area between Shrewsbury and Powys. Nick said: "As in the US, some people blame Satanists, some think it's aliens and others suspect some secret government programme.

"The situation is complicated by a separate but possibly related mystery of whether there's a small population of pumas, panthers and lynxes living wild in the UK."

An ignoble extradition

New clear evidence of hacker Gary McKinnon's Asperger's must persuade parliament to protect him

xtradition, extradition, extradition. The attention being paid to the attempts made by the Swedish government to extradite Julian Assange and what is happenin Virginia has inevitably obscured another battle being fought out behind the scenes, that of Gary McKinnon, the cker with Asperger's syndrome who left rude messages in the Pentagon's computer system a decade ago. Every member of both houses of

parliament should by now have received a letter containing fresh details of McKinnon's medical history and that of close members of his family. The decision to make public this intimate side of his life has been taken because McKinnon's family now feel that there is a real possibility the government may boy to repeated requests from the United States and allow the extradition.

What MPs and members of the House of Lords will learn is that McKinnon's mental problems were first noted back in 1983, when he was only 17. When he was diagnosed three years ago as suffering from Asperger's syndrome, suggestions were made in some quarters that this was a convenient way for him to avoid being extradited. This new evidence – which will form part of a debate in the Lords, initiated by Lord Maginnis, on March 23 - gives the lie to that scepticism.

In the letter McKinnon's mother,

Janis Sharp, writes: "On 10 February 1983 we were compelled to take my son

to see a neurologist because of our grave concerns regarding the sudden deterioration in Gary's mental health and the loss of his intellectual faculties, leading us to fear that Gary may have a brain tumour." She goes on to spell out the family's painful medical history.

She had taken the decision to go

She had taken the decision to go public with the family's many problems because she feels that MPs and members of the House of Lords need all the ammunition available as McKinnon runs

out of legal options to fight extradition. To her credit, Theresa May, the home secretary, stayed the extradition process once the coalition government took office. She is, according to the Home Office, "looking afresh" at the medical evidence, and is asking McKinnon to submit to a further examination - which he has agreed to, provided the examiner is an expert in Asperger's syndrome. May then has to make what may

be a speedy decision as to whether allowing extradition would be a breach of McKinnon's human rights. What politicians may want to digest is the assessment made by Professor Decla assessment made by Professor Decian Murphy - an expert in Asperger's and autism and a psychiatrist regularly use by the Home Office - that "[Gary] now has a fixed autistic-like idea, which is currently unshakable, that his best outcome is to take his own life".

Thanks to WikiLeaks, it has emerged that Gordon Brown, when prime minister, approached the US ambassador in the UK, Louis Susman, on McKinnon's behalf. Brown's reasonable suggestion - that McKinnon would plead guilty to hacking offences but would serve any

sentence in the UK - was then snubbed by a secretary of state who this week has been lecturing Middle Eastern countries

on tolerance and humanity.

It is perfectly possible for the United Kingdom to refuse to grant an extradition request. Life will go on. Last July Switzerland refused an American request for the extradition of the film director Roman Polanksi, who was director Roman Polanksi, who was convicted of a far more serious crime than computer hacking, and so far Hillary Clinton has not instituted a no-fly zone over Geneva. Coincidentally, this month the

National Archives released official and National Archives released official and previously censored documents about UFOs. It was McKinnon's belief in the existence of UFOs that sent him on his weird and wonderful hacking mission through the computer systems of Nasa and the Pentagon. The Ministry of Defence documents show this was something that even quite senior government figures around the world were concerned about, although many "flying saucer" sightings have turned out to be pranks or misunderstandings.

When confidential government documents are released in 30 years, detailing discussions about a computer hacker with Asperger's syndrome who did no harm beyond embarrassment to the American military, we must hope that future generations see that our ministers stood up for decency and common sense, and did not bow to demands for an ignoble extradition

MEMBERS of the House of Lords e to debate the future of Gar McKinnon, the computer hacker is facing extradition to the US.

Mr McKinnon, who is autistic, has admitted hacking into almost 100 American military computers in 2001 and 2002 but says he was looking for proof of the existence of UFOs.

The 45-year-old from Palmers Green, who suffers from Asperger syndrome, faces up to 60 years in jail if he is convicted but says sending him to the US would breach his human rights.

Extradition proceedings were halted by the Home Secretary Theresa May last year, but the case now appears to be stuck in a stalemate.

Mrs May has asked for a new

assessment by two governmentappointed psychiatrists, but Mr McKinnon's lawyers say the two psychiatrists have no particular expertise in Asperger's and have asked for an alternative expert. Now Lord Maginnis of Drumglass

has called for a debate in the House of Lords to discuss Mr McKinnon's future. The debate was scheduled

to take place late yesterday.

Mrs Sharp said: "I wrote to all the
Lords and the MPs explaining Gary's

Lords and the MPs explaining Gary's situation. So many people have responded, so I am really pleased."
Enfield Southgate MP David Burrowes met Mrs Sharp last week and has pledged to write again to Mrs May in a bid to break the deadlock.

In search of Nessie, the Loch Ness Monster

Henry Bauer has something in common with me, and most probably with you — he's never seen the Loch Ness Monster.



In his case, however, it isn't from lack of trying. The Virginia Tech science professor emeritus has made a number of trips to Scotland hoping to catch a glimpse of the world's most elusive aquatic beast, only to be disappointed. But not disheartened.

"Almost all of the sightings have been random," he said, "and they tend to catch people by surprise."

In other words, you can't meet "Nessie" by appointment. That is, if he or she actually exists.

There appear to be three possibilities:

- The Loch Ness Monster is nothing but a figment of some Scotman's imagination, a legend that has morphed into a mass hallucination among the believers.
- 2. There was a Loch Ness Monster once upon a time, but now it's dead.
- A family of Nessies still occupies the mile-wide, 20-mile-long lake, and it's only a matter of time before their existence is proven.

Bauer describes himself as "about 95 percent certain" of the third option. He will be one of the speakers at an "UFOs at the Lake Conference" at the Mariner's Landing Resort on Smith Mountain Lake, which is a neat coincidence. A movie in production called "Lake Effect" has been filmed there, and one of its components is a Nessie-style monster.

The producers of "Lake Effect" didn't enlist Henry Bauer as a technical advisor, but they should have. As the pursuit of Nessie has changed from hobby to obsession, he has read everything he can find on the beast, pro and con.

"I'm a scientist," he said, "and so I have an open mind, both ways. I'm just trying to help get at the truth."

The initial spark for Bauer was a chance encounter with a book by Tim Dinsdale, described as the only person ever to capture the Loch Ness Monster on film. You've probably seen a famous still photograph from that footage, a grainy image of what appear to be eel-like loops protruding from the water of the Loch.

Naturally, that photo has come under withering fire from debunkers. It's a boat, it's a sturgeon, it's an imperfection in the film.

"I took a year's sabbatical in 1972," Bauer said, "to study at the University of Cambridge in England. Naturally, I took a side trip to Loch Ness, Dinsdale happened to be there, and I met him."

Bauer leans toward the theory that the Loch Ness Monster (or monsters) is a prehistoric creature that somehow became landlocked when the Ice Age closed off Loch Ness' former connection to the ocean.

"There is another body of water called Loch Morar, also near the ocean, and there are legends surrounding creatures there, too," Bauer said.

If you're picturing Loch Ness as a small body of water, think again. This is no glorified farm pond. "It's 700 feet deep at one point," Bauer said.

Nor is it surrounded by Loch Ness Monster tourist attractions. "There aren't any summer cottages and only a few hotels," Bauer said. "The local planning committee is very conservative, and they want to keep the place pretty much like it's always been. You can buy a Nessie doll in some stores, but that's about it."

Obviously, there are Nessie questions with no current answers. Since there have been sightings since the 1930s, the creature either has a very long life span or it has reproduced. And if one of the beasts has died, why was no carcass ever found?

On the other hand, Bauer said, no one has been able to explain certain sonar findings that appear to show large objects in motion.

For all its size and presumably carnivorous diet, Nessie has never tried to eat one of its human neighbors, or even a tourist. Rather, the beast seems reclusive and shy, appearing only by chance and disappearing just as quickly.

Or else this is all a hoax. Like any true scientist, Henry Bauer just seems to be enjoying the puzzle. "I guess you'd say I'm into oddball science," he said with a chuckle.

The itinerary for the May 7 event at Mariner's Landing also includes representatives from the UFO Club of Virginia Beach and Virginia MUFON (the Mutual UFO Network), a man who claims to have been abducted by aliens, a licensed social worker who has counseled individuals who claim to have been abducted, and Phil Reynolds, an expert on the Mothman Mystery (among other things, a movie starring Richard Gere) from West Virginia.



Another Crop Circle Discovered in Indonesia

A new crop circle has been reported by a group established to investigate UFO sightings in Indonesia.

Beta-UFO, set up in 1997, said the latest crop circle had appeared in a rice field in Cikarang, Bekasi, West Java.

"The locals didn't know," group member Julius Perdana told Detik.com on Monday. "We had to climb up a hill to see it [the crop circle] for ourselves."

Julius said the crop circle was discovered three weeks ago but the group had only become aware of it on Sunday.

The news portal did not say how the group had been alerted to the find.

He said the crop circle — which fringe groups claim have extraterrestrial origins — was 90 meters long and 30 meters wide in some places and consisted of two circles topped with hexagons.

"There are no police lines or spectators," Julius said.

He said the design differed from the previously discovered crop circle discovered in Sleman, Yogyakarta, but more closely resembled another discovered in Magelang, Central Java.

Beta-UFO had taken photos of the crop circle and would send them to researchers at Central Java's Diponegoro University for further examination.


"We will wait for the researchers to say whether it is original or man-made," Julius said.

'What on Earth?' Probes Mysteries of Crop Circles

A cheery, chummy documentary about the pastoral patterns inaccurately described as crop circles, Suzanne Taylor's "What on Earth?" musters a gaggle of enthusiasts to dish on the phenomenon.

They're a diverse bunch — farmers and philosophers, scientists and a singer-songwriter — and Ms. Taylor, a former actress who first became involved with the group in the early 1990s, uses her familiarity to encourage them to open up. Merging homey interviews with photographs and film of the hundreds of varieties of patterns (which pop up mysteriously overnight and are found all over the world), the film makes no pretense of objectivity or analysis. Everyone on screen — most sporting little blue flowers in their lapels, like a club insignia — is convinced of an intelligence behind the designs.

"I knew that something beyond the beyond was going on," one interviewee says, echoing the metaphysical beliefs of many circle fans. But it's the film's geometrists who enthrall most, revealing that many of the shapes — one of which famously made the cover of a 1990 Led Zeppelin album — hold entirely new answers to Euclidean problems.

Set mainly in the bucolic beauty of Wiltshire, England (a hotbed of circle activity), "What on Earth" touches on famous hoaxes and enjoys a brief visit to the conspiracy-theory place.

The film's main attractions, though, are the patterns themselves: fantastically precise whorls and curlicues, radiolaria and mandalas that drift across the screen like the endlessly reforming crystals in a kaleidoscope. Whether designed by nature or by little green men, they make you want to believe.
