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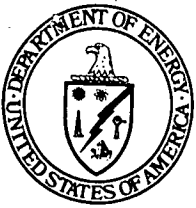



The Department of Energy has considered your Freedom of Information Appeal. As the enclosed Decision and Order indicates, the DOE has determined that your submission be denied.

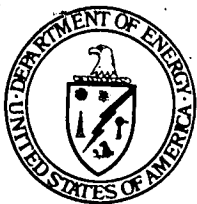

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## DECISION AND ORDER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY

### Appeal

Name of Petitioner: Richard M. Neal, Jr., M.D.

Date of Filing: June 14, 1988

Case Number: KFA-0195

On June 14, 1988, Richard M. Neal, Jr., M.D. (Neal) filed an Appeal from a determination issued to him on May 19, 1988 by William V. Vitale, Director of the Executive Secretariat of the United States Department of Energy (the Authorizing Official). In that determination, the Authorizing Official denied a request for information which was filed by Neal pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), 5 U.S.C. § 552, as implemented by the DOE in 10 C.F.R. Part 1004. In his Appeal, Neal asserts that requested material not located by the Authorizing Official exists, and requests that the agency conduct a more thorough search for responsive documents.

The FOIA requires that documents held by federal agencies generally be released to the public upon request. This Office has repeatedly held that an FOIA request deserves a thorough and conscientious search for responsive documents. See, e.g., W.R. Thomason, Inc., 10 DOE ¶ 80,150 (1983); Crude Oil Purchasing, Inc., 6 DOE ¶ 80,156 (1980); Dunaway, McCarthy & Dye, 4 DOE ¶ 80,173 (1979); Trends Publishing, Inc., 4 DOE ¶ 80,156 (1979); Exxon Company, U.S.A., 4 DOE ¶ 80,103 (1979). We have not hesitated to remand a case where it is evident that the search conducted was inadequate.

### I. Background

On February 25, 1988 and March 16, 1988, Neal submitted FOI requests to the DOE concerning the membership and correspondence of certain committees and offices of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) during the period 1947 through 1952. Specifically, Neal requested the following information:

1. The names of the members of the Science Advisory Committee;



2. The names of the members of the Advisory Committee on Biology and Medicine;
3. Whether any members of either Committee are still living;
4. Correspondence between Dr. Detlev W. Bronk and Dr. Alfred Newton Richards, Head of the Committee on Medical Research within the Office of Scientific Research and Development;
5. Any correspondence of Dr. Detlev W. Bronk on the subject of MJ-12, the alleged crash of a UFO near Roswell, New Mexico in 1947;
6. Correspondence between Dr. Detlev W. Bronk and Dr. Vannevar Bush, who established the Office of Scientific Research and Development;
7. Correspondence between Dr. Alfred Newton Richards and Dr. Vannevar Bush; and
8. Correspondence, notes, speeches, publications, etc., of Drs. Bronk, Richards, and Bush, when they were involved with the National Academy of Sciences.

In his May 19, 1988 letter, the Authorizing Official stated that Neal's inquiry concerning whether any of the members of these committees were still alive did not constitute a request for agency records as required by the FOIA. With respect to Neal's other requests, the Authorizing Official stated that the DOE's Office of the Executive Secretariat had been searched and that no documents were found that were responsive to the requests. The Authorizing Official also suggested that Neal submit FOI requests for this information to the National Academy of Sciences and to the Scientific, Economic and Natural Resources Branch of the National Archives and Records Administration.

In his Appeal, Neal contends that the DOE, as successor to the AEC, certainly should have the requested information. He questions whether the information has been withheld because it is classified and states that the information is too old to cause any breach of national security.

## II. Analysis

With respect to Neal's request for information on whether former AEC committee members are still living, we note that the Freedom of Information Act does not require an agency to

collect information or to compile and create a record for the purpose of satisfying a request for specific information. See 10 C.F.R. § 1004.4(d)(1); Paxton, Johnny, 10 DOE ¶ 80,117 at 80,558 (1982); American Federation of Government Employees Local No. 3800, 5 DOE ¶ 80,188 at 80,860 (1980). The DOE therefore is not required to determine whether these individuals are presently living.

With respect to the other information requested by Neal, the Authorizing Official stated in a telephone conversation with Kent S. Woods of this Office that a thorough search of the computerized indices of the Office of the Executive Secretariat had uncovered no information relevant to Neal's requests. According to the Authorizing Official, the DOE does not possess complete AEC records from the period relevant to Neal's requests. At the time when the AEC was abolished and replaced by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) and the Energy Research and Development Administration (ERDA), some AEC records were transferred to each of these successor organizations. Only AEC records transferred to ERDA became DOE records when the agency was established in 1977. In addition, many AEC records deemed worthy of preservation have been transferred to the National Archives and Records Administration, while other records determined to be of no historical interest have been destroyed.

Although the DOE's collection of AEC records is not complete, the Authorizing Official states that the agency has retained a sizable number of AEC documents from the period 1948 through 1952 for research purposes and for use in preparing histories of energy development and regulation. According to the Authorizing Official, these records are completely listed on a computerized index according to subject and also by their original numerical designation. They consist chiefly of specially prepared action or information papers and the minutes of meetings of AEC personnel. The AEC records retained by the DOE contain very little correspondence of AEC personnel. A thorough search of the DOE's index was made by the Authorizing Official prior to the issuance of his May 19, 1988 letter and no responsive documents were found. The Authorizing Official informed Mr. Woods that any existing correspondence files for the AEC would now be located at the National Archives and Records Administration.

In addition, the Authorizing Official has conducted a subsequent search for documents in response to Neal's FOI Appeal. In a June 27, 1988 memorandum to Mr. Woods, he stated that this search also failed to locate "MJ-12 documents", files of Dr. Detlev Bronk, or any other responsive documents. He suggested, however, that


information concerning the members of the AEC's Advisory Committee on Biology and Medicine may already be publicly available. According to the Authorizing Official, the AEC often published the names of committee members in appendices to its annual reports. He therefore suggests that Neal review these annual reports at a local depository library.

After reviewing the Authorizing Official's actions, we are convinced that he conducted an adequate search for relevant documents using the information supplied by Neal. The search was reasonable and calculated to locate any responsive documents in the DOE's possession. Miller v. Dept. of State, 779 F.2d 1378, 1384-85 (8th Cir. 1985). Since the material that Neal seeks does not currently exist within the records of the DOE, the present Appeal must be denied.

It Is Therefore Ordered That:

(1) The Appeal filed by Dr. Richard M. Neal, Jr. on June 14, 1988 is hereby denied.

(2) This is a final order of the Department of Energy from which any aggrieved party may seek judicial review pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(4)(B). Judicial review may be sought either in the district in which the requester resides or has a principal place of business, or in which the agency records are situated, or in the District of Columbia.

## Science Advice in the White House

The genesis of the President's Science Advisers and the National Science Foundation.

Detlev W. Bronk

There are reasons for hope that the recent precarious role of science and scientists in the national government may be redefined and strengthened by President Ford and congressional acts. There may again be an agency within the White House through which scientists will be able to participate in formulating laws and national policies that involve scientific considerations. Accordingly, it is timely and of especial interest to recall the origins of two closely related institutions that have had profound influence on national policies and on the development of science in this country during the past 25 years: the President's Science Adviser and his Science Advisory Committee, and the National Science Foundation.

1950-1951 was a remarkable period. It was the beginning of 12 years during which there was strong support of science by Presidents Truman, Eisenhower, and Kennedy. Science flourished in all branches of the government. Vannevar Bush was still the vigorous, wise creator and catalyst of scientific institutions.

The historic achievements of the Office of Scientific Research and Development (OSRD) during World War II had left a heritage of scientists and respect for science in the Department of Defense. Each of the services was developing an agency for science and technology with civilian advisory committees, such as the Office of Naval Research and the Naval Research Advisory Committee. Over all was the Research and Development Board (RDB) that had recently been created by Bush. The Korean War was a reminder of the military importance of science.

The Atomic Energy Commission was firmly established and was beginning to support much research in universities as well as within the Commission.

Supplementing the postdoctoral fellowships which they had provided for 30 years, the National Academy of Sciences and the National Research Council conducted the first country-wide program of fellowships for graduate study in the sciences with financial assistance from The Rockefeller Foundation at first and then the Atomic Energy Commission. The Academy and Research Council were at the start of a new era of unprecedented initiative in the development of science within universities and executive agencies of the federal government.

The National Science Foundation (NSF) was created in the spring of 1950 by Act of Congress after 5 years of discussion regarding its role and structure.

### Truman Seeks Advice

Early in the autumn of 1950 I received this letter from David Stowe, Administrative Assistant to President Truman:

At the request of the President a review of scientific research of military significance and of the organization of the Government for promotion of scientific activities generally is being undertaken by Mr. William T. Golden who is serving for the purpose as a Special Consultant to the Director of the Bureau of the Budget.

Mr. Golden wishes the benefit of an informal discussion with you and will communicate with you. . . . This study is important to the Government and your assistance will be greatly appreciated.

William Golden was an investment banker with a lively interest in science; now he is widely known and appreciated among scientists as treasurer of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and as trustee of many scientific institutions. During 1946-1949 he had been assistant to Atomic Energy Commissioner Lewis Strauss. It was that experience and the wide contacts with scientists and government officials he thus formed that fitted him for the study conducted for Truman.

In my first meeting with Golden, he said that his study would deal with the organization of scientific research and development within the government and the interrelationship of such agencies as the Research and Development Board of the Department of Defense, the National Science Foundation which was about to be activated, and whatever agency was to be responsible for those functions which had been performed by the Office of Scientific Research and Development during World War II. He described those organizations as "the three segments of my study."

We discussed the general dissatisfaction with the Research and Development Board which was then being investigated by a review committee of which James Killian was chairman. Golden and I agreed that the National Science Foundation, whose board was soon to have its first meeting, "should confine its activities entirely to non-military matters" except perhaps in time of war. Golden asked what I thought about the plan he was formulating for the establishment of a Scientific Adviser to the President whose functions would be "to keep fully informed on all major scientific research and development activities of a military character in all Government agencies so engaged." Should the Adviser be supplemented by an Advisory Committee? Who did I think would be a suitable Science Adviser to the President?

Although those were Golden's primary concerns, he asked discerning questions about the National Academy of Sciences and its National Research Council; he was enthusiastic about our plans for vitalizing them and their relations to all agencies of government.

The author, currently president emeritus of Rockefeller University, New York 10021, was, during the period about which he is writing, president of Johns Hopkins University, president of the National Academy of Sciences, and chairman of the executive committee of the National Science Board.

During the 6 months before and after that conversation, Golden had discussions with 165 scientists and engineers from universities, industries, and government and with nonscientific government officials. He thus heard a broad spectrum of opinions regarding the National Academy of Sciences, the Research and Development Board, the National Science Foundation, the proposed Scientific Adviser to the President, the interrelations among these institutions, and their several roles in the government.

As 1950 drew to a close, Golden was assured that he had widespread support for his proposal that there be appointed a President's Science Adviser. He had the unanimous approval of the Killian committee that was reviewing the Research and Development Board.

Accordingly, Golden sent to President Truman a memorandum: "Mobilizing science for war; a Scientific Adviser to the President." The memorandum recommended prompt appointment of an outstanding scientific leader as Science Adviser to the President. His functions would be:

- a) To inform himself and keep informed on all scientific research and development programs of military significance within the several independent Government departments so engaged.
- b) To plan for and stand ready promptly to initiate a civilian Scientific Research Agency, roughly comparable to the Office of Scientific Research and Development (OSRD) of World War II.
- c) To be available to give the President independent and comprehensive advice on scientific matters inside and outside the Government, particularly those of military significance.

Before 2 weeks had gone by, unexpected opposition to Golden's proposals developed within the newly created National Science Board of the National Science Foundation.

#### National Science Board

The National Science Foundation was established by Act of Congress in May 1950. The Act had the unusual provision that the ultimate power to disburse funds made available each year by Congress was lodged in a National Science Board composed of citizens appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Because of this unprecedented power, the White House under the leadership of John Steelman, Assistant to the President, solicited advice widely

as to the composition of the Board with regard to scientific competence; university, industrial, or political affiliation; religious, racial, and geographical representation.

The first meeting of the National Science Board was finally held during December in the Cabinet Room of the White House; the presidents of Harvard, Wisconsin, and Johns Hopkins—Conant, Fred, and Bronk—were elected chairman, vice-chairman, and chairman of the executive committee, respectively. In the course of the meeting, the President greeted each member of the Board, then asked, "What have you fellows and Sophie Aberle been talking about?" Conant replied that we had been discussing possible directors of the Foundation whom we would then recommend to him. With a smile, Truman said, "That should be easy, someone who can get along with me." He then went on for 10 or 15 minutes discussing his hopes for the Foundation, what it could, should, and should not do. He ended, "You may have trouble getting money out of those fellows over in Congress. I will help."

A month later the Board met again. Its purpose was to consider the post of director, but the discussion soon turned to Golden's recent recommendation to the President. DuBridge and I had been members of the Killian committee that had unanimously supported the proposal to create a Science Adviser to the President. We were dismayed to hear a majority of our fellow members on the Board strongly oppose the proposal.

In reporting this to the Bureau of the Budget, Conant told of the Board's concern that the appointment of a Science Adviser to the President with an Advisory Committee would lower the status of the Foundation and obstruct its congressional appropriations.

This conflict between the National Science Board and the proponents of a Science Adviser to the President with a Science Advisory Committee caused much concern in scientific and government circles. William Webster, chairman of the Research and Development Board, was especially vehement in his criticism of the National Science Board's objection, which he described as typical of "scientists' vacillation and naivete." This was unjustified because most of the members of the National Science Board had not been involved in discussions with Golden preceding his recommendations. Their desire that the Foun-

dation take an active part in furthering military science was indeed supported by the NSF Act of 1950 which states that the Foundation's duty is "to secure the national defense" as well as "to promote the progress of science; to advance the national health, prosperity, and welfare; and for other purposes."

The conflict was soon resolved, but the role of the National Science Foundation in military science and its relation to the Department of Defense was again an issue a year later, as it has been recently. Congressman Wolverton, who had been a member of the committee that sponsored the NSF Act, wrote to the acting director of the Office of Defense Mobilization (ODM): "It is my recollection that the principal function of the Foundation relates to adequate coordination and stimulation of scientific matters relating to the national defense." And so he asked, "What is this new Science Advisory Committee, how does it differ from the NSF and why cannot NSF act in the advisory capacity of this new committee?" The ODM replied that "there is no overlapping of functions . . . coordination with the activities of the NSF is assured by the appointment of four members of the NSB and the Director of the NSF to this new Science Advisory Committee."

Conant, DuBridge, and I continued to urge our colleagues on the National Science Board to concentrate the Foundation's initial activities on basic research and on a fellowship program. We were aided by a lengthy "Memorandum on Program for the National Science Foundation" that was prepared by Golden and sent through the director of the Bureau of the Budget to all members of the National Science Board. It began:

It is well to reiterate the preeminent need from a long term viewpoint, for advancing basic scientific knowledge. To promote such activities is the primary purpose of the National Science Foundation. To this end provision is being made for a representative of the NSF to be a member of the newly created Advisory Committee on Defense Scientific Research. This latter committee located within the ODM and reporting to the Defense Mobilizer and to the President will serve as a focus in the mobilization program for the representation of the scientific community and further will serve as the central point for knowledge of the Government as a whole in scientific research and development of military significance. Membership of the committee will consist of ex officio representatives of the appropriate governmental agencies plus a

representative selection of distinguished scientists at large.

It may be worth repeating that in accordance with the spirit of the Act, as well as the judgment of substantially all scientists with whom I have discussed the question, the National Science Foundation should confine its activities to furthering basic scientific studies and that it should not dilute its effectiveness by supporting studies of directly military or other applied character. To do so would seriously impair the long-term mission of the National Science Foundation without materially contributing to the war effort, since such work can better be done by other agencies. In the long run, of course, additions to basic scientific knowledge will contribute, as previously indicated, to both the wartime and peacetime strength of the country; but short-term results are not to be looked for.

The question of appropriations to the National Science Foundation is important but will not become a matter for immediate consideration until the Board itself analyzes its undertakings and prepares a recommended program for the near-term and long-term future. As a matter of interest, the Act as passed authorized direct appropriations not to exceed \$500,000 for the FY [fiscal year] ending June 30, 1951, and not to exceed \$15 million for each FY thereafter."

At its February meeting, the Board agreed that the Foundation should not become involved in military research; opposition to the appointment of a Science Adviser to the President was dropped.

After a few months of lengthy deliberations by the Board, Conant reported to Congress that

one of the purposes of the National Science Foundation is to provide in every section of the country educational and research facilities which will assist the development of scientific pioneers. . . . There must be all over the United States intense efforts to discover latent scientific talent and provide for its adequate development. This means strengthening many institutions which have not developed their full potentialities as scientific centers, it means assisting promising young men and women who have completed their college education but require postgraduate training in order to become leaders in science and engineering. To this end a fellowship program has been placed high on the list of priorities of the National Science Board. . . . Measured solely in terms of a contribution to national defense in a period of lengthy partial mobilization, I, for one, have no question but that the money will be well spent.

On 6 April the President appointed Alan Waterman, formerly deputy chief and chief scientist of the Office of Naval Research, first director of the Founda-

#### Search for a Science Adviser

Activation of the Golden report was delayed by the process of choosing and gaining the acceptance of a Science Adviser to the President. It was a difficult, critical position to fill. Bush wisely commented that the value of the post turned on who the man was, who was the President, and how they got along together. Conant thought that an advisory committee would be better because it was unlikely that a man with a sufficient range of competence could be found.

During 6 months of conversations with more than 150 persons, Golden had been asking who should be the Adviser. The range of suggestions he discussed with me was remarkable for its diversity, and for the widely conflicting judgments on personal qualifications. Only DuBridge and Mervin Kelly were generally approved. But DuBridge would not leave the presidency of Cal Tech and Kelly was committed to Bell Telephone Laboratories, of which he was soon to become president. Conant's preference for an advisory committee was slowly gaining favor.

During Golden's search he conferred with General Lucius Clay, assistant director of Defense Mobilization. Clay stated flatly that he did not like the title Scientific Adviser to the President and that the adviser and his committee should be located in the Office of Defense Mobilization and that the adviser should be called "Assistant to the Director of ODM for Scientific Matters." This was a step down from Golden's concept of a Presidential Adviser which he had been urging for 6 months and which had received wide support. General Clay had sufficient influence to prevail.

The concept of Science Adviser to the President was retained in part. In the draft of a letter that was to be sent by the President to the still-to-be-chosen chairman of an "Advisory Committee on Defense Scientific Research," the President said that he would welcome the recommendations of the committee and would call upon it for advice from time to time. The committee was to include the president of the National Academy of Sciences, the chairman of the Research and Development Board, the chairman of the Inter-Departmental Committee on Scientific Research and Development, the director of the National Science Foundation, and also a

number of eminent scientists and engineers.

This new proposal for an Advisory Committee on Defense Scientific Research with a full-time chairman was approved by Bush who thought it "far better than a single Scientific Adviser." Alfred Loomis, who had been one of the leaders of National Defense Research Committee, also thought that it would be desirable to have the functions that were to have been those of a Science Adviser to the President placed in the Office of Defense Mobilization although "university scientists might prefer the prestige of a presidential appointment."

During the weeks following General Clay's suggestion that a Committee on Defense Scientific Research and its chairman be placed in the Office of Defense Mobilization, the search for the Adviser continued. After Kelly declined the President's appointment, Oliver Buckley, who was Kelly's superior, and was soon to retire as president of Bell Laboratories, was widely discussed. Buckley was an able administrator, a highly respected scientist who had been active in the Office of Scientific Research and Development, was a member of the General Advisory Committee of the Atomic Energy Commission, and had been offered the post of chairman of the Research and Development Board following Karl Compton's resignation. After much deliberation he finally agreed to serve although he insisted that he be designated chairman of the Science Advisory Committee of ODM, a title he preferred to that proposed by Golden.

Late in April Truman appointed Buckley and a committee comprising Waterman, Webster and Bronk as representatives of the National Science Foundation, the Research and Development Board, and the National Academy of Sciences, as well as Conant, Dryden, DuBridge, Killian, Robert Loeb, Oppenheimer, and Charles Thomas. In his letter of appointment, the President stressed the role of the chairman and members of the committee as *advisers to himself* as well as to the director of the Office of Defense Mobilization (ODM): "in the achievement of continued progress in scientific research and development. The successful performance of the Committee's functions can be of great value to this country, both during this period of emergency and in future years."



### The ODM Science Advisory Committee

The Science Advisory Committee convened in May 1951; throughout the year Buckley was chairman it met each month, usually with full attendance. From its beginning the chairman proposed that the Committee be "advisory, not operating; have no budgetary responsibilities; work with and through existing agencies; avoid fanfare and minimize public appearances." Having thus defined the Committee's principles, it was not surprising that Buckley should have written to the members: "By its structure and location, the contribution of the Committee is limited largely to policy and other general matters. It cannot be relied on as the principal source of imaginative, technical leadership in the Government."

With characteristic but perhaps too great modesty, the chairman looked to the members of the Committee for initiative in bringing matters to the Committee's attention. In consideration of problems which came to him, he leaned heavily on the advice of the members and especially on the four Washington members of the Committee: the president of the National Academy of Sciences, the director of the National Science Foundation, and the chairmen of the Research and De-

velopment Board and the Interdepartmental Committee on Scientific Research and Development. This was consistent with his wise policy of strengthening existing agencies by bringing them into effective relations with the Executive Office of the White House through the Science Advisory Committee.

At the end of the first year Buckley reported to the President:

Since the Committee is composed of members with a great diversity of ties to other government agencies as well as to scientific and educational institutions outside the Government, its meetings have proved to be an excellent focus for interchange of views and development of opinion. It is in this way that the Committee has principally been effective [in providing relations between scientists and the federal government].

It has been an added privilege of the Chairman to serve as a member of the staff of the Director of the ODM, and in this capacity a variety of tasks have been performed.

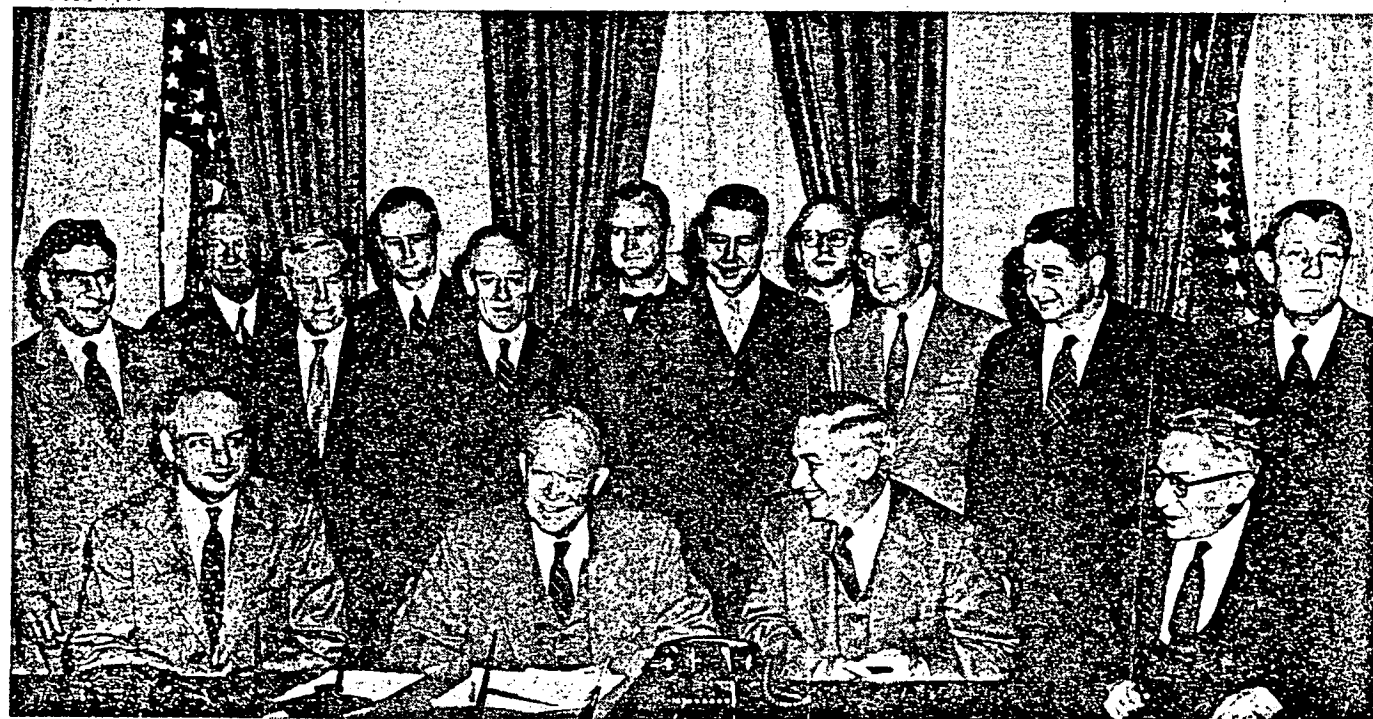
With informal operations of this type, the Committee has exercised a helpful influence in scientific affairs without interfering with other agencies in the conduct of their normal functions which we have been endeavoring to facilitate.

Because of these principles of working through existing agencies and avoiding publicity, it was widely thought and still said that the committee was "useful, but of little effectiveness, a status

that was not overcome by Buckley's successors." With that I cannot agree. Coming soon after the notable success of the Office of Scientific Research and Development, the Science Advisory Committee suffered by contrast, but throughout 5 years it had an important role in nurturing science within the government.

At the end of the first year in June 1952, Buckley resigned because of a growing illness which was ultimately fatal. He was succeeded by DuBridge as part-time chairman.

Soon after the change in leadership the committee spent three long days at the Institute for Advanced Study as guests of Robert Oppenheimer in a searching, informal discussion of the urgent problems that confronted the scientific community. After critically debating whether there was need for the committee and after appraising its value to science and the government, it was decided that the committee should be continued because it provided a useful deliberative group that could be briefed on projects that were wider in scope than any existing service or agency. However, because the Office of Defense Mobilization was primarily concerned with production and controls, it was not considered a suitable home for the committee. It was suggested

that the committee would be more useful to the President if it were attached more closely to him. It could thus provide for the National Security Council scientific assessments of situations involved in decisions the President was required to make. The suggestion was not accepted.

The committee continued in the Office of Defense Mobilization for another 5 years. Nevertheless, it had increasingly direct and personal relations with President Eisenhower, who had a lively interest in furthering science as a major element in the conduct of government. Once when I told him of scientists' appreciation for his understanding and support, he reminded me that he was a graduate of the first school of engineering in the country; he liked to think of himself as one of us.

DuBridge was chairman of the Science Advisory Committee throughout 4 years; he was followed by I. I. Rabi for somewhat more than a year. Because of their wide range of interests and competence, the scope of the committee's activities widened. The agendas and minutes of its meetings during those years recount how scientists were learning to play their proper role in government.

I am reminded, for instance, that our chairman told the President through the director of the Office of Defense Mobilization:

We are seriously concerned that the operations of the Office of Science Adviser in the State Department are in some danger of being reduced to the point of ineffectiveness. . . . We feel that scientific liaison with friendly countries is essential to well rounded cultural relations. We hope that a way can be found for the Secretary of State to recognize this, support the office and the scientific attaches in our embassies abroad.

During a time when there were alarmist attacks on the loyalty of scientists, DuBridge protested to Vice President Nixon that the committee

was seriously concerned that the extensive security and loyalty review programs carried on by many agencies of the Federal Government were being carried to extremes that involve costs and dangers to national security far greater than are warranted . . . those attacks are reducing the availability of key scientists for important posts in the Government."

DuBridge added that not one single American scientist of the thousands engaged in security programs during the past 15 years had been convicted or se-

riously accused of espionage or treason.

In a letter to Killian, I find evidence of Eisenhower's deep interest in the Committee's activities:

I understand that you have been asked by the Science Advisory Committee of the ODM to direct a study of the country's technological capabilities to meet some of its current problems. This project grew out of suggestions which I made to the SAC and I am naturally very keenly interested in it. The results will be of great value to the Government. Accordingly, I hope very much that you will find it possible to free yourself of your many other heavy responsibilities for a period long enough to undertake this important assignment, and that others whom you choose to be members of your staff will also be able to devote time to the work."

This is not the place for a further account of the many important and timely activities of the Science Advisory Committee nor of the wise guidance by David Beckler its executive secretary.

But it should be emphasized that scientists for the first time had effective contact with the Executive Office of the President. And had it not been for the continued existence of the Science Advisory Committee, it would not have been available for transformation into the President's Science Advisory Committee with a Science Adviser to the President.

#### International Geophysical Year

One of the greatest cooperative endeavors ever undertaken by scientists from many nations was a program of planned research during the International Geophysical Year (IGY) of July 1957-December 1958. Under the general direction of the Special Committee for the IGY (CSAGI) of the International Council of Scientific Unions, a wide diversity of research was initiated in many fields and places including the Antarctic, the ionosphere, and space. The United States was represented by the National Academy of Sciences; the National Science Foundation provided much of the financial support.

At a meeting of CSAGI in Rome during October 1954, a resolution was adopted recommending that "in view of the advanced state of rocket techniques . . . thought should be given to the launching of small satellite vehicles" during the IGY. The Soviet Union and the United States supported the proposal.

The U.S. National Committee for the IGY that had been organized by the Academy promptly recommended that the U.S. initiate a scientific satellite program. The Eisenhower administration enthusiastically agreed to support the project and directed the National Science Foundation to provide the necessary funding. The Defense Department was made responsible for providing the rocketry needed to place a satellite in orbit, but without interfering with the top priority ballistic missile program.

By the following summer, plans for our satellite program were sufficiently advanced to justify a public announcement. At the White House in July 1955, President Eisenhower, together with representatives of NAS and NSF, reported that "plans are going forward for the launching of small, unmanned, earth-circling satellites as part of the United States participation in the International Geophysical Year. Data that is collected will be made available to all scientists throughout the world."

Because the development and launching of the satellite vehicle (Vanguard) had been assigned to the Naval Research Laboratory, there was controversy and friction with the Army and Air Force. And Secretary of Defense Charles Wilson did not give the program enthusiastic support. On the occasion of a meeting of the National Security Council, he saw Waterman and me outside the Cabinet Room and told us that he was going to recommend that the program, which he considered a "scientific boondoggle," be abolished. When Wilson made his proposal, Eisenhower asked me what I thought would be the international reaction to our cancellation of the satellite program. I replied, "It was your decision, Mr. President, to announce our program at a press conference in the White House. Cancellation of the program within a year will bring much criticism from scientists throughout the world." After a moment of thought, the President announced that the program would be doubled: 12 Vanguards instead of 6.

Early in October 1957 a week-long, international conference on rockets and satellites, sponsored by CSAGI, was held at the National Academy of Sciences. Lloyd Berkner presided. Among the social events was a cocktail party at the Soviet Embassy on the last evening. During the party a correspondent of the *New York Times* drew Lloyd Berkner and Hugh Odishaw of our commit-



tee aside and whispered, "I have just had a call from our New York office saying that a cable from Moscow reports that the Russians put a satellite in orbit about an hour ago." Berkner quickly stood on a chair, tapped on a glass for silence, then announced to our Russian hosts and their hundred guests that Russia had put a satellite in orbit for the first time in history. There was awed surprise, "then all hell broke loose."

The final session of the Academy next morning was quite different from the series of routine resolutions that had been planned. There was much excited discussion of how the Russian feat would affect the future of the IGY satellite program and why had the Russians kept their plan secret. Finally it came time for me to bid our guests farewell "at a time when I can congratulate our Russian colleagues and our sister Academy of Sciences of the U.S.S.R. on their great achievement of yesterday." I went on:

Friendly competition as well as cooperation is a stimulus to achievement in scientific endeavor as in other forms of human effort. Because scientists are human, they naturally wish to be the first to achieve success in a scientific undertaking to which they are committed. But because scientists are humane explorers on the frontiers of knowledge, they rejoice in new discoveries made by their colleagues.

There was little rejoicing in the country at large. Some belittled the Russian achievement as did an admiral who was connected with the Vanguard project: "Why all the excitement? They have only fired a hunk of iron into the sky. Anyone can do that." Which we were still to do. And the press aroused widespread fear of Sputnik as a military threat and symbol of their scientific superiority. Only President Eisenhower and most scientists approved my cablegram to the president of the Russian Academy: "This is a brilliant contribution to the furtherance of science for which scientists everywhere will be grateful."

On the following Tuesday afternoon

Sherman Adams, Assistant to the President, called me at the Academy: Would I come over to the White House to discuss with the President, Press Secretary Hagerty, and himself what Eisenhower should say at his press conference next day about satellites and security.

The President began by saying that he was not surprised that the Russians had failed, in characteristic fashion, to reveal their plans despite the IGY agreement to do so. But he was surprised by the ungenerous attitude of so many Americans and our press. He recalled how grateful we were to English scientists for the discovery of penicillin and how much it meant to his troops in World War II. We recalled his remark in connection with the opening of the IGY: "The most important result of the IGY is the demonstration of the ability of peoples of all nations to work together harmoniously for the common good." And so we decided that his remarks to the press should begin: "We congratulate Russian scientists upon having put their satellite into orbit." He concluded: "Our satellite program has never been considered as a race with other nations. . . . We are carrying the program forward in keeping with our arrangements with the international scientific community."

After his statement to the press was agreed on, Eisenhower turned to a discussion of the sudden, irrational furor over the status of American versus Russian science. He again recalled the discovery of penicillin. "I heard no one complain that the English achievement belittled the quality of science in America." What could be done by other than words, he asked, to assure the country that American science was indeed vigorous and was respected and supported at the highest levels of government. That led to the role of the Science Advisory Committee of the Office of Defense Mobilization. I told him of Golden's original proposal that there be a full-time Science Adviser to the President supported by an advisory committee of eminent scientists, both

located within the White House. I urged him to consult at once with Rabi, the chairman of the Science Advisory Committee, develop closer relations with the committee, and give to the public assurance that it was indeed a committee advisory to himself. All this he did, and much more with the wise advice of Rabi and the committee.

A month later in a broadcast entitled "Science and national security," Eisenhower said:

I have made sure that the very best thought and advice that the scientific community can supply, heretofore provided to me on an informal basis, will now be fully organized and formalized so that no gap can occur. The purpose is to make it possible for me, personally, whenever there appears to be any unnecessary delay in our development system, to act promptly and decisively.

To that end, I have created a new office called the office of Special Assistant to the President for Science and Technology. This man, who will be aided by a staff of scientists and a strong Advisory Group of outstanding experts reporting to him and to me, will have the active responsibility of helping me follow through on the program of scientific improvement of our defenses.

I am glad to be able to tell you that this position has been accepted by Dr. James R. Killian, President of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He is a man who holds my confidence, and enjoys the confidence of his colleagues in the scientific and engineering world, and in the government. . . .

"In conclusion, although I am now stressing the influence of science on defense, I am not forgetting that there is much more to science than its function in strengthening our defense, and much more to our defense than the part played by science. The peaceful contributions of science—to healing, to enriching life, to freeing the spirit—these are the most important products of the conquest of nature's secrets. And as to our security, the spiritual powers of a nation—its underlying religious faith, its self-reliance, its capacity for intelligent sacrifice—these are the most important stones in any defense structure."

Seven years had passed since William Golden recommended to Truman that he appoint a Science Adviser to himself and a Presidential Science Advisory Committee.

realities hidden behind the formalisms will finally be perceived and, undoubtedly, new explanations and predictions will be obtained. The present situation, then, seems analogous to that which existed at the time when classical thermodynamics constituted a rigorous formalism permitting exact predictions but resting on admittedly arbitrary, a priori principles. It is the statistical interpretation of thermodynamics, due principally to L. E. Boltzmann and J. W. Gibbs, which made it possible to understand the true nature of entropy and finally to predict or explain new phenomena.

At the University of Paris, de Broglie received his *Licencié ès lettres* (1910), *Licencié ès sciences* (1913), and *Docteur ès sciences* (1924). He was professor of theoretical physics at the University of Paris from 1932 to 1962. Winner of the Nobel Prize for physics (1929), he was elected to the French Academy in 1944, to the Royal Society of London in 1953, to the U.S. National Academy of Sciences in 1948, and to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1958.

De Broglie wrote *Matter and Light: The New Physics* (English transl. 1939), *New Perspectives in Physics* (English transl. 1962), *The Current Interpretation of Wave Mechanics: A Critical Study* (English transl. 1964), *La thermodynamique de la particule isolée* (1964), and *Certitudes et incertitudes de la science* (1966). He edited *Wave Mechanics and Molecular Biology* (1966).

In 1901 John D. Rockefeller endowed the institute in New York City as a pioneering grant-giving agency. By 1903 a decision was made to conduct research, and the institute was modeled on the European laboratories presided over by such notables as Robert Koch, Louis Pasteur, and Ivan Pavlov. After World War II the trustees of the institute decided that university and medical school laboratories had begun to undertake research that had once been in the exclusive domain of the Rockefeller. As a result, the institute no longer securely held the position of innovator that had accounted to a large degree for its eminence. A committee was organized to chart the course of the institute, and from this group emerged a plan to utilize the institute's facilities for training talented young investigators and for working more intimately with universities.

Bronk was then asked to accept the post of president and chief executive officer of the institute, combining two formerly separate positions, and to guide the reorganization. He decided to undertake the task, for he believed the new position provided an unusual opportunity to devote much of his time to research while developing a unique international institution for the furtherance of science. In 1954 the institute's original charter was amended to make it a graduate university, and it became part of the University of the State of New York with the authority to grant the degrees of Ph.D. and Sc.D. At this time the name was shortened to

the Rockefeller Institute to reflect its broadened purposes.

Among the many ways in which the institute differed from conventional graduate schools were that it had no undergraduate college, it had a faculty-to-student ratio of 2:1, and there was no fixed program of study. Under Bronk's direction a graduate fellow was expected to choose his or her own curriculum by selecting a combination of courses, tutorials, and independent readings followed by self-directed study and research. Complete academic freedom was the keynote of Bronk's plan. At the Rockefeller a student could work for weeks, or even months, with a particular investigator and then withdraw without penalty to work with another if the student so chose.

The success of Bronk's leadership is borne out by the statistics of the first decade of the new program. Of the more than 200 appointments to fellowships, 73 received their degrees and 118 were still studying at the Rockefeller. As a result of the achievements during this period, in the spring of 1965 the institution was renamed the Rockefeller University to reflect the changes and the new direction that had been taken under Bronk.

Bronk's administrative abilities benefited a number of academic institutions. While at Swarthmore College he helped to organize the honors program for undergraduates. Later he was the first director of the Johnson Research Foundation of Medical Physics at the University of Pennsylvania. Bronk also served as president of the Johns Hopkins University, where he tried to bridge the gap between undergraduate and graduate study, emphasizing the progress of the individual student. During World War II he served as coordinator of research in the U.S. Army Air Corps Air Surgeon's Office, where he was concerned with the physiological aspects of high-altitude flight.

As a researcher, Bronk worked in the areas of both biophysics and physiology. He studied the nature of sensation, body movement control, the chemical excitation of nerves and nerve impulses, and the electrochemical methods of measuring oxygen consumption in nerve fibers.

Bronk received his A.B. (1920) from Swarthmore College, and his M.S. (1922) and Ph.D. in physics and physiology (1926) from the University of Michigan. After serving as an instructor at the University of Pennsylvania and the University

of Michigan, he joined the faculty at Swarthmore in 1924, becoming professor of zoology and dean of men in 1927. Two years later he accepted a position as professor of biophysics and director of the Johnson Research Foundation at the University of Pennsylvania. In 1949 he resigned these positions to become president of Johns Hopkins, where he remained until joining the Rockefeller Institute.

Bronk was the chairperson of the National Research Council from 1946 to 1950 and the president of the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council from 1950 to 1962. Among the many honors he received were the Priestley Award (1956), the Franklin Medal of the Franklin Institute (1961), the Presidential Medal of Freedom (1964), the Public Welfare Medal of the National Academy of Sciences (1964), and the National Medal of Science (1968).

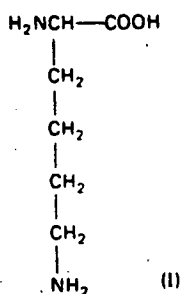


**BROQUIST, HARRY P.**

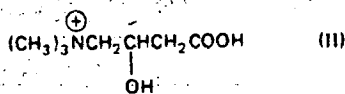

Lysine (I),  $\alpha$ - $\epsilon$ -diaminohexanoic acid, is one of the eight essential or indispensable amino acids that people must have in their diets to sustain life. They either meet their nutritional need for lysine by consumption of animal-derived foods where lysine is present in ample amounts or by judicious consumption of a variety of



plant foods where lysine is present in varying amounts. But the penultimate source of lysine is from plants, and much of Broquist's research concerned the mechanism of biosynthesis of this amino acid by certain lower plants and ultimately led to the complete elucidation of the amino adipic acid pathway of lysine biosynthesis. This research has important nutritional overtones, for it suggested a means for the economical production of lysine for use as a protein supplement in those foodstuffs poor in lysine.

Not only is lysine used in all living cells for the synthesis of protein, but because of its specific chemical nature, it is uniquely endowed to participate in specific intracellular processes and transformations of great biochemical importance. Studies in Broquist's laboratory at Vanderbilt University led to the discovery that lysine participates in the biosynthesis of carnitine (II). Carnitine is a biocatalyst

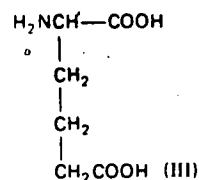


essential for fatty acid oxidation, a complex process wherein cells ultimately obtain much of their energy. Thus this research links lysine and protein metabolism with lipid and energy metabolism.

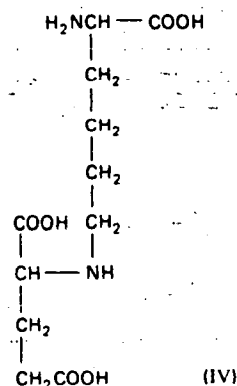
Because lysine level is poor in many of the common cereal grain foodstuffs consumed in large parts of the world by humans, there has long been considerable interest in developing methods for the economical production of lysine, so that it might be readily available as a protein supplement for such foodstuffs. Broquist discovered that common yeasts such as those used in the baking and brewing industries had the capacity to produce large amounts of lysine when grown with  $\alpha$ -amino adipic or its immediate precursor,  $\alpha$ -ketoadipic acid. Animal feeding trials demonstrated that such high-lysine yeasts could meet the requirement of test ani-

mals for lysine. Economical synthesis of these adipic acid derivatives by either chemical or biological means, followed by conversion to lysine by yeast fermentation, thus permits an attractive method for the production of a high-quality protein supplement for animal or human consumption.

As can be appreciated from the chemical structure of amino adipic acid (III), its



conversion to lysine involves reductive amination of carbon-6 to a primary amine. The precise biochemical nature of these events was elucidated and led to the discovery of a new amino acid, saccharopine (IV), which was involved in this process.



Saccharopine can be viewed as a molecule in which the  $\epsilon$ -N atom of lysine is shared with the  $\alpha$ -amino group of glutamic acid. Indeed, saccharopine was shown to be derived by reduction of a product formed from the condensation of  $\alpha$ -amino adipic semialdehyde with glutamic acid.

Although these studies of lysine biosynthesis were carried out exclusively with either yeast or bread mold *Neurospora crassa*, subsequent research from other laboratories demonstrated that higher animals degrade lysine arising from the breakdown of tissue proteins to  $\alpha$ -ketoadipic acid by a reverse of the process that fungi use for synthesizing lysine from ketoadipic acid. Ketoadipic acid then is subsequently broken down in animals to small molecules that can be readily oxidized. Thus studies of lysine biosynthesis in fungi indirectly contributed to a knowledge of lysine catabolism in humans.

At the age of twenty-one, in 1918 he joined the staff of the Philadelphia Food Administration as its executive secretary. Later on he served in the United States Army during World War I service; he entered the United States Naval Aviation Corps; he was promoted to the rank of ensign in 1919, and he was assigned to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland. After the war, he had begun his undergraduate studies at Swarthmore College, in Pennsylvania. Bronk returned to Pennsylvania, where he also held a position as an instructor in physics. the Colver lecturer at Brown (1946). He has received honorary doctorates in science from Swarthmore College (1937) and Princeton University (1947).

The study of 'neurophysiology' over these years was Dr. Bronk's main field of research. By evolving a methodology, with the aid of electrical, optical, and electron-microscopic aids, he was able to measure the changes in nerve cells during the passage of stimuli to the brain. These same techniques assisted him in evaluating the molecular structure of nerve cells and the placement of the atomic and ionic components in the cells. Experiments in collaboration with Dr. Frank Brink resulted for the first time in the measuring of the pressure which carries oxygen through the body.

On July 30, 1948, Dellew V. Bronk was named successor to Dr. Isaiah Bowman, who was retiring, as president of Johns Hopkins University. The new administrator assumed his office on January 1, 1949. Proposed to the university's board of trustees by Karl Compton, Bronk (Compton's only candidate) thus became sixth president of the Baltimore university, which was founded in 1876. (Johns Hopkins, a Baltimore merchant, also endowed the hospital which bears his name.) The university's undergraduate schools, open to men only, are the College of Arts and Sciences and the schools of engineering and business; its postgraduate divisions, open to both men and women, are the School of Higher Studies of the Faculty of Philosophy, the Graduate School of Engineering, and the schools of medicine (opened in 1893) and of hygiene and public health; afternoon and evening courses are offered to both sexes in McGeary College. On entering his new office, Bronk stated that he intended to continue the athletic policy established by Dr. Bowman. Thus forthwith the charging of admission fees for Johns Hopkins athletic events and encouraged the participation of every student in a sport.

For a number of years, from, at one time, a National Research Council fellow at the universities of Cambridge and London, had been associated in various capacities with the principal official body of the Government, between 1949 and 1946 he was a member of National Research Council's division of physiology and zoology, chairman of the division of internal and external relations and of the committee on aviation medicine, and chairman of the subcommittee on oxygen and visual problems.

In 1946 Dentley W. Brook was elected chairman of the council, national preparatory organization founded in 1916 by order of President Wilson as a quasi-official body. It was labeled as an adjunct to the National Academy of Sciences, the National Research Council, is composed of representatives of about ninety of the chief research, technical, and governmental organizations. Its purposes are accomplished, not by the direct maintenance of laboratories, but by the coordination of the labors of individual investigators doing research in the physical, biological, and social sciences. The specific methods used by the National Research Council are stimulation of research, study of the applications of science, improvement of

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meeting between private and Governmental researchers, signifying of problems arising from war, and awarding of fellowships. These activities and the stipulations of the N.R.C. are supported by grants from private foundations and persons, and no appropriation is supplied by the Government.

With Dr. Edward U. Condon as Director of the National Bureau of Standards, Brook in June 1947 was named a member of the Scientific Advisory Committee of the Brookhaven National Laboratory, an organization devoted to atomic research. A few months later he was named on the Advisory Committee for Biology and Medicine of the United States Atomic Energy Commission. As Chairman of the National Research Council, Brook supervised the efficacy and distribution of research fellowships for the AEC. When it developed that a scientist was a Communist, although he had received one of the fellowships, L. J. Brode and AEC chairman David L. Lilienthal<sup>1</sup> were called before the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy in May, 1949 to discuss the selection. Pointing out that no question of political sympathy was contained in the fellowship application blanks, Dr. Brook indicated that he would call a meeting of the committee's fellowship committee to consider a more careful screening of applicants.

Several of the advisory offices in which Brooks served during World War I were obsolescent at that time, such as that of a coordinator of research for the Office of the Army Medical Director and Special Consultant to the Secretary of War, both of which lasted from 1915 to 1946. From 1944 to 1946 he was, in effect, the division of aviation medicine of the Committee on Medical Research of the National Research Council. Research and Development activities by Brooks concerning the physiological aspects of aviation research appeared

in the *Proceedings of the American Sociological Society* of January and February 1944, and in the annual report of the Smithsonian Institution for 1945. In 1946 the society received an award for outstanding civil service during the war.

As foreign secretary of the National Academy of Sciences, Dettler Bronk addressed the first major postwar international scientific conference held in Philadelphia in October, 1945. A year later he was present as one of a delegation of ten representing the United States at the second general conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization; he had been a member of the United States Commission for UNESCO since 1943 and was elected its vice-chairman in 1948. In 1946 Bronk had become a member of the War Research Advisory Board, serving afterwards associated with the Scientific Advisory Board of the Army Air Forces for a year. He was elected to a similar post—that of secretary of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics—in June 1948, for a two-year term. Four months after that, Vannevar Bush appointed him chairman of a special committee on technical information in the National Military Establishment. He was the head of a five-member scientific mission sent on a tour of scientific and cultural institutions in Japan in 1948. Other appointments of Bronk's have been: to the advisory council on applied physics of the American Institute of Physics (1945) and to the board of scientific directors of Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research (1946).

Editorial posts held by Broek have included those of managing editor of the *Journal of Cellular and Comparative Physiology* (a 1938) and the *Integration Physiology Bulletin* and associate editor of the *Proceedings of Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine* (1935-41), the *American Journal of Physiology* (1938-43), *Biological Abstracts*, and the *Index of Scientific Literature*. He has contributed, too, to *Science*.

Memberships are held by the scientific administrator in the following groups: the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Physical Society, the American Philosophical Society, the American Psychological Society, the British Psychological Society, the Society of Experimental Biology Medicine (councilor 1939-42), the American Neurological Association, the Optical Society and the Acoustical Association. A member of the Royal Society of Great Britain, B is one of only twelve Americans who belong that Society. He is enrolled as a corresponding member of the Societe Philomathique of Paris.

Dr. Delley Bronk has been awarded the title of a member of fraternities—Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Phi, Sigma Xi, Sigma Tau, Alpha Omega, Alpha Mu Psi Omega, Phi Kappa Psi. His clubs are the Century (New York), the Rittenhouse (Philadelphia), and the Colonial (Washington). Bronk and Helen Ramsey married on September 10, 1921; they have sons, John Everett Ramsey, Adrian, and

I have been unable to reach you by phone over the last few days so I decided to go ahead and send this along. I know you will want to make a copy and forward it to Stan as soon as possible. The request for Dr. Bronk's file was made in November 1987 and has taken many follow-up letters and finally they sent the file with an undated letter.

In brief it shows his work with the Army-Air Force as a medical consultant during the War. Also AEC contracts from June 46 to 1961. The contract which ended in June 46 was renewed in September. He also had TOP SECRET clearances with OSD file references for 1949, 1954, and an FBI reference in 1961. I will FOIA these as well as possible AEC records under his contract number.

The real eye opener for me was a document dated Nov. 29, 1950, from the Secretary of Commerce asking Bronk if he would accept an appointment to a five member committee with the National Bureau of Standards do to the fact that the distinguished Prof. Harold C. Urey of Chicago was resigning. One member of this five, with a five year term ending in 1954, is none other than a Prof. D. H. Menzel of Harvard University. My guess is that Menzel put in Bronk's name. He did accept the appointment and therefore had to have known Menzel after 1951. Also of Historical note is that Dr. Urey was well known to Dr. Bush who had shared concerns over the possibility of Atomic weapons as far back as 1941.

Also note that the Eisenhower briefing places a tentative conclusion (November 30, 1947) as to the EBE's Biological development. He may have been brought in do to his Air Force and AEC



Backround at that time. He would have the knowhow concerning aviation physiology and also new information concerning medicine in relation to nuclear physics and atomic experiments.

Hope that you and Stanton like what you see. Let me know when our Next Fair Whitmess group is to meet.


This responds to your request for a copy of the employment records of Dr. Detlev Bronk.






(2) The period of this contract shall be from **July 1, 1956**  
to **June 30, 1957.**

(3) The Consultant shall be compensated at the rate of **\$50.00**  
per workday for services performed for, and at the request of, the Commission, including time spent during regular working hours (as such hours are determined by the Commission) in authorized travel.

(4) The Consultant shall be reimbursed for authorized travel and other expenses, and shall be paid a per diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with Section 5, Act of August 2, 1946, 60 Stat. 808.

(5) The Consultant Agreement Covering Discoveries, Inventions, and Improvements (Form AEC-203) is a part of this contract.

(6) The Consultant agrees to conform to all security regulations and requirements of the Commission; to be responsible for safeguarding the classified matter which may be in his possession in connection with performance of work under this contract; and to return, upon request, or upon termination of this contract, any classified matter in his possession. Except as the Commission may authorize, in accordance with the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, the Consultant shall not permit any individual to have access to restricted data until the designated investigating agency shall have made an investigation and report to the Commission on the character, associations, and loyalty of such individual and the Commission shall have determined that permitting such person to have access to restricted data will not endanger the common defense or security. As used in this paragraph the term "designated investigating agency" means the United States Civil Service Commission or the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or both, determined pursuant to the provisions of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954. - 2) The period of this contract shall be from July 1, 1948  
to June 30, 1949.
- 3) The Contractor shall be compensated at the rate of \_\_\_\_\_  
\$50.00 per work day (not in excess of eight hours per day or 5 days per calendar week) when actually performing services for the Commission, including time spent in authorized travel.
- 4) The Contractor shall be reimbursed for authorized travel and other expenses, and shall be paid a per diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with applicable provisions of law and regulations.
- 5) The Contractor's Agreement Covering Discoveries, Inventions and Improvements (AEC Form 203) is a part of this contract.
- 6) The Contractor agrees to conform to all security regulations and requirements of the Commission. Except as the Commission may authorize, in accordance with the Atomic Energy Act of 1946, the Contractor agrees not to permit any individual to have access to restricted data until the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall have made an investigation and report to the

Commission on the character, associations, and loyalty of such individual and the Commission shall have determined that permitting such person to have access to restricted data will not endanger the common defense or security. The term "restricted data" as used in this paragraph means all data concerning the manufacture or utilization of atomic weapons, the production of fissionable material, or the use of fissionable material in the production of power, but shall not include any data which the Commission from time to time determines may be published without adversely affecting the common defense and security.

7) Either the Contractor or the Commission may terminate this contract by giving the other notice in writing at any time.





SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TECHNICAL INFORMATION

1. ORGANIZATION

The Special Committee on Technical Information is established as an agency of the Research and Development Board.

2. OBJECTIVE

The objective of the Special Committee on Technical Information is to implement the directive of the Board in the field of technical information and related subjects.

3. MEMBERSHIP

3.1 Members.

The Special Committee on Technical Information shall consist of:

- (1) Three civilian members, including the chairman, nominated by the Chairman of the RDB.
- (2) One member nominated by the Department of the Army.
- (3) One member nominated by the Department of the Navy.
- (4) One member nominated by the Department of the Air Force.

Appointments of members are subject to approval of the Board.

3.2 Deputy Members.

A deputy with plenary powers for each member may be nominated by the appropriate authority. Appointments of deputies are subject to the approval of the Board.

### 3.3 Associate Members

A major Governmental agency may formally nominate, through the appropriate Governmental department, a qualified representative to act as an associate member as specified by the Rules of Organization and Procedure of the Board. Appointments of associate members are subject to approval of the Committee and the Executive Council.

### 3.4 Term of Service.

Members, deputies, and associates shall serve for a term of one year or until their successors are appointed.

## 4. PROCEDURE

The Special Committee on Technical Information is encouraged to function as an independent entity within the limits of its terms of reference.

### 4.1 Administrative Functions.

In accordance with the Rules of Organization and Procedure of the Board, the Committee is authorized:

(1) To employ professional and other personnel as necessary to discharge its responsibilities under a budget authorized by the Board through the Executive Secretary.

(2) To establish its own administrative procedures.

(3) To organize its own secretariat.

(4) To establish such supporting panels and consultant agencies as it may require.

### 4.2 Limitations.

On internal matters of procedures, administration, budgets, and personnel, and in relationships between the Committee and the Board or other committees, the secretariat of the Committee shall function within the administrative framework established by the Executive Secretary, RDB, and the Rules of Organization and Procedure.

Action of the Committee shall be effectuated in accordance with the Rules of Organization and Procedure of the Board.

## 5. TERMS OF REFERENCE

In pursuit of its stated objective, the Special Committee on Technical Information shall be responsible for the operations outlined herein.

### 5.1 Collection of Information.

The Committee shall continuously survey research and development activities in the field of technical information, both within and without the Military Establishment, and obtain:

(1) Necessary information through appropriate channels concerning United States and foreign progress, programs, plans, and budgets in the field of technical information.

(2) Necessary information from the Joint Chiefs of Staff, through the Executive Secretary, RDB, on such aspects of over-all planning for national defense as may be needed in formulating an adequate program for research and development in the field of technical information.

### 5.2 Evaluation and Coordination.

The Committee shall analyze and evaluate information obtained in accordance with Section 5.1 in order to:

(1) Determine the major goals and problems in the field of technical information and direct constant emphasis on them.

(2) Assess the adequacy of plans, programs, and projects and assess the merit and effectiveness with which programs are handled.

(3) Determine the presence of unjustifiable duplication of effort in the field of technical information.

(4) Determine the presence of serious gaps which exist in the programs.

(5) Assess the adequacy of facilities, personnel, and equipment currently available and estimate future requirements.

(6) Assess the degree of coordination obtained in technical information programs, including that reflected in budget requests.

### 5.3 Presentation of Reports and Recommendations.

The Committee shall prepare and present reports and informative papers in order to:

(1) Inform the RDB and authorized agencies of the Military Establishment of the facts and trends in the field of technical information necessary to assure continued and increasing progress in that field.

(2) Inform the Joint Chiefs of Staff, through the Executive Secretary, RDB, as to the implications on plans, operations, and strategy of new equipment and techniques in the field of technical information.

5.4 Furtherance of the Directive of the Board.

The Committee shall, in accordance with the Rules of Organization and Procedure of the Board:

- (1) Prepare, not less frequently than once a year, an integrated plan of research and development for military purposes in the field of technical information.
- (2) Allocate, and when desirable, reallocate responsibility among the Military Departments for research and development programs in the field of technical information and report such action to the Board.
- (3) Recommend means whereby maximum advantage may be taken of new advances, solution of problems may be speeded, undesirable duplication, waste, or neglect may be avoided, and liaison, cooperation, and direct dealing among agencies may be furthered.
- (4) Present to the Board, at appropriate times as specified in the current RDB schedule of operations, recommendations regarding funds for research and development programs and facilities in the field of technical information for military purposes.
- (5) Collaborate with other committees of the RDB on matters of common interest.

6. FIELD OF INTEREST

The field of interest of the Special Committee on Technical Information shall include methods for the effective reporting, recording, reproducing, organization, and dissemination of information relating to research and development as it affects the National Military Establishment.

A field of especial interest is the study and application of new methods and techniques to the problem of information organization and the promotion of active research in this effort.

7. LIAISON

The Committee shall maintain liaison with other groups and agencies, both within and outside the RDB, which have related interests. The Executive Secretary of the Board will collaborate in arranging effective liaison. Questions arising because of overlapping or conflicting interests between agencies of the Board shall be resolved through the Executive Secretary of the Board.

Dear Doctor Bronk:

The purpose of this letter is to acquaint you with a group which serves as Honorary Civilian Consultants to the Surgeon General of the Navy. This group comprises some of the nation's leading members of the medical and dental professions, as well as nursing, pharmacy and other paramedical specialties, and its function is to assist the Surgeon General in confronting problems encountered in the administration of the Navy Medical Department. I would consider it an honor if you would agree to serve as one of my Honorary Civilian Consultants.

Although the relationship of the consultant is a significant one, the duties are not arduous or demanding. The principal expenditure of time consists of participating once a year in a one day meeting in Washington, D. C. to consider broad administrative and professional problems, and perhaps an occasional visit to naval medical facilities at a time convenient to the consultant. There may be times we would correspond regarding a matter of concern to the Navy Medical Department, on which I would value your advice. Of course, if you have any constructive thoughts concerning our programs at any time, your expressions would be most welcome.

Honorary Civilian Consultants are appointed by the Surgeon General with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy and are subject to the investigative requirements of the President's security program. 

Commission on the character, associations, and loyalty of such individual and the Commission shall have determined that permitting such person to have access to restricted data will not endanger the common defense or security. The term "restricted data" as used in this paragraph means all data concerning the manufacture or utilization of atomic weapons, the production of fissionable material, or the use of fissionable material in the production of power, but shall not include any data which the Commission from time to time determines may be published without adversely affecting the common defense and security.

7) Either the Contractor or the Commission may terminate this contract by giving the other notice in writing at any time.

8) No member of or Delegate to Congress or Resident Commissioner shall be admitted to any share or part of this contract or to any benefit that may arise therefrom.

9) The Commission deems the execution of this contract necessary to the discharge of its responsibilities under the Atomic Energy Act of 1946.

**SUBJECT:** Award of Emblem for Exceptional Civilian Service.

**TO:** War Department Board on Civilian Awards  
(Through Assistant Chief of Air Staff, Personnel)

1. Under the provisions of paragraph 1-3 c, CPR 104, 5 October 1943, it is recommended that the War Department Emblem for Exceptional Civilian Service be awarded to Dr. Detlev W. Bronk, Special Consultant, assigned to the Office of the Air Surgeon.

2. At the request of the Air Surgeon, Dr. Bronk assumed primary responsibility for the altitude training program in the AAF. The program has a three-fold purpose:

a. To familiarize aircrew trainees and other AAF personnel with the physiological principles and the necessary precautions relative to high altitude flights.

b. To provide instruction in the use of oxygen equipment, and other personal equipment designed to maintain aircrews at high altitudes.

c. To determine tolerance to anoxia, and other conditions which develop at high altitudes, such as decompression sickness, and so on.

3. Dr. Bronk initiated recommendations leading to the establishment of a course for aviation physiologists at the School of Aviation Medicine and personally supervised the establishment of the course and its curriculum. He has been personally responsible for the selection of nearly all officers on duty with this program. This selection has resulted in an extremely high order of officers, and was made possible through Dr. Bronk's wide acquaintance with scientific personnel and his intimate connections with scientific associations.

4. Following the establishment of the altitude training program, Dr. Bronk, in coordination with medical officers of the AAF, located and established most of the altitude training units, and in most instances promoted their initial operation through personal visits and supervision. The program now comprises 46 units within the United States and overseas,

and now processes approximately 50,000 aircrew members and trainees each month. It has been in a large measure responsible for the successful indoctrination of AAF personnel in the need for and use of oxygen and oxygen equipment in high altitude flights, which in turn has been primarily responsible for the ability of AAF personnel to carry out their difficult bombing missions so successfully. The success of the introduction of demand-type oxygen equipment in the AAF would have been impossible save for the altitude training program. The program is a unique feat, in that it provides for mass instruction in applied physiology.

5. During August, September, and October, 1943, Dr. Bronk, representing the Air Surgeon, visited the European and North African Theaters of Operation for the investigation of scientific matters and problems of concern to the Air Forces. These investigations have led to the solution of many of the Air Surgeon's problems with respect to these areas, to the coordination of investigations within the areas and within the continental United States, and brought to personnel in the theaters knowledge of the latest developments and their application.

6. In many instances, Dr. Bronk has taken AAF problems to his own laboratory for solution, and has designed equipment which has been of inestimable value. His personal visits to, interest in, and criticisms and suggestions regarding the work and personnel of the medical, physiological and psychological laboratories of the AAF have served to raise the standards and closely coordinate their investigations in a most efficient manner.

7. There is inclosed a draft of a letter of commendation to be presented with the emblem.

Dear Dr. Bronk:

Thank you for your letter of November 9th regarding service in the air corps as a physiologist. I should like to have more information regarding it. Because of one of my connections here, some of what I say is confidential under War Department regulations.

I should first like to ask what rank I might reasonably expect if I were to apply for a commission and what amount of salary would be available for maintaining my family. I have the rank of assistant professor here and with summer teaching my salary is approximately \$3600 a year. I am thirty-five and a half years old and have had eleven years of research and teaching experience since leaving graduate school. I have a wife and two children, one three years and the other seven months old. We recently purchased a home here. I feel, therefore, that I have a real responsibility to my family and wish to make sure that they will be well cared for.

Second, you are already familiar with my training, but I feel that you should know what I am doing here. My teaching duties are: I direct and lecture in a course in Zoology required of agriculture students. I give two one-semester courses at the senior-graduate level, one in Comparative Physiology, the other in Cellular Physiology. This year I am giving the lectures on human and animal biology in a survey course in General Biology formerly given by Dr. Shumway, now in the army. I expect enrollment in all these courses to drop greatly and I shall, therefore, feel more available at the end of the present semester than at the moment.

I have a fair amount of nerve physiology going on and I hope to send you within a few weeks a paper which, incidentally, I hope you and Frank Brink will like. However, I am ready to drop all this program very shortly.

This fall I became associated in an advisory capacity with a W.D.R.C. project assigned to the University of Illinois by the War Department and under the general direction of Dr. A.M. Buswell of our chemistry department. It is a toxicological problem dealing with the effect of certain war poisons as tested on animals. I was cleared by the army and navy before I could participate in it. Just recently this project has been expanded and I have been asked to devote most of my time to it with the understanding that my teaching duties will be cut. The project is an important and practical one and I am not sure whether I would be more useful carrying out this investigation here or operating a decompression chamber in an air corps training center.

This summer I received an inquiry from Dr. Ward F. Davidson regarding my availability for a project, the nature of which he could not divulge. I filled out the N.D.R.C. questionnaire for the second time. In early September when we were planning our semester here I wrote asking whether I should expect word regarding this project in the near future. Dr. Davidson replied that plans were not yet complete but that I could expect to hear from him. I have heard nothing since.

I do not, however, feel that I know enough about the possibilities in the Air Corps to decide whether that or the toxicological project here would be more suited to my background. Can you give me further information?

Dear Ladd:

It has been suggested that you might be interested in service with the Air Forces in the capacity of a physiologist.

I do not know of any research positions at the moment, but we are very anxious to secure good physiologists for our altitude training program. This consists in the operation of altitude chambers and the delivery of lectures to Air Forces personnel in both the Flying Training Command and in Air Forces operational establishments. At the beginning, after you are commissioned for duty in this program, you would have an opportunity to learn the principles of aviation physiology. From this group of men, which includes many outstanding physiologists such as Hayden Nicholson from the University of Michigan, S. M. R. Reynolds from the Carnegie Institution, Richard Masland from my neurological staff at Pennsylvania, etc., we will select men for duty in the various research establishments which have been set up or are in the process of organization. I think it is, therefore, a good opportunity for real service and to maintain contact with research in physiology.

If you are interested in this program, I would suggest that you execute the inclosed papers. A recent two by two inch photograph should accompany the forms, together with three letters of recommendation. You should also report to Chanute Field for a final type physical examination. Please request the examining surgeon to forward the report of your physical examination directly to the Office of the Air Surgeon, Attention Research Division, Headquarters Army Air Forces, Washington, D. C.

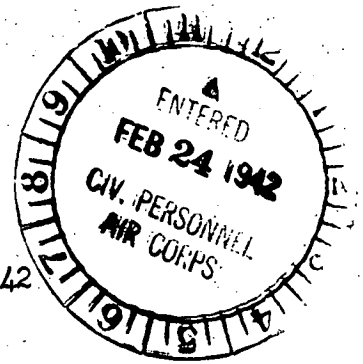
