Another "Smoking Gun"?

Another smoking gun has surfaced which furnishes physical evidence that seems to implicate Bill Moore as the author of the alleged Eisenhower briefing, as well as the Truman-Forrestal memo appended to the briefing.

Anybody who has ever been the recipient of mail from Bill Moore will recognize the rather distinctive return address on his envelopes (see Figures 2, 3, and 4). Because of the large size of the type used in Moore's rubber stamp, his return address appears sideways on the envelopes. Moreover, as evident in Figures 2 through 4, it appears that Bill Moore uses a rubber stamp assembled from a kit that uses movable, reusable type that allows him to make up any stamp he desires. This is indicated by several characteristics:

- 1. As Figures 2, 3, and 4 show, Moore used the same size and style of type for his Arizona address as he now uses in his California address.
- 2. In all occurrences of the letter "I" in "WILLIAM" and "OLIVE" (see Figures 3 and 4), the letter is slightly raised, a characteristic common to rubber stamps assembled from such kits.
- 3. Moore's return address has a rather sloppy, unprofessional look to it, again suggesting that he assembled the stamps from a kit. Either that, or he had custom rubber stamps made up for him, for both his Arizona and California addresses, by a firm that does consistently shoddy work.
- 4. A comparison of Figure 3, which is Moore's return address from the 1985 time period, with Figure 4, his return address from 1990, will show that the ZIP code portion of the address in the 1990 example is placed closer to the state abbreviation for California. Again, this suggests that the stamp was assembled from a kit of movable, reusable type.

Even more interesting — and incriminating — is the fact that the type style Bill Moore uses for his return address stamp is identical to the type style used for the classification markings ("TOP SECRET/MAJIC" and "EYES ONLY") that appear on the Eisenhower briefing document, although the size of the type is larger for the Eisenhower briefing. As evident from Moore's return addresses, however, he obviously has more than one type style, so there is every reason to believe that he may indeed have more than one size of the same type style.

In addition, the classification markings (see Figure 1) that appear on the Eisenhower briefing paper also appear to have been applied using a rubber stamp assembled from a kit employing movable, reusable type. Again, note the telltale raised letter "I" in the word "MAJIC".

No examples were found of Moore's return address that show type of the same size as that used for the classification markings on the Eisenhower briefing paper. This shouldn't come as any surprise because type that large has limited uses. For example, if Moore were to use a type size comparable to that used for the classification markings on the briefing document, his return address wouldn't fit on the envelope at all. As noted above, the type size he already uses apparently forces him to apply his address sideways. If it were any larger, he wouldn't be able to use the rubber stamp for his return address.

Even more interesting is the fact that the type used by Bill Moore in his return address is <u>identical</u> in both <u>style</u> and <u>size</u> to the type used in the "EYES ONLY" portion of the classification markings appearing on the Truman-Forrestal memo. Phil Klass has already proven that the signature on the Truman-Forrestal memo is a photocopy forgery.

While it must be acknowledged that there are perhaps many such rubber stamp kits in existence, it must also be considered a highly significant coincidence that the same person who is distributing the document also uses just such a kit that employs type identical in style to that used on the classification markings appearing on the Eisenhower briefing paper, and identical in both style and size to the "EYES ONLY" portion of the classification markings appearing on the Truman-Forrestal memo. Now it would appear we have evidence suggesting that Bill Moore, specifically, may be the author.



Dear Robert Todd:

Thank you for sending me a copy of "Another 'Smoking Gun'?". It's an angle that, as far as I know, no one has looked at before, and a fascinating observation as well. My congratulations. I am presently working on a full report on the results of our documentary analysis efforts (behind schedule, as usual), and am making every effort to present all sides of the matter in as straight-forward, unbiased, objective a manner as possible. Fortunately, your paper arrived in time to allow me to work it into the larger picture— for which I am grateful. (Imagine that!)

The only thing I object to in your approach is the rock throwing posture you have assumed even before you have gathered up all possible facts. For example:

- (1) Is the type involved part of a fixed stamp, or was it composed from movable, reusable type?
- (2) How common is that style of type in rubber stamps, and was it in use during the time period in question?
- (3) Would anyone in the government been likely to have used it?
  - (4) Where did Bill Moore get the stamp he uses, and when?
- (5) How readily available was that type to the general public in mid-1984? (In other words, how easy would it have been in '84 for someone wishing to discredit Moore to have purchased a rubber stamp or had one specially made up using that same style of type?)

Answers to <u>some</u> of the above are easy. Others are going to take some research. Here's for starters:

- (A) The type in <u>mv</u> rubber stamp is the movable/reusable sort. Cursory examination of the stampings on the alleged "Briefing Document" and the accompanying "Truman Memorandum" does indeed reveal certain characteristics suggestive of movable type as well, but I think it wise to do further research and seek other opinions before drawing a firm conclusion
  - (B) ?
  - (C) ?
  - (D) The rubber stamp kit I have is a versitile one which I

have had for a long, long time— so long in fact that I no longer have the original box it came in. I keep the "spare pieces" in an old cigar box. I know I have had it since at least my college days, perhaps even high school; which means that it dates from mid-50s through mid-60s. If memory serves, I bought the thing in a Murphy's Five and Ten store in Fittsburgh. It was misplaced for a number of years during the '70s while I lived in Minnesota, and rediscovered in a box following my move to Arizona in 1979— at which time I began using it again.

The set I have contains three different styles of type, all of which are displayed on one or the other of my return address stamps. As you have pointed out, two of these three styles seem to be similar if not identical to the ones used in the stampings on the MJ-12 documents. Whether this is significant or not, of course, depends upon the answers to questions 2 and 3 above. I do not have any other styles of type for that particular set: however I do have two other movable type rubber stamp kits, both with smaller type, which I use and which are incompatable with the set in question. One of these is employed in the "Bulk Rate Permit" stamp we use, and the other can be seen on my check deposit stamp. (Samples of all are enclosed.)

(E) Just after I moved to Arizona and had rediscovered this stamp kit in the process of unpacking. I happened to come across a <u>similar</u> set in an office supply store in Phoenix. Since I had plenty of movable type but could use another type holder, I inquired whether it was possible to purchase just a type holder alone without purchasing the rest of the set. It was, and I did. Unfortunately, I do not know if the type style in the set being sold was the same as the style I had or not since all I was interested in at the time was the holder.

All that can be concluded from this is that a <u>similar</u> movable type stamp kit was available as recently as ten years ago. That leaves as an open question the matter of availability of such a set with matching type either in the 1947-52 time frame, or in 1984. (Further research, however, <u>is</u> possible and I will undertake to do some.)

You have uncovered what would appear to be an important new approach to the question of these documents' authenticity. On the strength of that, I would like to propose that we consider putting aside whatever differences exist between us and see what more can be learned through cooperation. Once again, I invite you to come to L.A. and visit. Failing that, however, maybe we can agree to some sort of compromise. There is a chance I will be travelling to St. Louis in a couple of months. That's about half way between L.A. and Fhilly. How about meeting me there?

These documents present a very confusing and complicated situation. On the one hand, there is considerable evidence to suggest authenticity; while on the other, some very troubling inconsistencies have presented themselves, not the least of which are the mixed findings on the so-called "Truman Memorandum." The only thing I know for sure is that I didn't create those documents; and I don't believe Jaime Shandera, Stan Friedman, Rick

Doty, Phil Klass or Bob Todd did either. Given that, the truth must be one of the following:

Either: The documents are real;

Or: They are a clever mixture of real and phoney;

Or: The information in them is real, but the documents are all retyped;

Or: The documents are all phoney, but the information they contain is a combination of real information and disinformation:

Or: The whole thing is an elaborately contrived hoax.

No matter which of the above is true, the question of "motive" must be taken into account as well. The "why" is every bit as important as the "what" regardless of what the "what" turns out to Understanding the "big picture", of course, is an absolutely essential part of getting to the bottom of it all. There are some aspects of this that I simply will not put into writing or discuss on the phone at this time. That is why I have insisted on a face-to-face meeting as a condition of cooperation. Even though I do not have a particularly favorable impression of you as a person, I respect you as a researcher. Since the personality thing is largely a result of impressions gained through letters you've written and comments I've heard, I am prepared to put them out of the way and try to establish a clean slate. If you are willing to do the same, then let me hear from you. Seriously, L.A. is nice this time of year, and air fares are cheap. St. Louis is also an acceptable compromise, although I am not yet certain whether I will be making the trip there. If you wish to offer up some other alternative, I am prepared to consider same.

I am returning your letter to me dated March 16. 1953, with its enclosed report of recommendations regarding the National Security Council. I place great emphasis on the selection of men of high calibre for these positions, able to devote plenty of time to their Planning Board functions; for thereby the Council will be better able to operate promptly and effectively.

You will submit the appropriate budget amendments for FY 1954 to the Bureau of the Budget and take up with Mr. Steffan the arrangement for necessary space in the Executive Offices Building, capable of being made into a restricted security area.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PECORD

Meeting at DCI's Office Concerning SUBJECT :

HTLINGUAL

At 10:30 a.m. this date, Mr. V Helms convened in his office the DDP, the C/CI, the D/S, and C/CI/Project to report on recent action taken by him concerning the

- ETLINGUAL operation. Mr. Helms stated that on Monday he had briefed Attorney General Mitchell on the operation. (Note: Mr. Helms may have meant Tuesday, 1 June, Monday having been a holiday). Mr. Helms indicated that Mr. Mitchell fully concurred in the value of the operation and had no "hangups" concerning it. When discussing the advisability of also briefing Postmaster General Blount, Mr. Mitchell encouraged Mr. Helms to undertake such a briefing.
- 3. The DCI then indicated that yesterday, 2 June 1971, he had seen Postmaster General Blount. Mr. Blount's reaction, too, was entirely positive regarding the operation and its continuation. He opined that "nothing needed to be done", and rejected a momentarily held thought of his to have someone review the legality of the operation as such a review would, of necessity, widen the circle of witting persons." Mr. Helms explained to the PMG that Mr. Cotter, the Chief Postal Inspector, has been eware of the operation for a considerable period of time by virtue of having been on the staff of CIA's New York rield Office. Mr. Helms showed the Postmaster General a few selected examples of the operation's product, including an item relating to Eldridge Cleaver, which attracted the PMG's special interest.

In an aside, Mr. Osborne mentioned that he had seen Mr. Cotter since Mr. Helms' meeting with the Postmaster General and that Mr. Cotter reported that he felt that his stock with the Postmaster General had gone up several notches.

- 5. It was obvious that all present were gratified by the favorable reception Mr. Helms had met in briefing the two mentioned Cabinet Officers.
- 6. The DCI took the occasion to stress again the security aspects of the operation and stipulated that, in the event of any sort of security flap or even a suspicion that a leak of some sort had occurred, the intercept operation was to cease immediately and our men were to be withdrawn to the New York City base. Mr. Helms wished to convey the importance of stopping first and investigating later. If a subsequent investigation showed that indeed no damage had occurred, it would then be possible to resume the operation.
- 7. Both Mr. Helms and Mr. Karamessines recommended tight control over the number of Agency persons cleared for, and witting of, the operation.
  - -8. The meeting ended at 10:40 a.m.

We are responding to your March 31, and April 6, 1990 Freedom of Information Act letters.

We are attaching an unclassified copy of the attachment. We will not authenticate the document, as no official Government or legal function would be served by doing so.

We interpret your request for "a copy of the record which indicates the date at which time the designation of F-117 was classified" as meaning the record which indicates the date the association of the nickname "Senior Trend" with the F-117 aircraft was classified. That record is exempt from release because it is currently and properly classified in the interest of national security.

The authority for this exemption is in the United States Code, Title 5, Section 552(b)(1), and Air Force Regulation 12-30, paragraph 10a.

We are attaching a copy of the document that indicates the date which the association of SENIOR TREND with the F-117 aircraft was declassified.

The document that indicates the reason why you were shown a copy of the attachment C-l is exempt from disclosure because it contains advice, opinions, evaluations or recommendations which would reveal the deliberative process of the Air Force.

The authority for this exemption is in the United States Code, Title 5, Section 552(b)(5), and Air Force Regulation 12-30, paragraph 10d.

The denial authority is Mr. Eugene F. Boesch, Jr., Acting Deputy for Security and Investigative Programs, SAF/AAZ.

If you decide to appeal this decision you may write to the Secretary of the Air Force within 60 calendar days from the date of this letter. Include in your letter your reasons for reconsideration and attach a copy of this letter. Mail it to:

### MEMORANDUM FOR DISTRIBUTION

SUBJECT: Declassification of Association between F-117A and the SENIOR TREND Nickname

This memorandum constitutes a "letter change" to the SENIOR TREND Security Guide, 1 October 1989. Effective immediately, the association of the nickname "SENIOR TREND" and the F-117A aircraft is declassified. Each holder of the SENIOR TREND Security Guide should post this memorandum to their copy of the Guide. Documents classified solely because of the former classification of this association are now unclassified; and may be handled and stored accordingly. Each document should be reviewed to assure that there is no classified information other than the association.

Documents declassified under the provisions of this change should have their classification marked through, show the initials of the individual reviewing the document; and reference this memorandum as authority for the declassification. On bulky documents, it will only be necessary to re-mark the cover and title page, first two pages, and the back of the document. Post a copy of this memorandum inside the cover of the document.

The Air Force will continue a review of the classification of SENIOR TREND information, and will notify program participants of changes. I enjoin each organization and participant to remember that much information remains classified and to redouble efforts to protect this vital program.



It was learned from Major Doty, that Col. Baynes, C. O. at HAFB, no longer felt there was any justification for the allocation of funds for maintaining systematic investigation. Rather, he provided that the project be maintained on a standby basis and without official Air Force status. The information now available substantiates these dates in general, although new information indicating one method which the Soviets are following suggests that their first atomic bomb cannot be completed before mid-1951.
- (2) Based on evidence that the Soviet effort is directed toward producing a plutonium bomb, on current estimates of the amount of uranium available, and on the assumption that their plants will operate at reasonable efficiency, the maximum number of atomic bombs the Soviets could stockpile after a mid-1953 initial date is 60 by mid-1955 and 150 by mid-1957, by which time it is estimated that currently known uranium sources would be exhausted. The maximum number of atomic bombs the Soviets could stockpile after a mid-1950 initial date is 130 by mid-1955 and 150 by mid-1957.

It must be emphasized that estimates of bomb stockpiles depend very strongly on the amount of uranium ore available to the U.S.S.R. If the current ore estimates are revised, the bomb stockpile will be changed correspondingly. It is anticipated that various low-grade sources of uranium may be developed within the U.S.S.R., but it is impossible to estimate whether or on what scale such a development program will be carried out.

- The ConAC Air Defense Controller notified the Headquarters USAF Command Post that at 1030 hours a number of unidentified aircraft were approaching the northeast area of the United States and that there was no reason to believe the aircraft were friendly.
- 2. This information was further amplified at 1040 hours as follows. By radar contact it was determined that approximately 40 aircraft were in the flight, at 32,000 feet, on a course of 200 degrees, in the vicinity of Limestone, Maine.
  - 3. The emergency alert procedure went into effect immediately.
- 4. The Office of the President was notified. Brigadier General Landry returned the call and stated that the President had been notified and that:
- a. All information in this matter was to be released by the Department of the Air Force.
  - Office of the President would release no information.
- c. The substance of  $\underline{a}$  and  $\underline{b}$  above was to be passed to the Office of the Secretary of Defense.
- 5. At 1104 hours the ConAC Air Defense Controller stated that the original track had faded out and it appears that the flight as originally identified is a friendly flight.
- 6. ConAC took immediate action to dispatch interceptors on the initial contact.

Details: At the above time and specified date Corporal G. Floyd of the Military Police, Camp Holabird, was on duty at the main gate when he observed two large objects flying through the air moving over the Fisher Body Plant in a South-Southwesterly direction from the main gate of Camp Holabird. These two objects had the mass of a DC-3 but the shape could not be exactly described, but a rough guess on the part of Corporal Floyd would be that of a silver dollar. Corporal Floyd called these objects to the attention of Corporal William A. Garvey, also of the Military Police, and also to the attention of Warrant Officer Mervin L. Walsh. Both Corporal Floyd and Corporal Garvey give the same story concerning the objects.

Follow-up Action: The Baltimore City Airport is being checked to determine if any such objects were observed or released from that area.

Conclusion: At approximately 1720 on 30 September 1949 the operations officer of the Baltimore Airport was contacted in person in reference to this above story and he in turn gave the following explanation. At approximately the time listed above a local manufacturer was testing a newly designed helicopter. This helicopter is composed of the rotor propeller and a single transparent glass bulb located directly under the middle of the blades. Observed from some distance the bulb gondola is not noticeable and it is quite possible that the observer would notice the propeller only. This was the only explanation the airport could give of this phenomenon and is believed to be the proper solution since the above observers stated that the object was seen in the general direction of the Baltimore Airport. No further action contemplated on this report.

Agency-Academic Relations

This is an attempt to make some observations and suggestions about Agency-academic relations. In doing so I am grateful for the stimulus furnished by your outline. Although I believe I have addressed myself to most of the questions you have raised I have done so in free form rather than by a point by point consideration. I have also used "head notes" for purposes of organization and in an attempt to highlight the crucial questions in the subject.

Justifying an Agency-Academic Relationship: Let me stress at the outset that I believe Agency-academic relations are for the most part very good. Though I have no quantitative data to support such a conclusion my guess is that 95% of the members of the academy would be willing to assist the Agency if properly and skillfully approached, and that only a small fraction of that other 1% would be angered by an invitation to assist or would attempt to embarrass the Agency in any way.

However, on occasion when a university or an individual has acknowledged any contact with the Agency there has been some outcry by a few vocal members of the academic community.

In a later part of this paper I suggest "an affirmative program" designed to improve the Agency's reputation in academic circles and thus decrease the risks (costs) of association with the Agency. However, until either the passage of time or an image bolstering plan changes the cliches of the moment an educational institution or individual electing to assist the Agency may be on the defensive.

In my view the best way to defend association with the Agency when such a defense is necessary is:

1. By relating work for the Agency to one of the traditional functions of a university;







#### Status of the U.S.S.R. Atomic Energy Project

The Joint Nuclear Energy Intelligence Committee makes the following estimate of the status of the U.S.S.R. Atomic Energy Project:


- (1) In the 1 January 1949 report it was stated that the earliest possible date by which the U.S.S.R. might be expected to produce an atomic bomb was mid-1950 and the most probable date was mid-1953. The information now available substantiates these dates in general, although new information indicating one method which the Soviets ere following suggests that their first atomic bomb cannot be completed before mid-1951.
- (2) Based on evidence that the Soviet effort is directed toward producing a plutonium bomb, on current estimates of the amount of uranium available, and on the assumption that their plants will operate at reasonable efficiency, the maximum number of atomic bombs the Soviets could stockpile after a mid-1953 initial date is 60 by mid-1955 and 150 by mid-1957, by which time it is estimated that currently known uranium sources would be exhausted. The maximum number of atomic bombs the Soviets could stockpile after a mid-1950 initial date is 130 by mid-1955 and 150 by mid-1957.

It must be emphasized that estimates of bomb stockpiles depend very strongly on the amount of uranium ore available to the U.S.S.R. If the current ore estimates are revised, the bomb stockpile will be changed correspondingly. It is anticipated that various low-grade sources of uranium may be developed within the U.S.S.R., but it is impossible to estimate whether or on what scale such a development program will be carried out.

- "While it is relatively well known that various ionospheric conditions cause reflections at lower frequencies, it is usually considered that these layers have no effect at the frequencies used by the two radar sets mentioned except when temperature inversion or other atmospheric or tropospheric conditions cause ducting and spurious reflections. Presuming that such idealised conditions existed at the time of these observations, it is conseivable that an actual small change in physical lateral motion in reference to the radar set could cause a seemingly greater change in relative position of the 'object' as observed on the radar scope due to the varying path lengths the radar energy takes to and from the 'object' as a function of the frequency sensitive layers and angles of incidence of the propogated wave. However, the great difference in the frequencies of the L-Band CPS-5 and the S-Band CPS-4 radar sets and the evident correlation of observations between these two sets almost rule out the possibility of anomalous propagation effects. Further, the magnitude of the velocity and accelerations of the three dimensional movements of the 'object' reported are beyond the capability of known heavier or lighter than air vehicles in controlled flight.
- b. "Also substantiating this unlikelihood, is the fact that the 'object' was reported as remaining stationary in free space for a mean-period of two minutes.
- c. "Further validity is lent to the contention of the reports by statements that first indications, which were at high altitudes, were

observed on the CPS-4 height-finder before being observed on the CPS-5 surveillance radar set. This follows logic and field experience, inasmuch as the high altitude ocverage of the CPS-5 is known to be poor and the antenna is not capable of being automatically tilted as in the case of the CPS-4 on which the controller may tilt the antenna within wide limitations to observe any high altitude or high angle objects. It is to be noted that previous field experience with a CPS-5 surveillance radar set has indicated that targets picked up at ranges and altitudes indicated in subject report would probably have a reflection aspect ratio in the order of magnitude of a B-29 or greater.

- d. "In the absence of detailed vertical and horisontal coverage charts for the specific radar sites and comprehensive weather reports for the area during the period of time these observations were noted, a more complete study or evaluation at this time is not feasible.
- e. "In summary, no known electronic phenomena, nor combinations of several electronic phenomena could conceivably produce all of the observations covered by the attached reports."
- 4. The frequency of reports of this nature has recently increased; instructions have therefore been directed to all radar installations within this command to report scope sightings of unusual objects.
- 5. It is recommended that reports of unidentified object sightings be reconsidered for submission from all Zone of Interior Air Porce agencies.

- 2. The aforementioned cover sheet also suggested that Mr. Mayer, AFOIN-T, be contacted for advice as to the manner and format of this write up.
- 3. Mr. Mayer, Ext. 75957, was contacted on 24 Nov 51 and was most helpful in regard to the write up of this project. However, he advised that it would be improper and illegal for anyone but the procurement agency, AMC, to recommend a research agency or to attempt an estimation of the cost of the project.
- 4. After receiving Mr. Mayer's assistance, a proposed letter to AMC, subject: (Unclassified) "Request to Initiate Research Contract," with attached Tab "A" describing the project, was prepared. In addition, a DF has been prepared forwarding the letter to ATIC with a request for their suggested additions, deletions, and/or changes, and any comments they desire to offer.
- 5. Subject matter will not be submitted for inclusion in the Daily Staff Digest.

b. The investigation of the "unified field theory" to determine if it is feasible to produce energy applicable to aircraft propulsion.

- c. Remarks: One of the by-products of the general field of Einstein's Theory of Relativity analysis was the endowment of energy with the characteristics of mass, the inter-relation between gravitation and inertia and the recognition of various 'ields of force as being different aspects of a common phenomenon the "unified field theory." This theory has been explained by Minkowski in terms of the 4-dimensional "space-time" or "Minkowski world" called a "world line."

1. During the dates 2 February - 21 February 1956, sightings of unidentified flying objects by members of this command were noted. Sightings were visual and in three instances by radar oscilloscope operated by the 47th AAA Detachment. The radar site is located at coordinate 444118.

- 2. On 2 February 1956 between the hours 1300 1600. Pfc Richard L. Walker, Co "C", 723rd Tank Battalion, saw a flying object moving from North to South. Pfc Walker estimated the speed of the object to be in the thousands of miles per hour and at an altitude of over 15,000 feet.



<u>Details</u>: At the above time and specified date Corporal G. Floyd of the Military Police, Camp Holabird, was on duty at the main gate when he observed two large objects flying through the air moving over the Fisher Body Plant in a South-Southwesterly direction from the main gate of Camp Holabird. These two objects had the mass of a DC-3 but the shape could not be exactly described, but a rough guess on the part of Corporal Floyd would be that of a silver dollar. Corporal Floyd called these objects to the attention of Corporal William A. Garvey, also of the Military Police, and also to the attention of Warrant Officer Mervin L. Walsh. Both Corporal Floyd and Corporal Garvey give the same story concerning the objects.

Follow-up Action: The Baltimore City Airport is being checked to determine if any such objects were observed or released from that area.

Conclusion: At approximately 1720 on 30 September 1949 the operations officer of the Baltimore Airport was contacted in person in reference to this above story and he in turn gave the following explanation. At approximately the time listed above a local manufacturer was testing a newly designed helicopter. This helicopter is composed of the rotor propeller and a single transparent glass bulb located directly under the middle of the blades. Observed from some distance the bulb gondola is not noticeable and it is quite possible that the observer would notice the propeller only. This was the only explanation the airport could give of this phenomenon and is believed to be the proper solution since the above observers stated that the object was seen in the general direction of the Baltimore Airport. No further action contemplated on this report.

Reference: Your Top Secret Memorandum of 7 June 1954 addressed to Chief of Staff, U.S. Army, Chief of Naval Operations, and Chief of Staff, U.S. Air Force, on subject of French plan to activate 3 Reserve Divisions.

- 1. Your memorandum gives only some of the salient facts.
- 2. The salient facts omitted are:
  - a. SACEUR in his 2 June measage stated:

"Unless this letter reveals some new facts not apparent from the outline of the plan presented by General Vernoux, I propose, unless you instruct me otherwise, to inform the French Government that I offer no objection to the implementation of this plan".

- b. You wanted orally to the Chiefs of Staff that you intended to withhold disparent of the radio reply to SACEUR, unanimously agreed to by the Chiefs of Staff, until you had contacted the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of State.
- c. It was made clear to you both by me and the Chief of Naval Operations that this action, if taken, might completely nullify the unanimously approved action of the Chiefs of Staff, since the time required for you to contact the authorities mentioned was indetermined.
- d. At the insistence of the Chief of Staff, U.S. Army, and the Chief of Naval Operations, based on the foregoing reasoning, you agreed that if you were unable to contact the authorities mentioned and get their clearance by 051800 EDT June 1954, you would dispatch to SACEUR by radio the instructions which the Chiefs of Staff had unanimously approved.
- 3. The foregoing gives a more accurate and adequate picture of what transpired than the memorandum you furnished me.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD



- 1. Air Vice Marshal Atcherley came in to see me this morning to report that he was making a trip to England and would report to the Chief of the RAF Staff in the next few days.
- 2. He queried as to what the next step might be in the exchange of atomic information in light of recent legislation. He pointed up that exchange of information seems to have come to a grinding stop and the RAF, of course, was anxious to get on with it. He stated that the new legislation provided for certain countries asking for permission to collaborate in certain phases of atomic warfare and wondered whether the initiative should now come from the RAF. I stated that in my opinion the best thing was to let this thing ride because it was highly political and that in due course something would be worked out.
- 3. Atcherley then said his second subject was RAF Exchange Officers. He stated that the British were anxious to increase their number here by about twelve officers, chiefly in the guided missiles field. He said that the agreement called for a total of ninety officers under the Exchange Program and that they now had about seventy-five over here. I told him that with respect to this problem, I wanted to have a Staff view since I had heard nothing of the proposal and felt I should not talk about something about which I was not fully informed.
  - 4. This ended the conversation.

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5. I would point up a possible significance to the sequence in which the two problems were taken up, indicating to me that there is a great possibility that the Dean case is well known to Atcherley. However, this is purely speculation on my part.

The investigators were advised by the butler that at least one of the servants is always present in the house, that all doors are locked at night, and that he personally knows that no workmen, strangers, or other persons open to suspicion have been allowed access to the house prior to the time Mr. F expressed his concern.

When questioned regarding any missing documents it was learned that Mr. F has never mentioned this matter to the butler. However, the butler revealed that Mr. F often leaves documents on his desk, which are collected by the servants and placed in the drawer, and this may account for any paper not being in the place where it was left by him.

As a result of this interview the investigators are of the opinion that Mr. F's suspicions are unfounded. However, in accordance with instructions received, no attempt has been made to verify the butler's statements. The names of all persons referred to are in the possession of the investigators and these individuals can be interviewed if it is so desired. In addition, the name of a doctor who prescribed sleeping tablets for Mr. F has been ascertained.

It appears that Nr. F has, during the past several days, been suffering from a slight nervous breakdown and that his suspicions are the result of this condition.

Unless otherwise instructed, the investigation will be considered closed.

In addition to the points raised in the attached memorandum, the President made the following points:

- 1. The President expressed his feeling that for intelligence matters, the JCS should have one intelligence group. He pointed out that there is to be only one military plan and asked why there should be separate intelligence agencies and plans within the top military command.
- 2. The President expressed a feeling that for one reason or another the main elements of the Cuban situation had not been presented to him. He said that he would speak to Secretary of State Dulles about better coordination.

3. The President indicated that he did not wish the specifics of covert operations to be presented to the NSC.

# 'Eyes Only' Documents CAN Turn Up

"Eyes only."

It was part of the title of a James Bond movie. It's on the notorious MJ-12 documents. It conjures romantic images of international intrigue; of spies and counter-spies. It is, in fact, a legitimate element of the U.S. government's overburdened and often abused system of national security classification.

But it does not, as noted author John Keel contended in a recent interview with *UFO*, "mean you read [the document] and then you destroy it . . . You do not file, copy it or even discuss it, period." That declaration is categorically inaccurate.

Although relatively few documents among the millions of documents routinely rubber-stamped "secret" or "top secret" in red ink each year actually bear an "Eyes Only" imprint, they do exist; they are not all destroyed as a matter of policy or regulation following their having been read. Documents produced during World War II and Vietnam which have been declassified by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) can be found bearing an "Eyes Only" classification. According to Keel and other critics of the "Eyes Only"-imprinted MJ-12 documents, however, it is "impossible" for an authentic eyesonly document to suddenly turn up after all these years.

'Eyes Only' document at North trial

How, then, did a four-year-old "Eyes Only" document survive only to be entered as an exhibit at the trial of Lt. Col. Oliver North last year? Reproduced here, it was clearly never destroyed. It had been filed within the memory of the computer system by which it was prepared.

But there were many highly sensitive documents that were generated at North's behest which bore an "Eyes Only" classification, and which were stored in the vaults of the super-secret National Security Agency (NSA). These documents, which contained intelligence on the Iranian arms sales intercepted by the NSA, were addressed exclusively, in sealed "Eyes Only" envelopes, to a select group of Reagan administra-

tion officials designated by thennational security advisor Robert McFarlane.

Similarly, NSA's darkest secrets, made available only to a few select officials, are stamped "Eyes Only" and kept within the agency's secure safes.

Furthermore, there are existing documents written during the last couple of years that were given an "Eyes Only" classification. Some of these documents were recently leaked to several Washington, D.C.-based national security journalists, but before being passed to them, the documents were extracted from computers over which they had been transmitted—long after critics maintain they immediately should have been destroyed. These particular documents clearly discount critics' claims that such documents are neither filed nor capable of being copied. They were in fact stored in certain Executive branch computers and were retrieved from them, sometimes as long as two weeks after they were produced.

Washington's contingent of national security reporters all can attest to the existence of "Eyes Only" documents, and will be backed by any number of intelligence officials who regularly deal with such a classification. The assertion that they are immediately destroyed, conjuring a stereotypical image of a spy burning a top-secret piece of information. is best left to the celluloid fiction of Hollywood or to the narrative fiction of bestselling spy novels. It is simply not a matter of fact, and displays a very naive and unknowledgeable grasp of the world of national security classification.

This is not to imply, however, that "eyes only" documents are regularly leaked or declassified; they are not. But they do exist. They are not always destroyed. In reality, that destiny is the exception with such documents, not the norm.

James Neilson, pseudonym of a wellregarded Washington D.C. based national security journalist, is privy to the leaked documents cited in this article.

- 1. The Fifth Army Regional Office in Denver, Colorado, reported the following information: On 30 September the Regional Office received a call from CID, Denver, reporting that an ideal was at the Edelweiss Bar a man named offered him \$1500 for partographs he had taken of a flying saucer.
