This is in response to your letter of July 18. An Eisenhower Library staff member has checked several of our collections and failed to locate any memorandum or report by Donald H. Menzel regarding the activities of the Central Intelligence Agency and the National Security Agency. Naturally, this was only a very cursory check; it would take a lengthy effort by an on-site researcher to conduct an exhaustive search of all collections which might have something on this subject.

In connection with your telephone inquiry of July 17 we sent you copies of all the documentation we could locate on Eisenhower's appointments for November 18, 1952. Therefore, there is no additional assistance we can give you on this matter.

Eisenhower's Pre-Presidential Papers (Box 51, "Hill") contain one item of correspondence between Eisenhower and Hillenkoetter. It is a telegram from Eisenhower to Hillenkoetter dated August 24, 1950. A copy of this document is enclosed.

We were unable to locate any correspondence between Eisenhower and Hillenkoetter during the Presidential Period.

Eisenhower's Appointment Books Index indicates that Hillenkoetter only paid one visit to the White House while Eisenhower was President. This visit occurred on February 28, 1956 when Hillenkoetter accompanied the President of Italy to the White House as his American aide. Attached is a copy of one page from the Appointment Books for February 28, 1956.

Archivists on our staff do not recall ever seeing the terms, MAJIC or Blue Team, ever used in documents in our files.

We previously sent you a listing of those who attended the NSC meeting on July 15, 1954. Enclosed is the

Appointment Books page which lists those attending the July 22, 1954 meeting.

Eisenhower's Appointment Books Index reveals that General Nathan B. Twining attended a luncheon (1:00 p.m.) on July 15, 1954, which Eisenhower gave for the Prime Minister of Lybya, and he accompanied Admiral Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, on a visit to the Oval Office on July 19, 1954 (10:30 a.m.).

Walter Bedell Smith, together with John Foster Dulles, saw the President for about twenty minutes on July 15, 1954, just prior to the NSC meeting.

There is no diary or daybook among the Robert Cutler materials in our files. The Records of the Office of the Special Assistant for National Security Affairs contains a Special Assistants "chron" file, but this file does not begin until 1955.

The Eisenhower Library has a small collection of Gordon Gray Papers. (The finding aid to this collection is available through interlibrary loan.) The Truman Library has a few Gordon Gray scrapbooks and an oral history. The Truman Library also has a small collection of Sidney Souers Papers.

We have not found any listing which identifies the location of the personal papers of Detlev Bronk or Robert Montague.

Thank you for your letter of June 11. We have found no references to an MJ-12 project in our holdings. President Eisenhower's appointment records for July 16, 1954 show that no NSC meeting was held that day although the President's cabinet did meet on July 16. Topics discussed were: monitoring of telephone calls, foreign economic policy organization, the St. Lawrence Seaway, the employment security program, manganese purchases, Mexican migratory labor, and the position, Assistant Secretary For Administration. National Security Council meetings were held on July 15 and July 22, 1954 but an examination of the summaries of these discussions identified no information pertaining to your topic. Robert Cutler died on May 8, 1974.

According to our records you have one mandatory review case still pending, NLE 86-71 which consists of 7 documents pertaining to the Doolittle Committee. You will be notified when action is taken on this request.

Enclosed are copies of the pages from the President's appointment records for July 16, 1954.

Scope and Content Note

The Status of Projects Subseries of the NSC Series consists of four primary components: status of projects reports, status of U.S. national security programs, current policies of the U.S. relating to national security, and records of actions by the NSC (1960). The status of projects reports, which were compiled on a weekly and then a monthly basis (January 1953 - May 1955), include a brief synopsis and status of completed projects, projects under consideration by the NSC, current NSC Planning Board projects, other current Council projects, and cancelled projects. The reports were compiled by the Planning Poard Secretariat from reports submitted by other departments and agencies, primarily the DOD, CIA, ICA, ODM, USIA, AEC, and FOA.

The reports to the NSC on the status of U.S. programs for national security were prepared by the Executive Secretary's staff from reports submitted by the responsible departments and agencies, with the assistance of the NSC Reporting Unit. The Policy Coordinating Staff kept informed on the status of national security programs and provided guidance to the agencies in their preparation of annual status reports and other reports on their programs.

The reports on Current Policies of the U.S. relating to National Security were prepared by the Deputy Executive Secretary of the USC. Current Policy reports were issued for the information and se of the Council members and their staffs. Texts of the Policies were taken, with minor editorial changes, from official Duncil reports and memoranda.

OSD could be office of the secretary of defence.

5-5 there is an item dated 4-27 where classification is given as top Secret Special Handling. This is memo to DDE from Secretary.... Electronic Intelligence collection device CANES 4-27 from AJG copy returned to Dan Sullivan OSD.

9-12, 1960 there is a classification as listed TS Code. The subject Special Briefing Book (Code). from JE to Captain Harden.

In the log sheet dated 12-15-60 there is an item date of document 1-58, no listing for date received, top Secret, copy #4 from AJG to Colonel George 1957 Blue Book TS-2368 apparently and then directly beneath it 1-59 TS-copy 4 same AJG to Colonel George 1958 NATO Blue Book.

On the sheet labelled 12-20-60 bottom item, date 12-28 Jan 1957, classification for Secret, copy #33 of 125, AJG to OSD Registry USRO Blue Book. Strange.

On the sheet 12-30 date of document 12-27 classification TS-T original from A. Dull&s to General G. Subject; special picked up by somebody Beck or Back.

On a sheet 12-28 classification TS no copy No., AJG to Secretary somebody of defense can't read it, USRO data book.

There are numerous sheets in box #10 sub series, alphabetical sub series, White House OSS with destruction slips for classified

documents for JCS all begin with DA or JCS material. In Box 14 there are three different sets of intelligence sets folders. First there is intelligence briefing notes mostly in the 59-60 timeframe then there are intelligence briefing notes sensitive there is seven of those then there are intelligence matters by several month period each, none from my time frame but interesting that there is this distinction made. In the regular intelligence debriefing notes most of them have been declassified, all the rest of them have pink sheets. Stuff marked sensitive is almost all pink sheeted. practically none of it has been declassified.

in a big fat subject file for NSC papers which is classified secret on page 46 it says 54×12 series. Title and annotation omitted for security reasons. Walter B. Smith was appointed consultant in the executive office of the President, special projects. Then (General Smith service on the special task force on disarmament). That is what it says on the finder's guide. He was also appointed to the office of defence mobilizations special... advisor committee.

There was a lot of correspondence from Smith several boxes of his personal correspondence and official work isn't here.

..... declassified stuff isn't incorporated yet in the full files. There is a letter on 12 March 1953 to James Lay from Richard Drain, secretary of intelligence of the advisory committee, CIA. Mr. Robert Amery Assistant Deputy Intelligence has asked to forward to you for your information enclosed report "Report of the Scientific Pannel on Unidentified Flying Objects, Dated January 17, 1953. This report was prepared by a panel convened in January 1953

at the direction of the former director of Central Intelligence Walter B. Smith with the concurrence of the intelligence advisory committee. Copies are being transmitted defence director of federal civil defence administration and the chairman national resources board sincerely... this was a secret letter. and it only includes the summary pages and the tab B and tab c. Tab c with a list of the members and tab b was a list of the evidence presented. So they don't have the full report here. The cover sheet says comments, Dick Drain advises that this is simply for your information. You of course already have a copy but Mr. Amery asked to send this one at the same time he asked for one for CD Jackson in response to your telephonic request to Mr. Amery. it is simply for our information RHA.

Apparently is RHJ that is Mr. Johnson, who is underneath Mr. Lay. I am having copies made of course.

In June of '53 there was a national Counter Intelligence Corps Association in Hyatesville, Maryland. The organization included 5,000 of the army Counter Intelligence Corps back then. In Donald Quarles' papers 1952-59 box #6 personal correspondence letter B #3 there is one little post card size card from Vannevar Bush It's got a map on one side with his new address and the hand written notation after dec. 15, 1955, shows where he is living in Belmont, Mass, at the time of his retirement and it just gives the other side routes from Boston how to get there. No other correspondence in the pile from him, but clearly you don't send cards giving your retirement address unless you know the person on the other end.

Quarels secretary of the Airforce daily diary, Monday,

October 24, at 5:55 PM visitors in Colonel Casey, subject; fress release on Flying saucers. I believe the date of the press release was the next day.

At 7:00 on Tuesday October 25, Dr. Ormond Solandt chief of the Defence Research Board of Canada was in briefly concerning a visit to Washington. Quarles extended a luncheon invitation. On Wednesday afternoon 26th 12:20 TCN it says, Robert Trippe Ross re flying saucer release, no clue as to what that was about other than the subject. Ross was in again at 3:15, then people from April from this Week Magazine, General Twinking, Secretary Douglas. On the 27th there was a National Security Council Meeting at 10:15, 12:30 there was a luncheon with Dr. Solandt, Generals Twinking, Everest, Partridge, Putt, Briggs, and Secretary Douglas.

October 31, lunch with Dr. Neumann and Dr. Libbey, two outstanding scientist. He was on Meet the Press Sunday Nov. 6, 1955. There were various meeting with Gordon Gray at this time as well, along with General Twinking.

Letter from Hoyt Vandenberg to Quarals on 18 Dec. 1952, thanking for his services as a member of the Scientific Advisory board.

Two letters from Van Bush in 1954 some are Gerald D. Morgan, was administrative assistant to the president. Some of his papers are at the library but his file for July time of the Cutler-Twining memo, doesn't give any real clues.

The records of Wilton B. Persons, deputy assistant to the president and then assistant to the president, 1955-1960, he has a meeting file, about 5 cards, alphabetical, then dates within that, he did attend the NSC meetings of July 15, 22, 29, etc, 1954.

On July 7, 1954 in Box 1 White House Office, Special Assistant for National Security Affairs, Special Assistant Series, named sub theories, folder A-General 1, 1954-55, there are several notes from James Lay to Robert R. Bowie who is still alive, to C.T. Jackson of Time and to Robert Amery Jr. who is also still alive, dated July 7, 1954, some quotes, I am enclosing a self explanatory memorandum I just received from A.C. Cutler that's to Bowie, to C.D. A. Cutler has asked me to send you a copy of the enclosed memorandum and to Bob Amery, Bobby Cutler has asked me to send you a copy of the enclosed memorandum. Bobby would appreciate receiving your reactions and comments.

In a letter to Walter Odlin, from Dillow Anderson, Special Assistant to the President, February, 17, 1956, the reason why no transcript is made of the proceedings of the NSC nor, for that matter, the NSC planning board, should be apparent if you will reflect a little upon it. The whole purpose of these meetings is

to encourage uninhibited freedom of expression by all participants to the end that every possible viewpoint may be fully explored. Spontaneity and candour of expression would be considerably impaired if every speaker were talking for the record and knew that his remarks were beging transcribed. The pure product which is instilled in the council is a policy decision approved by the president. That decision is fully reflected of record of actions. That is Feb. 17, 1956.

The NSC Status of Projects as of July 1, 1954 is 20 pages TOP SECRET, still classified.

The June one is also classified, but the August one has been reviewed, with some deletions.

There is a NSC i61 deals with the psychological strategy board reported activities for the first half of 53, things like, had a response to Stalin's death etc. There are few reports from then that have been declassified. Interestingly enough on the first page part of it that deals with the CIA...

RESEARCH TRIP FEBRUARY 21-29, 1988

Eisenhower Library on Friday, February 26, 1988, reviewing a variety of files. Had a long conversation with Herb Pankratz. He was friendly, but a bit sticky in places. I pointed out that as far as I could tell NSC Executive Secretary, James Lay was NOT a subordinate to Robert Cutler. Perhaps they were equals, but Cutler was not over the NSC. I showed him the NSA Blacked out document and gave him copies of a clean set of the briefing document and my "Debunking the Debunker" paper along with several other papers. I hit difficulties at a number of points. Apparently he is in full agreement that they only reviewed the easy stuff to find Cutler memos. They did NOT review the NSC files. He claims that they did find one of the two Cutler-Twining memos (I saw it later) but he was not sure which, and that I did not call back apparently to verify that.

I expressed my concerns with the use made of their comments by the National Archives, by B. Greenwood, and by P. Klass. I asked if it would be possible to find out who else had been making requests about NSC and about MJ-12. I have to check on that (in writing). I get the feeling there has been a letter from Klass. There are tight rules at the library. Apparently they, too, have had thefts as well in the past.

I noted in the first folder that I picked out of the first box of the White House Office, National Security Council Staff papers 1948-61 Executive Secretary Subject File Series, Box #1, there is an onionskin memo from Cutler does NOT have a watermark on it, dated January 28, 1953. There is a National Scientific Intelligence Estimate for the atomic energy intelligence committee NSIE1, Dated 8 January, 1953. The cover page has typed in at the top TOP SECURITY/Security Information and at the bottom TOP SECRET/RESTRICTED DATA. In the text, however, at the top it says TOP SECRET, no "security information" up there. It is typed and not rubber stamped. In box #1 Miscellaneous File #6 there is a memo to The Atomic Energy Commission from Wilma Roma Lee Klar, secretary to the Executive Secretary of the National Security I can't find a watermark on the Council, Date Nov. 2, 1954. There seems to be something but it is impossible paper either. She may be a person to contact for future information. I should stress that there are loads of pink-sheeted items in these NSC files for 1953-56 more than 30 years old. I don't know why, but many are still classified. On a TOP SECRET cover sheet for an NSC Document, four names, Ina Holtzscheiter, J.D. Lay, S. Everett Gleason, and George Webber special staff NSC. This was

As an example of the status of James Lay, the Atomic Energy Commission sent reports on the status of nuclear weapons development to Lay for "the information of the President". Clearly he was at the top of the heap. There is a cover sheet dated June 21, 1960 to Mr. Lay from GG at the White House, whoever that was, and it has a listing of people who are under the Executive Secretary; Mr. Lay, Mr. Boggs, Mrs. Clark, Miss

Koch, and Miss Holtcheiter. The heading of this is National Security Council under Administrative Staff I have Mrs. Moock, Mr. Russel, Mr. Feichtner, Mrs. Booth, Miss Weakley, Mr. McKee, Mr. Romine. The policy coordinating staff, PC special staff, Mr. Hascons, Mr. Halla, Mr. Weber, Mr. Belk, Mr. Buford, the PC Secretary, Mr. R. Johnson, Miss Nicalo, Miss McEnroe. Then under NSC representatives on Internal Security: Mr. Coyne; Mr. Ash; Miss Conlon. Under the White House Staff it has Mr. Gray, Mr. Harr, Colonel Coffey, Mrs Haywood, Mrs. Bagnall, and Miss Nivens.

In a folder entitled CIA Watch Office Box 9, Dated March 24, 1961, memorandum for Mr. Robert A. Koch:

You are advised that Mr. Lay has resigned as executive secretary of the National Security COPS and I will be acting secretary until further notice. Marion W. Boggs, Acting Executive Secretary.

There is a folder labelled EYES ONLY; two items on the pink One is a letter Allan Dulles to Gordon Gray, TS two copies 51116, second is a report re: Soviet Cutless Weapons System 1060-63 pages TS. There is a NASA file with a note dated 1960, from Gordon Gray, Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, same job that Cutler had of Sept 11, 1958, the members of the National As Aeronautics and Space Council were President, Secretary of State, Secretary of Defense, Chairman of Atomic Energy Commission, The Administrator NASA, <u>Detlev W. Bronk</u>, General James H. Doolittle, William A.M. Burden, and Alan T. Waterman. It is interesting that in the President's appointments Wednesday the 14th of July, 1954, that he met with James S. Lay and §. Everett Gleason in the afternoon "off the record". Presumably he could have told Lay his appointment for N.Twining for the NSC/MJ-12 SSP Special Studies Project Briefing and that conversation could have resulted in Lay's sending the memo to General Twining. In 1956 there were Salmon Colored National Security Council Top Secret The instructions on the top "By direction of the Control Forms. President, this form must be signed and completed by each individual (1) who reads this document wholly or in part or (2) who personally handles it and has access to its contents. Such access must be limited to those individuals having "need to know" and appropriate TOP SECRET Clearance. One of the names is a Margaret M. Conlon. It is interesting that at the top there is printed TOP SECRET and on the bottom there is a rubber stamp that says RESTRICTED DATA. This document contains restricted data defined by the Atomic Energy Act of 1954. That Restricted DATA Stamp is not next to the TOP SECRET.

In Box 13 of White House Office National Security Council Staff Papers 1948-61, Executive Secretary Subject File Series there is a folder listed NSC Number documents numerical list of (1953-1955) All it has is the pink withdrawal sheet with three items: a list of numbered NSC documents for the year 1955 three pages long; one for 1954 four pages; and for 1947 through 1953, nineteen pages. So all the lists are still classified apparently.

On July 1, 1958, there is a table listing regular attendance

Assistant of the National Security Affairs, and 14 was the Executive Secretary NSC, and 15 the Deputy Executive Secretary There were other people not seated at the main table; a clue that they had a roughly co-equal role here. draft of a confidential memo dated July 16, 1956. Memorandum for the National Security Council Subject Operation ALERT 1956. is part of the test of continuity of the government being planned by the Office of Defence Mobilization for 1956. The president will meet with the National Security Council immediately after It goes on for a couple of pages, the start of the exercise. double spaced. The question is, is this the memo that the woman at the National Archives noted as dealing with National Defense and How could she possibly think it was 1954? This is on Operations& Alert, Folder 2, and Box #14 White House Office NSC. Executive Secretary, Subject File Series. There is an August 12, 1953 memorandum from Robert Cutler for General Smith, Mr. Kies, Governor Stassen and others. It is on onion skin and there is no watermark on the onion skin. A 1958 March memo about the OCB (Operations Coordinating Board). It mentions that the President's special assistant for security operations coordination (SOC) was Mr. Frederick M. Deerborne, Jr. who is Vice Chairman of the OCB.

In Box #17 a whole bunch of Special Assistant Cutler memoranda onionskins that are not watermarked paper. And it is interesting, one for example, for the under Secretary of state S. Robert Cutler, Special Assistant to the President and his NRC and this is Mr. Lay's copy. Copies went to Mr. Lay and Mr. Farley and Lay got copies of all the ones to various other cabinet members, but only Lay's copy has the RC on it. The others do not, nor do they have indication of a signature /s/. Cutler Memorandum 1953 this is (2) the pink sheet includes 17 different That's around May 1953. Most of the memos are on onionskin, are copies, and they are two-hole punched at the top apparently from a file. In Cutler Memo 1953 (2) there is a list of scientific personnel suggested by Dr. Bush, May 19, 1953, from a letter of 5/4/53. People are Don Price, S. Douglas Cornell, David Langmuir, Lloyd V. Berkner, Carroll Wilson, and Caryl Parker Haskins, (45 years old) the man who succeeded Bush as head of the Carnegie Institution. Interesting comment: old, Ph.D in Biology, has written several extraordinary books, biologist who operates his own laboratory, a man of independent means during the war, head of the liaison office OSRD, where he put in a fine performance, became generally respected, has been active on many governmental matters, usually as an individual advisor, State and Defense Committees, good thinker under national matters, active in civilian organizations dealing with international foreign affairs.. Noted scientist throughout the country, pleasant personality, very favorably good team worker, and then Palmer C. Putman, interesting comments

Cutler Memorandum #3, there is a pink slip with 14 items on it all in June '53, and Cutler Memorandum 1953 (4) the pink sheet has a total of 19 items mostly items from Cutler and various

people mostly TOP SECRET,. some mention of Cutler to W.B. Smith, and Miscellaneous. Previous Box, all the carbons are on onion skin with no watermark. Most are in and of themselves unclassified when separated from the attachments.

Number 5 has eleven on the pink sheet. There are 14 items on the pink slip in memorandum 1953. This is 7. Folder 8 has 21 items on pink slip. Folder No. 7 of Cutler Memorandum, the pink slip contains 17 items; item #4 which I have requested for declassification is message J. Lay to Cutler, re: NSC meeting I don't know what that is, but the date is very interesting. The memo from Cutler to Twining is here and does have an eagle watermark on the paper. It is Lay's copy that is In Folder #8 there is a memo White House Stationary dated August 18, 1954. It is typed with the big type that shows up in the Cutler Twining memo. Almost everything else is with small This one, which I have requested a copy of, has the large type. Proves that not everything is done in small. Almost all the carbons that are in this file are actually have a check mark next to Mr. Lay's name down at the bottom so that people will believe these are Lay's copies. Many of them say copy from Mr. Lay and they are checked.

Cutler left and then came back Jan. 7, 1957. Interesting letter in special assistant Cutler memorandum 1956-57 #1 from Jim. Lay, obviously old buddies and all that sort of stuff talking about secretaries. Cutler says secretary at the old Trust Company in Boston was Marion E. Masters who came down to work for him there. Wonder if she is still alive? Gordon Gray took over some time in 1958 as Special Assistant to the President.

In the Whitman file there are 5 folders of Cutler material. These seem to be mostly personal chit chat between him, Ike and Whitman and during Ike's heart attack, etc.

In the Whitman files, Cutler Folder 5 is a copy of the memorandum for the Secretary of Defense dated June 25, 1953, actually ...color even though it is clearly carbon. And I don't it is in this folder. This is the one that mentions Project Solarium is TOP SECRET SECURITY Information which, sure, is the way the other one was too. But this is a carbon with a signature. Report of European trip is in Box 10, Folder #3. There are seven more Cutler files in Box #11, but I won't go through them because they start with 1956. In Box #12 is a small file on Doolittle, couple of items of his review of CIA through Cutler. In the papers of the President there is an NSC series each of the NSC meetings, detailed notes in the one I folder for looked at. July 15, 1953 is the date of a memo. I am talking about the Office of Special Operations, which is to provide staff support security defence, deputy secretary of defense, to ... and the secretary of defence all matters international intelligence effort.... all psychological activities operations in which the department of defence is participating including... psychological warfare planning operations and research and development as well as unconventional warfare, international information activities in other operations to a similar nature which are within the cognizance of the Psychological Strategy

board, its successor agencies, or within the provisions of NSC 10-2, NSC 10+5, NSC 50-1.

Lily, was the acting executive assistant on the Operations Coordinating Board who mentioned that the secretary, Miss Talbott was in charge of the NSC files. While she was on vacation Mrs. Katherine Fairfax was in charge of the files. That was Henrietta Talbott. In an undated draft memo to apparently Lyndon Johnson from Ike, he says talking about not turning over the NSC reports: I

I believe we must all be sensitive to the added consideration that these reports are documents of the National Security Council. Never have the documents of this Council been furnished to the Congress.

I wonder if I goofed. There is a White House Office, Office of the Special Assistant National Security Affairs records, special assistant series and a logical subseries, and I got a box of 4 which starts with August 1956 which certainly wasn't my intention. There is a file in Box 10 of the White House Office OSANSA Special Assistant Series, Subject Series under Trips, about Cutler's trip to Europe, but only a small part of the final report is there strangely enough.

Some comments Sunday Night in Toronto:

Several points need to be made about the files I looked at over the last several days, both at the Truman and Eisenhower Libraries. First of all a key piece of information that was found was an indication of a meeting between Lay and S. Everett Gleason and Eisenhower, off the record, on July 14, 1954, just after noon, I think it was. It is surprising it was off the record since there were frequent meetings between the NSC and the President and Cutler was out of town so it certainly might have very well been this meeting that led to the memo to Twining about Clearly if the memo was legitimate it was done on instructions from the White House. But this was a very sensitive It hardly seems that Ike would have just called up and matter. given the information. On the other hand, since Lay's office was basically at the White House, he could very well have been summoned for an off the record meeting with Gleason. It would have been clear that Lay had clearances for everything. Cutler was out of town, it might have been that Cutler was the normal focus of the NSC/MJ-12 Special Studies Project. But since Lay and Cutler were seemingly in everything together, they sat next to each other at the meetings of the NSC, Lay got copies of just about everything that Cutler sent out, they are always their names next to each other on different listed with distribution lists and things like that. It would seem perfectly normal, I should think since one would certainly have expected that Lay would have been one of very few people in on things from the very beginning. If Souers was a member of MJ-12 dating from 1947 on, and since Souers was the first Executive Secretary of and Lay his assistant, it certainly would have seemed the NSC, reasonable since Lay was considerably younger there was always a chance something could happen to Souers that Lay would have been one of the few people with access to TOP SECRET MAJIC Information.

The second point that is clear is that there was plenty of carry-over material from the Truman Administration days to the Eisenhower Days, material that wasn't segregated out. At least it is particularly true of lots of NSC files dating from 48, 49, 50, 51, 52. The only way these could have ended up at the Eisenhower Library is if somebody kept them together with the later material. The notion that the Truman Library, for example, got everything from the Truman days is simply NOT true.

Another point that needs to be made is that so much of the material is still classified. Over and over again I would get a folder, especially at the Eisenhower Library with 20 items listed on a pink sheet at the beginning with practically nothing in the I went through an awful lot of boxes. Primarily the stuff that would have been most interesting simply wasn't there. request declassification on a number of items, but of course the titles that are listed are totally useless. Might be: Memo Lay Cutler to Lay with a date and a TS for TOP to Cutler; Memo: SECRET. But the basic notion in other words that, because it is old, is unclassified or has been declassified, is just it is perfectly clear that they had only gone Also through the first 77 boxes of the NSC Materials. If one figures

the maximum per six inch wide box with file folders, and what can be put in a box like that, at the very worst, (most of these were not tightly packed), 500 pages, even give a thousand, so that is about 40,000 pages I have gone through and they said 50,000, so that would figure out. And there is all the rest of that material, another 200,000 pages which hasn't been gone through, which nobody can go through until they have had time to review it and they don't have time or people to review it.

It became clear at the Eisenhower Library and the Truman Library, that the main function of the archivist is to provide service to researchers coming there not to conduct their own There are two papers underway by all the archivists at the Eisenhower Library. They are very helpful, they are certainly on the ball when you want things, they get them for you and they set you up nicely, and it is a great place to work, but apparently their role is service not creative work themselves. If they do do extra work it is going through files, but slowly or making up file lists for going through a box of miscellaneous material and putting files in it. At the Eisenhower Library, things are in very neat form, heavy green triple weight folders they have titles on them typed in, It's well set up and the pink sheets are backed by a sheet that stands for each of the items on the pink sheet interestingly enough. In other words when they pulled something they put it on a white sheet as well as listing it on a pink sheet.

noticed a couple of volumes of journals that deal I also with presidential archival research or something like that, part of the Political Science Association I didn't get much of a chance since it was right at closing. I just happened to notice it on a shelf there, but it is an area to follow up on because one of them at least carried letters and it would be nice to know maybe to get a letter published looking for other people who might know something. One area that I wasn't successful at digging out much useful was from the presidential diaries for Ike's activities on the 14th of July, 1954. I would certainly like to know more. I checked out a couple of things but they weren't filed in a terribly useful way. Ike apparently wrote entries, or dictated, I suppose, 🖝 long items and there was something from Axel Nielson, his old buddy but I didn't get a chance to get to the box that might have had detailed entries for that day. I will follow up with a letter.

I did manage to get copies of a number of memos apparently authored by Roscoe Hillenkoetter. They should be useful for Doctor Westcot in Madison, New Jersey for a linguistic review and evaluation. I will make a couple of sets of copies. Certainly one of the most interesting things I have found and I don't quite know how I found it, was the couple of page memo written about Forrestal dated March 31, 1949. Apparently Forrestal had really gone off the deep end, he was getting paranoid. There is nobody's name on it but it is a report. It is submitted with regard to secret investigation upon Mr. Forrestall's express belief that the telephone in his home had been tapped and that it is possible certain unidentified documents had been removed from his desk located in his bedroom. It helps explain that

Forrestald very well did go off the deep end, very unfortunately.

Dennis Bilger at the Truman Library seemed both more interested and more cooperative. He thought that Klass was on the wrong track with a focus on format and type. Seemed impressed with my 21 page NSA document. Made most of my copies while I was there which makes life simpler. It was very clear that Souers was close to HST for many years after the Presidency. It was also clear that many of the memoirs from HST to JF were very brief with just H.S.T.--sort of thank you notes and buck slips. There were no "Hells" in any. I think these were the ones Klass excerpted; these were not directives.
