Air Forces Deny Discs U. S.-Made

Material Command Chief Says Probe Getting Under Way

If there is any such thing as a flying saucer, disc, washtub or luminous ball of any kind flying around loose it was not made in America. That was the official announcement from the army air forces Monday night in answer to the epidemic of reports from 40 states ranging from the Northwest to New England.

"Neither the AAF nor any other component of the armed forces has any plane, guided missile or other aerial device under development which could possibly be mistaken for a saucer or formation of flying discs," Maj. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chief of the AAF air material command, told The Oregonian unequivocally when reached by phone at Kirtland army airbase at Albuquerque,

Air Force Investigates

"Some of these witnesses evidently saw something," General Twining, a native of Portland, declared, "but we don't know what. We are investigating."

AAF laboratories at Wright

AAF laboratories at Wright Field confirmed General Twining's statements to The Oregonian.

The navy and atomic energy commission also officially announced they had no knowledge of or connection with the mysterious missiles.

One of the most promising reports, from Russell Baird, pilot of a photographic plane near Bozeman, Mont., collapsed when the pilot announced he had merely been "gassing around the hangar" and had no intention of telling a story for publication.

Another apparently fizzled out when national guard pilots from Spokane failed to find any trace of flying platters "big as houses" supposed to have fluttered into the timber near St. Maries, Idaho.

But more reports continued to come spinning in, most of them as elusive and varied as the reported missiles them-



- The inclosed newspaper clippings are submitted for your informa tion and comment. The incident reported in Seattle appeared in the "Dayton Journal" on 12 November 1947, and should be followed up if possible.
- The story by Lionel Shapiro regarding war weapons developed in Spain evidently was printed in a number of leading newspapers throughout the country. The significance of this article will be dependent upon cer tain essential elements for such alleged important developments, such as funds, materials, experimental testing facilities, and technological "know-how". The latter is supposed to be supplied by German scientists The German scientists at this Hq indicate that no important scientists from Germany are working in Spain, and those mentioned in this article are not known to them.
- 3. If possible, therefore, an effort should be made to obtain names, qualifications, or any information that might help to identify the alleged German scientists working in Spain.
- A brief statement was made in a recent intelligence report from Hq, USAF, AC/AS-2, regarding a flying disc incident in Alaska in September. The close range sighting reported should render a more detailed observation than what was reported, which also suggests a follow-up.
- 5. It is further requested that this office be advised as to progress being made on the plotting of all flying disc incidents to date, particularly in North America. It was understood that Dr. Carroll was going to plot these incidents, but no further word was received regarding this effort.

b. When a trail is observed, it is a lightly colored blue-brown haze, similar, to a rocket engine's exhaust. Contrary to a rocket of the solid type, one observation indicates that the fuel may be throttled, which would indicate a liquid rocket engine.

- As to shape, all observations state that the object is circular, or at least elliptical, flat on the bottom and slightly domed on the top.
- d. Size estimates place it somewhere near the size of a C-54 or Constellation as they would appear while flying at 10,000!.
- Some reports describe two tabs located at the rear and symmetrical about e axis of flight motion.
- f. Flights have been reported containing from three to nine objects, flying good formation on each other, with speeds always above 300 knots.
 - The discs oscillate laterally while flying along, which could be snaking.

I find that, by an oversight, I did not acknowledge your letter, reference VCAS/L1845 of 25th July, (unless I did so in manuscript). However that may be, I saw Vandenberg as soon as I received it, and explained the position to him, and also left him a copy of your letter in confirmation of my conversation.

This afternoon Vandenberg asked me to come and see him. He told me that on the American side, the true purpose of the project had been kept extremely secret and was only known to himself, Twining, LeMay and White. He said that this being so, they had been caused a certain embarrassment by enquiries which had been made by the Air Force staff in Washington of General Romey (who is Director of Operations). Ramey, of course, has had to deal with the loan of these aircraft and the training of the crews for their ostensible purpose, but is not aware of the true purpose. The same goes for Breakey on our side. If therefore felt that there was nothing for it but to suggest to Vandenberg that Breakey should now be brought into the picture - otherwise the kind of embarrassment of which he was complaining would be bound to continue. Vandenberg agreed, and I have therefore put Breakey completely into the picture, and he will now deal with Twining on such points as concern the true purpose of the Mission, and with Ramey on such points as concern the ostensible purpose of the Mission.





You may remember I spoke to you about the proposal to form a High Altitude Reconnaissance Flight in this country to undertake certain joint research work, required by the U.S.A.F. and ourselves.

- We are proposing to send three crews to Barksdale Air Force base about the end of the month, in order that they may be converted to the B.45 under arrangements which have been made by General LeMay.
- Although we are going ahead in this way, C.A.S. would like you to explain to General Vandenberg that we have not yet obtained the political agreement which will be necessary if the full project is to be undertaken. In view of the time factor we felt, however, that we should not wait for this approval before sending the crews over. Their arrival does not. therefore, in any way commit us to conclude the full programme.

SUBJECT: AMC Opinion Concerning "Flying Discs"

TO:

Commanding General. Army Air Forces Washington 25, D. C.

ATTENTION: Brig. General George Schulgen

AC/AS-2

- 1. As requested by AC/AS-2 there is presented below the considered opinion of this Command concerning the so-called "Flying Discs." This opinion is based on interrogation report data furnished by AC/AS-2 and preliminary studies by personnel of T-2 and Aircraft Laboratory, Engineering Division T-3. This opinion was arrived at in a conference between personnel from the Air Institute of Technology, Intelligence T-2, Office, Chief of Engineering Division, and the Aircraft, Power Plant and Propeller Laboratories of Engineering Division T-3.
 - 2. It is the opinion that:
- a. The phenomenon reported is something real and not visionary or fictitious.
- b. There are objects probably approximating the shape of a disc, of such appreciable size as to appear to be as large as man-made aircraft.
- c. There is a possibility that some of the incidents may be caused by natural phenomena, such as meteors.
- d. The reported operating characteristics such as extreme rates of climb, maneuverability (particularly in roll), and action which must be considered evasive when sighted or contacted by friendly aircraft and radar, lend belief to the possibility that some of the objects are controlled either manually, automatically or remotely.
- c. The apparent common description of the objects is as follows: $\begin{picture}(60,0) \put(0,0){\line(0,0){100}} \put(0,0)$
 - (1) Metallic or light reflecting surface.
 - (2) Absence of trail, except in a few instances when the object apparently was operating under high performance conditions.
 - (3) Circular or elliptical in shape, flat on bottom and domed on top.

- (4) Several reports of well kept formation flights varying from three to nine objects.
- (5) Normally no associated sound, except in three instances a substantial rumbling roar was noted.
- (6) Level flight speeds normally above 300 knots are estimated.
- f. It is possible within the present U.S. knowledgeprovided extensive detailed development is undertaken—to construct a piloted aircraft which has the general description of the object in subparagraph (e) above which would be capable of an approximate range of 7000 miles at subsonic speeds.
- g. Any developments in this country along the lines indicated would be extremely expensive, time consuming and at the considerable expense of current projects and therefore, if directed, should be set up independently of existing projects.
 - h. Due consideration must be given the following:
 - (1) The possibility that these objects are of domestic origin—the product of some high security project not known to AC/AS-2 or this Command.
 - (2) The lack of physical evidence in the shape of crush recovered exhibits which would undeniably prove the existence of these objects.
 - (3) The possibility that some foreign nation has a form of propulsion possibly nuclear, which is outside of our domestic knowledge.

3. It is recommended that:

- a. Headquarters, Army Air Forces issue a directive assigning a priority, security classification and Code Name for a detailed study of this matter to include the preparation of complete sets of all available and pertinent data which will then be made available to the Army, Navy, Atomic Energy Commission, JRDB, the Air Force Scientific Advisory Group, NACA, and the RAND and NEPA projects for comments and recommendations, with a preliminary report to be forwarded within 15 days of receipt of the data and a detailed report thereafter every 30 days as the investigation develops. A complete interchange of data should be effected.
- 4. Awaiting a specific directive AMC will continue the investigation within its current resources in order to more closely define the nature of the phenomenon. Detailed Essential Elements of Information will be formulated immediately for transmittal thru channels.

JRDB is the Joint Research and Development Board set up and headed by Dr. Vannevar Bush and the successor to the wartime Office of Scientific Research and Development also directed by Bush and which had set up both the wartime Manhattan Project and its successor the Atomic Energy Commission. NACA is the technical group—National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics—which had reprecentatives from all the military services and civil aviation and which ran the wind tunnels, was responsible for the development of supersonic aircraft and later became the NASA. Its prewar chairman was Dr. Vannevar Bush who was a member still in in 1947. Twining was also on it. Dr. James H. Doolittle and Dr. Detlev Bronk an aviation physiologist were added to NACA in 1948. Doolittle became Chairman in 1956.NEPA stands for Nuclear Energy for Propulsion Applications. Eventually became the Nuclear Aircraft Propulsion (ANP) program. Theodore Von Karman was Chairman of the AFSAG and was succeeded by Doolittle who had been a member for sometime. Another member was Dr. Edward Teller. 
